Clark Kerr, President of the University of California and professor of industrial relations, will leave Dec. 22 for the Near East and Asia to participate in a series of seminars, it was announced today.

Accompanying the President will be four colleagues who are conducting an inter-university research program on problems of labor-management and social policy in economic growth.

The seminars will be sponsored by the Ford Foundation.

Wellman Acting President Dr. Kerr will be absent on special leave and annual vacation through Jan. 30, 1959. During his absence Vice-President Harry R. Wellman will be acting pres-

Colleagues accompanying President Kerr will be Thomas H. Carrol, vice-president of the Ford Foundation; John T. Dunlop, professor of economics at Harvard; Frederick A. Harbison, professor of economics at Princeton and Charles A. Myers, professor of industrial relations at Massachusetts Institute of Tech-

They will participate in seminars with representatives from universities, government departments and industrial concerns in Istanbul, Beirut, Tehran, Karachi, New Delhi, Jakarta and Tokvo.

During President Kerr's stay in Jakarta he will visit University of California projects which provide research and training services in economics and in medicine to the University of In-

Cal Leads Foreign Student Enrollment. UCSB Hosts 32

A total enrollment of 2,372 foreign students and scholars has been reported for all campuses of the University of California for the Fall 1958 semester. This is believed to be the largest number of such students at any American institution.

Of the total, 1,376 are enrolled at Berkeley, 672 on the UCLA campus, 219 at Davis, 72 at the San Francisco Medical Center, 32 at UCSB and one at Riverside. In addition, there are 15 foreign scholars at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at La Jolla. Canada, with 179 students, has

the largest delegation from a single country. There are six Canadian students on the SB campus.

Japan has the second highest with 165 visitors in the University. There are two Japanese students at Santa Barbara.

Other foreign student and scholar groups from specific countries or areas include China (from Formosa and those who remained in the U.S. following the communist occupation) with 158; India with 147; England. 113; Korea, 97; Israel with 92; Germany, 89; Iran, 83; Hong Kong, 77; the Philippines, 75;

Sophomore students will register Friday, Feb. 6.


