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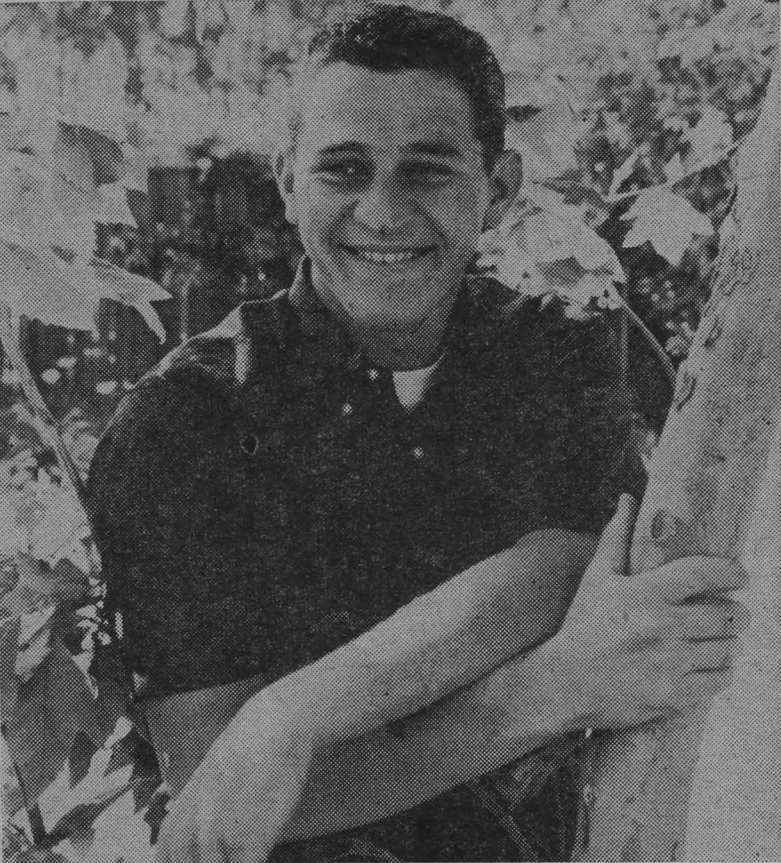

In addition to the hotly contested race for president between John Fiscalini and Guy Shipp, two major propositions will be voted on in the election.

51% Must Endorse

The proposed graduated fee for the new student center will be on the ballot. A total of 51 per cent of the eligible voters must endorse the fee before it becomes a reality.

The proposal would make it mandatory for students to contribute to the new SU when they pay their incidental fees. The scale will be \$1 per semester through the spring of 1961, then increasing \$1 per semester per year until '64 and '65, where it will remain at \$5 until the loan is paid off.

Proponents of the fee state that it is essential if UCSB is to have a new student center in future years.

President's Powers

Also on the ballot for the voters' approval will be several constitution changes. The most significant proposed change would give the AS president authority to appoint and dismiss committee and board chairmen. Council would approve appointments and a three-fourths vote of Council could overrule dismissals.

Another significant proposition on the ballot would limit students to one office on Council with the exception of the vice-president, who serves as Elections chairman.

Under the current system students may hold numerous non-voting jobs, but only one voting position.

Three Senior Class Openings Attract Eight Candidates

Eight candidates are running for the offices of Senior Class president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer. Vying for the top position are Mike Rappaport, John Vincent and Gladys Johnson.

Rappaport has participated in UCSB affairs, serving on the Board of Athletic control this year, and is a member of Blue Key.

John Vincent has served on the Sophomore Class Council. Gladys Johnson has served as non-affiliated women's rep and was in Phrateres.

Opposing each other for the office of Senior Class vice-president are Linda Jones and Carolyn Lane. Jones has served as an officer in Manzanita Hall and is a member of the Delta Phi Epsilon honorary society. Carolyn Lane is in UCSB's Junior Panhellenic and was student-body vice-president of her high school.

There are three choices for the office of Senior Class secretary-treasurer. Candidates Jan Purvis was active in junior-college affairs, serving as AWS president, and was chairman of the Finance Committee.

Carol Dotson has been active in Sigma Kappa, serving as recording secretary and vice-president.

Donna Weyand was active in student government in high school and is interested in the student government at UCSB.

FIVE COEDS. COMPETING FOR WOMEN'S REP JOBS

Three of five Gaucha coed candidates will be elected this week to serve as women's reps-at-large, a voting Council position.

The five contenders are Sally Beth Jones, Pat McCarthy, Carol Saindon, Diana Sanders and Gretchen Ziegler.

Sally Beth Jones outlines her platform: "If I am elected to the office of women's rep-at-large, I will strive to keep an unbiased mind when presenting the views of the students to Legislative Council.

"I feel that this is very important in giving the students a fairer representation.

"In high school I served as commissioner of publicity on the Board of Commissioners. This gave me valuable experience in representing students to the student government."

McCarthy Platform

Pat McCarthy reports, "If I am elected, my first duty will be to represent the Associated Students and present their criticisms and desires to Legislative Council so that constructive action can be taken.

"I will also keep the students informed of the plans and intentions of Legislative Council." Miss McCarthy is Oak Hall resident assistant and is currently serving on the Student Union Committee.

Saindon's Qualifications

Carol Saindon's qualifications include jobs as women's RHA rep, on the Charities Committee, Social Committee and Student Union Committee.

Miss Saindon says, "Based upon my experience on Legislative Council, I feel that the following objectives are desirable and practical; I pledge to work for their adoption:

"One, a first-rate marching band. Two, preservation and continuation of what is best and sound in traditional campus activities. Three, support of fund-

raising activities for the proposed student center."

Diana Sanders

Diana Sanders says, "My platform is to promote school spirit and interest in campus activities through more effective communication within the student body; to represent to the best of my ability the best interests of the majority of women students at UCSB."

Miss Sanders is a member of Kappa Omicron Phi honorary, and activities chairman of her living group.

Gretchen Ziegler was secretary of her Sophomore and Junior classes and served as a song leader.

Gretchen Ziegler

Miss Ziegler reports, "Another method of informing students of Legislative Council action is needed. Instead of visiting non-informed students, I believe that bi-monthly reports containing pertinent information should be sent to the students.

"Being able to visit well-informed students and carry on constructive discussion, instead of ignorant students being told facts they should already know, would be more effective to all concerned.

"Active committee participation will be my other concern as your representative-at-large."

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SIX SEEK REP POST

Three Major AS Positions Sought by Clay, Castillo, Vaughan, Fisher, Haber, Largent

Six vie for the voting Council post of men's rep-at-large in the campus elections this week. Candidates are Rosendo Castillo, John Clay, Ray Fisher, Harv Haber, Ron Largent and Grady Vaughan.

Rosendo Castillo calls for "clear, positive and objective legislation in the Legislative Council, reflecting the desires of the members of the AS, and better and closer ties between the student government and the students.

"Also, investigation of better job opportunities for needy, deserving students—athletes and non-athletes—and an increase of good relations between the campus and the Santa Barbara community."

Soph Veep

Castillo, a Gaucha trackster, has served as vice-president of his Sophomore Class and house manager for Phi Psi Zeta.

John Clay says, "My main objective in running for this office is to unify the Legislative Council and the student body. I want to promote more awareness, in-

terest and participation in student government.

"This can be accomplished only through direct personal contact by each representative with the individual groups and with the whole student body."

Harv Haber's qualifications and platform were not available at press time.

Fisher Platform

Ray Fisher has served as Frosh Camp counselor, was AS president at high school.

He says, "I will work for three main objectives: a general and fair representation of the men students, greater communication between students and student government, and a strengthening of student government itself.

"I believe that on the basis of my past experience I will be able

to accomplish constructive programs in these areas."

Largent Platform

Ron Largent says, "The representative should present the views of the students as he sees them. He should be one who has participated in the various aspects of campus life, so as to form those views.

"The representative should also be willing to talk with the many he represents, so as to further develop his views and present the additional ideas of his constituents."

Largent, Gaucha head cheerleader, is Sophomore Class president and a member of the Music Control Board.

Grady Vaughan's platform and qualifications were not available at press time.

Lorraine Hoppe is RHA publicity chairman and a member of Rally Committee. She describes her platform: "Working on RHA Council and Rally Committee, I have gained a better understanding of our student government."

"I have lived on campus for a year and a half and realize the lack of understanding of student government by the students. If students knew more about their government they would take a greater interest in it."

Marilyn Jacobs says, "I feel

that Legislative Council and RHA are in need of a closer relationship. The RHA rep, being a member of both the Legislative and RHA Councils, is in the position to bring student government to hall members and convey their views to the policy-making Legislative Council."

Miss Jacobs has served as president of her hall and member of RHA Council.

Barbara Schiller is RHA Council secretary, and past publicity chairman for the council.

She says, "Realizing that the newly established RHA women's rep holds one of 14 crucial votes on Legislative Council, I will strive, if elected, to fully represent the interests of next year's 776 women resident students."

"Because I feel that there is a need for greater resident and non-resident student unity, I will work to build a stronger bridge between RHA and Legislative Council, and would consider it an honor to join next year's crew of Pontifex Maximi."

Giansiracusa, Higginbotham, Kirk Campaign For Non-Affil; Warren, Glaser Opposed

Incumbent Chuck Warren opposes Warren Glaser for non-affiliated men's rep, and Judith Kirk, Donna Giansiracusa and Leslie Higginbotham compete for the non-affiliated women's vote in tomorrow's big elections.

Warren has held his position since February. He states, "I am acquainted with the operations of Council. I am a delegate for the La Vista Club for the Blind at the California State Council for the Blind."

"I hold the only two votes at this council for the Santa Barbara and Ventura area. I have also attended classes on parliamentary procedure."

His opponent, Glaser, has held numerous offices at Ventura College, including the vice-presidency.

In his platform, Glaser said he would establish posted office hours for consultation; publish, at regular intervals, Council proceedings pertaining to the non-affils, and try to establish a non-affiliated men's group similar to TONG.

Judith Kirk has served on various committees, was RHA rep and vice-president, and secretary of the Freshman Class.

She proposes contact with the non-affiliated women students of Santa Barbara to keep them informed on student government.

Donna Giansiracusa has been vice-president and social chair-

man of Manzanita, and a flag twirler. In her platform she states the non-affiliated women students representation can be improved through questionnaires, phone calls and personal visits to off-campus groups.

Leslie Higginbotham was vice-president at El Camino College

and is a member of the UCSB forensics squad.

In her platform Miss Higginbotham sees a lessening of communication and less interest as

the campus grows.

She proposes to improve communication between Council and non-affiliated women by "speaking for those whom I represent."

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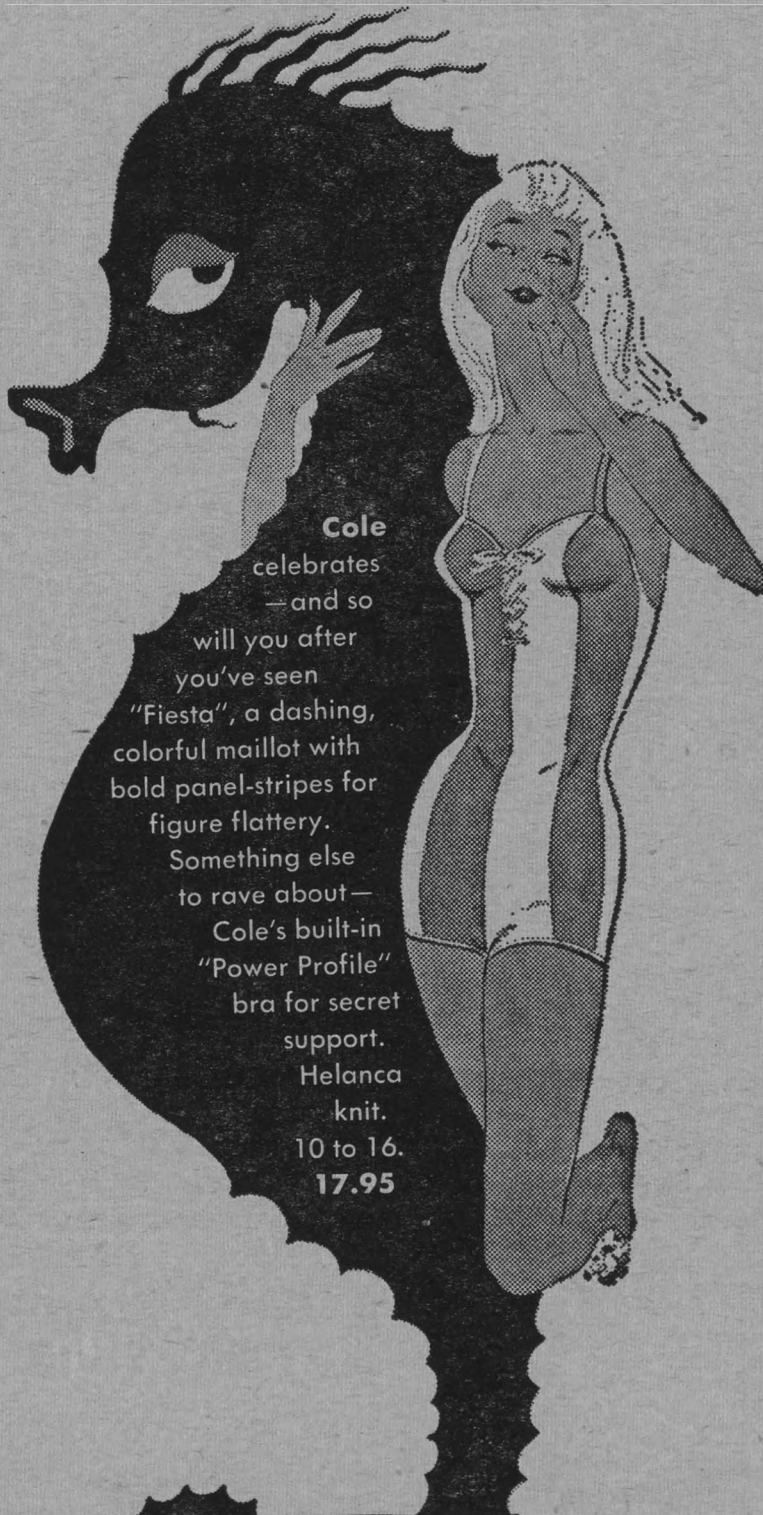

WERT FAVORS WELFARE, ACADEMIC COMMITTEES

As a candidate for the office of AS vice-president, I am fully aware of the responsibilities and trust of the position. I believe that I have the experience and desire necessary to fulfill the requirements of the office.

Student Government need not be a farce. It can, if supplied with vigorous, experienced, and vitally interested officers, do more than collect and parcel student fees and sponsor dances. It can provide services and can become a representative voice in the administrative policy making which effects our interests. It is toward these ends that I would work as AS vice-president.

To carry out these policies, I would:

1. *Work toward reorganizing the committees and boards and, where necessary, combine, delete, or add to the present system.* An example of this reorganization was the changing of the Board of Athletic Control to give the students more responsibility in defining athletic policy. Other committees that I feel should be examined are Standards, Pre-Audit and ACB.

2. *Establish a committee on Student Welfare and an Academic Council.* The Student Welfare Committee would be able to give the backing of the Associated Students to such problems as parking on campus and Isla Vista housing facilities. This committee would investigate such complaints and make recommendations to the proper administrative departments.

The Academic Council would gather information concerning graduate schools as a student service, and would make recommendations on curriculum and student-faculty relations.

3. *I also favor the Student Union Graduated Fee plan.* It is the best possible way to finance the new student center. I believe that a student union is necessary for the welfare of school spirit and the prestige of the student body.

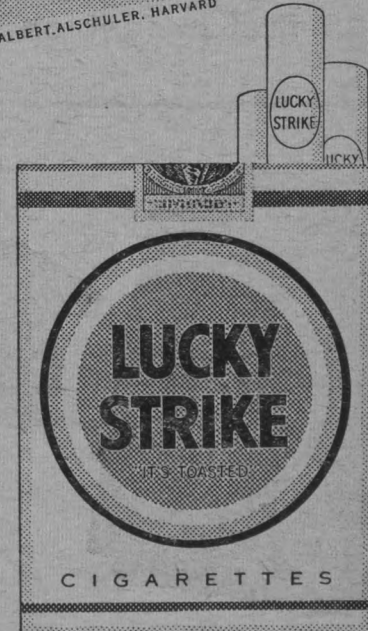
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CCAA SPIKEFEST SET SATURDAY

Rain Postpones Twin Bill After Defeat to Aztecs

April showers washed away the University of California, Santa Barbara's hope of escaping from the CCAA baseball cellar Saturday.

The Gauchos, who just the day before battled title-contending San Diego State down to the wire before succumbing by a narrow 7-6 count, were forced indoors when a steady downpour resulted in the postponement of a scheduled doubleheader with fifth-place Long Beach State.

Coach Rene Rochelle's crew, continuing to improve with each game, could have scampered up the ladder to within reach of the '49ers, their nearest competition, with a sweep of Saturday's twin bill, but as it now stands, they are still three hops back of Long Beach with an 0-7 conference mark.

No announcement has been made as to the rescheduling of the game, the first rain-out on the UCSB schedule this season.

In Friday's contest, the Gauchos backed up Jim Escareno's fancy relief job with clutch hitting, but, fighting an uphill battle after the fourth inning, fell one run short with the winning runs on second and third in the last of the ninth.

Duke Ellington's bases-loaded single shot UCSB into an early 2-0 advantage in the second, but the Gauchos, plagued by errors, helped San Diego score four times in the third and three times again in the fourth to move comfortably in front, 7-2.

Escareno relieved starter Bill Wetzel in the fourth and proceeded to set the Aztecs down without a run for the remaining five rounds, while his teammates whittled away at the San Diego lead.

Back-to-back singles by Rich Gunner and Ellington produced a run in the seventh, and then catcher Ron Huesser unloaded a towering two-run homer down the leftfield line to clean the bases, "one of those you don't even feel," termed UCSB's top conference batsman.

With one out in the ninth and the Gauchos trailing 7-5, Huesser, who has hit safely in every CCAA game, parked a double into left-center to bring the UCSB stock surging upward once again. After Aztec reliever Tom Biscotti got the second out, Vaughn Wipf walked and second sacker Bill Shortell, back in the UCSB lineup after an absence of two weeks, rifled a double to score Huesser.

UCSB Nine Seeks First CCAA Triumph Against Front-Running Bulldogs Friday

Coach Rene Rochelle and his University of California, Santa Barbara horsehiders are still looking for their elusive first conference win today. The Gaucho nine, mired in the CCAA basement with an 0-7 rating, heads northward Friday to tangle with highly-touted Fresno State and Cal Poly in a three-game weekend series, the next-to-last week of scheduled action for UCSB.

Santa Barbara meets the Bulldogs, 19-8 against college competition and sporting a 23-10 over-all record, at 3 p.m. Friday, before moving on to San Luis Obispo for a Saturday doubleheader with the fourth-place Broncos.

The rainout of last Saturday's games against Long Beach State gave Rochelle's mound corps a chance to recover from Friday's donnybrook with San Diego State in which two of the four front-line Gaucho flingers saw action.

Rochelle has not named a starting pitcher for Friday's contest against the conference's third-place club, but will most likely open with Jim Hezlep, coming back with Bill Wetzel and Jim Escareno Saturday at Poly.

The Gauchos, 5-11 on the sea-

son, will probably face either southpaw Leroy Gregory (6-0) or Harv Casey (4-1) at Fresno, while having to cope with the bats of Augie Garrido (.379), Joe Fischer (.361) and Jerry White (.346).

A sweep of Saturday's twin bill could set the Gauchos up for a possible leap out of the cellar. The Mustangs, boasting only a mediocre 9-14 record, have only two starters over the .300 level, with catcher Fred Bubeck hitting at a .333 clip and rightfielder Bob Williams checking in at .310.

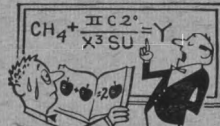

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SHIPP, FISCALINI FALLACIES . . .

Unfortunately, Gaucho voters do not have an outstanding candidate for AS president. Neither Guy Shipp nor John Fiscalini compares with Jerry Combs, last year's president, or Stan McGinley.

El Gaucho does not believe it fair to support one candidate or the other. However, the Editorial Board feels obligated to point out some of the major flaws in the candidates' pre-election promises.

One way of doing this is to carefully examine their platforms, which appeared in Friday's paper. Every voter who sincerely desires to make an intelligent choice should do the same. Both platforms are indicative of the shortcomings of the two candidates. First let's look at Shipp's case.

The Shipp Case

He favors fewer restrictions on AS activities, citing Barbary Coast as an example. Shipp neglected the fact that these restrictions were adopted by Council for good reasons. Students tend to get out of hand, especially at Homecoming and Barbary Coast.

Had Shipp looked into the matter more carefully, he would see these restrictions are essential.

Shipp Misinformed

He wants a student-opinion poll to discover what students desire in the paper. On this matter he is misinformed. He says *El Gaucho* was directed by Council to take such a poll.

Council only requested *El Gaucho* to conduct a poll. Due to staff limitations, this was not done. Besides, a poll would only indicate what is popular in the paper, not what is good.

The student newspaper should remain free from Council's interference. Shipp's proposal would have the opposite effect.

Bungling Students

Shipp's proposed Student Grievance Committee to investigate apartment-rental policies is poorly conceived. The administration and the housing office would not be pleased with inexperienced students bungling their job for them.

Shipp drags out the old elections standby—visitations by reps to living groups. This was tried last year and was a dismal failure because the majority of students are not interested in student affairs and few have constructive suggestions.

This year Council voted down a visitations plan. Visitations is an old campaign plank, sadly overworked and hardly worth bringing up again.

Most of Shipp's ideas would work only if the students were much more interested in their government than they are now. If he thinks the campus is going to wake up overnight, he's a wishful thinker.

Now turn to Fiscalini's "Real Student Government" platform. Fiscalini wants to publish a semi-monthly report of Council activities, saying "This will be done at personal expense if necessary."

Grandstand Play

He must know the AS president has a sizable expense account. If necessary, it could easily be made even larger. This is strictly a grandstand play.

Fiscalini's platform describes the "possibility of a proposed gas station featuring reduced rates and increased employment for students."

He must have a low opinion of the average student's intelligence. Fiscalini planned to contact oil companies and even wrote to the Attorney General of California—but he didn't bother to walk across campus and check with a single University official.

The Gas Station Hoax

Had he checked earlier, as he now has done under pressure, he would have found that such a gas station is impossible. The Business Office informed *El Gaucho* there is no possibility of such an idea because 1) UCSB's over-all master plan leaves no room for a gas station, and 2) it is against University policy to compete with private business by selling at reduced rates.

Fiscalini should have checked before making his political pitch. He can now insist it's not impossible, vow to fight the administration, but the fact remains the gas station was used merely as a vote-getter.

How About a Beer Garden?

He really should campaign for a beer garden in the Student Union—it is much more attractive and just as likely.

Finally, Fiscalini is for "continuing bull sessions as is done in the RHA." This function traditionally has had nothing to do with the AS president.

The bull sessions have been successful because the RHA students have made them so. Fiscalini is way out of line in infringing on the accomplishments of the RHA. It's like Eisenhower trying to take credit for good city government.

Ike has nothing to do with local affairs, and Fiscalini has nothing to do with RHA bull sessions.

These are some of the inadequacies of both platforms. As a voter, you are obligated to make a sincere choice after checking the facts.

Don't listen to the rumors, what your buddy says, or how your house is voting. Check for yourself.

"Never A Gas Station" Says Regents Secretary

Monday evening John Fiscalini continued to campaign for a Campus gas station. He told the Chi Omega and Kappa Alpha Theta sororities and the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity that a station was possible.

To support his cause he cited a case at UCLA where the Regents voted down a gas

station only by a close, split decision.

From Los Angeles, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents Jean Wall stated yesterday morning, "No gas station has ever been proposed to the Regents. They have been asked for just about everything else but never a gas station."

Candidate Guy Shipp Discusses Chances; Comments on Qualifications, John Fiscalini

Who will win the election?

"It looks like a very close election for president, but I wouldn't be running if I didn't think I was going to win."

Where is your main support coming from?

"I feel I have a good chance in all the areas of the student body—I think I have a good cross section of support."

Why should the students vote for you for president?

"Because I am qualified for the job and I want to do a good job if I am elected."

Would Fiscalini make a good president?

"I think John would make a good president, but I wouldn't be opposing him if I didn't feel I would be a better one."

It is said that you were not a strong Junior Class president; what is your comment?

"I could have done a better job—no doubt about it. I made the mistake of trying to carry a full load and participate in student government. I won't be that foolish again. Next year I am only carrying 12 units. You must remember that the class presidents, after the sophomore year, are limited in what they can do."

It is said that you were pressured into running for president; is that true?

"Pressured isn't the proper word. I was asked by many of my friends to run, but I decided not because I was asked but because I want the job."

Can you really do something about beach improvements?

"Certainly something can be done. Possibly a student committee could work on it. Improving the campus beach is not too great a job for the associated students to undertake."

Is McGinley a good president?

"Yes, he has been a very good president. He is an excellent chairman of Council and a good representative of the student body. Sometimes he is too non-committal."

Would you be an active or a passive president?

"As I see it, the president has two primary roles. He should make sure things are done properly in committees, and he should push his ideas and policies. As chairman of Council he must moderate the meetings, not dictate them. I would be a strong executive."

Gas Station Possible Says John Fiscalini

With reference to that part of my platform pertaining to the proposed Student Gas Station, I feel a clarification must be made.

I have found, in further investigation, that such a proposal is against University administrative policy.

However, this does not mean that a gas station is not possible for I will actively pursue any efforts towards the establishment of such a proposal. The student gas station is possible.

FISCALINI RELATES VIEWS ON OPPONENT, PLATFORM

Are you going to be the next AS president?

"I still have to answer the same way—I don't know. It will depend primarily on the merits of the individuals and the platforms. I think it will be a close race."

Where do you expect to get the majority of your votes?

"I hope to get support from all sources—RHA, Greeks and independents. I don't like to think of it as getting support from different factions but from individuals."

Would Guy Shipp make a good president?

"I think he would make a good president. Guy and I are different types of individuals. He would rely more on sub-lieutenants. I would be a more active president. I'm a little bit more active and vigorous. I would pursue the job in a more active manner."

Why do you feel the Delt penalty was fair and just?

(Fiscalini stated March 17 that the administration has made a wise and judicious decision on the Delt penalty.)

"It was a fair and judicious decision—a little too harsh—but fair in that they broke a rule. It was not unduly harsh—it might have been mitigated somewhat."

In your platform you state that you would re-define Standards Committee; why, and how would you accomplish this?

"I am very dissatisfied with the functions of Standards. The students should have some voice in determining penalties—they should have more voice. If a problem comes up they should get it first. . . . I would talk to Dr. Reynolds and Dr. Noble and establish a chain of command—I think the administration does have a certain respect for student views."

Has McGinley been a good president?

"He has done a good job. He is not active enough. Student government hasn't been brought to the students. Stan did a very qualified job, he put a lot of time into it. I would like to see the president make reports to the students. This should have been carried on."

Speaker From Warsaw

A famous philosopher and logician from behind the Iron Curtain will include this campus in his American tour in a lecture to be given Friday at 4 p.m. in the lecture hall of the new classroom building. The philosopher is Kazimierz Ajdukiewicz, professor of philosophy at Warsaw University. He is widely known on the continent but, due to lack of translations, his work is relatively unknown in the U.S. The Philosophy Department will act as host.
