According to a statement of football expenditures and receipts issued by Graduate Manager Bill Russell, the 25-cent admission charge is necessary to offset the increased cost of equipment, food and transportation, and to place pigskin finances on a sound foot-

The student body fee is \$7.80, the same today as it was in 1938. Yet football shoes have gone up from \$8 to \$12 a pair—and the team this year needed 60 new were required, rose in price from \$10 to \$16. Even socks have risen from 35 to 55 cents per pair. Inflation threatened to overrun the budget, and the Student Council was forced to get more money

That's where the \$13,623.70 goes. Where does it come from? The Student Body Fund contributes \$2723.70; the remaining \$11,-000 must be raised from gate receipts, sale of programs, and concessions. The fog at the Pomona game, incidentally, cost an estimated \$2000 in gate receipts.

In the light of these facts, 25 cents a game is not an exorbitant price to pay for keeping football in the college.


