Homecoming Day Draws Near As Organizations Unveil Plans For Participation

"Rolling Home to Harvest Homecoming" began to roll at Santa Barbara college this week as campus organizations unveiled plans for events beginning the evening of October 31. The itinerary will include a student musical review, the Homecoming parade, the Gaucho-Cal-Poly football game, breakfasts, luncheons, brunches, dances, alumni reunions, receptions, and a variety of sorority and fraternity events that will be of interest to both alumni and actives.

Window Space To Be Given

Donated by Santa Barbara merchants for the purpose of displaying photographs and campaign material of Homecoming Queen candidates, choice down-town show windows are now available to organizations or individuals sponsoring contestants. The window will be allocated by a drawing, and clubs will be permitted to decorate the window in any manner they may choose.

Organizations or individuals desiring window space may leave an application addressed to Charlie Jones with Mrs. Ester Porter in the Alumni Office. The deadline for submitting applications has been set for Thursday, October 23, at 3 p.m., at which time the drawing will be held and the windows assigned.

Sigma Xi To Meet

The Santa Barbara chapter of Sigma Xi fraternity will meet tonight in the Gaucho Mesa campus auditorium to hear Dr. Tracy M. Sonneborn, Indiana University, lecture on the topic, "Beyond the Gene."

The lecture is sponsored jointly by the SBC SX chapter and the Santa Barbara college and will be repeated on the Riviera campus October 23.

There is no admission charge for the lecture and all members of the fraternity, whether affiliated with the local club or not have been invited. Students and members of the college faculty who may have an interest in genetics may attend. The lecture is also open to the general public.

College Not To Have Excessive Boost In Future Enrollment Figures, Provost Says

Santa Barbara college will not experience another excessive boost in enrollment, Dr. J. Harold Williams, provost of the college, stated this week. A recently fixed limitation sets the maximum enrollment at 3000 students.

Establishment of a limited student body dovetails with the newly inaugurated faculty project to develop a wide but intensive program of general education for students who do not wish to specialize in any particular field.

Graduate work will not be initiated on the campus, according to Dr. Williams.

"The administration believes," he said, "that the destiny of the college, and of the whole University of California family, can best be fulfilled by keeping Santa Barbara a strong, consistent, undergraduate college."

In conjunction with the plan to

strengthen the college academically, the provost pointed out that of 164 instructors on the campus, 61 hold doctor's degrees and several of those holding masters are now studying for doctorates. Nearly every major American university and some foreign, including Oxford, are represented in the faculty. Dr. Williams stated that the administration will continue to bolster the quality of the teaching staff whenever possible.

Concerning the apparent delay in developing the Mesa campus, Dr. Williams made it clear that the university does not intend to build until suitable contracts and materials are available. When they are, construction will begin on several units simultaneously so that the college may move as a unit into the new buildings. In the meantime, committees and architects are busy with plans for the 110-acre campus.

Active Physical Education Department women majors will engage alumni in a traditional volleyball game at 11 a.m. The alumni vs. actives tilt will be followed by a luncheon, served by department members on tables in front of the Men's Gym.

CITIZENS TO SEND US OLYMPIC TEAM TO LONDON GAMES

Entries of the United States in the Olympic Games at London in 1948 will be financed in a manner different from that used in previous years according to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Contributions will be accepted at one particular event of each member of the association. The collection at Santa Barbara college will be made during the College of Pacific football game at La Playa field on November 7. Arrangements have been made for donors to make their contributions at the ticket windows.

In making the announcement, the NCAA emphasized that contributions are not compulsory but will be handled on a purely voluntary basis, and that the plan presents a more representative and fair way to sponsor the Olympic team.

Donations will be accepted in denomination of 25 cents. Each contributor will be given a 1948 Olympic Team certificate, in recognition of having helped send the team abroad.

Third 'Great Books' Lecture Is Scheduled For October 29 At Santa Barbara Public Library

Lecturing on Plato's "The Republic," Santa Barbara college's Dr. Harry Girvetz will present the third of the "Great Books" lecture series in the Santa Barbara Public Library October 29, at 7:30 p.m.

Designed to bring a continuing program in world culture to the people of Santa Barbara, the series is being sponsored by the Committee of Drama, Lectures and Music of the college in cooperation with the Santa Barbara Public Library, and the Santa Barbara Community Institute.

An authority on "The Republic," Girvetz will develop the incredible influence of the Platonic doctrines on man's conceptions today, and will trace those influences through the centuries. Perhaps second only to the Bible in its influence on western culture, the book deals with morality, the ideal state, politics, factors of justice, injustice, truth, and evil. As in all great cultural influences, the work of Plato excels in literary quality as well as in intellectual merit.

By way of preliminary, the similarity of the martyrdom of Socrates and that of Christ will be discussed in the lecture.

The remaining "Great Books" lectures will include the following: "Paradise Lost," Milton, George Hand, Ph.D., Nov. 12; "Faust," Gothe, Dowe Stuurman, B. Litt., Dec. 3; "Madame Bovary," Flaubert, William F. Aggeler, Ph.D., Jan. 7.

Beginning October 31, citations for trespassing on private property will be issued to all Gauchos who have failed to register their automobiles with the Gaucho Police Department, Captain Floyd Bernard emphasized today.

The ruling is in compliance with a recent decision of the campus Student Safety Committee and conforms to Section 603A, Vehicle Code, State of California, reading as follows:

"No person shall drive any vehicle or animal, nor shall any person stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle or animal, whether attended or unattended, upon the driveways or paths or any of the groups of any public school, State university, State college, State, county, or municipal institution or building, or any educational institution exempted in whole or in part from taxation, except with

Extra 'Two-Bit' Charge Explained By Manager

The new policy of charging Gaucho students 25 cents for admission to football games has elicited so much comment and criticism that discussion of the football budget seems in order.

According to a statement of football expenditures and receipts issued by Graduate Manager Bill Russell, the 25-cent admission charge is necessary to offset the increased cost of equipment, food and transportation, and to place pigskin finances on a sound footing.

The student body fee is \$7.80, the same today as it was in 1938. Yet football shoes have gone up from \$8 to \$12 a pair—and the team this year needed 60 new pairs. New helmets, of which 20 were required, rose in price from \$10 to \$16. Even socks have risen from 35 to 55 cents per pair.

In the large metropolitan areas such as Berkeley and Los Angeles where huge stadiums seating 50 or 60 thousand persons are available, the tide of rising prices is met by an increase in the cost of football tickets to the general public.

Veterans under 33 years of age, and non-veterans under 25, may make application for the scholarship if they feel that they can get the endorsement of the department in which they are enrolled, or in which they have done their major work.

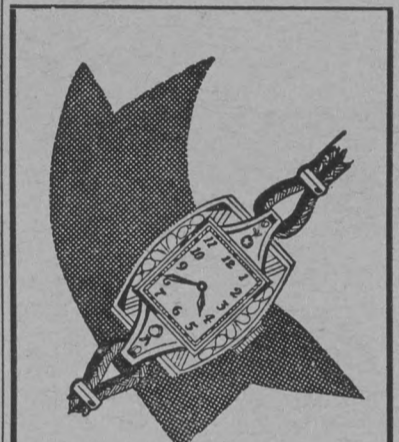
From among those trying out, the 10 men making the highest scores will be selected to enter the Hearst Matches.

Sam Cathcart, Max Diamond, Jack Miller, Royal Cathcart, and Kenny Duddridge turned in good performances, but they were not broken away as they have been in the past games for some of those badly needed long gains. The quarterbacking of Bill French was well done, but the passing arm of Bill Steele was sorely needed. Oxy helped San Jose no end there.

Fumbles

The Gauchos played the hardest game they have yet, driving hard, smashing and slashing to time and again threaten. But at the crucial moment, the Golden Gauchos would fumble, or have a pass intercepted, or be penalized. Although it did not show in their playing, the incident that broke the Gauchos' back happened early in the first period. After taking the kickoff, and being held for downs, the Gauchos' Miller placed a nice 23 yard boot to the 50, where the Spartans took over. Tight defensive play by the Gaucho line held the mighty Northerners, and they were forced to punt. Sam Cathcart took the kick on his own 8 yard stripe, and displaying the speed and deception of the last two games, whipped down to the San Jose 30. A penalty which was never signaled brought the ball back to the Gaucho 8.

At this point, to begin the end, the Gauchos fumbled on their 12, and from there on it was the Spartan's ball game.

Penalties, fumbles, interceptions, lack of reserves, foreign field—all these contributed to the debacle. The Gauchos were outplayed, but not by any 39 points.

The Spartan rooting section put on card stunts at half time that were comparable to those of the larger schools on the coast. Their 84-piece band made an impressive showing too. Probably the most interesting and spectacular display hough was that put on by a group of Gauchos, the loyal rooters who followed their team. A group of perhaps 50 voices made as much noise at San Jose as the entire rooting section has at games past at La Playa. Bob Lorden and Arnold Hargis led the cheers, and did a fine job. The Gauchos might have been outplayed, but they were never outyelled.

Few Substitutions

It will be of interest to note that the score was not run up by the first team in the first quarter, and then sending in the entire bench. The Spartans' first team stayed in most of the time, as did the Gauchos'.

The game is over, and lost. There is nothing that can be done, except to whip the blazes out of the Aggies, and that is just what the Gauchos intend to do. It is expected that more Gauchos will journey to Davis than did to San Jose, and that game will be played Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m.

The Gauchos of old used to play their football on the diamond of Pershing Park, not the best stadium in the world. However, in 1937, when they went world-beating, and emerged undefeated, a group of Santa Barbara businessmen got together and helped sponsor a stadium. The state of California granted Santa Barbara college enough money for stands, on the provision that not one cent was to go toward land for the field.

There were three sites for the field, one down by the "Mesa Turnpike," that road going up to the Mesa campus, where there is a natural hollow. Another was in a natural bowl across the road and up the beach. The other was the present site. The cost of the two other spots was out of proportion to their worth, whereas the land upon which La Playa now rests was *State land*, and could be had *free*. Naturally, it was chosen. But before it was selected, tests were taken for a whole year, each night, testing each spot for temperature, fog, and wind. The present field is the least foggy and the warmest of the three! The one behind the Mesa buildings is a little less windy, but that is the only advantage. And that is the reason we have our field where it is.

Third Best

The track at La Playa was the third best in the country before the war, and money has now been appropriated to refinish it. It will again be one of the finest tracks in the land.

As for one stand: it is probable that in the future, either near or far, that there will be stands on the other side of the field. However, the present stand will hold 8900 people.
