## Season Opens With Pep Session in Auditorium

Students Show Enthusiasm at Assembly Last Wednesday Night; McArthur and Harder are Confident

A season of Gaucho spirit was given an early start with a well-attended rally in the college auditorium Wednesday night.

The evening's pep session was opened with a Gaucho yell under yell leader Harry Sloan and the song leaders, Barbara Sharp and Renata Maccianti.

Mrs. Jane Miller Abraham, registrar, invited the student body to attend the faculty reception at Rockwood, Saturday evening. She assured everyone a pleasant evening of cards and dancing and stated that informal dress will be in order.

Announcement of Frosh-Sophomore tie-up results by Barry Simmons, showed that the freshman class had turned out well for the rally.

Wilma Kiesner, chairman of the rally committee, introduced Denning McArthur, president of the student body. McArthur expressed his confidence, prophesying a conference win for State—with the continued help and spirit of the student body.

## Controller Makes Arrangements for Reno Train Trip

Definite arrangements have been finally made for the purposed trip to Reno to see the football game to be held there October 31, according to student body president Denning McArthur, and Controller Fred Allred, who are in charge of the venture.

The train will leave Santa Barbara Friday noon, October 30 and arrive in Reno 7:15 Saturday morning. It will leave Reno Sunday morning at 10:30, and arrive back in Santa Barbara at 8:15 Monday morning.

A special fare of \$11.50 per person is being offered by the railroad if a party of 100 students or more decide on the trip. This does not include berths; for sleeping quarters for the trip the round fare will be \$12.75. If less than 100 people go, the price, without berths, will be \$14.50. Tourist car berths for the trip will be \$1.25 for lower, and \$1.00 for upper.

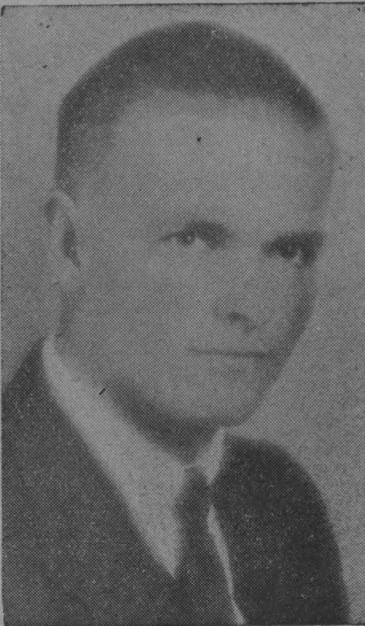

The Speech Arts Board was allowed to retain the surplus of last year's budget to partially re-equip the stage in the college auditorium.

## PRIMARY GROUP STAGES SUPPER

New members of the kindergarten primary department were entertained by the old members at an informal supper in the park below the school between 5:30 and 6:30 Tuesday night. Department songs were sung and the new officers were introduced. Betty Wells, social chairman had charge of the affair.

A business meeting will be held at the home of Betty Townsend, president, on the first Tuesday in October at 7:30 p.m.

Many roads lead to Santa Barbara State college, according to figures released by the offices of the registrar and the controller of student affairs. To date 930 students have enrolled, 196 more than last year. Other students are expected to arrive within the next few days.

A survey shows that State is drawing from 137 different communities, some as far away as Gary, Ind., and Buffalo, New York. Most students are from California localities, and Santa Barbara sends more than any other city, its representation comprising about half the student body. Other cities which have sent delegations larger than the average are Bakersfield, Los Angeles, Riverside, Santa Paula, Pasadena and Goleta.

All departments have been working to capacity to care for enrolling students. The offices of the deans of men and women report that suitable living accommodations are scarce. Room rent, however, is no higher than last year. Jobs are hard to find, but not so hard as last year, according to Dean William Ashworth. The National Youth Administration is a major factor in the student self-help program, providing work for 92 men and women.

## 'Sandy' Ready for Final Year

### All-Conference Fullback to Be Gunning for Place in State Grid Fame

Harold "Sandy" Sanderson, blond fullback of Coach "Spud" Harder's grid warriors, began his football career at Strathmore High School in 1928 where he played outstanding ball for four years. In 1933 he entered Porterville Junior College and carried off the season's honors there. 1934 brought "Sandy" to this campus as a sophomore to play under the guidance of Harder. In that year he made history with his star punting. On November 3, 1934, at Peabody Stadium during the State-Oxy game, he stood on the Gauchos' goal line and kicked out-of-bounds on Occidental's 12 yard line, a distance of 88 yards, and the longest kick on the Pacific Coast that season.

Last year he played bang-up ball on both the offense and the defense. His marvelous kicking often kept the team out of serious trouble and his line plunging gained consistantly for the Gauchos. To top it all he tied with Howard Nelson of Whittier for position of fullback on the Southern California Conference First Honor Team.

This year Sanderson promises to be even better than ever. He has some competition for his backfield position in Gardenhire and Fred Monson, a couple of flashy players from last year's Frosh.

## Staters Prep for Big Year in Conference

### Heavy Line and Fast Backs to Be Backed Up by Plenty of Subs

### Last Year's All-Conference Backfield Men Ready to Play

Expressing mild satisfaction upon the completion of their initial scrimmage, Coaches Harder and Wilton both expressed the belief that this might be the year the Gauchos gridders "go places."

Forming the nucleus of this year's outfit will be last season's All-Conference backfield of Dave Pollock, brains and quarterback, along with halfbacks Yeager and Morelli speed merchants supreme, and "Sandy" Sanderson two-year veteran at the fullback spot.

With a wealth of junior college transfers available there will be in the first time in the history of Gauchos gridders, a reliable reserve team.

Headed by 210-pound Al Young All-Conference end of Ventura J.C., Harder will have material from which to choose from "Tooly" Palmer, also of the Pirate school, along with, diminutive Nathan "Bus" Johnson former L.A.J.C. co-captain, and a two year All-Conference member, Earl Freidburg, formerly of Taft Junior college will lend his speed and hefty bulk to advantage at one of the tackle spots.

Heading the candidates for the center position thrown open by the graduation of Murt Miller, a two-way battle seems to have developed between Don Hart and Jack Joseph, with the outside possibility that Claire Busby, last year's Frosh pivot man, who at present is working out at the outside tackle berth, might be drafted into the ball-passing spot.

Speed combined with weight, will make its initial appearance on a State team with the possibility that the line will average over 200 pounds from end to end.

Stellar Doug Oldershaw will appear in the role of running guard this season while the men trying out for the other guard positions include last year's men, Gardner, Hale and Hayman.

Veterans of last season's squad will dominate the starting lineup for the season opener at Pershing Park with the clever, light Cal-Tech eleven who will provide the Hilltoppers with plenty of opposition. Coach "Fox" Stanton has always been known to do wonders with his small and light candidates who come from a group of scholastic students.

Veteran Danny Mulock and soph Bob Riparetti are out with injuries. Mulock is going to find plenty of competition in order to gain his end post from Al Young and Ollie Seely of last year's frosh outfit.

## Peagreeners Show Promise for Good Team

### 'Doc' Kelliher to Coach First Year Men; Frosh Open with C. C. C.

Frosh Coach "Doc" Kelliher worked out the initial Frosh scrimmage of the '36 season with a band of the toughest yearlings State has ever seen. This first scrimmage saw a display of strong linemen rather than backfield as the result of a week's practice since the season opened a week ago.

Nearly 50 candidates have attempted to gain a position on the Gauchos team. These candidates represent a choice of athletes from central and southern California. Among the localities represented are Exeter, Tulare, Long Beach, Bakersfield, Fillmore, Oxnard, Lompoc, Santa Paula, Eagle Rock, Huntington Park, Los Angeles, Pittsburg, and Santa Monica.

While Kelliher was cautious in making any statement, he did admit that there would be a combination of a heavy line and a speedy backfield. In the line the ends are stellar players from high school. At the tackle and guard positions there are about 15 players with either speed or plenty of weight.

On the other hand Kelliher made it clear that there was not too much in the center position with only two men, both from the Don's championship team of last year, trying to grab this spot. While these two are both good men Kelliher feels in need of more material on this spot.

In the backfield there is a group of players picked as the choice of the surrounding vicinity with the addition of the problem as to who will make the first string. While there is this strength of numbers the players have not yet unlimbered their kicking and passing ability.
