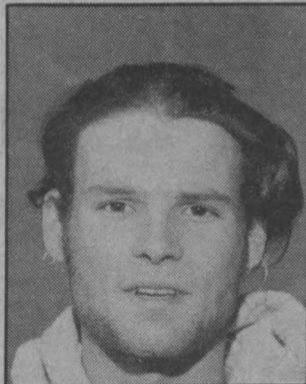

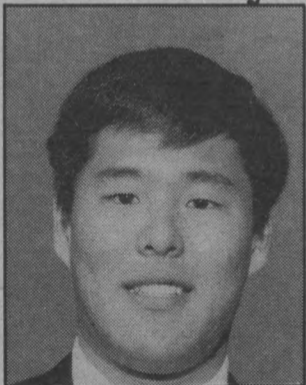

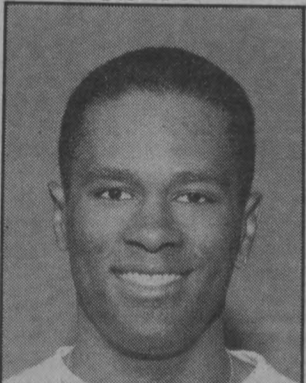
WHAT ABOUT BOB???

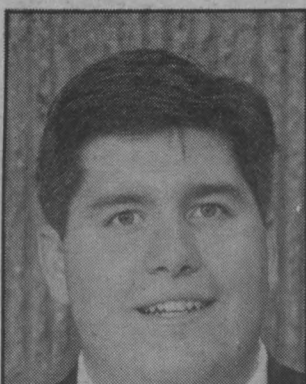

Audra 'A.P.' Pratcher



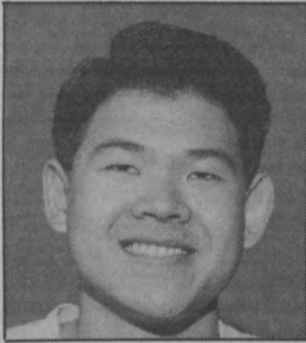

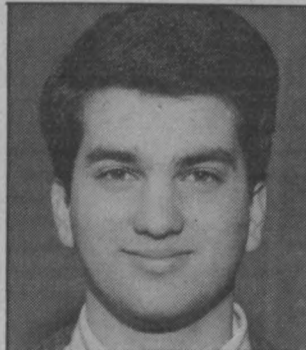

UCSA Vice-President

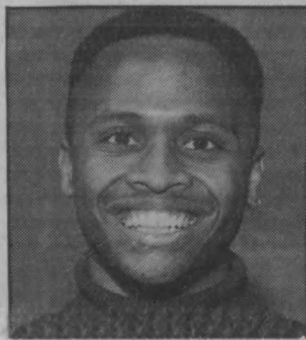

Something must be done to preserve the accessibility of higher education in California, not only for us who struggle to pay now, but also for our younger peers, who may soon find a UC degree unattainable.

UCSA, the University of California Student Association, was founded in 1972 as a result of student protest against a plan to institute tuition throughout the UC system. In this sense, UCSA was partially responsible for making the UC the best school for the dollar throughout the seventies and early eighties. UCSA con-

tinues to serve as the statewide student voice to our state's legislators, as well as to the UC Regents and the Office of the President.

I have served as the Director of UCSB Campus UCSA Office throughout this academic year, organizing UCSB contingencies to the UCSA conferences (Women's Conference at UCSD, Student Summit at Sacramento, Student of Color Conference at UCR — 4/25-4/26), lobbying our local politicians on legislation relevant to students (AB1884 — Campus-Based Fees, AB 2649 — Remove Filing Fee From SAAC Form, SB 1446 — 10% Cap on Fee Increase), as well as serve as the Legislative Council's watchdog at the state level. In the past I have served as an A.S. Representative-At-Large (1991-1992) and president of the Black Student Union (1989-1990). Other issues I have been involved with are police harassment, the closing of P.I.E. english courses, and minority recruitment and retention (with EOP, the Office of Relations With Schools, and the Go To High School-Go To College program).

My mission for 1992-1993: Keep UCSB accessible, voice the concerns of UCSB students loudly to the Regents, get you to vote!

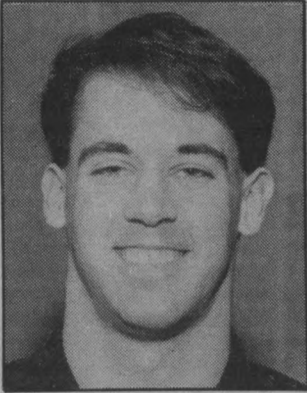
Representatives-at-Large

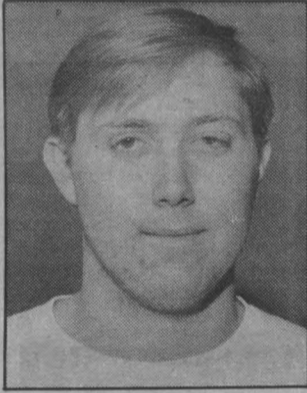
Debbie Danluck

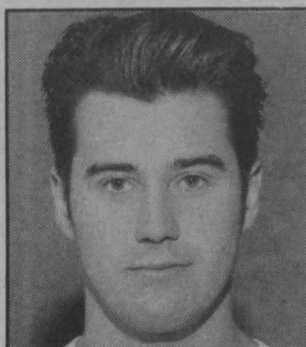
As I see it, the only way the "student voice" can be heard is through unity and an organized effort, to not only take back the Legislative Council, but the University and our whithering right to

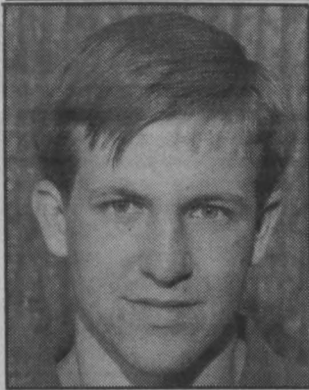
better. I want to revive this project.

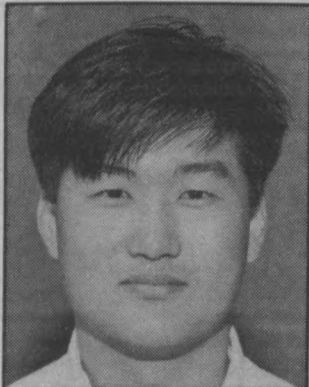

A.S. Constitutional Amendments

Every now and then, the Associated Students Constitution has to be modified to close loopholes that may allow abuses in the system. The Initiative to change the Constitution's section on Publicity and Distribution of Text during the election process is one such area. The Associated Students Constitution would be modified to allow "proper publicity which may include... the text of the amendment during the week prior to the Election" instead of publishing the full text. This area must be updated to avoid wasteful spending of Material resources and to save the student body money.

As it stands at the moment, if you had an initiative on the ballot that consists of pages and pages of propaganda, the Associated Students Elections Committee would be forced to publish it. Case in point: three years ago during the A.S. Spring election, hundreds of student dollars were wasted on a publication to "educate" students on a ballot initiative. Thousands of these yellow booklets had been duplicated and were either blown around, thrown away, or recycled. Printing the full text of any amendment text is both economically and practically unsound.

Every time I walk through Anisq 'Oyo Park in Isla Vista, I am reminded of the conversation I had with Mr. MacKenzie on a Spring night about this time last year. It appeared that Mr. MacKenzie was particularly drunk on this night, and particularly missing his home somewhere on the other side of the Santa Ynez Mountains, and particularly tearful. The tough part about hearing Mr. MacKenzie's story wasn't that I couldn't help, but that he couldn't help himself.

On this Spring's ballot, we have the unique opportunity to support the groups that hold Isla Vista together — the I.V. Social Services Lock-In. Each of the non-profit groups in Isla Vista, large and small will have an opportunity to continue their work to benefit the community if we vote in favor of the lock-in. They help people like Mr. MacKenzie back on their feet — a truly noble cause.

Some of the services the lock-in will help include feeding the poor, teaching and caring for the young, and medical treatment for all Isla Vista residents. These services are needed in the community as a "safety net" for those who are less fortunate or fall on hard times, or are simply not provided for by the County.

In light of the size of the lock-in, the current lack of financial support by the county for Isla Vista, and the constant need for help in our small community, I encourage you to support the Social Services Lock-In. It may be the easiest way to stop MacKenzie's tears.

Fellow students, children and other Isla Vista residents urge you to vote for the *Isla Vista Social Service Lock-In* ballot measure.

These funds would help ensure funding for organizations that provide valuable human services to the Isla Vista community such as LIVE (Let Isla Vista Eat), I.V. Youth Projects, I.V. Medical Clinic, the Community Counseling Center, Isla Vista Mediation, and the I.V. Recovery Group. The services funded by the fee include childcare for UCSB and other Isla Vista parents, free breakfasts for students at I.V. School and other Isla Vistans, drug and alcohol recovery programs, and medical services including HIV testing, counseling, STD checks, contraception and family planning.

Three reasons you should support the Lock-in fee: opportunity, compassion, and responsibility.

1) **Career Training:** These organizations provide numerous opportunities for students to become involved in the community and serve as training grounds for students in medical, educational, public administration and social services fields. More than one UCSB grad has gained basic medical training at the I.V. Medical Clinic and gone on to become doctors; many educators got their start working with children at I.V. School and Youth Projects; psy-

chologists learn valuable skills at the Community Counseling Center, with the Isla Vista Mediation Program, mediators learn how to successfully work with conflicts at home and at work, etc. *There's a long list of success stories!*

2) **You Get What You Give:** Isla Vista is made up of students, children, homeless, and minority populations; that such diverse residents live together as well as they do is a credit to the idealism and youthful tolerance shown most particularly by students in our town. Student involvement in social services has historically been very strong, and Isla Vista organizations have always appreciated the efforts of super volunteer organizations such as CAB, Pan Hellenic Council, Friends of L.I.V.E., Isla Vista Mediation, Students for Children, etc. *With a YES vote, you can continue this tradition.*

3) **Doing Your Share:** We've all seen the old maps of I.V. with beach cottages and grassy fields. The University Administration did nothing in the early years to counter overcrowding and found a partner in the County, who suspended or allowed circumvention of development regulations. While these authorities wavered in their commitment to easy shoddy conditions in I.V., UCSB students' dedication hasn't waned. Each class of students represent the next generation in many ways, and the social service efforts of previous classes is felt today by all current residents. There's more to I.V. than the partying, and students are a big part of the solution.

Only \$1.00 a quarter per student, this fund will improve our community. In these days of negative advertising and question-your-character issues, you can vote YES on the *Isla Vista Social Services Lock-In* to demonstrate what it means to be a good neighbor, and reap the benefits too!

Con statement against Social Services Lock-In and Lock-ins as a whole:

The A.S. lock-in fee system is antiethical to the concept of free choice for students, and the tendency for more and more campus organizations (Student Health and Football, for instance) to look to an A.S. lock-in — money taken from the pockets of students — to solve their financial woes is a sorry one. With a typical turnout in an A.S. election, about 15% of the students can vote to impose yet another new fee on 100% of the students. In a time when rising reg fees imposed by the Regents are driving many students away from UCSB to an education that they can afford in the Cal State or community college systems (or out of school altogether), this is unfair, undemocratic, and patently wrong.

An A.S. lock-in serves merely to take dollars from students and funnel them directly to an organization with financial needs that are probably otherwise being ignored by their more appropriate funding sources (e.g., the University administration, the state Legislature, etc.). Students do not necessarily benefit and do not maintain control over how the money is spent. Your student government becomes a social service organization with deep pockets and a blind eye.

This election's Social Services lock-in is the most insidious example yet of the abuse of the lock-in system. Funds will be collected from students and funnelled into off-campus community service organizations that will be forced to compete before yet another new bureaucracy for their share of the manna. These community organizations are worthwhile but should be county- and state-funded, NOT student-funded. Let's help students by keeping FEES DOWN. *Vote NO! on this and the other lock-in initiatives on the April 21-22 ballot.* And remember to VOTE: don't let a minority make this important decision for YOU!

As one of these two regularly published newspapers at UCSB, *Inside Wave* provides the campus with valuable news, opinions and entertainment on a weekly basis. This periodical has struggled through three tumultuous years trying to establish its presence and inform its readership. Never has it proven itself more consistent, more creative, and more intuitive than this most recent year.

Groundbreaking interviews with campus officials, local and national bands, underground artists, and national comedians as well as a regular supplement of unbiased reporting provides the bulk of content for this innovative weekly student press. It distributed 6,000 copies of twenty issues around the campus this year alone, and drew the attention of national press associations, local and state politicians, and campus faculty. Among the examples of its effects at UCSB are these reactions from the campus: *Inside Wave* was the basis for assignments in one UCSB English class, articles were reprinted in *Zeta Magazine* and two UCSB sociology readers, not to mention the fact that an *Inside Wave* article caused the UCSB Financial Aid Office to drop a questionable processing fee, while still other articles have changed discriminating policies in more than one campus office.

Over the three years of its existence, *Inside Wave* has struggled to free itself from the constraining bureaucracy of Associated Students, but due to is unable to avoid confrontation with it's governing bodies. This problem would be solved if *Inside Wave* had its own source of student funding, was free from Associated students' consistent meddling, and was governed by the UCSB Press Council. All of this would come to pass if you vote for the proposed *Inside Wave* lock-in of \$35 or \$50 per quarter. If you only played two less video games a quarter, or went without that extra pack of life-savers, you would have a weekly student press to bring issues of importance to you, the UCSB student, who desperately needs to know.

The UCSB Intramural Program is one of the largest of its kind in the State of California with an annual participation rate of over 16,000 people per year. The various intramural sports are structured so that players of *all* skill levels can participate. A few of the many benefits that arise from interaction with Intramurals and Recreation include fitness, socialization, an aid to bettering ones mental and physical health, and an opportunity for a constructive use of ones leisure time. One must remember that the michael Jordans and Tim Hardaways of the world learned many of their skills, not in the NBA, but in intramural and recreational programs. The importance of Intramural play and recreation cannot be undermined or neglected.

Unfortunately, however, intramural entry fees are becoming cost prohibitive for many people campus wide. Many students have already been forced out of participating in Intramural league play as a direct result of the rising fees. Currently, team entry fees for Intramurals are at forty-five (\$45) per sport and without some sort of subsidies Intramural league fees over the next two years could soar as high as seventy (\$70) or eighty (\$80) dollars for each team entry fee. This is incredibly outrageous, but unfortunately, because of the University's economic situation, it is also very realistic! This would be a tragedy for all students on this campus and especially unfair and burdensome to those students in the lower income brackets and completely dependent on financial aid. The Intramural program is one of the only programs on campus that is open to all students, graduate and undergraduate alike. If intramural fees are forced into an upward spiral, more and more students (and student groups) will be prohibited from taking part in a program where the only prerequisite for participation should be the desire to play, not the amount of money in your bank account.

With a Student fee lock-in the Intramural program will be able to accomplish the following: a reduction in team entry fees for all (between 50%-70%), maintain student employment opportunities (currently the Intramural Department employs over 150 students per quarter), and increase the quality of officiating and equipment utilized during Intramural and Recreational activities. The Intramural program is entirely student operated with only two (2) permanent staff members and is of vital importance that every student realize that not one penny of the lock-in will go towards permanent staff member salaries!!! The Intramural program is purely a student program and a fee lock-in will offer a direct savings to you the student. Please support your Intramural and Recreation program and vote YES on April 21 and 22. Thank You.

THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL IS MADE UP OF:

- 5 Representatives At-Large
- 3 On Campus Representatives
- 12 Off Campus Representatives
- 1 Representative for University owned Housing

THE DUTIES OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEMBERS INCLUDE:

- A) Supervise and maintain the policies, properties and conduct of the Associated Students.
- B) Have authority over the responsibility for all Associated Students' revenues and expenditures.
- C) Be empowered to override a Presidential veto by a two-thirds (2/3s) majority approval of the voting membership.
- D) Be empowered to authorize the expenditure of investment reserve funds by a three-fourths (3/4) majority approval of the voting membership.
- E) Be empowered to dismiss appointees of the President, the Presiding Officer, and the Judicial Council by a two-thirds (2/3s) majority approval of the voting membership, unless otherwise provided herein.
- F) Attend all regularly scheduled Legislative Council meetings.
- G) Serve on at least two (2) standing committees.
- H) Hold a minimum of three (3) office hours a week.
- I) Undertake at least one (1) major project during their term of office.

THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH IS MADE UP OF:

- President
- Internal Vice-President
- External Affairs vice President
- Vice President for University of California Student Association

THE DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH INCLUDE:

- A) **The President shall:**
 - 1) Be the Chief Executive Officer of the Associated Students and shall coordinate and be responsible for the functioning of the A.S. Executive Director.
 - 2) Serve as official representative of the Associated Students in all campus, systemwide, local, state and federal matters, unless otherwise provided herein.
 - 3) Deal with all student affairs.
 - 4) Appoint the Chairpeople of all boards, commissions, committees, and other agencies of the Executive Department from the membership of the Associated Students.
 - 5) Name the Chairperson of the Judicial Council from its membership subject to a two-thirds (2/3s) majority approval of the voting membership of the Legislative Council.

- 6) Appoint all student representatives to University administration, faculty, staff, or other advisory bodies.
- 7) Formulate an annual budget to be submitted to the Legislative Council for approval by the fifth (5th) regular meeting of Spring quarter.
- 8) Be a non-voting ex-officio member of all boards, commissions, committees, and other agencies of the Executive Department.
- 9) Be empowered to veto legislation of the Legislative Council within two (2) days of its adoption.
- 10) Be empowered to appoint a Cabinet of Advisors not subject to Legislative Council ratification.

B) The Vice President for Internal Affairs shall:

- 1) Serve as the Presiding Officer of the Legislative Council except when the office of the President becomes vacant.
- 2) Serve as the representative of Associated Students in all internal affairs.
- 3) Advise and inform the President and the Legislative Council on all campus matters.
- 4) In the event that the office of the President becomes vacant, serve as President until a new President is duly elected.

C) The Vice-President for External Affairs shall:

- 1) Serve as the official representative of the Associated Students on all Isla Vista and Santa Barbara County affairs.
- 2) Coordinate all Isla Vista and county of Santa Barbara issues that indirectly or directly effect UCSB students.
- 3) Advise and inform the President and Legislative Council on all local external matters and affairs.
- 4) In the event that both the offices of the President and the Vice-President for Internal Affairs become vacant, serve as President until a new President or Vice-President for Internal Affairs is duly elected.

D) The Vice President for the University of California Student Association shall:

- 1) Serve as the official representative of the Associated Students on the University of California Students' Association (UCSA) Board of Directors.
- 2) Serve as the representative of Associated Students in all state, federal and UC systemwide matters.
- 3) Advise and inform the President and Legislative Council on all state, federal and UC systemwide matters.
- 4) In the event that the offices of the President, the Vice-President for Internal Affairs and the Vice President for External Affairs should become vacant, serve as President until a new President or Vice-President for Internal Affairs is duly elected.
