The 1962 Field Science and Conservation Workshop will offer teachers an opportunity to relate their nature and biology instruction directly to the "California scene" immediately after summer session.

Scheduled from July 30 to August 11 the workshop will cover conservation, seashore life, native birds, rocks and minerals, astronomy, native plants, elementary science methods, and western trees.

Sponsored by the University Extension, the workshop is a two semester unit course in professional biological science. The enrollment fee is \$40. PROFICIENCY EXAMS SCHEDULED FOR JUNE 28

Original and make-up Proficiency Examinations will be given from 7-10:30 p.m.on Thursday, June 28, for teacher credential candidates in Building 431, Rooms 101 and 102.

Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must retake the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not.

No appointment is necessary in advance. Students appear at the time scheduled. However, a Statement of Study is required of each student repeating the test. This may be obtained at the office of the student's major department or the Department of Education. Before signing it, a student should spend at least 10 hours in study, preferably with a tutor. This Statement of Study must also be signed by a faculty member.

BAYER ART WORKS TO BE DISPLAYED THROUGH THE SUMMER

Austrian artist Herbert Bayer's exhibition of paintings, architecture, and graphics will be on display in the campus art gallery in the Arts Building until August 12.

The exhibition was formally opened on June 17th.

Bayer was one of the original participants in the famous German Bauhaus. He served as design consultant for the Aspen Institute in Aspen, Colorado, and the Container Corporation of America.

He is a pioneer in the field of design and has had his work shown in New York, London, Paris, Berlin, Munich, Milan, Vienna, Zurich, Chicago and San Francisco. His work as a painter as well as a designer is represented in museums and private collections here and abroad. Gallery hours during the Bayer exhibition are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and 2-5 Sunday.

FIVE UNIVERSITY LECTURES TO HIGHLIGHT '62 SUMMER SESSION

Five University Lectures will be the bright spots on the UCSB calendar of intellectual events this summer. All of the lectures are set for Tuesdays at 3 p.m. in the lecture room in South Hall at UCSB and are open to the public without charge.

Dr. Bruce Hopper's lecture, "The Far East: Collision Lines or Shared Responsibilities?" in South Hall June 19 at 3 p.m. has been cancelled because of illness.

Professor Alexander De Conde of UCSB will lecture on June 26 on "The Secretary of State in American History."

Dr. William B. Michael will speak on "Use of Psychological Tests in College Selection" on July 3. Dr. Michael is the director of the University Testing Bureau and Professor of Education at the University of Southern California.

Dr. Joseph Ullian, visiting professor of Philosophy at the University of Chicago, is on the docket for July 10. He will talk on "What is Mathematical Logic?"

Dr. O. K. Bouwsma will end the series on July 17 when he speaks on "Samuel Johnson and the Stone." Dr. Bouwsma is Professor of Philosophy at the University of Nebraska.

UCSB LIBRARY HAS NEW FACILITIES, LATER HOURS FOR SUMMER

Enlarged library facilities, sporting bigger study areas, and later hours and more reading materials are available to summer students, according to Librarian Katherine McNabb.

The library building, Unit 2, was completed this spring after being under construction for over a year. Books and reader space has been doubled in the enlarged building. The collections have increased to 170,000 volumes, 5,000 phonograph records in music, speech and foreign languages, 3,000 periodicals and serials, and 12,000 pamphlets of general information.

Now seating 14,300 persons, the library features new and improved services such as a reserved books, curriculum materials study room - smoking area complex which can be shut off from the main library and kept open later hours--the reserved book room is open until 11 p.m. (see schedule below.)

A sun-deck for reading and conversation, several group study rooms, a typing room, listening rooms, and a graduate reading room are available.

In addition, the Library is a depository for federal and California state publications under a special service staff. Inquiries can be made at the Government Publications and Serials window behind the Reference Desk.

The new Department of Special Collections houses the Wyles Collection of Lincoln, Civil War and Westward Expansion materials. Also located here are the Skofield Printers Collection, and other special collections. The department is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Summer session students are urged to make use of the many services the campus library has to offer. Ask at the various desks for assistance in finding material and books. Most books may be charged out for two weeks. Fines are 15¢ per day per book and all books must be returned on or before the last day of classes.

High School students from all over the U.S. are members of the fourth-year special university program for high school juniors this summer at UCSB. The program includes exceptional high school students between their junior and senior years with college level courses and at the same time gives them an inside look of university cultural and social activities.

The students have access to all university facilities, including residence and dining halls.

Conferences to be Held On Campus

A total of 430 delegates will attend three professional conferences during summer session. The conferences will include the following groups: U.S. Treasury Department Internal Revenue Service Management Workshop "A" from June 17-29; American Mathematical Society Summer institute, from June 17-30; and Southern California Youth Association, July 27-29. During their stay on the Santa Barbara campus, delegates will be housed in Anacapa and Santa Rosa residence halls and take their meals in Ortega Dining commons.

Parking Permits and Regulations

Summer students and all new people parking on campus are required to display the proper parking permit on their vehicle windshields. This sticker is obtainable through the Police Department Office (Building 427, room 202) for \$1.

You are required to park only in the areas designated on the permit. The department also urges everyone to obey all posted signs, and to observe other customary traffic and parking regulations. Driveway parking, parking by fireplugs, and obstructing traffic while stopping to chat are particular violations to be avoided.

FOREIGN FILM SCHEDULE

"Films from Five Countries" is the theme of the film series presented by the arts and lectures committee this summer.

On June 24, the "Best Film" award winner of the San Francisco Film Festival in 1960, "Ballad of a Soldier" will be presented in Campbell Hall at 7:30 p.m. Made in the Soviet Union, the film portrays the moving tale of a young soldier's four-day leave.

"The Scandals of Clochemerle" will be presented on July 1. The French film is based on Gabriel Chevallier's satirical novel. The companion film is "Quetico!"

Judy Holliday will give forth with her hilarious portrayal of a dumb blonde on July 8 in "Born Yesterday." "The Loves of Franistan" is a satire on epic motion pictures.

The final films of the series are "Ia Strada," an Italian film directed by Federico Fellini, and the "Dinner Party" a favorite Marcel Marceau pantomime. "Genevieve", the first film in the series was shown on June 17. Show time begins at 7:30 on Sunday for all films. Student and faculty admission is 25 cents.
