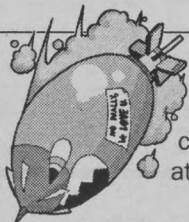

San Francisco Group Donates Flag to SB's Gay Community

Members and supporters of Gay Santa Barbara gathered Saturday to raise one of California's original rainbow gay pride flags in De La Guerra Plaza.

The San Francisco Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Pride Celebration Committee donated the flag as a way

to extend support to Santa Barbara's gay community. The rainbow flag originated in 1978 during a gay pride parade in San Francisco and since then, has decorated two miles of San Francisco's Market Street in celebration every June.

The San Francisco LGBT Pride Celebration Committee purchased new flags to replace the aged ones in San Francisco.

Executive Director Teddy Witherington visited Saturday's Gay Santa Barbara celebration to present the group with one of San Francisco's old rainbow pride flags.

"A number of the flags are still in good condition, and so we decided to send them out as gifts of support and solidarity around the world," Witherington

Memorial Attendees Come Together to Share Thoughts, Stories in Remembrance of Faculty Member Lex Murray

UCSB lecturer Lex Murray was a frequent visitor of the Corner Store. There he would hand pick candy that would later grace the desks of his co-workers and students. And with the candy, Murray would bring a smile and often, encouraging words.

On Friday, April 14, students, friends and family gathered in memory of the 42-year-old Murray at the RecCen Garden Court. Murray died in an auto accident along Highway 154 on March 20.

Attendants shared thoughts and memories and recounted stories about Murray. Some shed tears, but the stories about a man who brought joy and shared many jokes to those lives he was in contact with mostly brought laughter and smiles to the gatherers.

These thoughts were echoed by Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs Michael Young.

"When I heard that we had lost Lex Murray, I have said we have lost one of our own. We have lost and I have lost a good friend. We have lost and I have lost a colleague. We all have lost a great man," Young said. "I remember vividly the day he tried to show me how to operate the work-out machines. I was pitiful, but Lex was patient. We both laughed as he tried to instruct me on the proper usage of the machines. ... Lex always made me feel good, but I will always miss his smile and good feelings that he engendered."

It is estimated that Murray was in contact with over 15,000 UCSB students through his sports psychology and physical activities classes. One student was junior communication major Max Lishansky.

Workers File for Bonus Today, Bargain in May

The Coalition of University Employees (CUE) will begin negotiating its next contract with the University of California in May.

CUE's current contract was finalized in December 2000. Negotiations for that contract, which expires in September 2001, began in 1998. Some employees have not received performance bonuses promised in the current contract, and today is the last day for CUE members to file for those bonuses.

"Clerical employees are still owed the back pay retroactive to the two-and-a-half years that negotiations dragged on, and the university has until May 9 to pay," UCSB CUE President Debbie Ceder said.

Early this year during the negotiations, CUE members picketed outside of Cheadle Hall and accused the university of being indifferent to their financial situation.

The negotiations ended with a 7.8-percent pay increase for clerical workers. The union also won additional merit increases for employees under the Incentive Awards Program (IAP). So far, UCSB has paid a 6.8-percent raise, as well as IAP bonuses from 1999 and 2000.

"UCSB has some incentive to pay it off quickly, in that they may not raise our parking rates until 45 days after our final payment is made," Ceder said. "Clerical employees have been enjoying the 1999 parking rates during our prolonged negotiations."

Ceder said CUE members must submit

PG&E Demands Lifting of Regulations



SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Pacific Gas and Electric Co. officials demanded the utility be cut free from state regulation and be allowed to push huge rate increases onto its customers, two weeks before negotiations with Gov. Gray Davis broke off, the *San Francisco Chronicle* reported Sunday.

"Perhaps we misjudged their primary concern," said Steve Maviglio, the governor's spokesperson. "It wasn't resolving their credit issue. It was extracting vengeance on the PUC."

In addition to insisting that it be released from the state Public Utilities Commission's regulatory grip, PG&E demanded it

be allowed to buy back its power lines without competitive offers if the state ever decided to sell. In addition, it wanted to continue profiting from any telecommunications lines or antennas linked to the system, according to a Feb. 28 eight-page proposal obtained by the *Chronicle*.

PG&E denies the document influenced the out-

lowed."

At the time of the utility's bankruptcy filing April 6, PG&E Corp. Chair Robert Glynn said no talks had been held for three weeks. PG&E's proposal had been delivered about two weeks before talks ceased.

PG&E has said it's entitled to recoup \$9 billion it paid for wholesale power because of PUC-

Chronicle reported.

The document went on to demand the PUC drop all proceedings concerning PG&E, including an investigation into whether the utility violated California law by transferring millions to parent company PG&E Corp. prior to filing bankruptcy.

"They took a position on regulatory matters that was out of touch with reality," Maviglio said.

PG&E Corp. spokesperson Shawn Cooper declined to comment on the proposal.

"That document is confidential," he said.

Ratepayer advocates say they're baffled by PG&E's demands.

"It's like the Japanese insisting that we surrender Hawai'i after we beat them in World War II," said Harvey Rosenfield, consumer advocate for the Foundation for Taxpayer and Consumer Rights.

CINCINNATI (AP) — On Sunday, the mayor rolled back the city's dusk-to-dawn curfew in response to a calm night following the funeral of a young black man whose shooting triggered a week of unrest.

Mayor Charles Luken said the curfew will start at 11 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. to allow families more time to celebrate Easter together.

"Hopefully today can be a day of prayer. A day of peace. A day of coming together," Luken said.

The April 7 death of Timothy Thomas, 19, led to three days of rioting in predominantly black neighborhoods that stopped when the mayor instituted the curfew Thursday.

Overnight Saturday, police arrested 187 people for curfew violations.

"It was almost a boring night for us," police Chief Thomas Streicher said.

He said there were calls about shots being fired, and sporadic instances of rocks and bottles being thrown at police cruisers.

Since Thomas' death, more than 700 people have been arrested for looting, arson, vandalism and curfew violations.

Thomas, who was wanted on 14 warrants for misdemeanors and traffic violations, was unarmed when he was shot while running from police. He is the fourth black man killed by police since November.

Stephen Roach, the officer who shot Thomas, is on paid administrative leave.

SACRAMENTO (AP) — California should be able to force power plants that get fast-tracked approval to sell their electricity within the state, according to a California Energy Commission report.

That opinion released Friday contradicts earlier predictions by the state commission's top lawyer, who said last week that in-state sales requirements appear to violate the U.S. Constitution.

The commission, which permits power plant construction or expansion, will discuss the requirement at its Wednesday meeting, when it is scheduled to vote on the expansion of a power plant owned by AES Huntington Beach. AES wants to fast-track a plant to revive two mothballed units at its plant.

"This is a gray area of the law," two commissioners concluded in an amended decision. "There is no case directly on point nor any statute or regulation directly addressing this unique circumstance."

Following two days of rolling blackouts in January,

Gov. Gray Davis issued an executive order that speeds the application process for power plants. Some commission review times were cut from an average of one year to as little as 21 days.

Davis said then that the electricity produced here "will stay in California."

AES has said it intends to sell all 450 megawatts produced by the expanded plant to California entities, but it does not want to be required to do so.

Other states have said any attempts to confine power to California could backfire, because the state needs imported power until more power plants are built. The commission's chief counsel has advised it against a California-only sales clause.

NEW YORK (AP) — Singer Joey Ramone, the punk rock icon whose signature yelp melded with the Ramones' three-chord thrash to launch an explosion of bands like the Clash and the Sex Pistols, died Sunday. He was 49.

Ramone, the gangly lead singer with the leather jacket, tinted glasses and permanently torn jeans, was hospitalized in March 2001 with lymphoma. His death was confirmed Sunday by Arturo Vega, the Ramones' longtime artistic director.

The Ramones — its four members adopted the common last name after forming the band in 1974 — came out of Queens, a motley collection of local losers with limited musical skills. Joey became the lead singer only after his drumming proved too rudimentary to keep up with his bandmates' thunderous riffs.

While British bands such as the Sex Pistols and Clash received the media's attention once punk rock exploded, both were schooled by the Ramones' tour of England that began on the U.S. Bicentennial — July 4, 1976.

"They changed the world of music. They rescued rock and roll from pretentiousness and unnecessary adornments," said Vega.

The band's "do-it-yourself" garage-rock influence still echoes today in bands like Green Day and the Offspring. The low-tech Ramones spent just two days and \$6,000 recording its 1976 debut album.

"They're the daddy punk group of all time," said Joe Strummer, lead singer of the Clash, in a recent *Spin* magazine interview.

Despite its influence and critical acclaim, the Ramones never cracked the Top 40.

"He was a super compassionate guy, who truly cared about all of us," he said. "Every time I was up there and passed by his office, his door was always open. And he would always be sitting there saying 'Hi' to everyone, with a huge smile on his face. He truly cared. You could tell."

In his own words, Lex Murray said, "The most important thing in life is

the quality of relationships we have with others."

Theater arts major Chanté Frierson sung "Amazing Grace" to close the memorial service, but many lingered around to share more memories.

Murray's career at UCSB began 15 years ago with a brief tenure as the assistant coach of the women's basketball team. He was then active in the development in the UCSB Fitness Center and the founding of the UCSB women's golf team.

Born Jan. 5, 1959, in Santa Rosa, Calif., Murray's passion for golf began at an early age. At age 13, with a six under par (64), he set the Bennet Valley Golf Course record and went on to qualify for the United States Association Junior Champions in 1973 and 1975.

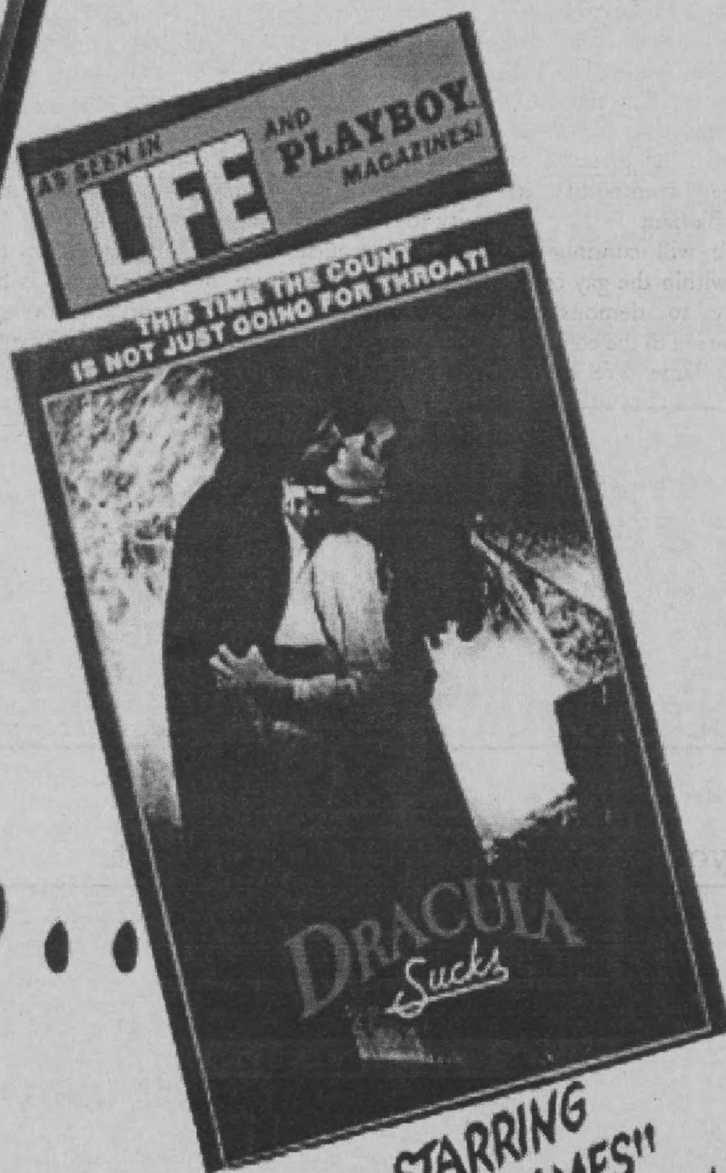

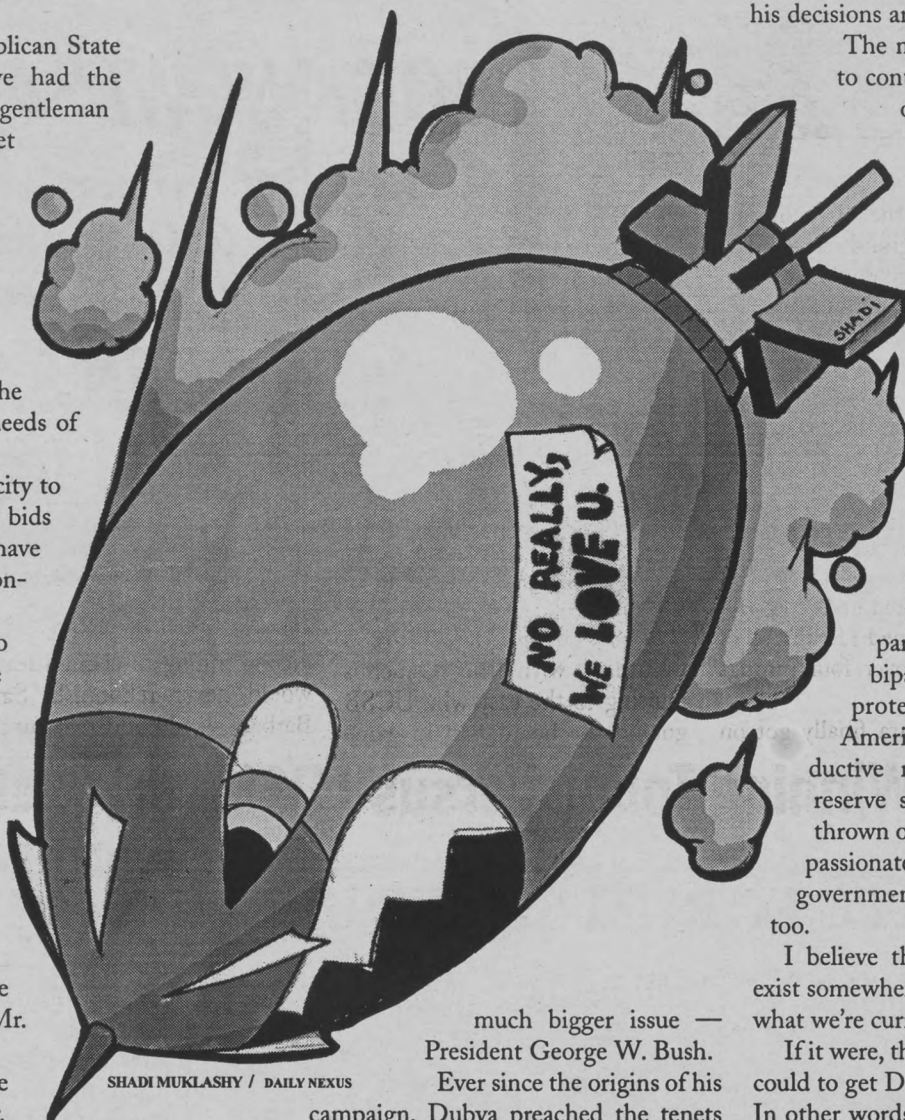

PLO/ISRAELI VIOLENCE IS A TWO-SIDED DILEMMA

This letter is a response to Eli Raber's seemingly bitter letter about Dr. Hanan Ashrawi's recent visit to UCSB (*The Reader's Voice*, "Pro-PLO Speaker Taints Center's Grand Opening," April 11). I intend this letter to be an objective and unbiased view, being that I am neither Arab nor Jewish, and I hope that it will not be taken as an attack.

Raber casts a very negative light on the Palestinian Liberation Organization (PLO) and Ashrawi. Raber claims that the PLO is a "known terrorist organization," and that Ashrawi is a "known propagandist and hate speaker." I will not claim any universal knowledge regarding terrorist organizations or hate speakers, but I will say that to call the PLO a terrorist organization is no different than calling Israel a terrorist



organization, and that to call Ashrawi a hate speaker is just plain ridiculous. I think it is important to remember that we are talking about two groups who are fighting for what they honestly believe to be their homes. If the PLO is a terrorist organization for defending and fighting for their land and homes, then Israel's occupation and destruction of Palestinian homes and communities is no less terrorist in nature. I do not mean to label either party terrorist, but this is a two-sided struggle involving violence on both sides. It is true that the PLO and Palestinians have used and do use violence, but this is a group of people who cannot walk the streets at night because of Israeli troops who patrol the streets near artificial and increasingly intrusive borders.

I do not know every word that Ashrawi has spoken, but her promotion of peaceful means for resolution makes me question Raber's claim that she is a "known hate speaker." Just as Raber's own words are filled with passion, I think it only fair to consider the

personal aspect of the issue for a Palestinian who has experienced the violence of the conflict firsthand.

Raber also seems concerned with Ashrawi's alleged anti-American sentiments, despite the fact that such factors are extremely important to the history of the Middle East and the current relations between the U.S. and Middle Eastern nations. As far as democracy in the region is concerned, I believe it is irrelevant to the opening of the Middle East Studies Dept. and to America's relationship with Israel and Palestine. However, I remind you that Ashrawi is the founder of the Palestinian Initiative for the Promotion of Global Dialogue and Democracy.

I believe it was a wise decision for UCSB to invite someone so involved and knowledgeable as Ashrawi, and more importantly, someone who promotes peace and distinguishes her views from those who practice violence. I hope that I have at least opened your eyes to the two sides of this complicated issue.

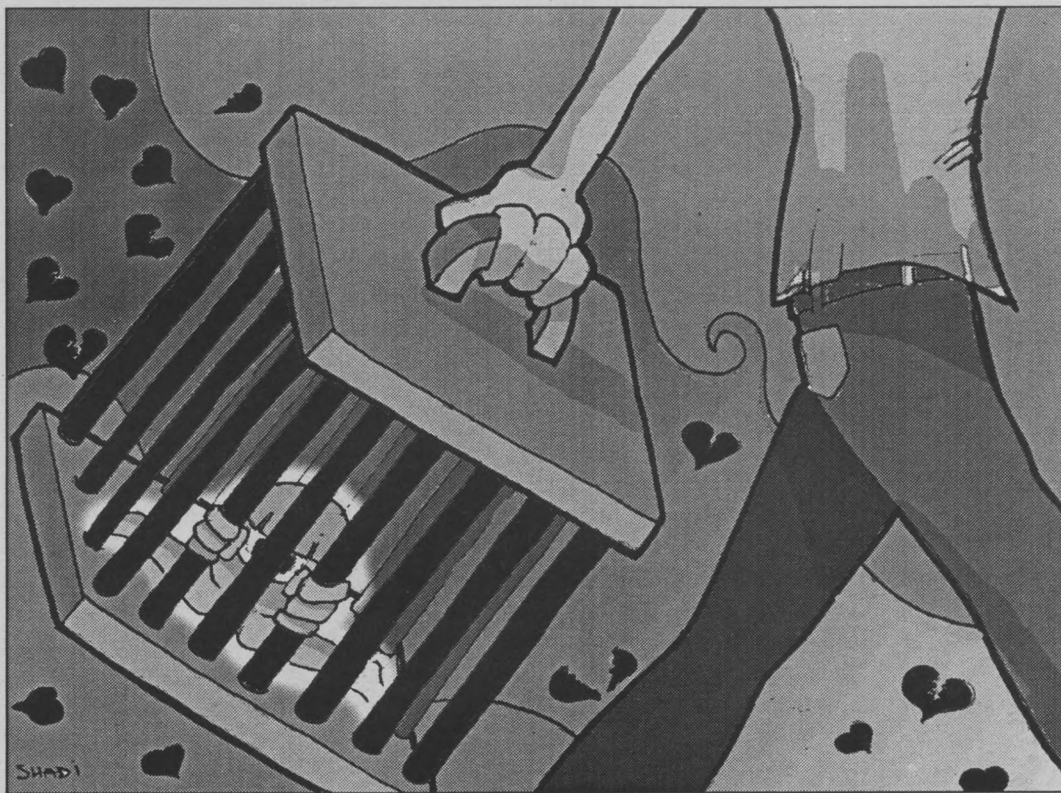

about control. Through manipulation and other mind games, abusers are able to keep their partners firmly in their grasp. Sometimes it's keeping them from seeing their friends, other times it crosses over into rape — where the abuser coerces his or her partner into having sex. The tricks and tactics are endless, and they all do damage that can be far worse than a slap or a punch.

Many wonder why people stay in these relationships. Often they ask, "Why don't they leave?" Some assume that the abuse must not be that bad if the abused continue to stay in the relationship. This is dangerous logic. The abused are stuck in a place and they perceive no way out, so they stay. They feel that the shame, guilt and fear facing them after they leave will be worse than the relationship itself. Others feel they have to stay because of children, economic dependence or even a genuine love for their abusive partner.

It's important for the rest of us to take notice when we think something is wrong. I talked with Carol Mosely at the Women's Resource Center about warning signs. She told me that one thing to look for is an attempt by the partner to isolate the abused — keeping them from seeing their friends is one indicator. Another sign is extreme possessiveness and jealousy. Those inside the relationship may see this as genuine concern and love, but the abuser's true nature should be clearer to those who are on the outside looking in.

If little red flags start flying up in your brain, then it's time to do two things. First, go to one of the many resources: The Rape Prevention Education Program (RPEP) peers, the Women's

Center or the folks at Take Back the Night. They should be able to give you more information and guidance on how to handle your problems. They're the ones who helped me find information, and I found them all extremely helpful. Everything you tell them is confidential and anonymous, so there is no excuse not to go.

Once you've talked to them, try confronting your friend. This goes for both friends of the abused and the abuser. Let them know you care for them, while at the same time letting them know something is wrong; tell them what's going on isn't right and it's time to get help. As Carol told me, it's not a private issue between the abuser and the abused — it affects everyone. The most important thing is to speak up; tell some-

body.

Silence is a stone in your mouth.

It's sad that this stuff exists, but we can snuff it out if we all take a little more time to pay attention and stand up for ourselves and each other. Ignoring abuse doesn't help anyone, and who's to say when a nasty remark will turn into a slap, then a punch, then something far worse? Over the next few days, take advantage of all the workshops and events going on for Sexual Violence Awareness Week. Take Back the Night Provides a Forum to Examine Rape Culture

ear we hold Take Back the Night here at UCSB. And after the event, one of the organizers has to write a hurt letter to the *Nexus* about the stupid, cowardly acts of requisite antagonists. I know; I did it last year. This year, I thought I would try to preempt that by writing to the *Nexus* before our event.

I am not writing to berate those who disagree with us and act against us (usually from a distance, with eggs and this is an open invitation to all of those who are indifferent to our event, and a big welcome to those who don't agree with us or how we fight it. This year, I am extending an open invitation to everyone to withhold judgment until *after* you have attended one of our events. Who knows? You might just realize that Take Back the Night means something to you after all.

For those of you who are not familiar with the history of Take Back the Night, it is a movement to stop sexual assault. It is an effort to end the culture of rape and fear that oppresses women of all backgrounds, races and ages. The Take Back the Night movement began as a forum for women to protest that they were not becoming empowered and to begin to heal.

On our campus, Take Back the Night is a powerful coming-out event for women in a weeklong series of events every spring. At UCSB, SBCC and the community, this is our annual event. We have been working hard since October planning workshops, speakers and performers, and finding new ways to involve the community.

We will be tabling throughout the week with the full schedule of events, T-shirts, CDs and more information. Here is a taste of what to expect.

We kick off Take Back the Night with a noon rally at Storke Tower. The lineup will be a favorite local band, Butcheek Doofus. The speaker will address some of the main issues surrounding sexual assault and expand on our theme for this year: "From the Ashes: Empower, Educate, Evolve."

At 2 p.m. in the MultiCultural Center (MCC), there will be workshops put on by various campus and community

groups, dealing with same-sex assault, male responsibility, social expectations of men, racism within anti-rape activism, GHB (the "date rape drug"), sex trafficking and the military. The Rape Prevention Education Program (RPEP) peers will be putting on a self-defense workshop at 4 p.m. in the UCen State Street room.

On Tuesday, there will be a Santa Barbara Rape Crisis Center (SBRCC) panel discussion in the MCC Lounge. This year's discussion, titled "Is it Yes or is it the Alcohol?", will focus on the relation of alcohol to acquaintance rape. Whether you think that alcohol is the root of all evil in Isla Vista or that alcohol is no excuse for any behavior, come listen to and participate in this discussion.

Tuesday night is also "Take Back the Mic" Performance Night. The evening will feature local musicians, poets, actors and spoken word performers exploring women's issues, especially sexual assault, healing and revolution. There are open mic spots for those of you who want to share your own performance art.

Wednesday's events begin with RPEP's mock trial at 3:30 p.m. in the MCC Theater. This trial will simulate a sexual assault hearing here at UCSB. Come and see how the "jury" must make a decision from the facts at hand and the testimonies of those involved.

For an interactive and fun evening, come join us Wednesday evening at the Women's Center for "Art as Revolution" Night. We will be exploring ways of healing, educating and fighting for change through finger-painting, clay, collage and a group mural.

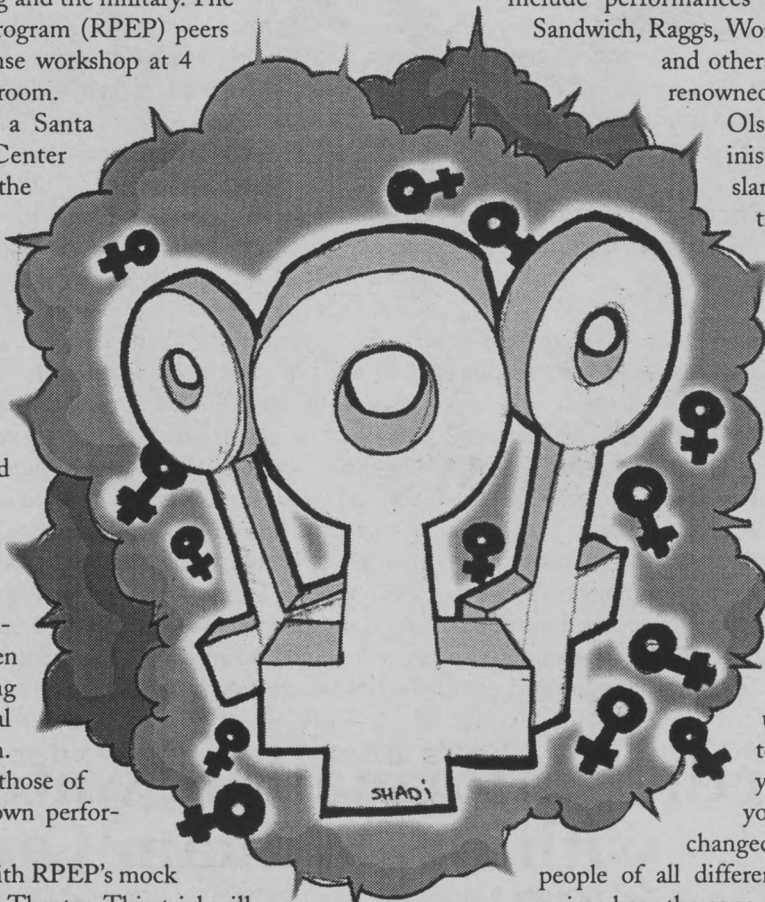
The culmination of our week will be Thursday's rally and march at Anisq' Oyo' Park in Isla Vista. The rally will begin at 5 p.m. and include performances by Joules Graves, Whiskey Sandwich, Raggs, Wozani, Impulse, Gravity Willing and others. Our keynote speaker will be renowned spoken word performer Alix Olson.

Alix is a lesbian and a feminist and an absolutely kick-ass slam poet. Around 9 p.m. we will take to the streets of Isla Vista, with candles and chants of solidarity to symbolize the fight for freedom for women everywhere. The march is an empowering way to start taking back all of the aspects of our lives in which we are oppressed by others.

Now, in conclusion, and for those of you who skipped down to the end, here are my final words. Pick up a schedule from our table or the Women's Center, or cut out our schedule from today's *Nexus*. Come to some events that interest you. Come prepared to have your preconceived notions changed. Come willing to listen to people of all different backgrounds, and in their voices hear the song of your sisters, mothers, aunts, cousins, friends and lovers.

At the very least, be tolerant and respectful of our events. Above all else, try to keep an open mind. Remember, we are not some fringe group at UCSB — we *are* UCSB, in the sense that the issue of sexual assault affects every single member on this campus.

He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

Why should Jesus' resurrection mean anything to me?

If one thing is obvious, it is the fact that we will all face death. This year in particular, we at UCSB should be painfully aware that we have no guarantee of even our next birthday.

Nearly 2,000 years ago, Jesus of Nazareth defeated our greatest enemy — Death itself. As a result of his own death and resurrection, salvation and eternal life have been offered to you as a free gift of God's grace and mercy.

For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 6:23)

I'm a good individual. I'm even better than a lot of religious people. Isn't that good enough to guarantee a decent spot for me in heaven?

Heaven is where the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit reside. If you happen to be without sin then, yes, you qualify. Have you loved God with all your heart, soul, and mind? Have you loved your neighbor as yourself? How good is good enough? Jesus taught that if we even hate our brother, we have already committed murder. If we lust after someone, we have committed adultery. Is there really room for any self-righteousness with that kind of standard? Should we stand proudly in our self-righteousness and thank God that we are not like others, or should we turn to him in humility and ask for His forgiveness?

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith — and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God — not by works, so that no one can boast. (Ephesians 2:8-9)

If I am saved by God's grace alone, why should I bother with good works at all?

Let's look at the next verse. Context counts.

For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. (Ephesians 2:10)

Once you have been saved by grace (through no merit of your own) you are given the gift of the Holy Spirit who will guide you into an abundant and fulfilling life of works which are not only pleasing to God, but of service to others.

Think about it — If it were possible to earn our way to heaven through good works, why would God send His only begotten Son to a humiliating and painful death on a cross nearly 2,000 years ago? The fact is, Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection were necessary steps in God's plan for our salvation. Is there any other name under heaven by which we can be saved from death and punishment?

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. (John 14:6)

What do you mean God sent his Son to the cross? I thought the Romans and Pharisees were responsible for Jesus' death.

Technically speaker you may be correct, however, it was God's will that Jesus be punished as the ultimate sacrificial Lamb to take away our sins. The Old Testament practice of sacrificing a spotless lamb for the forgiveness of sin foreshadowed the real sacrifice that Jesus would later take on himself.

Jesus was without sin, yet he suffered a humiliating punishment in our place so that we might be ransomed from death. He certainly agonized over

his journey to the cross and prayed intensely for a different way to gain our salvation, but it was ultimately God's will for justice, mercy, and self-sacrificing love to be met at the cross. One the evening before his crucifixion, Jesus even rebuked his disciples for attempting to "save" him from certain death. His response to Peter was, "Get behind me, Satan." Anytime you look at a cross, you should remember that Jesus has already been punished so that you don't have to be. That's the Gospel. That's the Good News.

As for the Romans and Pharisees,

Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34)

I only believe in things that can be detected with our five senses. Needless to say, this is all a bit much to swallow.

You're not alone. Do you think that the First Century Jews and Gentiles were any different? As John, a Jewish eyewitness to the events wrote,

That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched — this we proclaim concerning the Word of life. The life appeared; we have seen it and testify to it, and we proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and has appeared to us. We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ. (1 John 1:1-3)

That's just one person's testimony. Can't you do any better than that?

What if the story of Jesus' birth, life, death, and resurrection were written by a dozen different authors over a span of fifteen hundred years before he even set foot on earth. Would that count? Twenty-nine prophecies alone — which were written over a span of 500 years — were fulfilled the very day of Jesus' crucifixion. The picture that emerges of his identity in Isaiah 9:6, his suffering in Psalm 22, the reason for his sacrificial death in Isaiah 53, and his coming before the destruction of the temple in 70 C.E. could only have been fulfilled in the person of Jesus.

Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed.

We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth.

By oppression and judgement he was taken away. And who can speak of his descendants? For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my people he was stricken. He was assigned a grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, and though the LORD makes his life a guilt offering, he will see his offspring and prolong his days, and the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand.

After the suffering of his soul, he will see the light [of life] and be satisfied; by his knowledge my righteous ser-

vant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities.

Therefore I will give him a portion among the great, and he will divide the spoils with the strong, because he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors. For he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors. (Isaiah 53:4-12)

What about those who have never heard the Gospel? How can they believe and be saved?

Since you don't qualify yourself as one who has not heard, I take your question to be a purely academic one. First of all, God is a righteous judge. Everyone will be judged fairly. Secondly, all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. We all deserve punishment. We all deserve to be cast away from Him. If He forgave just one of us, we should rejoice in that person's salvation. Better one be shown mercy than none at all.

If you are truly concerned about the fate of those who have not heard, then by all means help to share the Good News. If each of us told 2 people today, and those two each told two tomorrow, the entire world would be reached in less than a month. Unfortunately, there are many who want to prevent this from happening. Are you one of them?

What if I don't want to have anything to do with God?

Although it is God's will that all would turn to Him, He gave us the free will to reject Him. Love is simply not possible without free will. Since God will honor your will, he will make sure that you are not forced to live with Him eternally. The question is, "what on earth is worth trading for his forgiveness and love?"

What good is it for a man to gain the whole world, yet forfeit his soul? (Mark 8:36)

If I every overcome my stubborn pride, what should I do?

Seek first the Kingdom of God. He will provide the rest.

In all your ways acknowledge Him and he will direct your paths. (Proverbs 3:6)

Pray for forgiveness and you will be washed clean of all your guilt.

"Come now, let us reason together," says the LORD. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool. (Isaiah 1:18)

Accept Jesus as your Savior.

If you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. (Romans 10:9)

Set your mind on permanent things above, not on perishable things below.

proof they were promised IAP bonuses if they wish to receive them. Documentation can be in the form of a letter, certificate, e-mail printout, etc., to Labor Relations Manager Leslie Sanchez. The proof can be hand delivered, mailed or faxed.

Ceder said if the IAP bonus was promised verbally, supervisors must provide a memo or a letter to that effect.

"Employees who apply get 100 percent of the promised IAP money," Ceder said. "Many of them were nominated to receive anything between \$100 to \$1,000 or more."

"A communication which merely states that the employee has been nominated for an incentive award without supplemental documentation confirming the award of an IAP will not be construed as a promise by the university to pay an IAP award."

The university will pay IAP bonuses on or before

July 2, 2000, Ceder said. Only clerical employees who were promised IAP awards between July 1, 1999 and Dec. 20, 2000 should apply.

CUE members are currently in the process of electing a new bargainer to represent Santa Barbara in the upcoming negotiations.

"The upcoming negotiations will begin in May, but our bargainer won't be elected until the end of May," Ceder said. "Nominations are open from April 5 to 19."

Chancellor Henry Yang said he had faith the negotiations will progress smoothly.

"CUE and the university have exchanged their initial lists of contract articles they would like to include in the negotiations," Yang said. "I am confident that the university will negotiate in good faith regarding any proposals that CUE makes, and that the two sides will reach a mutually acceptable agreement."

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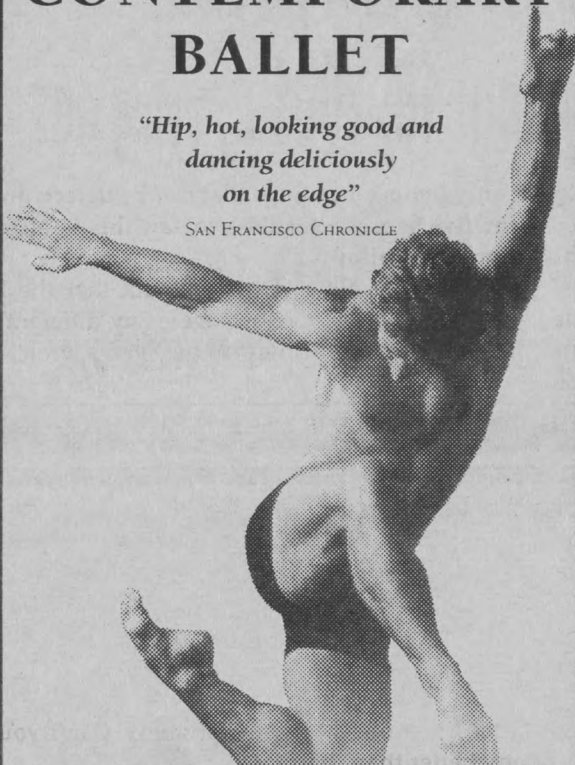
