Election Assembly Installs Gauchos To Skipper Widespread Activities

Cal Reynolds, by a margin of 23 votes, defeated Hob Watts in the runoff for the office of president of the Associated Students, at the election of summer officers Wednesday, June 25, in the auditorium of the Riviera campus. Hob Watts was elected vice-president; Ann Davies, secretary; and Jack Erikson, social chairman.

Committee heads who have been appointed are Don Gill, to be in charge of intermural sports, and Judy Morgan, to head the Bridge Club and the social activities calendar.

Nominations

Nominations for the office of President of the Associated Students were called for by Bill Russell in the general assembly held Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. Those nominated were Daniel Alcala, Hob Watts, Cal Reynolds, and George Weisinger. "What's that name?", shouted a voice from the upper balcony, as Jack Erikson stood to nominate Cal Reynolds.

The four candidates for the office of President went backstage while a standing vote was taken. The vote between Reynolds and Watts was so close that a revote had to be taken. First, each came out on the stage to make a few statements outlining his platform. The runoff gave the presidency to Cal Reynolds by a margin of 23 votes.

New President

Bill Russell then turned the meeting over to the new president, who presided over the rest of the meeting. Hob Watts was elected vice-president over Arnold Har-

gis; Ann Davies defeated Ann Osterahl for the office of secretary; and Jack Erikson was chosen social chairman over Thomas Cowan.

Cal Reynolds, a physical education major, has held the offices of secretary of the A.M.S. and secretary-treasurer of the men's physical education department. He is a Gamma Sigma Pi and a member of the Blue Key.

Vice-president Watts, who entered U.C.S.B. last fall, has been junior class representative, president of the Quadrangle Club, and a member of the swimming team.

Other Offices

Ann Davies, new secretary for the Associated Students, has been a participant in Phrateres activities.

Jack Erikson, elected social chairman, graduated from U.C.S.B. in June of this year, and was President of the Senior Class. Jack was a member of the social committee, President of Gamma Sigma Pi, a member of the interfraternal council, and a member of the Blue Key.

Plans made by the social committee include a picnic, a "night splash" at Los Banos Pool, Twilight Sings followed by bridge each Thursday night, dances each Tuesday night, and another big dance to be held later on in the summer.

Active Summer Calendar Planned As Student Body Officials Meet

The summer session Student Council met recently and, despite the handicap of a ridiculously low budget, outlined a social program that should appeal to all the students, regardless of their fields of interest.

On the agenda are the Bridge Club, which will hold its first meeting this evening; the Squabble Club, composed in the main of I. E. men; publication of El Gaucho; and two Garden Tours,

to be held the 11th and 18th of July, which will visit Hope Ranch and Montecito areas. Also the Intramural Sports program, which is tentatively hanging in the balance pending allocation of funds, the lack of which is due to the poor response to the student body card campaign; a student Picnic, tentatively scheduled for July 18th; and the next Student Body Dance, which is scheduled for July 25th.

300 Pay For 1300

At the Council meeting, Graduate Manager Bill Russell presented a financial statement of credits and debits to date and pointed out that somewhere around 300 students (who have purchased student body cards) are paying for the publication of El Gaucho and are financing the social program for all the others, around 1000 students).

Foremost of the subjects discussed was the next student dance. To be "dressy sport," the affair will be held at the Rockwood Women's Club. Herb Fredlund's orchestra will furnish the music and Bill Adaza will arrange for a "floor show" during the intermissions. Tickets will go on sale on the campus ten days in advance of the dance; the price will be one dollar per couple to those students and faculty members who do not hold student body cards.

Quad Dances

Also high on the discussion list was a plan for informal weekly "Quad Dances," to be held each Tuesday if sufficient interest is shown.

All things considered, the social program looks like a success; perhaps an almost *sans funds* success, but a success nevertheless.

Schedule 1st Readings For Next Wednesday

Presentation of a series of play readings by students under the direction of Dr. E. J. Curry will get underway in the college AWS room on Wednesday, July 9, at 3 p.m., and continuing through the following two weeks.

The readings will be selections from famous American plays presented without the aid of scenery or gestures, thereby placing the accentuation on expressive reading.

Any student interested in taking part in one of these programs may get information from Dr. Curry in Dr. Snidecor's office (Oak Hall) at 10 a.m., any weekday morning.

The speech department extends an invitation to all students to spend an enjoyable hour watching these presentations. The admission is "for gratis."

Fall Application

All students, in school now or out, must file applications for admittance in the fall by August 15th, according to Dr. Lester Sands, registrar.

Because of the anticipated swollen enrollment, Dr. Sands advises all students to obtain blanks from his office and fill them out immediately.

Activity Cards Go To Faculty, Wives

Student body cards afford the holders the opportunity to participate in all student activities for only the initial price of two dollars for the card. The student council decided that these groups should be able to purchase activity cards as well as the registered students.

The chief difficulty found in placing students is the correlation of college schedules with work hours. This is the reason for the comparative scarcity of available positions, since there have been many requests for full time help.

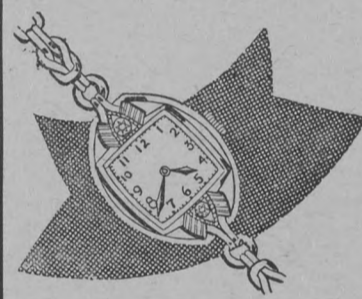

On July 4th, 5th and 6th the Eleventh Annual Semana Nautica will present varied tournaments, races and spectacular sporting events for followers of every sport.

High on the list of activities of interest to Santa Barbara College students are yachting, speed boat races, aquaplaning, water skiing, and paddleboard and swimming races.

Many Events

Aside from water sports, which has been the speciality of the annual Marine Week celebration, tournaments have been arranged in golfing, archery, badminton, tennis, table tennis, bowling-on-the-green, horseshoes, rifle and pistol shoots, and a bicycle road race from North Hollywood to Santa Barbara.

Sailing activities are among the most colorful and exciting of Santa Barbara sports for both participants and audience. Stars, flatties, and moons will offer exciting competition off the Santa Barbara Shoreline. Sailors enjoy a 90-mile cruising area, and the entire course can be seen from the shoreline. These races will be held at 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., on Friday, and at 1:30 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday.

Aquatics

Swimming events are highlighted by meets at the beautiful city pool, Los Banos del Mar, and West Beach at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday, and by the two-mile David Gray Ocean Swim, beginning and ending at the Cabrillo Pavilion at East Beach on Sunday.

Paddleboard races will be held in the inner harbor at West Beach at noon on Saturday.

Golfing tournaments for men

and women will commence on Friday morning, 8 a.m. at the Montecito Country Club. At 9 a.m. on the same day, the tennis tournaments will open at the Stadium.

Tennis Courts, and the badminton open tournament begins at 2 p.m. at the Montecito Country Club.

The Semana Nautical 90-mile Handicap Bicycle Road Race will begin in North Hollywood and end in Santa Barbara in front of the Museum of Art at 9:15 to 9:45 a.m. on Friday.

Bows and Spurs

The annual championship Archery Tournament will be held at the Sports Field at 10 a.m. on Saturday. Bowling-on-the-green will also be featured on Friday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Recreation Center grounds, Anapamu and De La Vina streets.

For the horsemen, the Lompoc Parade and Rodeo will take place in Lompoc, on Friday at noon. Locally, the event will be the Equestrian Endurance Trail Ride on Saturday. It leaves Pershing Park at 1 p.m. and finishes at Pershing Park at 4:30 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Rifle Shoot

NATIONAL GREEK GROUP FORMS RANKS ON HILLTOP

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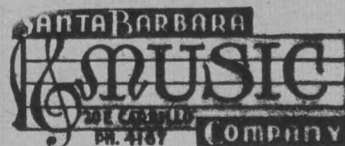
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
