

The new University of California ruling makes two years of college ROTC training mandatory for entering UC students who are physically fit and have not served in the United States Armed Forces for at least a year.

#### UNIT COMMANDER

The new unit, headed by Col. Richard Gray McKee and Sgt.-Maj. Anthony G. Stevenish, will see the first ROTC uniforms on the campus in the fall.
