National Volunteer Week Salute to Volunteers

A great deal of planning went into the **1991 National Volunteer Week Celebration**. Departments and individuals were asked to carve out precious time, resources, and funding to support our goals of recognition and outreach. The response has been wonderful. Money has been squeezed from already overextended budgets. Staff and students worked long hours organizing a direct mail outreach, planning a Storke Plaza rally, serving on selection committees, etc.... Community organizations and professionals responded with nominations, funding, and encouragement. UCSB sang the praises of the many students, staff, and faculty volunteers in the community and honored the many community volunteers on our campus. On the following pages attention is given to those individuals who were recognized on April 23rd. These individuals are representative of a movement that is sweeping our nation and redefining volunteerism. This movement toward redefining volunteerism was researched and is being widely publicized through the American Red Cross in a study entitled "Volunteer 2000." This study states,

"Volunteers are individuals who reach out beyond the confines of their paid employment and of their normal responsibilities to contribute time and services to a not-for-profit cause in the belief that their activity is beneficial to others as well as satisfying to themselves."

Even though this "new" definition of volunteer contains all of the traditional elements of volunteerism (service to something beyond oneself; a willingness to contribute time and effort without pay; and a donation of time and effort beyond one's normal responsibilities) it broadens the traditional concept significantly. It acknowledges that volunteers themselves benefit from their charitable activities — yet it does not pass judgement on their motives. It includes employees who volunteer on company time if the service they provide is not part of their regular job. It encompasses the growing number of volunteers in government programs and in political campaigning or lobbying. It does not rule out training, stipends, vouchers, or other benefits meant to assist volunteers to overcome financial barriers. The new definition of "volunteer" is nonjudgmental, flexible, and inclusive. It takes into account the complexities of the volunteer world and of our rapidly changing society. It is a definition that is helping to shape our training programs and focus our attention on maximizing volunteer opportunities for students.

At UCSB volunteerism comes in many forms. From students involved through the Volunteer Reserve Corps of the A.S./UCSB Community Affairs Board who give 2 hours per quarter to help with one time events, to students who complete 100 hour internships through the Applied Learning Program of Counseling and Career Services and gain academic credit for their work, to students receiving work study money to tutor through the Urban Teachers and Educators Program and through El Congreso's La Escuelita program. Students volunteer through their fraternities, sororities, and honor societies. Resident Hall Associations, political organizations, pre-professional clubs, and athletic clubs organize community service projects. And faculty encourage students to gain real life experience beyond the classroom by volunteering. It has been estimated that between 30-50 percent of undergraduates will participate in some type of public service during any given academic year. Volunteerism is woven into the very fabric of UCSB by staff and faculty members who juggle work and family responsibilities along with independent activities to make room for the public service they know to be so important to the quality of life in Santa Barbara county.

Now is the time to make plans to participate in the **1992 National Volunteer Week Celebration**. Let's work together to create a Celebration that cuts across all political, cultural, economic, and social boundaries, that salutes volunteering as an important element for a successful life, and that pays tribute to all levels of community involvement from **OUTSTANDING** to the smallest effort to make a difference by a local hero. So, start today by marking your calendar for April 1992, by keeping an eye out for volunteers to recognize, by sending your ideas to the program committee, and, of course, earmarking a bit of your budget. We look forward to another year of service.

Faculty Tributes

“ Today, it is my privilege to recognize the efforts of our UCSB faculty whose efforts have helped make a difference. We know that many of our faculty have gone beyond their immediate research and teaching responsibilities to offer their time and expertise to the volunteer boards and agencies they serve. Today we honor several.

One such person deserves special recognition for both the volume and quality of her community service. Her name is **ROBERTA JACKSON**, lecturer for our Speech and Hearing Sciences Department. Robbie started volunteering at the age of seven at a pre-school swimming program and more recently has dedicated herself to over eighteen community service agencies ranging from the Association for Retarded Citizens, Braille Institute of Santa Barbara to Junior League and United Way. In addition to doing “hands-on” volunteerism — (working with an AIDS patient, the Adult Literacy Program, disabled adults), she also has used her excellent administrative skills on many community boards, in fundraising, and teaching grantsmanship. For Robbie, volunteerism appears to be a way of life. What's more, gives of her time in a thoroughly committed, tireless and cheerful manner. Truly Robbie is a “HEART AT WORK.”

Three years ago, the state legislature passed the Vasconcellos Human Corps bill strongly encouraging all California college students to participate in an average of thirty hours of volunteer service. According to this bill “Student community service is an activity of extreme importance to the mission of the university and deserves to be conducted both for academic credit and otherwise.” To address service with the curriculum, a Human Corps Academic Task Force was established. Thanks to the concern and participation by these next two faculty members, an action plan was developed to do just that. Although the plan is still in process, the campus has begun to lay a blueprint on incentives and funding for how faculty might enhance their courses through the use of service learning projects and volunteer internships. In a climate where research often gets first priority, it is always rewarding to find faculty who really believe that excellence in teaching and research can be achieved through public service. It is with real pleasure that I award these certificate of appreciation to the following individuals:

Professor Robert Sherman, Psychology

Dr. Sherman applies the Human Corps initiative through his popular, longstanding (over 20 years) “Field Experience in Psychological Settings” course where his students volunteer 8 hours per week with a local community, mental health setting while attending his weekly seminar complemented with individualized readings, analytical writing assignments.

Professor Cedric Robinson, Political Science

Dr. Robinson brings a richness to his teaching and research through his some eight years or so of co-hosting and producing of a live TV show for KCTV Community Television, Channel 19 entitled “Third World News Review,” along with his willingness to sponsor students with community service internships through independent research projects that help them critically examine issues of social and civic responsibility needed in social change. As past chair of his department, Cedric represents one of the few departments on campus that actually require an internship experience for those selecting an emphasis in public service.

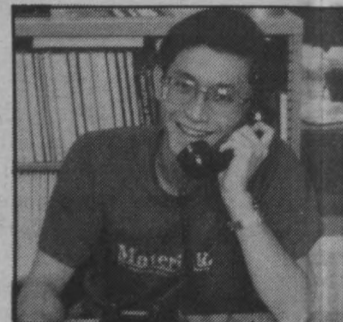
Volunteers Hearts at Work

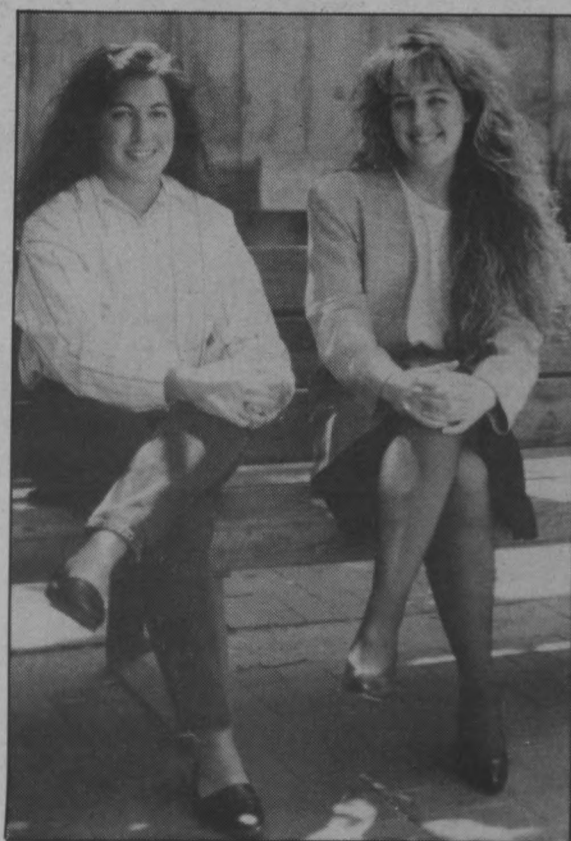

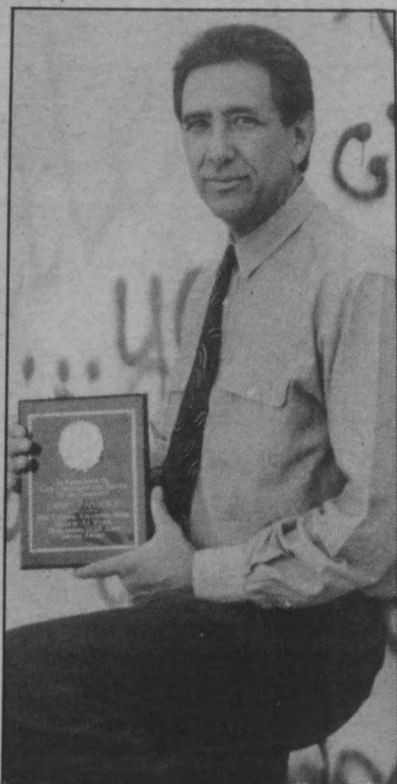

Isla Vista — A Great Place to Volunteer

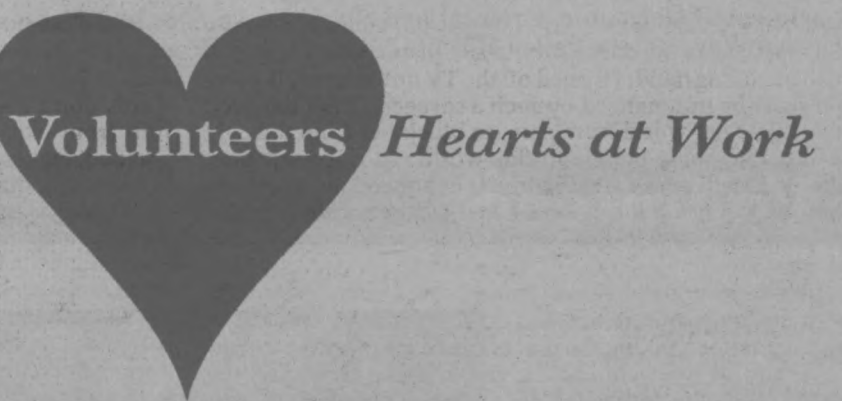
Over 50 percent of the UCSB student body live in the Isla Vista area. That's over 8,000 energetic, talented, resourceful, and intelligent individuals who should be able to make a difference in the community in which they live. Many students are already putting into action their belief that you don't have to look beyond your own backyard to make a positive contribution and are volunteering at one of the many Isla Vista community service agencies.

Students interested in working with children are volunteering with the **Isla Vista Youth Project** located at 892 Camino del Sur, or the **Isla Vista Elementary School**, or the **University Children's Center**. Senior citizens living at **Friendship Manor** are helped by volunteers willing to take a little time for activities ranging from picnics to symphony concerts. Students learn valuable counseling and negotiating skills by volunteering with the **Isla Vista Mediation Program**. And, first hand experience confronting the issue of homelessness can be gained by volunteering with **L.I.V.E.** (Let Isla Vista Eat), the **Santa Barbara Food Bank**, **Transition House**, and the **Emergency Winter Shelter Services**. Through these and other volunteer projects the students have demonstrated that they are indeed a valued part of the community.
