Men's Glee Club Now Touring In Valley Towns

Varied Program Given

Club Will Sing At Lancaster Tonight

The Men's Glee Club, composed of twenty-three members, left yesterday morning for its first two days tour of the year including Bakersfield, Wasco, Delano and Lancaster. The men appeared in Bakersfield for an afternoon and evening performance yesterday. This morning they presented their program in Delano followed by an appearance in Wasco where they are being entertained for dinner. Tonight the club will give its last performance of the tour at Lancaster.

The Glee Club will make its second tour during the middle of April appearing in Ventura, Fillmore, Santa Paula. The Club also has an engagement at Santa Ynez on March 20. A tentative tour is being planned to include several cities in the northern part of Santa Barbara county and San Luis Obispo county.

According to Mrs. Barnett, director, since this year's program is superior to that of last year, which met with such hearty approval, the tour promises to be a great success.

"New Factors in California's Teacher Training Program" was the subject of an address delivered by President Phelps before that body on February 21. His address will later be published in the year book of the American Association of Teachers Colleges.

Following the Conference of the American Association of Teachers Colleges, President Phelps attended a meeting of the Department of Superintendence which convened during the first part of last week in Cincinnati.

President Phelps reports that he had an interesting luncheon with Mrs. Miller's brother, Judge Wade Cushing, who is a well known Judge of the Cincinnati Court of Appeals.

Windshield Stickers Will Be Printed

A committee composed of Helen Culp, chairman, Ted Ellsworth and Jessie Lemmon, has been appointed to investigate the printing of stickers for windshields, suitcases, etc. A design has been made, embodying the Roadrunner as a background for the S. B. C. monogram. The stickers will be printed on white stock with a green border and lettering.

According to the committee, the stickers will be printed in large quantities, if the plan is accepted, and put on sale at the Co-op at a nominal price. Plans have also been discussed for the designing of a pennant sticker of a smaller size than the Roadrunner type, suitable for sticking on note-books, mailing parcels and envelopes.

Campus Tree Destroyed By Malicious Person

A malicious act of vandalism was committed on the College grounds Tuesday night when some one sawed off one of the four camphor trees located near the base of the steps.

Shortly after seven a student who had arrived at play rehearsal early was sitting on one of the benches in the court and heard some one sawing. She was not conscious that it was being done until the tree fell. Several students arrived immediately after the tree fell but no one caught a glimpse of the marauder who was evidently frightened away. A saw bearing two initials on the handle was found near the tree Wednesday morning.

The tree, which fell across the road leading up to El Encanto, was moved by a passing motorist and the students.

All clues have been turned over to the police, who will attempt to determine the instigator of the deed.

Work to Start on New Building Immediately

Ground Staked Yesterday

Will Contain Library, Auditorium, Museum

Yesterday the ground was staked for the site of the new building which will be located on the west side of the campus. A representative from the State Department of Public Works is expected here today or tomorrow to look over the site and begin figuring on the construction of the building.

The building will be 220 feet long and will consist of two stories. The lower floor will contain an auditorium at the west end and class rooms at the other end. The auditorium, which will be sloped, will have a seating capacity of approximately 1000. The stage will be 20 by 50 feet.

A library and museum will be located on the second floor. If there is sufficient room the president and his secretary will also have offices on the same floor.

The new building which has been made possible by the recent state budget will probably be made the center of the college buildings.

Definite plans for the heating of the building have not yet been made but it will probably be heated by means of gas radiators.

The construction of such a building is the beginning of what will probably prove a surprising growth in the college. With more room a greater number of students can be encouraged to come to the institution and a larger enrollment will probably result in the final construction of dormitories and other desired buildings.

College May Yet Be Granted Funds For Land Purchase

Santa Barbara State College may yet be allowed the funds to buy additional land if the measure which is now before the State Legislature providing for a grant of \$12,500 for such purposes meets with the approval of the state body and the governor. The Chamber of Commerce has taken an active part in promoting this measure.

President Phelps has been conferring with Legislative Representatives and the State Board of Control in regard to this measure ever since the appropriation asked for the purpose of securing land was left out of the budget of the College approved by the Board of Control at Sacramento.

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College Proud Of Men's Glee Club

Santa Barbara College should be proud of the Men's Glee Club, which is at the present time on its tour including Bakersfield, Wasco, Delano and Lancaster. The College is being well represented in the northern part of the State.

The Men's Glee Club has put forth much effort and devoted a great deal of time in preparing for the tour. Months of tireless and faithful practice have enabled the club to arrange a concert program of varied numbers of a high standard.

President Phelps Attends Fraternity Luncheon

While in Cincinnati President Phelps, President W. P. Morgan of Macomb Teachers College, Illinois, and President E. L. Hendricks of Warrensburg Teachers College, Missouri, three Phi Delta Kappa men, dined together on Washington's Birthday.

These three men are the only State Teachers College Presidents who are Key men. These keys are awards made by the National Council of Phi Delta Kappa upon the recommendation of the universities after the students leave their universities.

President Phelps also attended the annual Phi Delta Kappa luncheon held in Cincinnati. Nearly five hundred members were present at the luncheon.

The route to be followed will be through the Gaviota Pass and thence up the Alisal road to the ranch gate. Cars must be left at this gate and the remaining two miles must be taken afoot.

Last year's trip to Nojoqui attracted a large crowd from the College of over thirty students and faculty, and a most pleasant time was had by all.

Nojoqui Falls was the scene of much of the Indian history. The name "Nojoqui" was the name of an Indian maiden who ended her life, by a leap over the hundred and eighty foot cliff from the top of the falls, in her lover's arms. (Cliff-jumping seems to be a favorite pastime on Outing Club trips.) The falls are also the only place in Santa Barbara county where the famous five-fingered ferns may be obtained.

The manager of the Alisal ranch requests that the Outing Club members leave the picnic grounds at the Falls free from papers, etc. The Club last year was complimented upon the fashion in which its members cleaned up the grounds after their trip to the falls, and it is to be hoped that this same compliment may be paid again this year.

Students making the trip are requested to bring all their own food, water, etc.

J. C.'s Leading In Departmental Track Meet; C. M.'s Second; 3 Events Still to Be Completed; Records Made

As this paper goes to press, the J. C.'s are leading the C. M.'s and the G. P.'s in the annual inter-department meet by the respective scores of 53, 45 and 10 points. After the pole vault, 220-yard dash, and 220-yard low hurdles are run off, the scores should be somewhere around 65, 50, and 20 with the Junior College leading.

The two leading departments were well represented in each event, but the J. C.'s stepped to the front by capturing nearly twice as many first places as the C. M.'s; although Jimmy Anderson made nearly half of the C. M. score by placing in most of the sprints and weight events. The Junior College made up for its lack of such a versatile athlete by a greater number of contestants.

Hollingsworth and O'Reilly were the only representatives of the G. P. Department, but they made an excellent showing.

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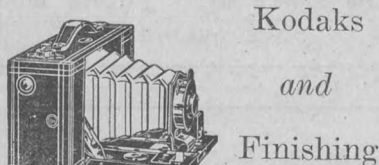
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
