"No, nothing with that theme at all. It's just kind of a gift store," he said. Unconditional love?


"Nope. I have no real say in the matter. You'd have to talk to the buyer," he said. The buyer? Thanks a lot. Mike.

"I think it's a great gift idea. It's educational and entertaining," said Linda Thurmond, who is an Arts and Lectures marketing



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



planned to get it he said, "From the people around me"


Well, I called a bunch of other places and didn't get much further. It took most of the clerks a while to figure out what I was even talking about.

In the meantime, I'd like visor.







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




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
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
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
