The Gauchos continued to excel at their final home meet of the season, which included participants from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Claremont McKenna, Cal State Bakersfield, Pomona, Pit-zer and Whittier College.

Senior Dave Cullum went out in style by taking the crown in the men's 1,500 meters with a time of 3:53.70. In addition to Cullum, senior Brad Glosser finished fifth with a mark of 3:55.93. Junior Nate Elston came in eighth with a time of 3:56.52. In a ninth-place showing was senior Nate Jobe (3:57.35).

"We are a dominant squad in the 1,500," Cul-lum said. "It was a nice meet for my last home meet. It was pretty emo-tional. I still have a lot more to come [in later

Gauchos Manage One Victory at Long Beach

The UCSB baseball team was able to salvage one game this weekend against division-leading #19 Long Beach State at Blair Field.

Santa Barbara was able to beat the 49ers 8-0 Sunday after losing 8-7 and 10-3 Friday and Saturday,

The lone win for the Gauchos (24-26 overall, 14-13 in the Big West) on Sunday was the result of a masterful pitching performance by junior Seth Bean.

Bean threw 109 pitches, allowing four hits and two walks over nine innings to earn his third straight victory. After the game, he said he had a premonition about his pitching gem.

"I knew that I was going to win today on Friday," Bean said. "I had a \$5 bet with [senior designated hit-ter Justin] Balser that I'd only give up only one run. I never felt I was in trouble. I got ahead with strikes and outs with balls. This is definitely the best game of my

Bean's shutout was the first against Long Beach since 1985, when UCSB won with an 8-0 score. It was also the first time in 168 games that the 49ers (33-19, 22-5) have failed to score a run against their

Santa Barbara Finishes Year With Four Straight Defeats

The UCSB softball team continued to struggle at the plate last weekend, managing only two runs in four games — which resulted in four consecutive losses to end its season.


The Gauchos (24-35 overall, 8-24 in the Big West) were swept by Cal State Fullerton on Friday, 6-1 and 2-1. Santa Barbara then dropped a pair of games Saturday to Long Beach State, 8-0 and 1-0.

UCSB's best chance at victory came in game two against the 49ers (40-17-1, 21-9). The score was knotted at zero through seven full innings of play as Gaucho freshman hurler Jennifer Tolton battled 49ers' Amy Miner pitch for pitch. But in the bottom of the eighth, Nicola Walsh belted a double into left center field to drive in the winning run. Santa Barbara was only able to get one hit in the game — a single by freshman center fielder Tonya Dias.

In game one, Tammy Dietrich was just as effective as her counterpart on the mound for Long Beach. She also allowed only one hit — a triple by junior Kerry Kops, in picking up the win. The 49ers put the game away early with a run in the first, two in the second and five in the third. The highlight of the game for UCSB came in the first inning, when Dias threw a runner out at the plate from center field to stifle a 49er drive.

Friday's contests saw the Gauchos involved in similar action — losing one game by a run and another by a wide margin. Cal State Fullerton (29-23, 13-16) scored early




PERFECTION: Junior Seth Bean pitched a fourhitter Sunday for UCSB's lone win at LBSU.



While Sunday's game was as good as it gets for the Gauchos, the team had some problems early on in the

Friday, UCSB blew a 7-4 lead in the seventh inning, when LBSU scored four unanswered runs to win 8-7. Sophomore second baseman Bryan LaCour paced the Gaucho offense with three hits and three ribbies. Junior

shortstop Michael Young also contributed two hits.

Senior Brian Noyes gutted out 6½ innings, allowing nine hits and eight runs — five earned. Freshman Barry Zito finished the game by registering four of five outs through strikeouts.

The game wasn't so close Saturday. The Gauchos

never recovered from a seven-run deficit in the first two innings, losing 10-3.

Sophomore David Uris was shelled for seven earned runs in only 1% inning of work. Although senior Jorvic Salazar and freshmen Troy Kinto and Matt Dailey were able to limit the 49ers to three runs after the second frame, it was already too little too late. UCSB never got on track offensively. Balser hit a solo home run, while Wright added two hits and an RBI.

Despite the disappointments in the first two games, Brontsema was satisfied with his team's performance this weekend — especially Bean's.

"My reaction to the game was Seth Bean," he said. "The game starts on the mound, and he was awesome today, as he has been over the last four outings. We [as a team] work hard on living the present — inning by inning and pitch by pitch. It allows us to recover well

The Gauchos will next play their last home game Tuesday against Pepperdine University. The team travels to Cal State Fullerton this weekend for a three-game series before going back to Long Beach for the Big West Tournament. Tuesday's game will start at 2:30 p.m.

game and then play well in the second." she said. In game two, the Titans went ahead 1-0 on a single by Kate Degener in the second inning. The Gauchos tied the score 1-1


