EDITORIAL

Scientifically, the discovery of a defense against the atomic bomb is a brilliant discovery and one that will carry the study of sub-atomic energy even farther than it has already gone. But socially, both the bomb and its defense have revealed certain characteristics of human behavior that aren't too pleasant to behold.

When the United Nations finally reached a point where they could be sure of being able to dictate plans for a brave new world, all the members were sure that peace was something that could be achieved. Optimism reigned. For once we could look forward with certainty to a peaceful future, instead of recurrent wars until we had fought ourselves out of existence.

Now something is wrong. Ever since the announcement of the atomic bomb, the attitude toward the future has changed. Many people were so misled as to believe that a feeling of human compassion and a sense of justice had motivated these plans. But from observation, it is now apparent that nothing so christian was the reason. It was simply that no nation could be sure of winning the next war. There could be no true victor. With the coming of the bomb, mankind awakened to discover that the nation or group that had control of the bomb had control of the world. Immediately everyone began to scramble for his share of the spoils. Justice and regard for one's fellow man are completely forgotten, and a defense for this bomb has only aggravated the situation. We are right back where we started from, everyone out for what he can get. Maybe Aldous Huxley was right when he thought that the day would come when science would destroy civilization.

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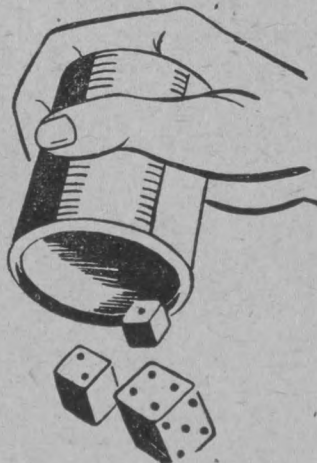

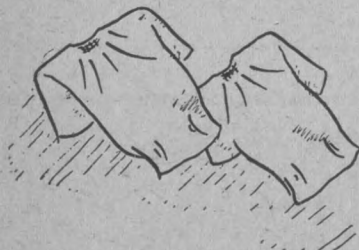

Gaucha grid fans will be rooting for the Santa Barbara Marines tomorrow night when they play their final home game against the California Polytechnic eleven at La Playa Stadium. The contest will start at 8:15 p.m. A record turnout of college students is expected to witness this contest. The Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the local games, has agreed to donate their profits to a football scholarship fund for returning servicemen at the college.

Tickets for the game may be purchased at the student body office or from members of the associated men students. The price for students is 60 cents and general admission is one dollar. A special rooting section is being arranged by Bob Schottland, yell leader, and his assistants.

The marines have a record of five victories, one tie and one defeat. They have not lost a game at La Playa and will be slight favorites over Cal Poly. Last Saturday the marines scored a 6-0 win over undefeated Fresno state. Earlier in the season the Bulldogs played a 6-6 tie with Cal Poly, and two weeks ago they scored a 24-0 victory over a crippled Mustang eleven.

Coach Dick Evans expects to have the marines at full strength for the game Saturday. Danny Radakovich, who alternates with Hank Little at fullback, played a few minutes

against Fresno and will see more action tomorrow night. Radakovich is the local team's leading ground gainer with 235 yards, followed by Little with 205 and Walter Ott with 195.

The marines have several other outstanding ball carriers, including Tony Minetto, Eli Maricich and Ken Reese. Minetto led the offensive attack against Fresno with 58 yards gained in nine scrimmage plays. Reese displayed a great deal of speed and skill when he caught the winning touchdown pass thrown by Charles Horvath. Maricich is the team's leading scorer with four touchdowns.

Cal Poly will be no setup for the marines. They did not play last week, and most of their injured players have recovered from early season ailments. The Mustang squad was also strengthened this week when a new group of Navy trainees were transferred to San Luis Obispo.
