## GSA Discusses Changes to Highway, Old Town

The Graduate Student Association took a position on the proposed transformation of a local roadway and voted on a measure that prohibits doing business with companies dealing in Burma at its executive meeting Tuesday.

GSA voted to oppose the Highway 217 proposal that is part of Santa Barbara County's Old Town Goleta Revitalization Plan, which calls for 217 to be altered into an expressway with traffic signals.

"People are concerned with the impact it will have on access to the university," said GSA Internal President Travis Dixon.

Traffic congestion that would be created during events such as freshman move-in day or graduation ceremonies will be a problem, said GSA adviser and Associate Dean of Students Naomi Johnson.

"[When there are] events on campus, it'll be backed up," she said.

GSA also passed the Selective Purchasing Act, requiring the group to restrict its business

transactions with companies located in Burma, which has a record of violating human rights through forced labor and slavery.

Among discussion items on the agenda was the Old Town Goleta Revitalization Plan. One of the major concerns surrounding the plan is how grad students will be affected by projected changes in the area's financial climate from the renewal efforts, Dixon said.

"A number of us are concerned about certain things — issues of property taxes which will affect rental rates, increasing the cost of services," Dixon said.

Also discussed by the board was campus housing availability and health benefits for domestic partnerships that aren't validated by a marriage certificate.

This is an issue that largely affects same-sex relationships and remains an unresolved problem, said GSA External President Anastasia Telesetsky.

"This has been a hot and contentious issue for a number of years," she said. "The question is whether a marriage certificate should be a requisite."

## Problems With Oozing Gunk Stem From Natural Causes

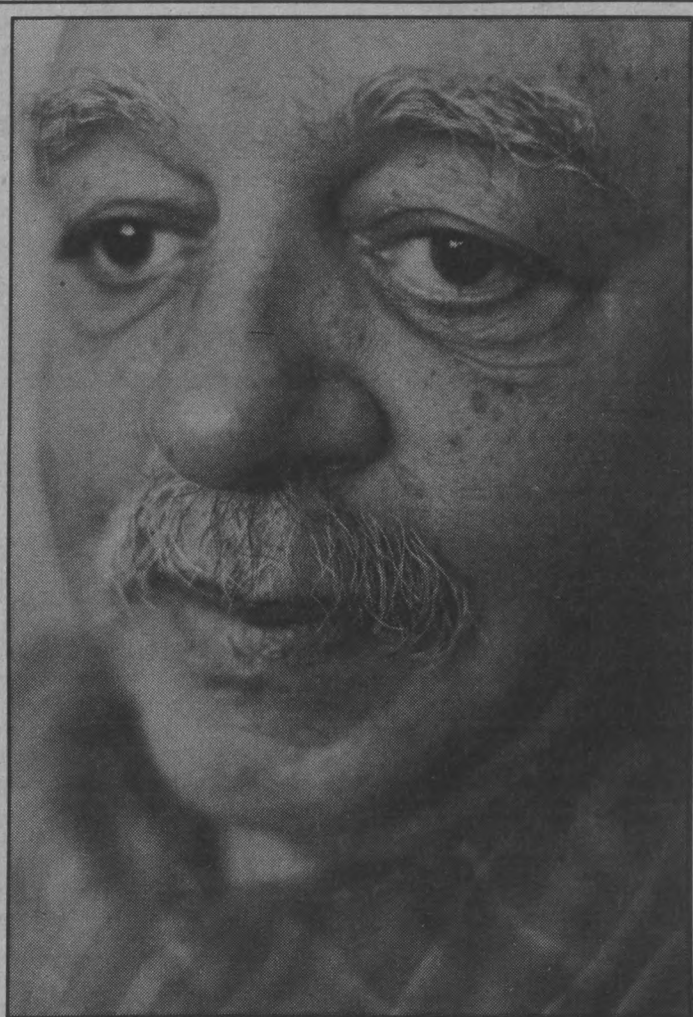
Tar. It plagues the beaches of Santa Barbara and Goleta and attaches itself to the soles of seaside strollers as they wander barefoot through the ocean foam.

While the sticky substance clings to everything it touches, tar's effects on the environment are still unknown. Studies show evidence that almost all of the tar found on Santa Barbara beaches is naturally occurring, said geological sciences Assistant Professor Jordon Clarke.

"A study done in the early 1980s said that tar in Santa Barbara beaches is nearly 100 percent natural, meaning that virtually all the tar on all the beaches is from natural sources," he said.

The environmental consequences of the tar are still uncertain, he added. Not only does the tar seepage pollute the air, but it may also be responsible for driving ocean animals away from Santa Barbara's

## Social Issues Focus of Study

Human rights violations in Mexico will be discussed by a noted professor and a local group at an event this summer.

The colloquium, led by Santa Barbara United Nations Association president and sociology Professor Seth Fisher, is scheduled to be held at the University of Guerrero in Mexico at the end of the summer. Professors, officials from the University of Guerrero, SBUNA representatives and Guerrero citizens will participate.

"[We want] to begin a dialogue about the status of human rights, generally speaking, as well as there in Guerrero," Fisher said. "It has been alleged that the [people] who have been attempting to organize to express their own interest in politics ... are thwarted in their efforts to do so and the democratic process is stymied."

The study was conceived when Fisher and a group of colleagues presented a panel on Mexican human rights in Switzerland last summer.

"Our discussions led to the generation of the idea, and they came up [to Santa Barbara] and talked to the Unitarian Church," Fisher said. "It's important that people [in Guerrero] know that there are people throughout the world who have an interest in human rights and want to see them protected and enhanced rather than brutally cut down and denied."

Fisher is also interested in locating and interviewing the black

## Fake Money, Bad Checks Cause Woes

Check bouncing, credit card fraud and even cash counterfeiting have been occasional difficulties for campus and local businesses that are now taking measures to prevent the problems.

While the impact of such incidents varies at each establishment, stores are still sure to be on the lookout for fraudulent transactions.

The UCSB Bookstore loses between \$2,000 to \$3,000 a year due to bounced checks, according to UCen senior cashier Debi Veder.

## Education Stressed in Clinton Address



**WASHINGTON (AP)** — President Clinton, declaring that Americans “want us to be partners, not partisans,” challenged Congress in his State of the Union address Tuesday night to give the nation’s schools a big spending increase while balancing the budget by 2002.

Recycling popular ideas from his campaign, Clinton identified education as the top priority of his second term and said Americans should have “the best education in the world.” He challenged communities to measure their students against national standards to lift achievement in math and science.

The president’s proposals would boost education spending by 20 percent to \$51 billion for fiscal 1998. The increase — including the cost of tax breaks for college — would total 40 percent by 2002.

Two weeks after his sec-

ond inauguration, the president lectured the Republican-led Congress to “complete the unfinished business of our country” — balancing the budget, enacting long-

a joint session of Congress, the nation’s attention was distracted by news of a verdict in the O.J. Simpson civil trial.

Balancing the budget by 2002 “requires only your vote and my signature,” Clinton said, brushing over the wide gulf with Republicans over how to

amendment. We need action.” That line drew groans from Republicans.

Clinton was on strong footing as he faced Republicans suspicious of his proposals. His political confidence, shaken by the Democrats’ devastation in 1994, was restored by his re-election, and his recent approval ratings were among the highest of his presidency.

Rep. J.C. Watts of Oklahoma gave the traditional Republican response to Clinton. In his prepared remarks, Watts struck GOP themes of returning power to local communities, family values and balancing the federal budget.

“The strength of America is not in Washington,” said Watts.

## Simpson Found Responsible by Civil Trial Jury



**SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)** — A civil jury found O.J. Simpson responsible Tuesday for the slashing deaths of his ex-wife and her friend, a moral victory for grieving relatives who felt the football great got away with murder.

The unanimous verdicts came with an \$8.5 million award in compensatory damages and triggered a punitive phase that will begin Thursday.

As the first verdict was read, Simpson sat stoic, unmoving and staring straight ahead.

Across the courtroom, the families of victims Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman let out whoops of joy.

“Yes!” screamed Kim Goldman, Ronald’s sister. She and her mother and father clasped hands in jubilation. The judge threatened to silence them. They fell silent, sobbing.

The mostly white panel, forced to begin deliberations anew after a juror’s dismissal, snatched away some of the

vindication Simpson claimed in 1995 when he was acquitted by a mostly black jury in a televised murder case that divided the nation over issues of police racism, domestic violence and the quality of justice.

Sharon Rufo, Goldman’s estranged natural mother, who was a plaintiff, fell into the arms of Dominique Brown, Ms. Simpson’s sister, and sobbed silently throughout the reading of the verdicts.

As the jury was polled and it became apparent it was unanimous, Fred and Patti Goldman raised their arms in exultation.

At a brief news conference later, Goldman said, “It was done with honesty and dignity, complete truth and our family is grateful for a verdict of responsibility, which is all we ever wanted. We have it. Thank God.”

Plaintiff attorney Daniel Petrocelli said he couldn’t comment on the substance of the case because of the upcoming penalty phase, but felt compelled to make a brief statement.

“We are very grateful for this verdict and we feel vindication for Ron’s death and Nicole’s death,” he said.

## Prop 187 Backers Get New Legal Support



**SACRAMENTO (AP)** — A group representing the backers of Proposition 187, contending that a hostile federal judge has deliberately blocked the initiative, wants to intervene in the federal fight between the Wilson administration and civil rights groups.

The non-profit Pacific Legal Foundation, a business-sponsored organization that often represents conservative causes in court battles, filed the formal request Tuesday before U.S. District Judge Mariana Pfaelzer in Los Angeles.

A hearing was scheduled March 10.

“This case has languished in this court for two years,” said Sen. Richard Mountjoy (R-Monrovia). He said Pfaelzer is “making law by de-

laying law. We would prefer it if she had said it was unconstitutional and threw it out of her court. We would like to move this case along.”

Mountjoy, an author of Prop 187, said the request for intervention was not intended as criticism of the handling of the case by state Attorney General Dan Lungren, a fellow Republican.

As the state’s lawyer, Lungren’s office represents the Wilson administration’s interest against legal challenges and has suffered adverse rulings from Pfaelzer.

Civil rights groups, led by Latinos and the American Civil Liberties Union, contend Prop 187 is unconstitutional and that it usurps federal authority.

On Nov. 20, 1995, Pfaelzer agreed, ruling that “immigration belongs exclusively to the federal government, and state agencies are not permitted to assume that authority.” She also said undocumented immigrants can’t be questioned about their immigration status when applying to attend public elementary and secondary schools or receive health and welfare benefits.

She did not, however, strike down provisions that deny higher education benefits to undocumented students.

Robert Corry, an attorney for the Pacific Legal Foundation, said the goal of the request to intervene is to expedite the case.

“The drafters, authors and co-sponsors have a right to intervene,” Corry said. “This brings a breath of fresh air to this stagnant legislation.”

• **SYDNEY, Australia (AP)** — Alcohol ads in bus shelters that give passengers a whiff of a lemon-scented drink are raising a stink in Australia.

Bacardi-Martini Pacific has scent dispensers in 90 bus shelters in Sydney, Adelaide, Melbourne and Brisbane ready to advertise Bacardi Limón, a lemony, 35 percent alcohol drink.

People entering the shelters trigger motion detectors, setting off 20-second bursts of fragrance every three minutes.

Victoria state authorities are moving to ban the Melbourne campaign. And Warwick Murphy, a spokesperson for the substance abuse agency Drug-Arm Victoria, called the ads irresponsible and risky for recovering alcoholics. “For some of them, they only need one whiff of it.”

"We get bad checks weekly, daily even. The bulk are received at the beginning of each quarter, when people come in for books. During the rush we probably get up to 20 a day," she said.

Methods of legal recourse exist for the university to efficiently deal with monetary fraud, Veder said.

The Cashiers Office sends out four notices over a 45-day period, at which time the case is turned over to the county district attorney's bad-check program, she said.

"It's hard to say, but on a continual basis, we send a case in every two to six months," she said.

Credit card fraud has also been taking place in the bookstore. Customer service cashiering manager Julia Taylor believes that fraud of this type is a concern although it doesn't occur frequently.

"It has happened, but it is very rare. I've been here nine years and it has happened maybe a couple of times," she said.

The university's access

card program and its widespread use cuts down on fraud and counterfeiting, Taylor said.

"Anytime you can alleviate using cash money, the threat [of receiving counterfeit money] is lessened," she said. "The access [card] has photo I.D. and most credit cards don't."

Preventative measures are also taken at the Arbor so that past experiences with counterfeit bills won't happen again, said junior anthropology major and Arbor Supervisor Nancy Walker.

"The cashiers have green pens that mark the bills to help prevent it now," she said.

The Arbor avoids problems with counterfeit money by refusing to accept bills larger than \$20 and by training employees to identify fake currency, she said.

UC Police Dept. Capt. Tony Alvarez feels the campus doesn't have a big problem with fraudulent money but offers some suggestions on how to be more cautious when handling large amounts.

"Just be more aware of handling large bills. There are telltale markings espe-

cially with the new federal notes. ... The new money issued from the Federal Reserve will make counterfeiting more difficult," he said.

One Isla Vista business has also experienced its fair share of problems dealing with students' misuse of checks, said Giovanni's owner Indras Govender. The pizza restaurant loses between \$500 to \$600 to bad checks every year.

"When people are hungry they write checks even if there is no money in the account," Govender said, adding that this occurs mostly in the spring, near graduation.

Giovanni's does take legal action but only after calling the offender for about three months, he added.

"The checks [individually] don't tend to cost that much and a collection agency costs the students a lot more. I feel compassionate for the students but eventually I do hand them over."

Giovanni's has also taken measures to ensure that they no longer take stolen credit cards.

the community."

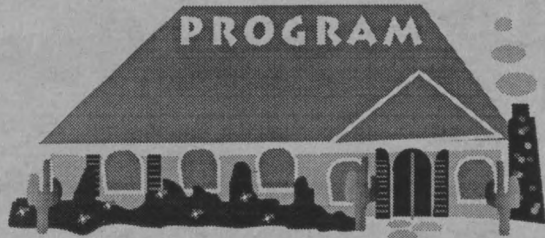

## Seniors Make a Difference

Scholarship, leadership and community service are the doctrines followed by a group of philanthropically motivated seniors.

In an effort to maintain high academic standards and provide community service, the Mortar Board sponsors programs like the Giving Tree, where students give gifts to developmentally disabled people, and Project Literacy, which is designed to help elementary and high school students improve reading and writing skills, said Public Relations Chair Charity Yarnal.

"The purpose of Mortar Board is just basically a senior honor society that focuses not only on academics, but student leadership and community service," she said.

The group is comprised of 31 seniors who work together to create and execute programs that benefit the local community, said Mortar Board President Angela West, an English major.

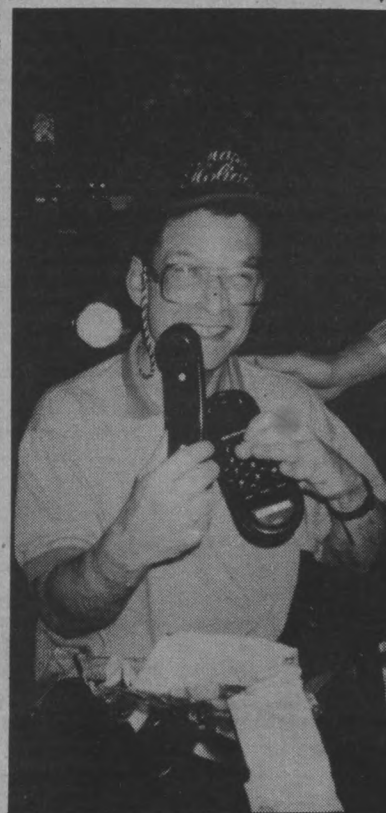
West believes the involvement of the students distinguishes the organization from other groups.

"Mortar Board is one of the best things on campus because they are concerned with the community," she said. "We've really emphasized the service aspect, and I think that's what separates us from the rest of the honors societies."

Another unique characteristic of Mortar Board is its ability to come up with innovative projects, West added.

"The creativity of the

ideas is important; we don't just do a dinner for the homeless. We try to implement ways that aren't really looked at, and try to reach people that are a lot of times overlooked," she said.

An example of the board's creativity is the recent expansion of Project Literacy with an essay contest at San Marcos High School on the American Dream. All en-

tries will be published in a journal, and the top three essays will win gift certificates from Borders Books & Music, West said.

In addition, Feb. 18-22 is Mortar Board week, and each day a different event will be held to promote the club, including a blood drive, canned food drive, a beach cleanup and sandwiches for the homeless, said Co-Chair Michael McNellis, a religious studies major.

McNellis sees the group as a way to relate what he learns at the university to the real world.

"For myself, it's allowed me to maintain a balanced college experience between both taking and receiving information from people and at the same time giving it," he said. "It's an opportunity to use the resources that I've gained at UCSB and go and apply them to the community. To connect my role as a student to my role as a community member."

The club is rather selective, as approximately 30 students are chosen every year with gpa's of over 3.0. The applicants are required to compose two essays on why they should be members and what they will do once accepted, Yarnal said.

Club member and biology major Alison Metz feels the organization helps the students as much as it helps the community.

"Giving back to the community is basically what it's about," she said.

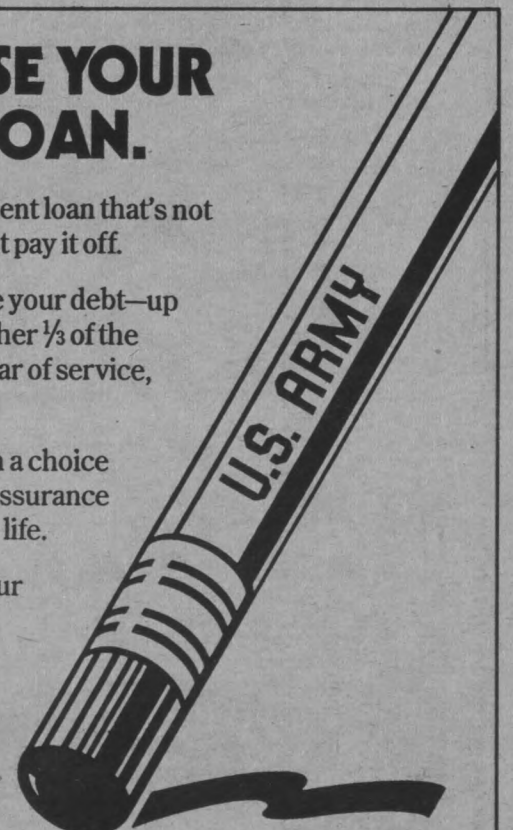

shores, Clarke said.

"The seeps are major polluters of hydrocarbons, [gasoline, methane, propane and oil that effect] both the ocean and atmosphere in the regional sense," he said.

While the impacts of the 1969 Santa Barbara coastal oil spill are still being felt in the area, the incident is not solely responsible for the oil seepage off the coast, said Associated Students Environmental Affairs Board Co-Chair Eric Cardenas.

"From the 1969 oil spill you can still see the effects because it has coated all the beaches and you can see the tar on the rocks. That's part of the [pro-

blem], but it's not coming in anymore. There is naturally occurring oil seeps off the coast and that stuff is what washes up on shore," he said.

Offshore oil drilling could help eliminate seepage since drilling releases pressure that might build up in oil veins, he said.

"When oil companies try to stop the tar from coming to the surface with seep tents, this makes [the oil companies] in effect look good," Cardenas said. "With them drilling oil with ocean reserves and getting oil out of the ground, they say it relieves the pressure of the seeps so less will come out," he said.

Historically, tar has been used as a natural resource for communities living in the Santa Barbara

area, he added.

"There are natural oil seeps on land as well. It's natural and the Chumash did utilize the land tar seeps to make their boats," he said.

However, there are still other environmental problems the tar causes, including the impact on local wildlife, said Santa Barbara Wildlife Care Network volunteer and EAB Co-Chair Jessica Scheeter.

"A lot of the sea birds we get in is because the tar gets on their feathers and they lose their waterproofing abilities, making them susceptible to the cold," she said. "The tar floats on top [because] it is lighter and gets attached to the birds, and it is fairly toxic, so it can lead to problems internally."

population in Mexico, whose existence is little-known in the country, said Sociology Dept. Chair William Bielby.

"He's taught very important classes for us in the area of race relations and social welfare and that's the experience he'll

bring to bear in Mexico," Bielby said.

Fisher's ultimate goal is to see the U.N. Human Rights Declaration universally implemented.

"[I would like to see] the return to an honoring of human rights by all parties involved in this particular state and country and the world," Fisher said.

"We had a problem last year with people calling from the dorms and residence halls and meeting us in the lobby. We didn't know what room number they were and they were using other people's cards," Govender said.

Now, a driver license and the actual credit card are required for deliveries to

verify that the right person is using the account. The measures taken have eliminated the problem, Govender said.

I.V. Foot Patrol Lt. Sam Gross said the community of Isla Vista doesn't experience much of a problem with stolen credit cards.

"We get a lot of calls about lost wallets and lost cards, but we only criminally investigate stolen credit cards about once a month," he said.

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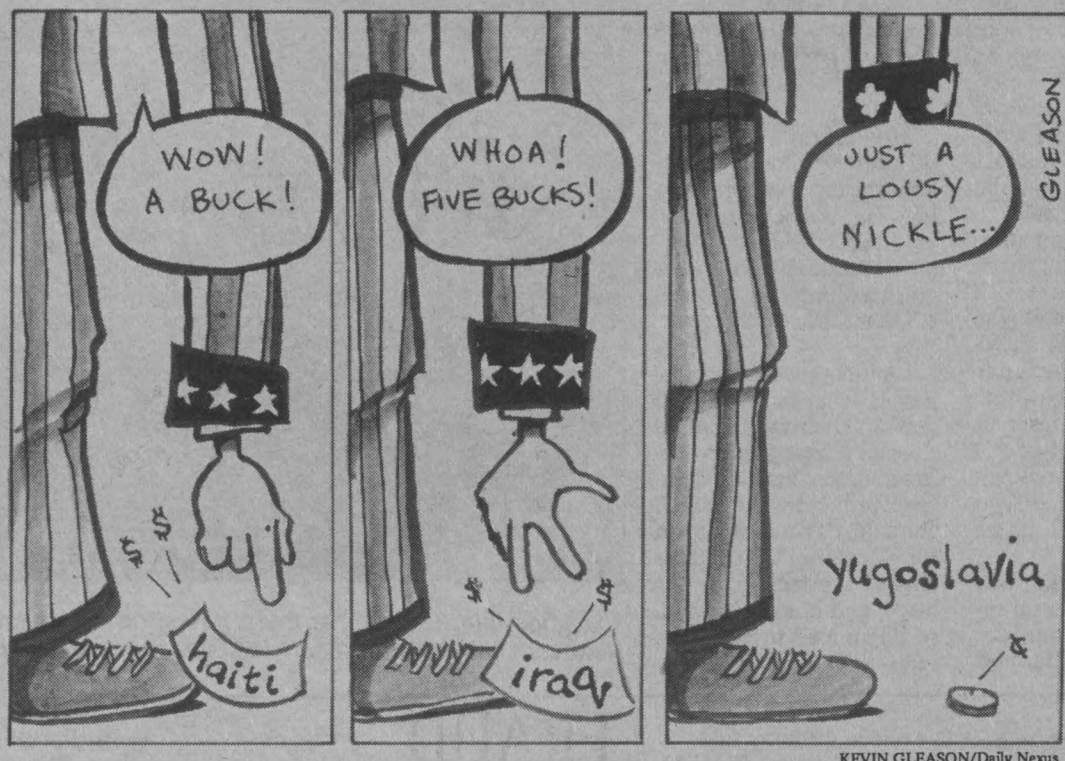

## An Anesthetizing Apathy

We Cannot Allow Peace and Prosperity to Dull Desire for Human Rights

**H**ere in the land of the free we have grown accustomed to the comfort of peace. Few Americans lose sleep over the prospect of civil war or, for that matter, any major upheavals in the fabric of our stable nation.

The bedrock of this peace is democracy — we have the ability to vote, to protest, to directly intervene with the dealings of our government. Without faith in our power as citizens, the stability of the U.S. would be in danger.

In Yugoslavia, the people cannot be so sure nor so comfortable. After experiencing a democratic overhaul of their formerly communist government, the Yugoslavian people had their faith severely shaken by the tyrannical actions of their president, Slobodan Milosevic. Milosevic refused to acknowledge defeat after local elections held on Nov. 17 of last year ousted the president's Socialist Party from many of the country's largest cities.

Milosevic, in a simple move of tyranny, annulled the results, sparking outrage among the Yugoslavian citizens for denial of their newly acquired rights. Massive protests drew 250,000 people to Belgrade in the first few days after the election and a consistent 20,000-30,000 people since November. Over the past weekend, Milosevic finally tired of the right to protest and cracked down on the resisters, using batons and water cannons to disperse the persevering crowds.

This is *real* protest, with risk and passion involved, the likes of which America has not seen since the tumultuous '60s. We can comfortably read about the Eastern struggles over coffee, possibly reminiscing over the days when the majority of Americans felt passionately about some issue that didn't necessarily involve their pocketbooks. Or, more likely, we read or

watch the news about the Belgrade protests and *don't care*.

This apathetic attitude toward events outside our borders is reflected in our government as well. While we sit pretty in democratic security, our leaders do the same. Now we seem to have retreated on both fronts — our government does not care about democracy outside our borders unless it involves *its* pocketbook and we the people don't bother to pay attention to travesties of justice in distant lands.

We would like to see an end to both of these policies of ignorance in relation to Yugoslavia. Although we don't want to see another thinly veiled war for preserving democracy, it isn't appropriate to react in an isolationist way in regards to Milosevic's actions.

Our government needs to use its position as a stable democratic nation to exert diplomatic pressure on Milosevic and his cronies *without* military pressure or economic threats, but simply with a sagacious use of our diplomatic powers. This is why we have diplomats, ambassadors, the State Dept. and million-dollar jets for all these people to fly in — so they can do their jobs of monitoring and regulating foreign policy without resorting to ultimatums and wars.

Foreign policy toward Milosevic's actions should be a careful warning that the U.S. is watching.

To those of us who don't realize how precious a nation of peace is, recognize that we could be clubbed by our nation's riot police just like those in Belgrade. Your humanity demands that you be aware of the plight of others across the world — because the next loss of freedom could be in your own backyard.

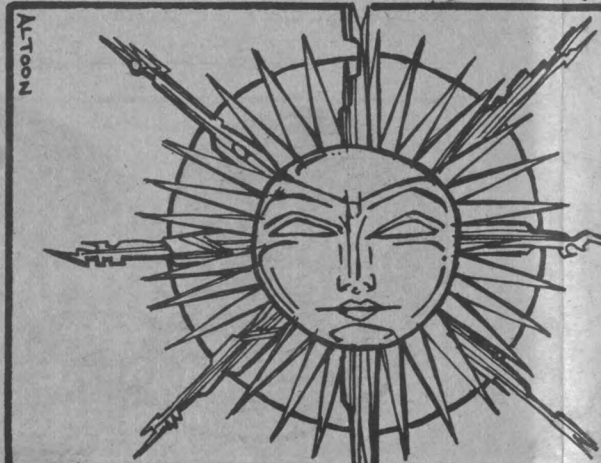

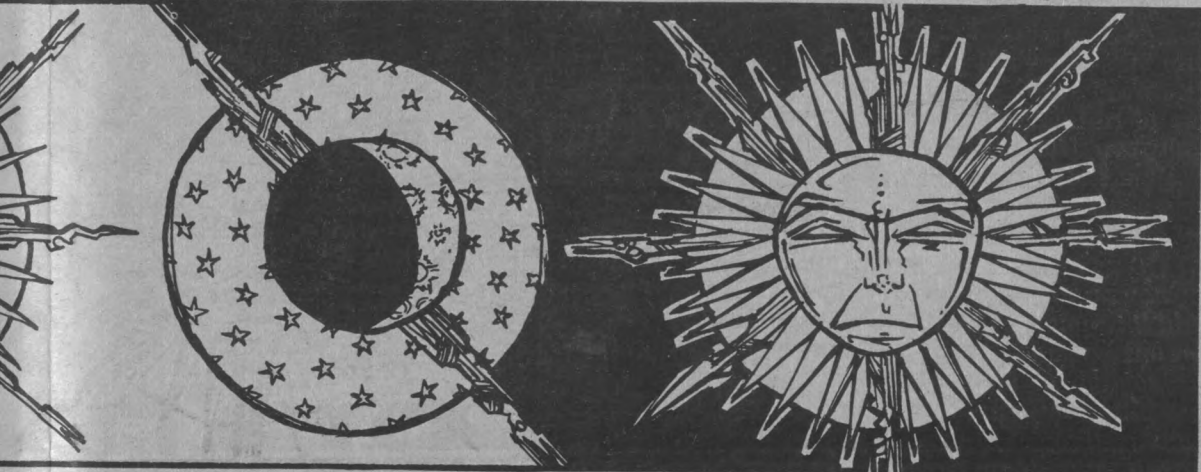

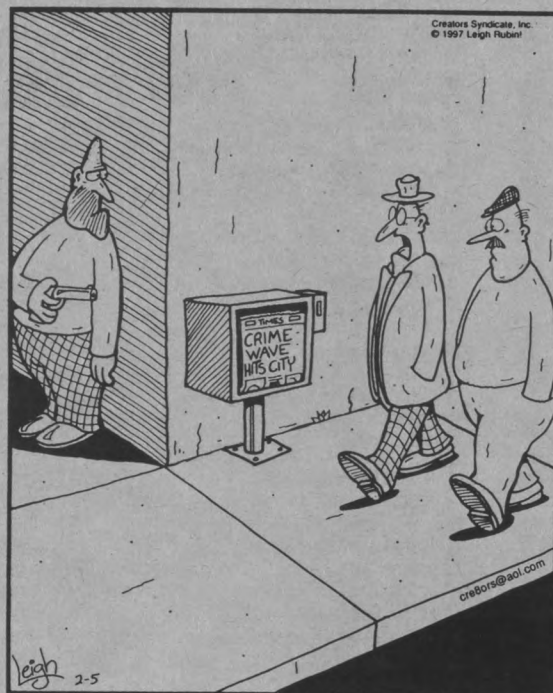

Dear Desperate,  
With thousands of résumés coming across employers' desks every week, many only skim résumés during the first go around. If your résumé doesn't stand out in 10 to 15 seconds, it will probably be rejected. Most employers like to see the following:

- Focused objective
- Error-free document—no spelling, grammar, punctuation errors
- Specific measurable accomplishments—i.e., length of report, dollar amount of money
- Bullets
- Plenty of white space
- Only one or two indentations
- Relevant information targeted toward the job—no filler or fluff
- Short sentences
- Key words, numbers, phrases, and quotes related to the position
- Relevant experience—paid or unpaid
- Contributions rather than duties
- Organized layout
- Important information high and to the left
- Correct names and titles on the cover letter and other documents

While these tips may not get you the job, they will help your résumé stand out and get noticed. Take a look at your own résumé to see what you can do to incorporate some or all of these points. Revise your résumé and then have it evaluated by a Career Services Career adviser in the Career Resource Room. Soon you'll have a résumé that demands attention and gets results.

### ■ Defense Adequate in Taming Matadors; Bean Grounds CSUN

In its seventh game of the season, the UCSB baseball team finally showed signs of a complete package.

After struggling defensively so far this year, the Gauchos (4-3) made only one error on Tuesday afternoon, when they beat Cal State Northridge 12-9 on the road.

That defensive soundness, coupled with the Gauchos' effective base running, proved to be the perfect complement to the gutsy pitching performance delivered by junior starter Seth Bean.

"Overall, we're very pleased with our performance," Santa Barbara Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "This is a very tough place to pitch and play. It was the best all-around game so far on the year. We did all the

little things well."

Bean (2-1), the staff ace, had earned a victory Friday against the Loyola Marymount University Lions. He was able to squeeze out 4½ innings against the Matadors, giving up 10 hits and six runs.

"Seth battled well and kept us in the game," Brontsema said. "He was scheduled to pitch only three to four innings."

Helping the pitchers' cause, the Santa Barbara offense exploded once again. The Gauchos tallied 12 runs on 17 hits without hitting a home run.

UCSB scored two runs in each of the first three innings against CSUN (5-2). They tacked on three more runs in both the fifth and sixth innings.

Leading the charge was senior first baseman David Willis, who went 5-6 with three RBI. Willis, who struggled to begin the year, has erupted with eight hits in the last two games.

"I got off to a slow start on the year," Willis said. "Today, I looked at every pitch and tried driving the ball really hard."

Willis also attributed his recent performance to being able to get more involved on the field. Usually a designated hitter, Willis has played at first base for the past two games.

"I definitely feel more comfortable playing in the field than at DH," he said.

The five hits by Willis tied a personal best and was one shy of the school record for hits by an individual in one game.

Supplementing Willis on the offensive end Tuesday was freshman Bryan LaCour. LaCour, who made his eighth error of the season against the Matadors, made up his defensive lapse by going 3-4 with three RBI.

Sophomore right fielder Eric Leiser also chipped in three hits and two RBI.

## Injury Plays a Hand in Hefty Loss for Spikers

### ■ Santa Barbara Loses Middle Blocker

The UCSB men's volleyball team's penchant for early season injuries is coming dangerously close to turning into a midseason predicament.

X-rays taken on Monday show that a bone in starting junior middle blocker Bob Hefty's left hand is broken. Hefty will be forced to sit out of today's match at the University of Hawai'i and, depending on a doctor's recommendation, may or may not be able to play in Friday's match, also against Hawai'i.

Hefty broke the bone in the second game of the UCLA match last Friday. Not believing it to be broken, he continued to play throughout the Bruin contest and then taped it up and played Saturday against UC Irvine as well.

"I ran into one of our players and I guess I hit it harder than I thought," Hefty said. "It was kind of swollen and it was still pretty sore [on Saturday], but we had some time before the Irvine match for the trainer to tape it up pretty good."

For Santa Barbara (3-2, 3-1 in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation), Hefty is the third starter this season to be hampered by an injury. Senior outside hitter Donny Harris sat out the season opener with a bruised hip, and senior outside hitter Jason Crone has been bothered all season by the effects of a sprained knee suffered in that first match.

Hawai'i (4-3, 3-2) may have

trouble taking advantage of the Gauchos' misfortunes, however. They have been hit with the injury bug as well.

The Rainbows lost starting outside hitter Rick Tune to a broken thumb last Thursday in a match against Pepperdine, while starting outside hitter Naveh Milo may also sit out with a pulled muscle in his left arm.

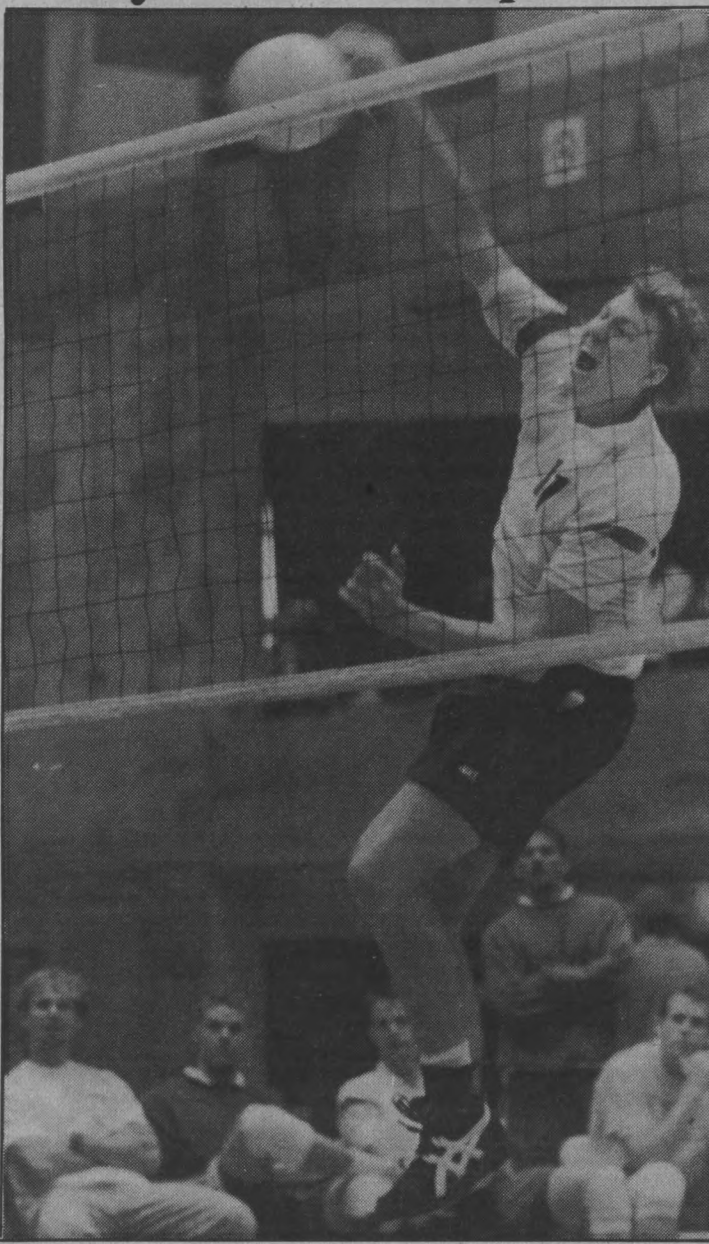
"We may be seeing two teams out there who are in trouble," UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston said. "We'll be putting some different lineups together."

Because Santa Barbara and Hawai'i are in two different divisions in the MPSF, only one of their meetings will be counted as a league match — the other will go on each team's overall record. Preston chose to count Friday's match toward their league record because doing so will give his players time to recover from traveling.

It will also give Santa Barbara an opportunity to become acquainted with Hawai'i's jump serves. Preston estimates that 90 percent of the Rainbows' serves are made with jumps.

The serves have worked effectively for the Rainbows, who have recorded 34 of their 40 aces with jump serves this season.

"It just comes a lot quicker and with spin," Preston said. "We've practiced returning it a lot this past week and we've done OK. We're ready."

## Swimming and Diving Secure Big West Teams

Both the UCSB men's and women's swimming and diving teams bounced back from tough losses to UNLV two weekends ago to beat UC Irvine on Saturday 192-89 and 173-79, respectively.

The Gauchos were racing more against the clock than the Anteaters, who are not known for their swimming prowess.

"We beat them hands down," UCSB junior Jim Phalan said. "They have a couple of good swimmers, but they aren't at the same level as us."

While Saturday's win may not have meant a great deal to Santa Barbara as a team, the meet did provide some individuals with a last chance to make the trip to the Big West Conference Championships, which are coming up in 3½ weeks.

Among the men who made the cut as a result of strong performances against Irvine were senior Brian "Chuckie" Roth, sophomore David Tobias and freshman Jason Dietrich.

Roth recorded a personal-best time in the 100-yard freestyle, finishing in 48.00, while Tobias swam the 200 free in a personal-best 1:46.64. Dietrich's 200 breaststroke time of 2:11.43 was good enough to earn him a spot on the Big West team.

Roth attributed his success at Irvine to perseverance. "Just sticking to it," Roth said. "No one can have a great day every day, but sooner or later it's bound to come in."

On the women's side, Big West Championship spots had been determined for the most part before the Irvine match. But junior Robyn Kracik, who did not swim for official times during the meet, was able to impress Gaucho coaches enough with her unofficial times to earn a spot on the trip.

The men's team will head up to the Bay Area this weekend to face UC Berkeley on Friday and Stanford on Saturday.

"Those teams are always pretty tough for us," Phalan said. "This year we're looking to close in on them — to beat Cal in all of the relays and Stanford in the 200-freestyle relay."

## Men's Tennis Earns Season's First Win in Home Opener

The UCSB men's tennis team's 5-4 win over Brigham Young University yesterday marked a couple of firsts for the Gauchos.

It was the first opportunity Santa Barbara (2-2) had this season to compete on its home courts. After playing in a number of preseason singles tournaments, the squad opened dual match play on the road at USC and the Great Northwest Shootout in Seattle, Wash.

Freshman Jong Min Lee's 6-3, 5-7, 6-4 victory over Damien Ward was his first as a Gaucho. Lee had struggled in his first three matches as a collegian after arriving from his native South Korea in January.

"It was a great win for the school and a great win for myself," Lee said. "I didn't return serves well, but when it mattered I won the big points."

UCSB victories were also tallied by junior Ross Duncan and seniors Eddie Weiss and Darren Potkey. Duncan, who was moved into

the #2 position after his impressive play against Northwestern and Tulsa in the shootout in Seattle, soundly defeated BYU's Manuel Calvo 6-3, 6-4. Weiss, playing in the #4 spot, took care of Jason Hardin 7-5, 6-1 while Potkey continued his success at #6 by beating Roman Weyenhans 6-1, 6-1.

Head Coach Don Lowry made some lineup changes for the BYU match after going with the same rotation in the team's first three contests. Along with Duncan's promotion to #2, Weiss was moved up a spot while Lee was dropped to the #5 position.

"It was time to juggle the lineup," Lowry said. "Some guys were getting beaten up. Ross was playing well and deserved to be moved up. I moved Jong Min Lee down to gain confidence. He has had a tough transition to college tennis, but was the hero of the day."

Santa Barbara has a week off to prepare for what will most likely be its toughest match of the season against second-ranked UCLA. Lowry believes that the Bruins are far from invincible.

"We're going down [to L.A.] as underdogs, but we feel we can beat them. If [UCLA] doesn't show up ready to play, we'll take them out."
