retirement is official, three of the greatest players to play their respective sports have retired. Starting with Michael Jordan in January and Wayne Gretzky's finish last month, it seems the only sport lacking a retiring representative is baseball. But don't be surprised if Cal Ripken Jr. calls it quits after the playoffs. It would be a classy move and 1999 would be remembered as the year that four of the best ended their careers.

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Long-time Yankee catcher Yogi Berra was inducted into the Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Fame. Not for what he did for the Dodgers, but what he did against them. Berra played in six World Series vs. the Bums, and in the 1956 Series, he hit three homers, including a grand slam to go along with a .360 batting average.

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Tony Gwynn, who is closing in on 3,000 hits, is the only everyday player that is batting over .400. Not since Ted Williams hit .406 in 1941 has a major leaguer hit over the sacred mark.

The Dodgers and Angels are both impressed by their young third basemen this season. Adrian Beltre and Troy Glaus have been tearing up their respective league's pitching and after this past weekend, they were both hovering around a .350 batting average - second on the team.

one run on one hit in one inning to take the loss and fall to 1-1.



The Tigers displayed strong pitching once again in Saturday's game. Senior Travis Fleming pitched his first complete game of the year, giving up two earned runs on seven hits for a 6-3 Pacific victory.

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UCSB Can't Get Breaks as Titans Take a Pair

What a strange day to say goodbye.

Sunday was Senior Day at Campus Diamond, where tribute was paid to the UCSB softball team's three seniors -Kiki McAulay, Dayna McCall and Katie Ziegler - before the Gauchos' final game of the weekend vs. Cal State Northridge. After a few bumps, bruises, arguments and ejections, the day ended with a Northridge victory of 7-2 over the Gauchos, and an interesting, if not controversial, farewell tribute to the three Santa Barbara seniors.

The loss completed a weekendlong

Gaucho bats simmered through all of game one, producing only three hits - all singles - over seven innings. UCSB's pitching, however, was good enough to keep the Gauchos in the game. Junior Melanie Richardson and sophomore Nicole Greathouse combined to shut the Matadors out for six innings, keeping the game a scoreless tie until the seventh.

With one out and the bases loaded in Northridge's half of the seventh, Matador catcher Jamie Moore doubled off of Richardson, scoring two Northridge runners.

Northridge added one more run in the inning, and Tara Glaister went the distance for the Matadors, striking out six and earning her 16th win of the year with a score of 3-0.

In the back end of the Saturday doubleheader, the Gaucho offense was on the money from the very first pitch. Following McAulay's leadoff single and back-toback doubles by juniors Mandy Edwards and Kendra Wood, UCSB got out to a quick 2-0 lead that it would not relinquish.

Sophomore Abigail Murphy went the distance for Santa Barbara, putting the lid on a stubborn Matador offense to eke out her 13th victory of the season.

In the seventh and final inning, it was Moore again trying to propel the Matadors to victory, blasting a two-run home run to right field to pull Northridge within one run of the Gauchos. But Murphy refused to wilt, and three batters later a 4-3 victory was in hand for UCSB.

"The second game was awesome," McAulay said. "I think we could have scored even more. It was our goal to win one game this weekend, and we did."

On Sunday, it was clear even in the first inning that it would be a rough Senior Day for the Gauchos. With a runner on second and two out, Ziegler fouled a pitch

off of her right shoulder, which deflected the ball into her right eye.

"I honestly don't know what happened," said Ziegler, who looked more like a boxer than a second baseman after the game. "It was a hit and run, so I was swinging. It was high and inside, and I don't remember what happened after that."

Ziegler left the game, to be hit for by junior Sarah Powell. The good news was the Gauchos had a 1-0 lead after the inning and Ziegler would return in the fourth inning to hit an RBI double. The bad news was everything that happened in between.

In the top of the third inning, Northridge staged a huge rally that chased Greathouse — the starter out of the game. She was replaced by Richardson, who was taken out in the same inning in favor of Murphy.

With two out, Matador outfielder Jill Passafiume popped out to second, ending the inning. Or so the Gauchos thought. Umpire John Bennett ruled that Murphy had balked on her last pitch, scoring a Matador runner from third and continuing the inning. By the time the dust had settled the score was 7-1 in favor of Northridge.

> "This has to be the best season [for me]," McCall said. "In the past four years we've struggled, but this team always comes through. I definitely think we can do it."





on Sunday, beating Pacific 7-1 with both strong pitching and hitting. Junior Troy Kinto was nearly untouchable for the Gauchos. The southpaw pitched his first complete game of the season, giving up only one earned run on two hits, and striking out five Tiger batters.
