The visitors tied the score three times in the first half, but fell behind 21 to 15 at the break. Coach Wilton ran in most of the bench in the second half, but the Blue and Gold still pulled an additional 6-point edge.

The Gauchos played without the benefit of Guard Quentin Sims, who was mourning the loss of his father-in-law.

## Temporary Quonset Hut Student Union Under Consideration

The possibility of bringing two Quonset Huts on the campus to serve as a temporary Student Union and lounge has been under consideration by the Student Council for the past two weeks.

Dave Brownell, chairman of the committee appointed by Associated Students President George Graves to investigate the matter, reported at the last Student Council meeting that a local contractor has submitted the following estimate:

### \$5000 Minimum

A \$5,000 minimum to include cost of buying the huts, laying foundations, moving the huts to the campus, and installing plumbing that would be needed. This price would not include furnishings for the inside.

Pointing out that \$5,000 minimum is "rather out of line" for the present Student Body financial condition, President Graves directed the committee, which also includes Wendell Kirk and Fred Wade, to investigate Quonset Hut costs further.

Willie Wigger, AWS president, has been appointed to head a committee to further plans for the Student Union building which is to be built several years from now on the Mesa campus. This committee plans to investigate the advisability of scheduling an immediate drive for funds, and will also consider several tentative plans for the building. Patty Maher, Marilyn Melvin, Al Rasmussen, Shirley Hillis and Graves are working with Willie.

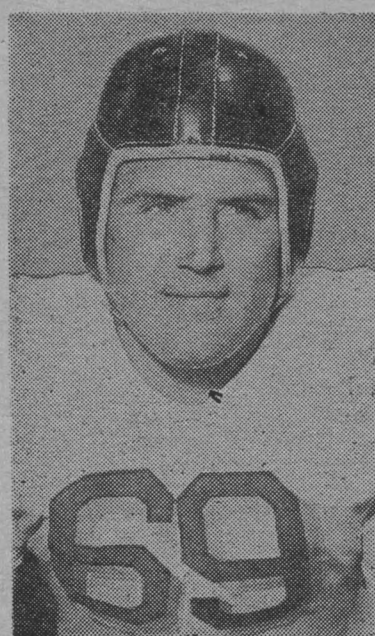
## Fencers, Aiming For Eighth Cup, Schedule L. A. Practice Match

## KIRKLAND, DIMAS WILL CAPTAIN '48 GRIDDERS

At a meeting of this year's football team last Tuesday evening, center Frank Kirkland and fullback Sam Dimas were elected co-captains of the 1948 Gaucho football squad.

Sam Cathcart was awarded the Gene Harris Most Valuable Player trophy, and was also named the most valuable back. Frank Kirkland received the most valuable lineman award, and Cy Williams, reserve guard, was given the Oscar for the best act upon being injured.

### All Opponents' Team

The pigskinners also named their own all-opponents' team, consisting of Cassidy (San Diego) and Knupper (San Jose) at ends, Campora (COP) and Dahm (San Diego) at tackles, Neal (Fresno State) and Franceschini (COP) at guards, Pifferini (San Jose) at center, LeBaron (COP) at quarter, Orvis (COP) and Sanders

(Occidental) at halves, and a tie for fullback between Donaldson (San Jose) and Paulos (COP). No men from Pomona, Cal Aggies or Cal Poly were named.

## Villagers Face \$25 Rent Hike

Rents at University Village will be raised at least \$25 a semester beginning in February, according to a statement from the Business Office this week.

Multiple units (squadroom) rent will be \$235 a semester instead of \$210; double rooms jumped from \$220 to \$255; and singles will cost \$265, \$35 more than the previous rate.

The boost in rents is necessary, according to J. A. D. Muncy, business manager, because the Village cannot meet operating costs at the present rates.

Some Village students are sharply protesting the new rate, and one group of co-eds in Primavera plan to give up living at the Village in favor of a co-op house next semester, in an effort to cut expenses. Others, informally polled, do not mind the raise "if we start getting decent food."

## Interclass Track Meet Thursday

The Second Annual Interclass Track Meet will get under way at La Playa Stadium this Thursday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. The meet will feature all college events; however, hurdles will be run at 70 yard highs and 120 lows, and the relay will be run over a half-mile course.

Anyone may run for the glory of their class, and should sign up with their class managers as soon as possible. Wally Cole is in charge of the seniors; Ray Lloyd the juniors; Dick Campmann, the sophomores; and Arvin Smith, the frosh team.

Ribbons will be awarded the first three places in each event, although four places will be scored. The winning class will receive the AMS award, won by the sophomores last year.

## Classroom Shortage Means More PM Classes in 1948

Because of the shortage of classrooms on the Riviera campus, more classes will be scheduled to meet in the afternoon when the Spring Semester begins, according to the Class Schedule Committee.

During the present semester there has been no flexibility in room assignments due to the tight schedule of classes which meet in the morning. From 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. there are no extra rooms on the campus.

### Crowding Inconveniences

While every class has been taken care of this semester, the concentration of morning classes has forced men's physical education classes to meet in home economic rooms, and Monday, Wednesday and Friday classes often meet in a different room for each session because the same room is not available all three days. Also there has been no opportunity to establish a motion picture projection room. This move is an effort to utilize class room space during the entire day.

### Half and Half

When planning the Spring schedule, heads of departments have been asked to have 50% of their classes meet in the morning and 50% in the afternoon, with 40% of the afternoon classes meeting after 1 p.m. This is an increase from 33 1/3% which met after 1 p.m. this semester.

A slight increase in classes being offered in the Spring Semester will add to the overcrowded conditions.

## 'GONDOLIERS' DUE IN JANUARY

All organizations of the Santa Barbara Music Department have united to produce Gilbert and Sullivan's light opera, "The Gondoliers." There will be three performances in the Riviera Auditorium, January 15, 16, and 17.

"The Gondoliers" is one of the less well-known works of Gilbert and Sullivan but, according to Music Department faculty members, one of the most attractive and appealing. It is seldom heard, however, due to its complicated score and casting problem.

A chorus of 130 voices will form a background for the principal characters. Organizations participating in this annual Music Department offering are the Band, the Orchestra, the Men's and Women's Glee Clubs, the A Capella Choir, and the Treble Ensemble.

## Greeks to Wrap Toys For Children

Toys to be given to the children at St. Mary's Boys Club on Thursday, December 18, will be wrapped at a present-wrapping party to-night at the Delta Sigma Epsilon sorority house at 7:30 p.m. Members of all Greek organizations on campus are invited to attend.

The boys' club will receive the gifts at a Christmas party jointly sponsored by the Inter-Fraternity Council and the Pan-Hellenic Association. The party, the first of its kind, will become an annual affair for underprivileged children.

Plans include the traditional Christmas tree, games and carols, and the arrival of Santa Claus to present the gifts. Cornell Ramsey is chairman of the party committee.

## Health Center Closed For Xmas; Doctors On Emergency Call

The student Health Center will be closed for routine work during vacation.

However, a registered student may, in case of serious emergency, contact one of the staff physicians or report to the emergency room of the St. Francis or Cottage Hospital. In such cases the Student Health Service will assume responsibility for payment of authorized expenses.

The following university physicians will be available at one time or another: Paul L. Ashton, M.D., surgical; E. L. Markthaler, M.D., medical; and W. T. Robbins, M.D., medical.

## Review of DZD Penalty for Rushing Violation Ordered

A penalty invoked by the Panhellenic Board against the Delta Zeta Delta sorority for alleged violation of rush rules will be reviewed by the Activities Control Board. The penalty was the outgrowth of charges made by other sororities on the Gaucho campus that DZD presented a "theme" party in violation of Panhellenic "experimental" fall rush rules.

The review order, calling for sub-poena of all minutes, records, letters and orders pertaining to the case, will determine a point of jurisdiction. The order followed a protest to the Activities Control Board by Charles Bates, chairman of the Student Publicity Committee.

### Penalty Stiff

The penalty meted out by the

Panhellenic Judiciary Committee, according to the minutes of that body for November 17, would, if enforced, deprive the Delta Zeta Delta sorority of the privilege of "participating in any college or sorority sponsored activities, except rushing, and from sponsoring any campus or off-campus activities."

Specific example of the type of activities included in the penalty were participation in the "May Queen, Scholarship Cup, El Dia del Gaucho, Panhellenic Dance (attend but not present new members), no money-making activities, no closed sorority formals, exclusion from any inter-group contests and function." The ruling would be effective from December 6, 1947, to June 19, 1948.

Dear Editor:  
For "lunch" at University Village today we had soup, a macaroni concoction that was slimy, nauseous and inedible, canned peaches and cookies. This mess could hardly have cost more than a dime a serving, yet they are raising the rent at the Village because of the high cost of living.

The high cost of living can cover a multitude of sins. Since the Official Attitude is "It's none of your business how we spend your money," we submit an unofficial estimate of the Village budget:

300 students pay an average \$50 per month—total monthly income \$15,000. Food, let's say 90 cents a day per student—\$8100 per month. (Certainly the starchy, greasy food we're fed couldn't cost more.) Payroll, well, let's set the figure high at \$4000 a month. Utilities, not over \$500. Total output—\$12,600. Leaving \$2400 for miscellaneous.

This obviously doesn't gibe with the statement that the Village is going in the hole. Somewhere our figures are off, and we'd like to know where. Will the officials tell us?

Veterans' Guidance Center, University of California Extension, located at 519 Balboa Building, will be open during the holidays except Christmas and New Year's Day.

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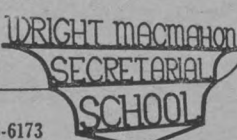

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**Makeup Proficiency Test Due Jan. 10**

**Must Take All**

The opening bout was called a draw at the end of the first round when Don Wilde opened a cut over the left eye of Mustang Art Guglielmeli, last year's 2C2A bantamweight champ.

The second clash found Les Rislino of Cal Poly winning a split decision over Frank Walker in the featherweight division.

### Cormier Draws Blood

Billy Cormier, Gaucho 2C2A champ last season, mauled Gene George, game Mustang-man, by knocking him down in each of the first two rounds, and by drawing blood in the third. This was a lightweight fight.

In a very even match, Bob Goodrow downed Thad Weems to give the Gauchos another bout. Weems was a stylist, but in the fast third round Goodrow knocked him down, and also belted his mouthpiece out.

Last season Sam Cathcart, 2C2A welterweight champ, won one fight from Polyite Russ Barr, and lost another. In this, the rubber match, Barr was awarded the decision in a very close contest.

### Slug Fest

In a true slugging match Jimmy Watt, Gaucho mittman, came back hard in the third round to down Willie Baker. Watt partially closed Baker's right eye in the first round, but the Poly boy wouldn't quit.

The seventh contest found Bud Kenison licking the cockiness out of Herb Pimbroke, although the Poly pounder tried to come back in the final round.

To close the evening Cal Poly's Ken "Rawhide" Cornelius overcame the excellent defense of Bill Steele, knocking him into the ropes as the final bell sounded.

Bert Killingsworth, referee for the matches, did a fine job, complete with stopping one of Kenison's punches himself. Bobby Garcia, last year's Gaucho great, acted as second for the Blue and Gold men.

### COP All-Opponents

The College of the Pacific announced their All-Opponents' Team recently. They named Sam Cathcart of the Gauchos in the backfield, and co-captain Max Pickarts at tackle. Cathcart also made the 2C2A conference All-Opponents' team.

Among just the 2C2A opponents met by COP, guard Joe Rossi was also named.

He stated definitely that this was still only in the planning stage, that the Santa Barbara College ASB must approve it, and also that there is still a financial difficulty.

## HORSEHIDERS TO PLAY CIBA

At the recent meeting of the California Intercollegiate Baseball Association, held in conjunction with the Pacific Coast Conference meeting at Sonoma, Santa Barbara College, Loyola University of Los Angeles, and San Francisco University submitted bids for entrance.

The coaches meeting there could take no action, but highly recommended that UCSB be taken in at the next regular session to be held in June of 1948. As this would preclude the entrance of UCSB this season, the members present agreed to schedule as many games with the Gauchos as possible. UCLA, Cal, Stanford, and USC all seemed very eager to meet the Blue and Gold men on the diamond.

The UCSB horsehiders last season split with UCLA, 7 to 9 and 13 to 5, and USC, 10 to 8 and 6 to 12, while losing to the national champions from UCB, 3 to 2, on an unearned run.

If any of the three independents seeking admission have exceptionally good seasons this year, they would be invited to the NCAA playoffs, regardless of whether they were members of the CIBA or not. This gives UCSB an excellent opportunity to step into national prominence, if they can win.

## AMBITIOUS SCHEDULE SET FOR LOOPMEN

The Golden Gaucho cage squad has set themselves an ambitious schedule for the next few weeks. Tomorrow night they meet the highly touted Whittier Poet five, followed on Thursday by a tussle with the Sagehens of Pomona. Saturday they tangle with Occidental.

Monday and Tuesday, December 22 and 23, the casabans journey to Los Angeles to play a two-night stand with George Pepperdine College.

### National Champs Coming

On Tuesday, December 30, the national champions invade the Armory to try to down the Gauchos. That is the Marshall College squad from West Virginia. This will undoubtedly be the toughest and best game on the 1948 schedule.

The night following this, Wednesday, December 31, the blue-jackets from the USS Tarawa arrive in Santa Barbara to spend New Year's Eve on the hardwoods.

In the Olympic Auditorium of Los Angeles, on January 2 and 3, Friday and Saturday, the Gauchos meet New Mexico University and Whittier College in another set of terrific tiffs. Any Gauchos in that area are urged to come out and root for the Blue and Gold.

On the evening that school reconvenes after the holidays, the Gauchos face Loyola University here in the Armory, while Saturday, January 10, finds them meeting their first conference foe, College of the Pacific, also in the Armory.

This is expected to be one of the finest seasons the Gaucho basketballers have ever had.

The games would be played October 30, 1948, at Berkeley's Memorial Stadium. The UCSB Gauchos would meet the Cal Aggies at 11 a.m., while the UCLA Bruins and UCB Golden Bears would tangle at 2:30. Both would be full length, regulation games.

Stupendous festivities would mark the contests, with a four-campus rally the night before the games and an all-University dance afterward. The bands of both UCSB and Cal Aggies would be represented at halftime, with both bands having either seats on the field or in their respective rooting sections.

### Rooting Sections

Organized rooting sections would be had, with UCSB on the UCLA side between the 30 and 40 yard lines, and Cal Aggie on the UCB side in a similar spot. A one dollar charge would be made for the three visiting schools, which is far below the regular three dollar fee.

Tickets for the game would be sold here in advance of the game, and it is probable, with the success of the San Diego train, that there would be a rooters' train, possibly combined with UCLA's.

This plan is to be a two year agreement, with the 1949 games to be played in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum under the same arrangements.

### Troubles

Although UCB is still dickering over the financial agreement, this plan has the backing of President Sproul and most of the officials throughout the four campuses, so it seems probable that it will succeed.

Should this idea go through, it would represent a fine step in inter-campus relations, and pave the way for bigger and better things for UCSB.

## 1941 Highlight of SBC Cage History

(Sports Editor's note: It has been the policy of El Gaucho to attempt to introduce the Gauchos of today to those of the past. This is a second in this series of articles.)

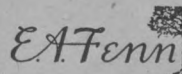
Looking down the dim, dark corridor of history we come to the door marked 1941, the year of one of the finest basketball squads that ever graced the grounds of Santa Barbara College. This was the year the hoopsters took fourth place in the Kansas City invitational tournament. Having won the 2C2A the year before, and come in second in 1941, the Gauchos journeyed east to face 31 of the nation's top teams.

### FINEST IN HISTORY

Probably the finest defensive men in Gaucho cage history were Brewster, Dick Rider, Joe Nunez, and Don Druliner, the last three of whom were killed in World War II. Gordy Gray was another. Lowell Stewart, now playing for the Los Angeles "Red Devils," was one of the greatest centers in our history. BH (before Hubler, this year's stalwart). A great forward was Paddy Caudillo. But outstanding of the outstanding was Tommy Guerrero, three-time All-Conference, three-time captain of the team, and three-time Most Valuable Player. He made first string Little All-American on Chuck Taylor's team, and second string All-American in 1941.

Never have the Gauchos failed to have at least two men on the All-Conference team, since the inception of the 2C2A—a real tribute to Coach Willie Wilton.

So, the Gauchos of this season, rated to be good, have a large assignment to live up to as far as history is concerned. But perhaps they will write a little history too.
