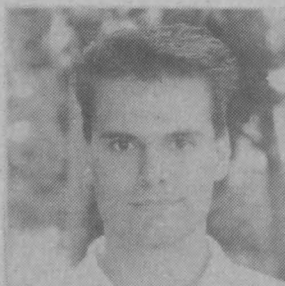

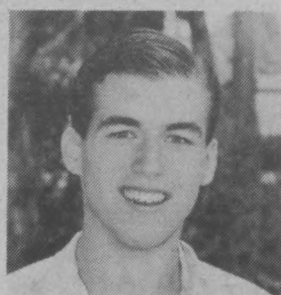

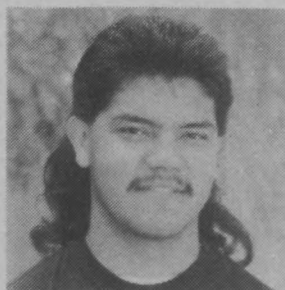
David Lehr

Gabriel Gutierrez

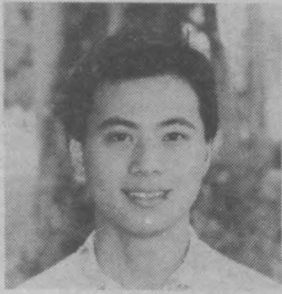
Gabriel Gutierrez is extremely committed to your concerns!!

INTERNAL VICE PRESIDENT (Vote for One)



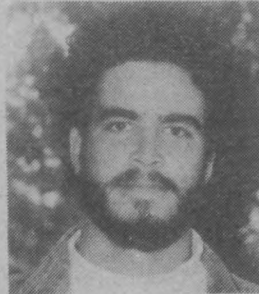

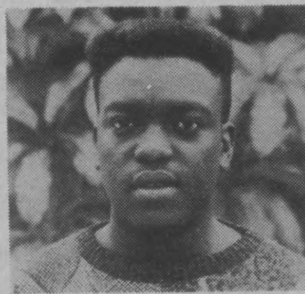


Allison Tom

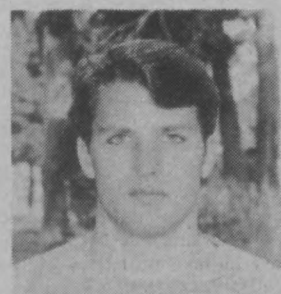

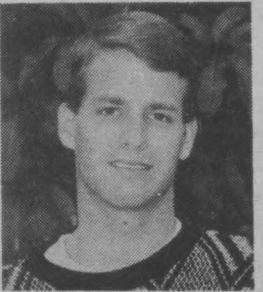
first bill.

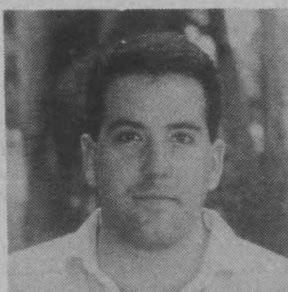
Michelle Koskella

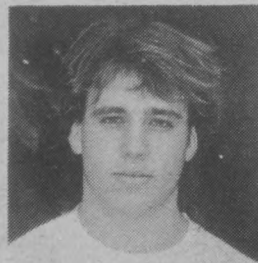


ON CAMPUS REPRESENTATIVE (Vote for Three)

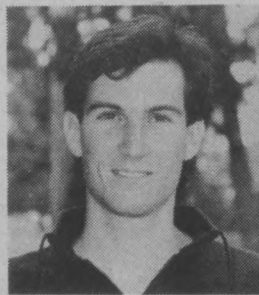

Pro Campus Media Lock-In

UCSB's student media - the Daily Nexus, KCSB and the LaCumbre yearbook - survive wholly or in part because of student contributions to them. Without this student support the campus media would not be able to continue to provide quality, innovative publications and programming at its present high standards. The combined \$4.74 that constitutes the student media lock-in are distributed as follows: Daily Nexus, .85¢; LaCumbre, .84¢; KCSB, .80¢ and Communications Personnel, \$2.25. Each of these monies directly affect the quality of the student media, and are thus integral in the media's ability to reach students with pertinent and entertaining information. And at the low price of the lock-in over the course of a year, reaffirming the lock-in measure is a wise investment for the UCSB student body.

VOTE YES to reaffirm the student communications media lock-in.

II. A.S. Constitutional Fee Increase Proposals:

1. Increase K.C.S.B. Lock-In by \$0.40/student/quarter

Whereas: KCSB is a community service broadcasting station, as mandated by the FCC;

Whereas: KCSB provides students an educational setting in which to learn many career-oriented skills such as being a disc jockey, engineering, a radio program, management, etc.;

Whereas: KCSB provides quality programming for a wide and diverse audience;

Whereas: There has not been an increase in the KCSB lock-in since 1984;

Whereas: The increasing costs of electricity, equipment, supplies, etc. has made the current student lock-in funding inadequate;

Whereas: KCSB is constantly growing, and the static lock-in funding does not allow productive growth to occur;

Therefore let it be resolved: that the 1988-89 Legislative Council place on the ballot of the 1989 A.S. Spring Election the following KCSB-FM Constitutional lock-in increase:

Increase the A.S. Constitutional lock-in for KCSB-FM by \$.40 per student per quarter.

The Student Media Lock-in is the lifeblood of KCSB. Without it, they wouldn't exist. Period. End of story.

KCSB is an amazing student service. Not only does our Student-Run, non-commercial radio station broadcast alternative music, quality public affairs programming, award-winning news, and Gaucho sports, but it also provides "hands-on" practical training to literally *hundreds* of UCSB Students who become disc jockies, news reporters, sportscasters, engineers, promoters, accountants, managers...the list goes on. No class will ever come close to what is learned by this hands-on experience

That was the pretty picture. Now for reality. KCSB has not had a budget increase since 1984. Currently, KCSB's **ENTIRE** operations budget is less than the electric bill at Y-97. Over the past five years since the last increase, equipment costs have risen.

PRO STATEMENT FOR THE KCSB LOCK-IN INCREASE

Electricity costs have risen. Everything has gone up, except for the amount of money available to pay the bills. Currently, KCSB's plans for next year doesn't include equipment that they badly need. KCSB can't spend what it doesn't have.

This ballot measure asks the students of UCSB to increase the funding of KCSB by 40 cents per student. That's not too demanding. This is what is needed to ensure that the high quality programming and training that KCSB provides for us will continue.

Commercial-Free and Student-Run for 28 years. Let it go another 28.
Please vote "YES" for the increased KCSB Constitutional Lock-In.

2. Increase A.S. Program Board Lock-In by \$0.50/student/quarter

Whereas: Program Board is in the process of hiring a full time advisor; this person's salary will be taken directly out of the ASPB account which effectively decreases ASPB funds and the Board's ability to program;

Whereas: In order to produce more educational and therefore non-revenue (or little-revenue) generating programs such as lectures we need to compensate for the "losses" incurred by such programming;

Whereas: This year Program Board has planned and programmed bigger shows than in years past; **EXTRAVAGANZA** is in the planning; as well, research and planning are continuing for a Grateful Dead show for next year; a larger lock-in would enable ASPB to program of more of these types of events;

Therefore let it be resolved: that the 1988-89 Legislative Council place on the ballot for the A.S. Spring election a Constitutional Lock-in increase for A.S. Program Board from the present \$2.80 per student per quarter to \$3.30 per student per quarter, an increase of \$.50 per student per quarter.

3. Increase UCSA Lock-In by \$0.26/student/quarter:

Whereas: The University of California Student Association (UCSA) is an association of student governments representing over 155,000 students on nine UC campuses;

Whereas: The history of UCSA has been extremely successful in Student Advocacy programs and protecting students' rights

Whereas: UCSA is a permanent voice in the State Capitol, recognized as one of the most influential lobbying organizations in Sacramento and has won several significant budget and legislative battles on behalf of students;

Whereas: UCSA is supported totally by campus contributions;

Whereas: UCSA has been under severe budgetary constraints this past year due to insufficient funding.

Whereas: The last time the UCSA fee was increased was 1978;

Therefore Let It Be Resolved: That the 1988-89 A.S. Legislative Council direct the A.S. Elections Committee to place the UCSA fee increase of \$0.26 on the upcoming spring ballot. The increase will be from \$.35 per quarter per student to \$.61 per student per quarter.

Should students vote to assess themselves an additional 26 cents each quarter to help fund the UC Student Association? The answer is YES. UCSA is an organization who is presently lobbying to keep students fees at a reasonable and affordable level so that we as students can continue to pursue the kind of education which we are each entitled

UCSA has been continually successful in student advocacy programs and protecting students' rights. UCSA is a permanent voice in the State Capitol and is recognized as one of the most influential lobbying organizations in Sacramento. As a result of their efforts, UCSA has won several legislative battles on behalf of students. (These legislative victories are too numerous to list here. However, copies are available to review in the *A.S. Main Office). In addition to positions on issues submitted to the State Legislature, UCSA pursues an agenda of student initiatives called the UCSA Advocacy Program. The 1988-89 Advocacy Program--determined by UC

students-- includes student fees, student participation in the management of student-funded programs and facilities, student employee rights and working conditions, affirmative action for graduate students and faculty, and the quality of undergraduate education.

UCSA is completely supported by campus contributions. UCSB currently contributes 35 cents per student, per quarter. This is on the low-end of the contribution scale. The proposed fee increase of 26 cents would increase this fee to 61 cents per student, per quarter at UCSB.

UCSB has not increased its contribution to UCSA since 1978. UCSA has continually been giving students the opportunity to have a greater voice in the University decision-making process. It is time UCSB increased its funding and pull its own weight in supporting such an effective organization instead of being subsidized by the other eight campuses.

Pro UCSA Fee Initiative

4. Initiate a Lock-In of \$1.00/student/quarter for EOP Components

Whereas: Associated Students has supported the Educational Opportunity Programs with \$30,000 per year since 1969; at which time there were approximately 400 students in the Educational Opportunity Program.

Whereas: Associated Students is still supporting the Educational Opportunity Program with an annual \$30,000 in 1988; which presently consists of over 2500 students.

Whereas: Today, the increasing numbers of students in Educational Opportunity Program on campus and the increase of the cost-of-living has created a need for greater levels of funding;

Whereas: In previous Associated Students By-Laws, which were changed in 1972, the allocation of Associated Students' funding of Educational Opportunity Program was changed to a flat \$30,000 per year as opposed to \$1.00 per student per quarter;

Whereas: The overall goal of the Educational Opportunity Program and Associated Students is to help implement the recruitment and retention of students from diverse backgrounds in order to create more cultural awareness and diversity on the Campus and in our community.

Therefore: Let it be resolved that: The 1988-89 Leg. Council places a Constitutional lock-in of \$1.00 per student per quarter for EOP for the Spring 1989 General Election ballot that if a Constitutional lock-in of \$1.00 per student per quarter for EOP passes in the Spring election, the present \$30,000 lock-in be discontinued.

II. A.S. Constitutional Fee Increase Proposals

(Continued)

5. Initiate a Lock-In of \$1.00/student/quarter for student groups:

Whereas: According to Standing Policy 5, student groups have the lowest budget priority, and received only 53,835 from A.S. last year.

Whereas: The student groups present a large variety of programs to the campus each year, and need more money to put on these programs.

Whereas: The time spent by these groups doing fundraising could be spent doing meaningful work.

Therefore Let It Be Resolved That: The 1988-1989 Legislative Council directs the Elections Committee to place the following Amendment to Article III, Section 4, Paragraph C, Sub-section 5 on the Spring 1989 Ballot:

5. One Dollar (\$1.00) per ASUCSB Membership per quarter to be allocated in the President's annual budget to U.C.S.B. registered student groups.
a) These monies shall be a minimum funding level for student groups, and does not modify the criteria set up in the remained of the A.S. Legal Code.

III. A.S. Constitutional Amendments:**2. A.S. Constitutional Amendment to change A.S. Legislative Council's Veto Override power**

Whereas: The legislative council currently wields the power to override a presidential veto by a simple majority vote(50%+1); and

Whereas: Many items of legislation brought before the council require a two-thirds majority to pass.

Whereas: The A.S. Presidents' Veto power is virtually ineffective in such circumstances.

Whereas: The governing principle of "checks and balances" is rendered essentially non-existent.

Therefore Be It Resolved that: The following be placed on the AS UCSB Spring 1989 Ballot:

Do you approve of the following change to the ASUCSB Constitution?

Amend Article III, Section 4 (Section Outlining the Duties and Powers of the Legislative Council)

Current:

K) Be empowered to override a presidential veto by a majority approval(50%+1) of the voting membership.

Proposed:

K) Be empowered to override a presidential veto by a two-thirds(2/3) majority approval of the voting membership.

I) Have the power to enact a phone vote if the vetoed legislation is deemed urgent in nature.

1. A.S. Constitutional Amendment to Direct the A.S. President in submitting the annual A.S. Budget.

Whereas: The new budget process changes passed by the legislative council on January 29, 1989 conflict with Article IV, Section 2 of the A.S. President's Powers.

Whereas: The ASUCSB Constitution takes precedence over the ASUCSB Bylaws and Standing Policies.

Therefore Be It Resolved that: the following be placed on the ASUCSB Spring 1989 Ballot:

Do you approve of the following change to the ASUCSB Constitution?

Amend Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph A, Sub-Section 7 (Section Directing the A.S. President to submit a budget by the 6th Regular Meeting of Winter Quarter)

Current:

7) Formulate an annual budget to be submitted to the Legislative Council for approval by the **Sixth** Regular meeting of **Winter** Quarter.

Proposed:

7) Formulate an annual budget to be submitted to the Legislative Council for approval by the Fifth (5th) regular meeting of Spring Quarter, and approved by the Seventh (7th) regular Legislative Council meeting of Spring Quarter.

PLEBISITE**UCSB's Role in Nuclear Weapons Labs**

Whereas: For over thirty years, the University of California has managed two laboratories run by the United States Department of Energy, one located in Los Alamos, New Mexico, the other in Livermore, California and the Nevada Nuclear Test Site in a remote area of Nevada's desert.

Whereas: Together these laboratories have been responsible for the design and development of every nuclear weapon in the U.S. arsenal.

Whereas: According to James Kane, assistant to UC President James Gardner and special University liaison to the laboratories, the charter of the University provides for research, teaching, and public service.

Whereas: It has been debated for many years whether management of institutions having substantial involvement in the creation of nuclear weapons is in keeping with these ostensible functions of the University.

Whereas: Aside from the dilemma of whether the University should manage the laboratories at all, there is a great deal of uncertainty concerning the quality of UC management.

Whereas: In 1987 DOE documents revealed that employees of the laboratories coordinated lobbying activities to dissuade the House and Senate from approving a comprehensive test ban treaty, visiting 100 House members and over 20 senators.

Whereas: Under DOE regulations, it is illegal for the contractors (laboratory employees) to make unsolicited contacts with Congress.

Whereas: Also in 1987, LLNL physicists Edward Teller and Lowell Wood provide "overly optimistic and technically inaccurate statements," concerning the Star Wars X-ray laser program to President Reagan and other US government officials.

Whereas: In 1988 a US Congress investigation at the Livermore lab discovered evidence of "widespread drug use."

Whereas: It is clear from these recent examples that the University is not fulfilling its contractual managerial responsibilities.

Whereas: In past years, numerous reports have urged the Regents to adopt a stronger management yet they have never adopted a change in policy.

Whereas: On July 8, 1988, the state budget included language that required the labs to appoint three overseers in order to increase UC's management role or they would be denied funding.

Whereas: To this date, March 8, 1989, the Regents have not adopted any new policy changes and no overseers have been appointed.

Whereas: It is my special project to attempt an educational campaign to enlighten the students at UCSB on their University's role with these institutions of mass destruction.

Therefore Let It Be Resolved: That the 1988-89 AS Legislative Council direct the AS Elections Committee to place the following opinion poll on the upcoming spring ballot:

We, as students of the University of California at Santa Barbara, are concerned about the UC management of the nation's only two nuclear weapons research and development laboratories and the Nevada nuclear weapons test site. We strongly urge the Regents to immediately hire three laboratory overseers as required by the California State Budget that was signed into law on July 8, 1988. We believe this action will increase UC's managerial role and be a step towards fulfilling its contractual management agreement with the Department of Energy.
