State Legislature Passes Bill For Land Purchase

Additional Appropriation Of \$12,500 Favored

The special measure appropriating \$12,500 for the purchase of additional lands for the College passed both houses of the State Legislature this week. The bill will be sent to the governor for his approval soon.

The appropriation will permit the purchase of two and one half acres of land west of the College campus. Buildings will be erected upon the ground within the next few years according to present plans. The land will be purchased with the expectation of erecting dormitories on the site some time later.

As the angel called by the Virgin, Monroe Langlow was exceptionally good. The angel, the soul of the Sister Hilda, which was represented by Lothelle Miller, and the Virgin produced some beautiful tableau effects.
