UCSB Outshined by U. of H. in Three Straight

Winning Season Ends on Disappointing Note

WESTWOOD — UCLA's Pauley Pavilion again proved to be unfriendly ground for the #4 UCSB men's volleyball team as a premature ending to the 1995 season was forced upon them by #2 University of Hawai'i Friday night in the semifinals of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation tournament, 15-10, 15-13,

Although the match with Hawai'i (19-5 overall) was an improvement from UCLA's threegame spanking of Santa Barbara (18-9 overall) on April 12, the contest was hardly played in top Gaucho fashion.

"I don't know what it is [about Pauley Pavilion]," said UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston. "This game was almost like a repeat of the recent UCLA matchup. We just couldn't get things going long enough. We didn't play as a

UCSB came out slow and tentative, dropping to a 2-0 deficit before turning on the heat. Back-to-back-to-back blocks by senior middle blocker Carter Reese, sophomore outside hitter Donny Harris and junior setter Todd Rogers gave the Gauchos some momentum as they

jumped to a 9-4 lead.

The five-point lead wasn't enough, as the Rainbows' offense picked up the pace, out-scoring the Gauchos 11-1 to take a 1-0 game lead.

"Both teams took turns playing great," said UCSB junior outside hitter Brant Chillingworth. "We tried to get by one point at a time, but we ran into hitting trouble.'

Game two started out the way game one ended. Led by freshman outside hitter Yuval Katz, the Rainbows jumped out to an 11-4 lead, but this time, the Gauchos made the comeback.
Rogers picked up the defense making eight digs while Harris

pounded out 11 kills during the

Along with the improved defense and hitting, strong blocking by sophomore middle blocker Robert Treahy and ju-nior outside hitter Morgan Chapman helped bring UCSB to a 13-13 tie, but it didn't last. UH senior middle blocker Jason Olive and Katz turned on their offensive firing power and brought Hawai'i to a 2-0 game

"The big comeback in game two showed our character," Harris explained. "But I think the loss might have been the last straw for some of us."


"History shows that usually after a comeback you let go at the end and the team that had the lead wins," Preston explained. "I wasn't too surprised that we lost the game, but it is hard because it was so close. It just doesn't get much closer than that."

That tough loss did seem to break the spirit of the Gauchos as they entered game three in a lethargic manner. Hawai'i bolted their way to an 11-0 lead before Santa Barbara could do

any scoring.
With some intense play, junior middle blocker Doug Hughes turned up the offensive heat, helping the Gauchos shorten the Rainbow lead to 13-7. but it didn't last. Hawai'i quickly regrouped and took the game and the match. They advanced to the MPSF finals against top-ranked UCLA on Saturday where they lost to the Bruins in four games

"It was really disappointing to end the season like this," said Gaucho senior outside hitter Darren Torbet. "Now I'm done and Carter [Reese] is done and we have to look at the bright side. We've had a great season and to come this close to the final four after not even making it to postseason the last two seasons, we have to be happy we got

Women's Tennis Overwhelms Ojai Field on Its Way to Fifth Consecutive Big West Title

Neither Magic Johnson's great Lakers of the 1980s nor Joe Montana's 49ers could win five straight championships, but the 1995 UCSB women's tennis team under Head Coach Pete Kirkwood has done just that, earning its fifth consecutive Big West title.

The #3-seeded Gauchos defeated #2 University of Nevada, Las Vegas (5-3) in the semifinals on Friday and #1 University of the Pacific (5-2) on Saturday - teams which both beat UCSB earlier in the season — to win the title at the Ojai Valley Racquet

"This [championship] felt the best because we were the underdog," said junior Kelly Spencer. "In the past, it was like, oh well, another Big West [title], but this year we just really wanted to win. We were more determined."

In addition to the team award, Kirkwood was named as Big West Co-Coach of the Year with UOP's Bill Maze, marking the fifth straight year that a UCSB coach has picked up the honor (Chris Russell earned the award from 1991-94).

"It meant a lot for us to win for Pete. We didn't have the greatest season and he never gave up on us," said junior Amelia White. "Pete was so confident. He was always there when we needed him and it made a big difference to have him have confidence in us."

It must have been the confidence that paved the way for Santa Barbara, winning three of four threeset singles matches against the Tigers in the finals. Senior Lynn Coakley downed Pacific's Katharina Schlensker in the #2 spot (3-6, 6-1, 7-5) in the most heated battle of the tournament, according to

'Lynn played in one of the most entertaining matches I've ever seen, from a fan's point of view, Kirkwood said. "They had some hard-fought rallies with the crowd cheering after every point."

Seniors Kathy Peterson and Courtney Strauss came through with the other two three-set victories for the Gauchos. Peterson overcame Bente Grina (7-5, 3-6, 6-3) in the #4 slot, while the Tigers' Tanya O'Neil fell to Strauss at #6, 1-6, 6-3, 7-5.

UCSB's #1 singles player junior Jean Okada was defeated (6-4, 6-1) by Big West Athlete of the Year Tracee Lee, but junior Gaucho Amelia White came through with a relatively easy win in the #3 spot over Marsa Kuurne in straight sets, 7-5, 6-0.


"I was pretty nervous because I was playing on court one," White said. "Before, I was spraying balls and not focusing, and in the second I bore down and made her make the mistakes instead of me making the errors."

Although the season is over for the squad, White and Spencer have been ranked as one of the top 15 doubles tandems in the nation and have a good shot at making the NCAA individual draw.



Gauchos Bust on Vegas Road Trip: Two Losses Kill SB Playoff Hopes

Desperately needing at least two wins this past weekend to stay in the hunt for a Big West playoff spot, the UCSB baseball team wasn't able to hold down the University of Nevada, Las Vegas offensive attack, losing two out of three to the Rebels, 2-14, 20-10 and 8-10.

The Rebels' (30-16 overall, 11-7 in the Big West) offense was sparked by leadoff hitter and shortstop Stacy Kleiner, who had seven hits and scored eight runs over the three games. Despite scoring 30 runs themselves in the series, including 20 on Saturday, the Gauchos (20-22, 6-12) were simply unable to contain the UNLV lineup.

In Sunday's contest, a 10-8 Rebel comeback victory, UNLV took advantage of five Gaucho errors and eight walks to score 10 runs on only eight hits.

UCSB sophomore starter Jorvic Salazar (4-1) was


the victim of poor Gaucho defense as well as his own lack of control. Salazar threw for three innings, allowing only four hits but walking five Rebels.

After six innings, however, Santa Barbara had taken an 8-6 lead over UNLV on the strength of senior center fielder Doug Smaldino's sixth and ju-nior right fielder Wynter Phoenix's 10th home runs of the season.


Unfortunately for the Gauchos, the lead didn't last. The Rebels posted one run in the eighth and three in the ninth off junior reliever Dax Groves (four innings pitched, two earned runs) and sophomore reliever Clint Pearson (one IP, one ER). Pearson (0-1) took the loss for UCSB, while UNLV reliever Joel Garber (3-0) picked up the win with 31/4 innings of scoreless

On Saturday, the Gauchos exploded for their highest run (20) and hit (25) totals of the sea-

UCSB Softball Squad Posts Winning Weekend at SJSU, Pacific; Team Takes 3 of 4

The UCSB softball squad has been turning its potential energy into kinetic energy, winning three of four games this weekend on its final road trip of the season.

The Gauchos (21-34 overall, 7-21 in the Big West) were shut out 2-0 in game one on Friday against the University of the Pacific (16-34, 6-20) in Stockton but stormed back with 10 hits, including a home run, to blank the Tigers in the nightcap, 5-0.

Santa Barbara also nailed some key hitting in San Jose on Saturday. The UCSB offense, combined with solid pitching, proved to be too much for the Spartans, and the Gauchos swept the doubleheader, 3-2 and 5-2.

"We had a team meeting and talked about how we wanted to end our season well, and that's what we're doing," said junior pitcher Stacy Atwood. "We went out there more confident, thinking we are going to win, and that's what we did."

San Jose (25-34) is in the middle of the pack in the Big West with its 12-12 conference mark and looked to be tough competition for UCSB. However, the Gauchos put together 16 hits while stringing two strong pitching performances in a row to sweep the

"We just played the best we've played all year," said sophomore catcher Michelle Ray. "Everyone hit really well and both Megan [O'Brien] and Stacy [Atwood] pitched very well."

However, Santa Barbara started off the weekend

However, Santa Barbara started off the weekend slowly as Tiger Brandi Phillips (7-14) kept the Gauchos at bay all game, throwing a two-hitter while striking out four. Atwood (11-18) pitched six innings, giving up an earned run in both the third and fifth frames on six hits.

Atwood and UCSB bounced back in the second game in a big way. Santa Barbara had a 1-0 lead into the sixth inning, when Ray (3-3) and sophomore catcher Johnna Mike (1-4) led off with consecutive singles. Atwood came up and promptly knocked an 0-2 pitch over the left-field wall for her third homer of

the season, putting the game out of reach for UOP.
"I was just thinking, 'Hit the ball hard.' I was surprised I got a good pitch," Atwood said. "I ran to first and watched it go over the fence and then I jogged slowly around the bases."

Before this weekend, Atwood had been in a slump, but in the last three games, she has reached base safely nine of 10 times. "When I hit it, I knew I was out of my slump," she added.

Atwood came back against the Spartans to throw a

Atwood came back against the Spartans to throw a four-hit complete game, and the Gauchos scored two runs in the sixth to defeat SJSU.

Sophomore pitcher O'Brien followed that up with a brilliant performance of her own, scattering five hits and not allowing a run until the sixth inning to win
