Homecoming fans, Gaucho students and local spectators will fill La Playa Stadium to full 10,000 capacity tomorrow evening when UCSB hosts favored San Francisco State for its traditional celebrated Homecoming and non-conference tussel. Kickoff is at 8 p.m.

Gaucho followers will witness the spectacle with these questions upper-most in their minds; 1) Can Santa Barbara maintain its fine homecoming record which includes eight wins in its last nine games? 2) How much will the loss of fullback Ned Permenter and quarterback John Crawford affect the team? and 3) Will there be a fourth-quarter letdown on UCSB's part?

Gators Seek Revenge

The San Francisco Gators bring an impressive four win, one loss record to Santa Barbara with hopes of reversing the 20-6 defeat the Gauchos handed them in UCSB's Homecoming of 1952. (For past Homecoming games see Page 7). To date Coach Joe Verducci's Gators have humbled Cal Poly

(Pomona) 20-18, squeezed by Occidental 25-16, whipped Nevada 18-6, and lost by a one-point margin to Humboldt State, 13-12.

In their opener San Francisco downed Long Beach State, 14-0, which in contrast to UCSB's 12-7 loss to the 49ers makes them a pre-game favorite for this tilt.

Gauchos' Faults Might Hurt

Two factors are evident in the Gauchos playing that could have ruinous affects in this homecoming. Coach Ed Cody's gridiron crew has trouble jelling into a unit in the first quarter, and on two occassions have fallen apart in the last few minutes of the fourth quarter.

Both Gaucho losses have resulted from this lapse in the final minutes of play. Last weekend Long Beach scored their 12 points with three minutes left in the game, and Whittier likewise threw its TD winning pass in the final moments.

These factors coupled with the loss of Permenter, the team's leading rusher and Crawford, injured in the Long Beach game, further establishes the Gauchos as underdogs.

Versatile Jack Lyon and guard-fullback Walt Townshend are expected to see action in the full slot with Jim St. Clair receiving the nod to quarterback the team. Fred Standifer takes the starting role at the left halfback position while Dennis Vaugh should be called on for added support. The reliable Duke Ellington will start at his customary right half spot. Hilderbrandt to Start

In the line, left end Gary Hilderbrandt, a sophomore, has earned starting honors and will be balanced at the other end by Benny Dyas. At tackles will be Don Rodriguez and Ray Schaack. Bolstering the middle of the line will be center Leon Schumaker with Preston Burton and Bob Lopez at his sides.

In past games with the Gators, UCSB holds the edge with a 3-1 record. Competition between the two colleges began in 1935 when UCSB won 12-0, and again the following year by a 37-7 score. 1952 saw the 20-6 Gaucho win and in 1953 San Francisco stunned Santa Barbara for their only series victory, 26-13.

The contest should prove to be as hard-fought as the past homecoming games have been with the enthused support on hand and with UCSB seeking to regain lost prestige from the Long Beach game.


'Best Parade Yet'

HAL McINTYRE BAND FEATURED IN **BIG HOMECOMING DANCE AT ARMORY**

Topping off the Gauchos' Homecoming week will be the annual Homecoming dance at the National Guard Armory tomorrow night after the game. Free to all Associated Students card holders, the dance features the Hal McIntyre orchestra.

McIntyre, saxophonist and band leader, has played with such top name bands as the Benny Goodman and Glenn Miller orchestras. It was Goodman who first "discovered" McIntyre and asked him to sit in with the Benny Goodman orchestra. Later, McIntyre joined the new Glenn Miller orchestra and was in on that band's big successes. In August of 1941 Glenn Miller suggested that McIntyre form his own group, and the Hal McIntyre orchestra was born.

Glen Island Casino

First date for the new band was the Glen Island Casino, known as "the cradle of name bands." From the Casino have come Glen Grey, the Dorsey brothers, Glenn Miller, Claude Thornhill, Charlie Spivak and many others. McIntyre then played many other big - name dates, such as the Commodore

Hotel in New York, the Palladium, the Sherman Hotel in Chicago, Frank Dailey's Meadowbrook and the Paramount Theater on Broadway.


Women's Drill Team **To March In Parade**

YES ON PROPOSITION 3

On the state-wide election ballot Nov. 4 there is one proposition of vital importance to UCSB and every other school and college in the state now and in the future. This is Proposition No. 3, which *El Gaucho* fully endorses. Prop. 3 has also been endorsed by the Associated Students, Legislative Council, the Board of Regents and University President Clark Kerr. Both political parties have given this proposal their approval as have more than one hundred other statewide organizations.

Prop. 3 is a bond issue asking for \$200,000,000. This is part of a \$500,000,000 program of extensive school building for the fiveyear period 1959-1964. Seventy-five per cent of the \$200,000,000 will go to the University and state colleges. These funds are vitally needed. By 1970 the expected enrollment of the University will exceed 100,000.

For the Santa Barbara campus \$30,000,000 will be allocated for the erection of fifteen buildings and site development. This will include library expansion, new classroom buildings, new residence halls and science laboratories. These funds are needed at UCSB because enrollment is increasing 10-15 percent annually. With an expected enrollment of over 10,000 in the very near future tremendous increases of facilities are needed.

If Prop. 3 is passed the rate of interest on necessary funds will be very low and the cost will be spread out over a long period of time. This means the students will be paying for the actual buildings they use instead of the voters now having to pay enormously increased taxes.

The remaining \$300,000,000 in this \$500,000,000 expansion project will come from current revenue.

Students on the UCSB campus who are of voting age are urged to consider carefully and vote in favor of this proposal. Those students who cannot vote are urged by *El Gaucho* and the Legislative Council to write their parents explaining this proposition and the vital necessity of its passage. 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

New Student Union Fund Drive Begins; 'Building Could Be Completed by 1962'

Unless adequate funds are raised by 1961 UCSB students may be without a Student Union for a period of time, according to Niela Loebs, co-chairman of the Student Union Committee.

The present temporary Student Union building will be demol-ished in 1963 in order to make room for the new auditorium. If funds are available by 1961 construction on the first unit of thenew union will start. According to the Building Committee, the new building could be completed by 1962 if funds are raised.

The Student Union Com-mittee, aware of the need for money for the \$3,500,000 project, has taken as its current project a fund-raising campaign. Dennis Naiman and Mrs. Loebs, co-chairmen of the committee, ask that all students interested in working on the fund-raising drive meet at 12:15 Tuesday, Oct. 28, in the AS conference room.

During the next three weeks forms will be distributed to all UCSB organizations giving information on the fund - raising drive and asking for pledges. So far the Residence Hall Association, Junior Class and Activities Control Board have pledged money toward the proposed student union. RHA has pledged to donate half of all money taken in from vending machines and half of the money raised during its proposed Work Week.

The Junior Class has pledged some of the money taken in from the Ugly Man Contest and the ACB will donate all personal fines collected throughout the year.

GAUCHOS BOAST TOP SLATE

Single Loss Mars Homecoming Record

by Tom Morgan, Sports Writer A highly-touted band of San Francisco State Alligators will stop off at La Playa Stadium tomorrow evening to help the University of California at Santa Barbara celebrate its 1958 Homecoming activities.

Greeting the invaders upon their arrival from the Golden Gate City will be an equally impressive Gaucho gridiron crew, which hopes to bring home the CCAA crown Nov. 21 after steering past a four-week practice slate, including three non-conference tussles and a bye.


Top Homecoming Record But Coach Ed Cody's Santa Barbara pigskinners, who have come within six points of an undefeated season, will be putting more than their 3-2 record on the line in tomorrow's showdown. The Alligators will run head on into one of the finest Homecoming grid records in Southern California's famed football annals.

The Gauchos have compiled an enviable 8-1 mark for their past nine Homecoming encounters, and will bring a three Home-coming game win skein with them to La Playa Stadium tomorrow.

Win Streak to Three

Santa Barbara, needing only to hurdle past league-favorite Cal Poly to stake claim to the CCAA title and cap one of the most successful Gaucho pigskin performances, has suffered only a single setback in its past nine Homecoming games, that coming in 1954 at the hands of

Gauchos rate a slight underdog in this tussle because of common foes faced—Gators beat Long Beach, 14-0 . . . the team which upset UCSB, 12-7.

For three consecutive seasons since the Fresno tragedy, Santa Barbara has closed out its weekend of Homecoming activities with a victory cake, as was the case for five straight years prior to the 1954 defeat.

The Alligators will line up for the opening kickoff with a revengeful eye tomorrow, for they are still smarting from a 20-6 Homecoming game loss to the Gauchos in 1952.

First Win

The Gauchos started on their long road to Homecoming fame in 1949 with a 14-7 victory over Fresno State, the first win for Santa Barbara in the history of their rivalry with the Bulldogs. Cal Poly became the second

combination of Dick and Dave Gorrie teamed to show the way for a surprisingly easy victory.

Sandwiched around the San Francisco State conquest in 1952 were wins over both Whittier and Los Angeles State, vaulting Santo Barbara's streak to five

straight.

Come-From-Behind Win With his mates down by one touchdown at intermission, Ron Ternquist returned the opening kickoff of the second half 80 yards for the go-ahead score and then added the game - winning margin in the final period with a 22-yard spurt as the Gauchos whipped Whittier, 19-12.

Santa Barbara rebounded after the '54 setback to Fresno with

CCAA kingpin Fresno State, 26-20. straight homecoming win the fol-lowing year, 20-7, as the brother again in 1955.

Santa Barbara continued its impressive homecoming stand in 1956 when a smooth-operating Gaucho squad humbled Sacramento State, 33-0, to end a fourgame victory famine.



And then last year, with quarterback Don Trauthen clicking on seven of 13 passes for 145 yards and two touchdowns and Jack Lyon and Bruce Varner each scoring twice, Santa Barbara reeled off a decisive 32-14

win over Pepperdine. This added the third notch in a new homecoming victory streak, a streak which goes up for grabs tomorrow night when the Gauchos seek to cement their bid for homecoming gridiron supremacy.

Called by Coach Ed Cody as the finest straight ahead blocker in college ball today, Schaack with his 221 pounds and 6'1" poses a big problem for opposing linemen. Picked in many circles to gain all-conference honors, Schaack is not disappointing any followers.



Cody has two top-rate signal-callers to operate his Gaucho offense, although Crawford may not see action tomorrow due to a leg injury suffered at Long Beach.



He is 21 years old and a P.E. major.





Tackle Don Rodriguez

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
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HALF DENNIS VAUGHN—HALF FRED STANDIFER
