

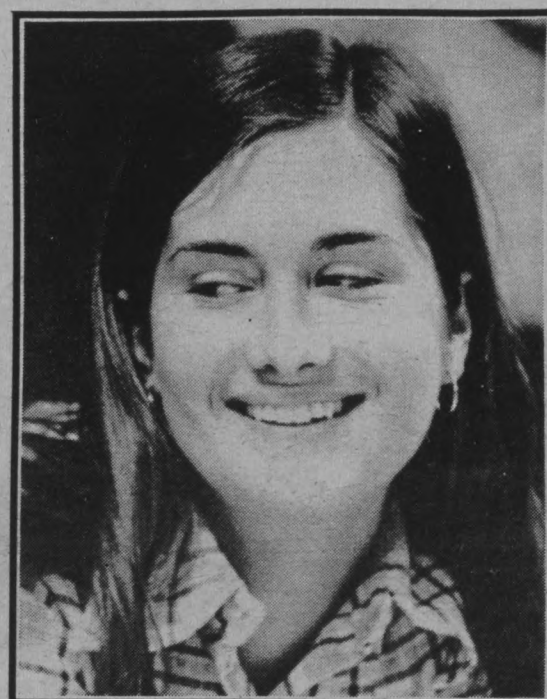

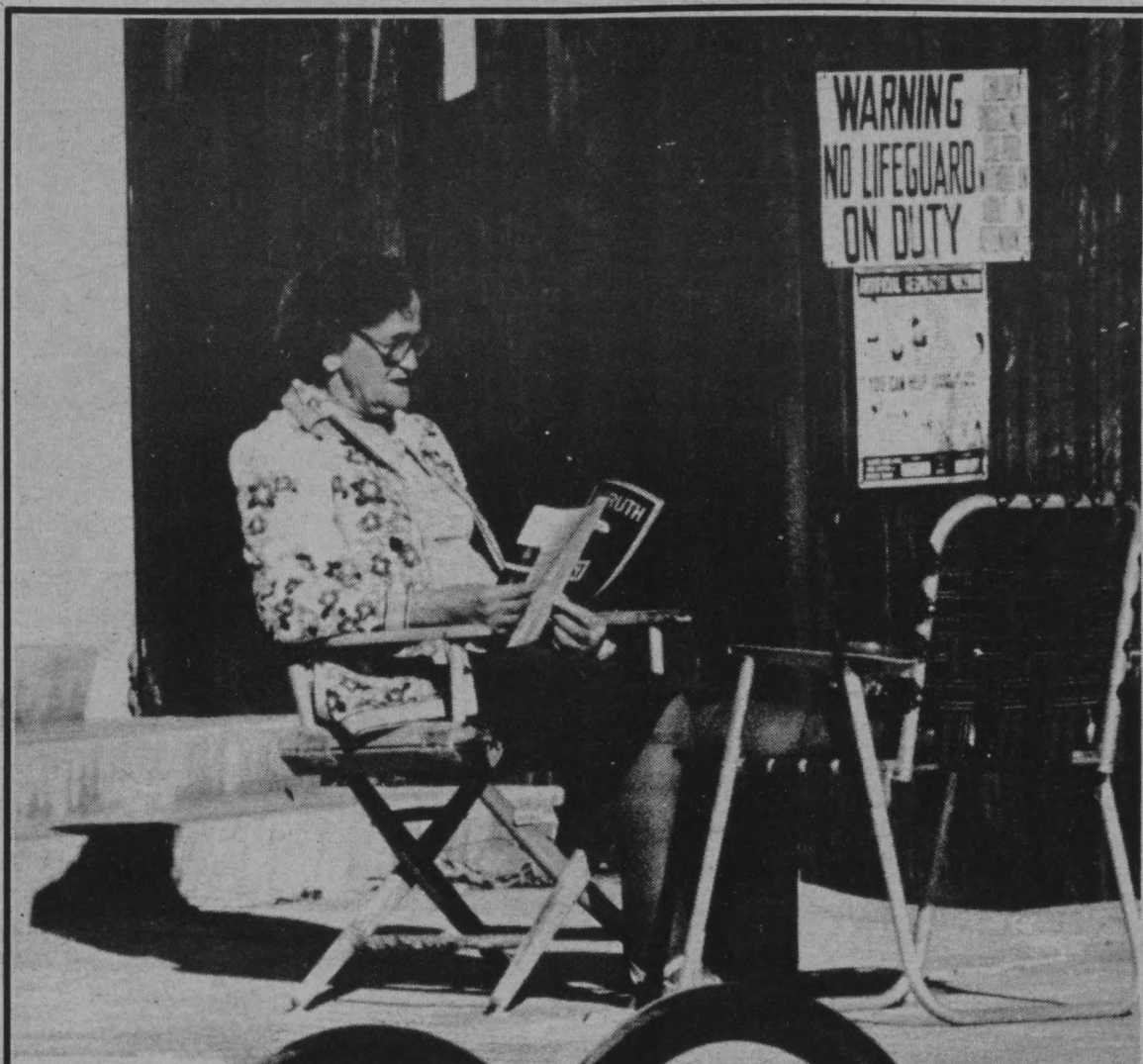

'Better Than The Presidency'

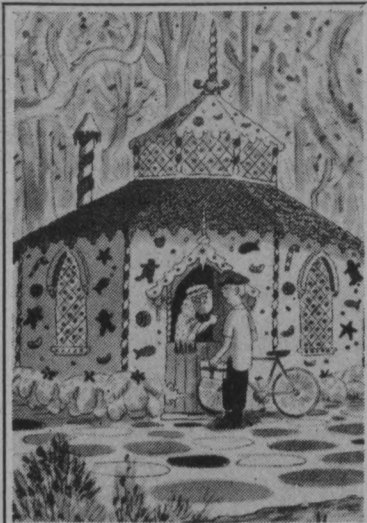

It may surprise, even shock, you to find out that UCSB was actually founded millions of years ago by an alien civilization somewhat less bright than our own. You think I'm crazy?

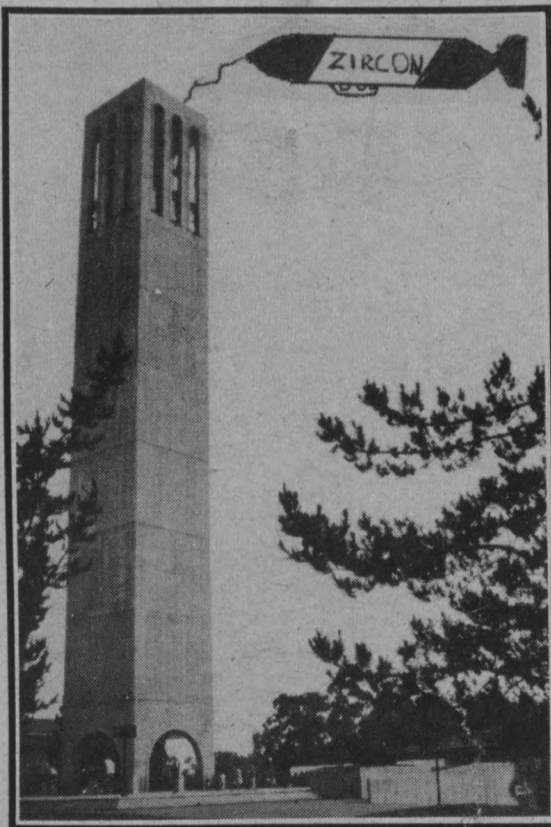

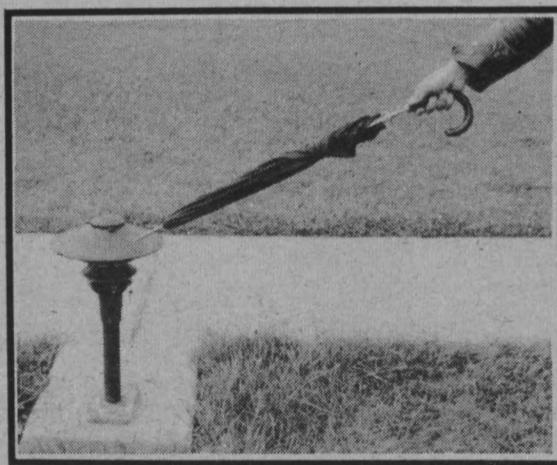

Life After Death Discovered For Sure This Time

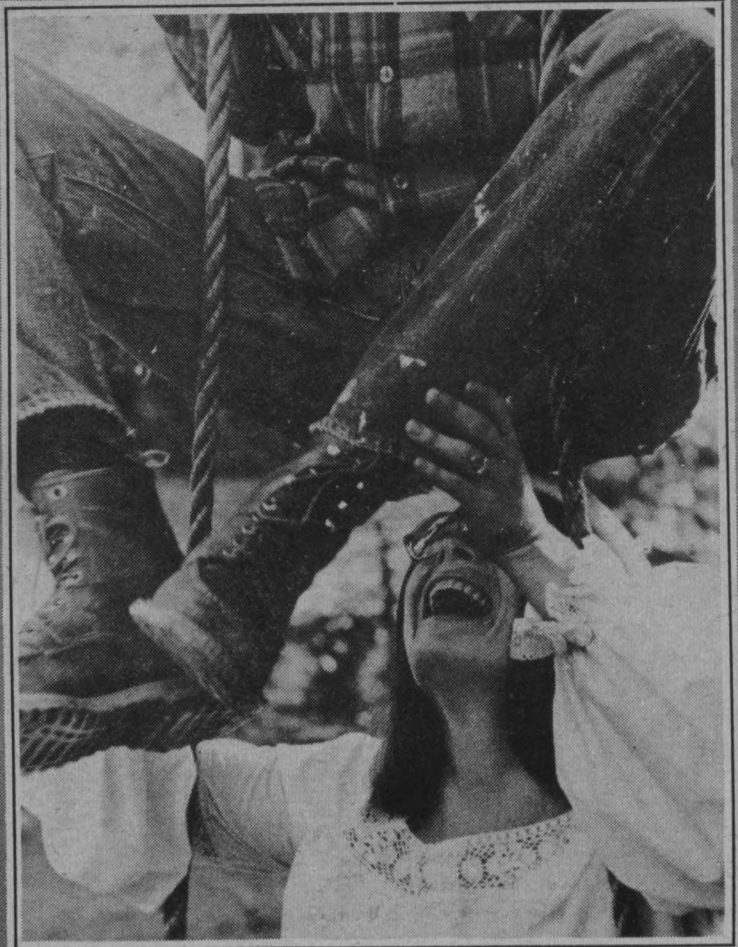
UCSB biologists have announced that new experiments performed on white rats definitely do not preclude the chance that there is life after death.

Ralph Johnson, a veteran of the Korean War has carried a souvenir of that conflict with him as a good luck token— a bullet from an M-1 carbine. It may have saved his life.

Johnson was hanging around the fringes of a "Jump for Jesus" rally in Pocatello, when suddenly the crowd turned violent. Chanting "One way, one way," the slogan of the Jesus Movement, the crowd began to surge forward toward the speaker's platform.

The speakers on the platform, fearing for their lives, began to throw Bibles at the on-rushing crowd, stunning several of them, and fatally wounding two.

Johnson described the scene as "frightening. All of a sudden they just opened fire with these Bibles, and people around me began dropping like flies. I saw a lot of horrible things in the war, but nothing like that. Then one of them hit me, and the next thing I knew I was in the hospital."

Doctors say that it was only a miracle that Johnson escaped with his life. Evidently the Bible struck Johnson directly on his bullet and was deflected.

Johnson is still humble; although he attributed much of his luck to clean living and a daily pint of whisky, as he says, "Maybe there is something higher that shapes our lives."

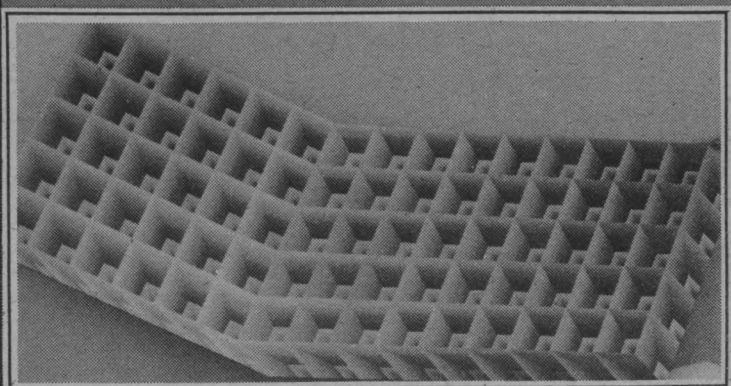


SHIRLEY HOLLOW received last year's best try award after failing to succumb after taking 400 Midol pills.

It was the best of times and the worst of times for Jackie O. While snacking on caviar and cream soda at her villa on Skorpio, enrollment dropped at UCSB. Administrators were furious, but the Inquirer continues its search for causal links.

The heart of the nation went out to Jackie Kennedy that tragic day in Dallas over ten years ago. But Jackie learned to live on in spite of her tragic loss. She even managed to land the richest man in the world: Aristotle Onassis.

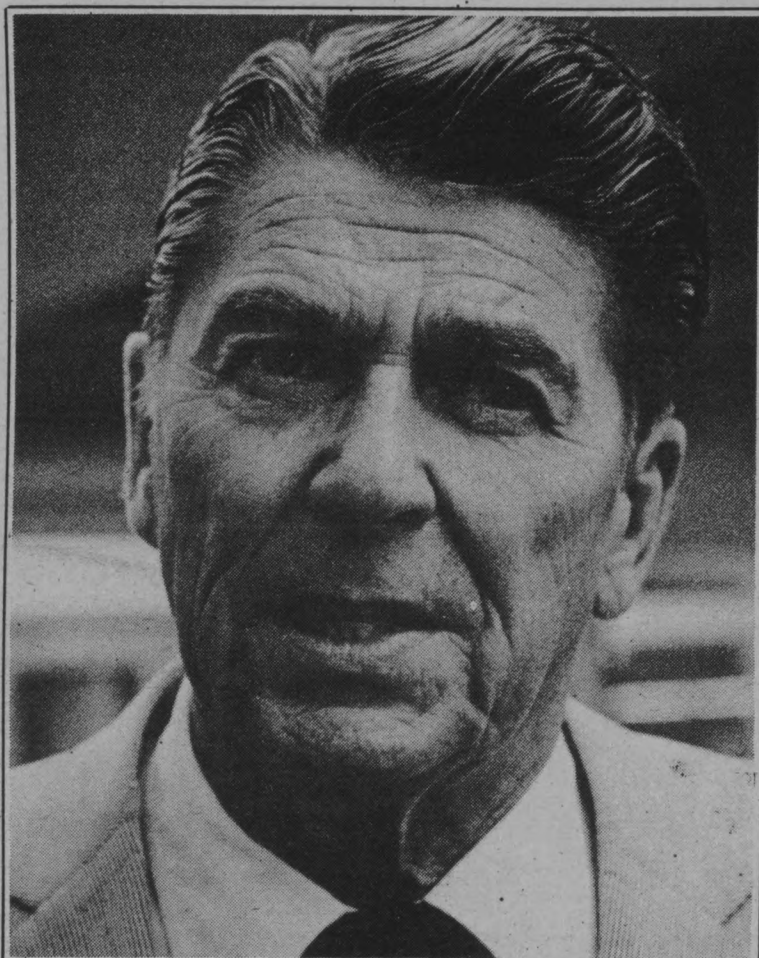

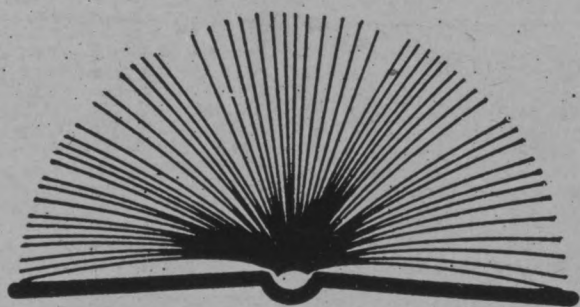

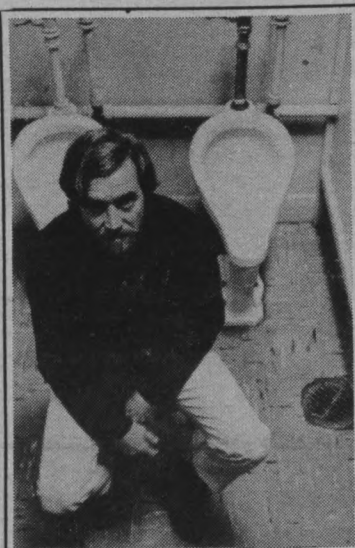
