

Death Takes Holiday In I.V.

"The problem with old age," says Sylvester Hewlitt, Isla Vista octogenarian, "is that you're only a baked potato away from a heart attack." At 87, Hewlitt understands that his remaining years at Friendship Manor retirement home are limited.

The Inquirer recently invaded the moldy hollows of convelescence to study these and other scenes of expiration. "As I walk the halls of these many retirement communities," says Friendship Manor owner Reverend Kenneth Berg, "I talk to people with tears of gratitude streaming down their cheeks.

"During my thirty years in the pastorate," he continued, "I have trudged up dingy steps to hold the hands of the sick in the midst of the squalor and the filth of many sub-standard homes for the aging. I have asked myself, 'Why must a man live for many years—only to die like a dog?'"

Why indeed! Berg has made arrangements for all his oldsters to die like people, "in a spirit of real dignity." They go out like old soldiers," he says. Berg also issues all of his residents copies of the "Plain Truth" magazine, so they can understand "God's message to the fossils."

The residents themselves are generally happy in their new

abode. "The nicest thing about this place is that they keep plenty of Phillips on hand," says 94-year-old Henrietta Johnson.


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Lecture Halls Of The Gods? UCSB Founded By Men From Outer Space

It may surprise, even shock, you to find out that UCSB was actually founded millions of years ago by an alien civilization somewhat less bright than our own. You think I'm crazy?





Ralph Johnson, a veteran of the Korean War has carried a souvenir of that conflict with him as a good luck token—a bullet from an M-1 carbine. It may have saved his life.

Johnson was hanging around the fringes of a "Jump for Jesus" rally in Pocatello, when suddenly the crowd turned violent. Chanting "One way, one way," the slogan of the Jesus Movement, the crowd began to surge forward toward the speaker's platform.

The speakers on the platform, fearing for their lives, began to throw Bibles at the on-rushing crowd, stunning several of them, and fatally wounding two.

Johnson described the scene as "frightening. All of a sudden they just opened fire with these Bibles, and people around me began dropping like flies. I saw a lot of horrible things in the war, but nothing like that. Then one of them hit me, and the next thing I knew I was in the hospital."

Doctors say that it was only a miracle that Johnson escaped with his life. Evidently the Bible struck Johnson directly on his bullet and was deflected.

Johnson is still humble; although he attributed much of his luck to clean living and a daily pint of whisky, as he says, "Maybe there is something higher that shapes our lives."






