# Expansion May Affect Estuary

Proposed expansion of Santa Barbara Municipal Airport may affect areas of the Goleta Slough, an estuary in which various species of plants and animals can be found.

The airport plans will accommodate an increase in passengers from 300,000 to 750,000 by 1990, according to Santa Barbara City Environmental Planner Pat Saley.

The airport has put together an environmental impact report detailing the proposed expansions and their effects on the environment, Saley said.

The EIR is ready to go before the environmental review board which will evaluate the EIR's findings, Daniel Gira, environmental planner with the Santa Barbara County Resource Management Department, said.

"Our (conclusion) was that the expansion would have an adverse impact," Associate Wildlife Biologist with the State Fish and Game Department Earl Cummings said.

According to the EIR, some of the airport's planned expansions include extension of the western runway by 400 feet; partial reconstruction of Fairview Avenue; relocation of San Pedro Creek to San Jose Creek; and construction of a long-term parking area.

Some of the mitigation measures included in the report are to confine construction activities to the period from August through December to reduce impacts on nesting; to revegetate the bare soil at the end of the project with native species; to include buffer strips around the salt flats and mud

flats; and to alter abandoned portions of San Pedro Creek to provide increased estuarine and upland habitats.

Airport Director Patrick Murphy believes the proposed expansion will eventually be approved.

He said there are 23 projects in the proposal, and none of them include land expansion. All proposed construction is on land the airport already owns, Murphy said.

The EIR calls the Goleta Slough a "regionally rare system of wetland and adjacent upland habitats," adding the slough is the northernmost sizeable estuary of the Southern California biogeographic province.

"Goleta Slough is the remnant of a large marine embayment that spread into the Goleta Valley Basin as the sea level rose during the last glacial period," the EIR states.

The slough has been naturally reduced to less than half its 1903 extent, according to the report.

The EIR has been prepared in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act of 1972, Cummings said. According to Cummings, the state agency or local government body which approves the permit for expansion is designated the lead agency in the project and must determine the feasibility of the project based on the expansion's environmental impact.

The proposal will go to the state clearing house, which may call for changes in the proposal to reduce the environmental impact, Cummings said. The proposal will be returned to the city for public comment and alteration to accommodate the state's (Please turn to pg.12, col.3)

## Supervisors Increase Low-Income Housing

In an effort to increase the availability of low-income housing, the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors voted to allow increased densities in housing projects whose developers agree to build low-income units.

"There is a dire need of low-income housing in the south coast area," Supervisor Toru Miyoshi, said referring to the need for the new amendment to the Housing Element of the Comprehensive Plan. He explained the need for affordable housing is not being met by the current housing market.

The board's decision will affect developments requiring a change in the county's general plan. The general plan determines the land use and density allowed in different areas of the county. Under the approve amendment, developers who plan to increase

the number of units allowed on their property will have to devote all of these additional units to low-income housing, according to the county report recommending the amendment.

The amendment also affects land going through a zoning change. "For proposed changes from an agricultural or recreational open space designation to a residential designation, at least 50 percent of the units should be affordable," the report concluded.

Supervisor DeWayne Holmdahl objected to requiring developers to build low-income housing in return for building more houses on less land. "I'm getting sick and tired of putting the burden on the backs of the property owners," he said.

Supervisor Robert Kallman said it was the county's job to build low-income housing. "We are tran-

## Student Commission Regulates Advertising

In an effort to keep the campus free of illegally posted advertisements, the Advertising and Posting Commission was formed this quarter through the Activities Planning Center to rid the campus of all posting offenders.

The commission consists of three students: Tom Lopilato, Jason Lees and Sara Spring, all of whom felt the advertising on campus was slowly getting out of control. Posters were being put up outside of regulation areas and rules were being disregarded, they explained.

Last year, concerns over campus appearance were expressed by students and the Campus Regulations and Review Committee, which goes over campus policies every two years, according to Sue Kohlruss, a graduate intern at the APC and supervisor of the commission.

The commission tried to form last year, but "never got off the ground," Kohlruss said. Mikie Chavez, last year's adviser for student organizations, said after concerns over the campus appearance were voiced research was done to look into different posting procedures and ways to publicize events.

Last quarter a proposal was written by Kohlruss, Lopilato, and Lees, and was submitted to Director of Student Life Leslie Lawson. The proposal was then sent to Vice Chancellor for Student and Community Affairs Edward Birch who approved formation of the commission.

## Moral Majority Leader Explains Philosophy To UCSB Audience

"We don't think that because someone is a born-again Christian that makes him a second class citizen, that they have no right to become active politically," Robert Billings, co-founder of the Moral Majority and currently United States Undersecretary of Education, said, addressing the question of church/state separation in a lecture Monday.

Referring to the rise of the new religious right, Billings, often called the "father" of the movement, said, "We did not feel we were doing something that no one else has ever done.... Other interest groups have always rallied their people who believed like they did. So we were doing the same thing others had done, although it created a great deal of hype in the media."

Billings said Jesse Jackson's campaign is a good example of a similar movement, as he has a large religious following.

When asked what he considered a violation of church and state separation, he responded, "If you're talking about the involvement of Christians in politics — none." He added the clause "separation of church and state" is not found in the constitution but rather was voiced by Thomas Jefferson and has been since adhered to.

As president of Hyles Anderson University, Billings was annoyed by government intervention and determined to "get the feds off our back." In 1975 he attended a seminar in Washington, D.C. on political involvement. Enthused after the seminar, he made an unsuccessful bid for Congress (though he won the primary) in 1976. Determined to become involved in politics, Billings set up the National Christian Action Coalition in 1977, now headed by his son William.

In 1979 he was invited to Richmond, Virginia to meet with (Please turn to pg.12, col.3)

## Reagan Offers New Right Little More Than Rhetoric

President Ronald Reagan has not lived up to the expectations of the new Religious Right, and has offered conservatives little more than "lip service" and "a pat on the back," Under Secretary of Education Robert Billings said in an interview Monday.

"As a pragmatist, I'm sure he has had to make decisions in some areas which he might not otherwise have made," Billings said. "In areas like tuition tax credit, he did not wave the flag for the program like he did when he was trying to sell the AWACs. The same would be true with prayer in the classroom. He speaks about it often, but nothing has really come out of the White House."

Billings is the co-founder of the Moral Majority, along with Reverend Jerry Falwell. He also founded the National Christian Action Coalition, and has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Council for National Policy, a group formed to offer a political counterpart to liberal viewpoints. He waged a losing battle for a position in the Congress on a conservative ticket in 1976.

Billings anticipates Reagan will focus on education in the upcoming year. At a recent conference of White House advisors, Reagan cited education as one of his three main priorities during 1984, Billings said.

The discrepancy between federal spending on education and on other programs is not as great as is sometimes thought, Billings said. "The federal government has to provide all of the monies for the military. But states have their own funds for education," he said. Last year the federal government spent \$14 billion on education, but the total spending on education in the country, Billings said, was over \$220 billion, while military spending was just over \$230 billion.

### Konstantin Chernenko Succeeds Andropov

Moscow — Konstantin Chernenko, a pillar of the Kremlin's old guard, was named leader of the Communist Party on Monday at the age of 72 — the oldest man ever to achieve the peak of Soviet power.

Chernenko, an ally of late President Leonid Brezhnev, succeeds Yuri Andropov, who died Thursday at 69 after 15 months in office.

Chernenko was chosen by his 11 fellow members of the ruling Politburo. Unanimous approval Monday by the Central Committee was announced by the official news media at 2 p.m. as dignitaries from around the world gathered to attend Andropov's funeral.

It is not known if Chernenko would speak privately with Vice President George Bush and Senate majority leader Howard Baker Jr., who are representing the United States at Andropov's funeral in Red Square Tuesday.

Beirut, Lebanon — Scattered exchanges of sniper fire between the Lebanese army and Moslem militias crackled through the Lebanese capital Monday, and the army for a second day allowed trucks to carry food and fuel to the trapped residents of West Beirut.

Brig. Gen. Lufti Jaber, Shiite commander of the army's 6th Brigade, ordered his soldiers to report to duty in west Beirut within 48 hours and take over security of the besieged Moslem sector of the capital. The spiritual leader of Beirut's Shiites called for "absolute cooperation" with the brigade to restore law and order.

The move will give the army its first presence in the Moslem sector since militiamen took control a week ago in heavy fighting. The 6th Brigade had refused to fight at the height of the battle.

The move came a day after President Amin Gemayel called for national reconciliation talks and ordered a plan

## State

### De Lorean Trial

Los Angeles — With John De Lorean's cocaine trafficking trial three weeks away, a judge ruled Monday that the automaker's controversial lie-detector test can't be used as evidence because "substantial body movements" made the test results questionable.

The government suggested during weeks of hearing on the polygraph issue that De Lorean's twitching, fidgeting and jumpiness, seen on videotapes of the test, were intentional efforts to alter the results in his favor. The defense denied this.

Fresno — Pacific Gas and Electric Co. hopes to complete repairs this week on an overheated bearing at its problem-plagued Helms hydroelectric plant, an official said Monday.

Testing of the first unit was halted Friday evening, just 28 minutes after water began running through a generator in the massive underground powerhouse in the Sierra 80 road miles east of Fresno.

Ontario — A freeway crash of a van carrying 10 Soviets left one woman dead and nine injured as they returned to the Los Angeles area from a weekend trip to Las Vegas, officials said Monday.

California Highway Patrol Officer Edward Martinez said the driver and his passengers were non-English-speaking Soviets, including two visitors from the Soviet Union.

Diruhi Delikyan, 53, of Glendale, was killed in the Sunday morning accident.

Mountain View — Space administration scientists Monday announced findings from the Pioneer Venus spacecraft showing Earth's cloud-shrouded twin planet apparently has gigantic active volcanoes, lightning, and at least one mountain taller than Mount Everest.

## Nation

### Hope For Soviet 'Cooperation'

Washington — The Reagan administration said Monday it wanted to join the new Soviet leader, Konstantin Chernenko, in achieving "constructive cooperation" but emphasized that improving relations between the superpowers "has to be a two-way street."

Vice President George Bush laid a memorial wreath Monday evening at the casket of Soviet President Yuri Andropov. Bush said he hoped the United States and Soviet Union would "increase contact and cooperation."

Late in the afternoon, Reagan paid a brief visit to the Soviet embassy to sign a condolence book under a black-bordered portrait of Andropov.

Washington — The Reagan administration has quietly informed Congress it intends to sell up to 1,600 anti-aircraft missiles to Jordan while trying to persuade Israel to go along with plans for a U.S.-armed Jordanian strike force,

sources said Monday.

The proposed sale surfaced as Jordan's King Hussein held talks with President Reagan, Secretary of State George Shultz and Robert McFarlane, Reagan's national security adviser, on U.S. policy toward Lebanon. President Hosni Mubarak of Egypt was scheduled to follow suit Tuesday.

Forsyth, Ga. — The Rev. Jesse Jackson said Monday he has been invited to Nicaragua to help celebrate the rise to power of the leftist Sandinista government there and will decide by the end of the week whether to go.

If he goes, the visit next Tuesday would come one day after the Iowa caucuses and exactly a week in advance of the New Hampshire primary, where Jackson is pushing for a strong showing. Jackson said the invitation came from the Nicaraguan ambassador to the United States.

Washington — The Reagan administration has set in motion plans to withdraw the U.S. Marines from Lebanon before mid-March, officials said Monday.

"The White House has made a decision to get the Marines out of Beirut and on the amphibious ships offshore within 30 days from last Saturday," said an administration official.

"The clock started then," added this official, who said the decision was made after Defence Secretary Caspar Weinberger delivered the Pentagon's proposal for withdrawing the Marines to the White House last Friday.

Such a timetable would bring the 1,200-1,300 Marines serving in the multinational force from their positions at the Beirut International Airport to the ships by March 12.

**WEATHER** — The day will be clearing to sunny in the morning and clear at night. The temperature highs will be 65 to 70 and the lows 38 to 44.

Washington — Salvadoran businessmen often resort to illegal means, including funneling money from El Salvador's black market into Miami banks, to elude government rules that limit use of scarce foreign capital for necessities, according to a secret U.S. study.

The study, prepared by an outside consulting firm for the U.S. Agency for International Development, suggests overhauling Salvadoran banking and enforcing anti-black market laws to reduce corruption.

Birmingham, Ala. — A federal appellate judge heard arguments Monday on whether a black federal judge, U.W. Clemon, should be removed from a racial discrimination case because he represents blacks in similar suits when he was a lawyer.

# Santa Barbara Purchases Buses To Accomodate The Handicapped

In accordance with state and federal law, the Santa Barbara Metropolitan Transit District has purchased 20 new buses equipped with wheelchair lifts to accommodate the handicapped.

The new buses are five feet longer than the current 35-foot-long buses and cost \$134,984 each, MTD Administrative Assistant Sherrie Fisher explained, adding, \$8,400 of the cost pays for the lift.

Fisher said the lifts on the new buses will be air-operated. The bottom step moves to the level of the pavement, then hoists the passenger to the top step.

"Every route will have accessible service," Fisher said. However, acknowledging some routes may have more need of accessible buses than others, Fisher said MTD would welcome suggestions. "If there are specific needs, one route more than another, we'd like to hear them."

Xavier Martinez, office coordinator and secretary of the Independent Living Resource Center, said "It (the purchase of the new buses) will be good for the handicapped people, especially the ones in wheelchairs." Fisher also supported the new buses, saying "I imagine that for the people who use it, it will be very important."

State law requires "all rapid transit equipment and structures shall be so built that a handicapped person shall have ready access." Whereas federal law provides alternatives to mandatory accessibility on public transportation if these alternatives can best meet the needs of the people, Melanie Rausch-Stewart, executive director of Easy-Lift Corporation, said.

Easy lift is another bus system that provides services to the handicapped for those in the area who are not able to make it to and from a bus stop. "My drivers stop, go

into the homes, and help them (the handicapped)," Rausch-Stewart said.

"We try and refer people to use MTD buses, but they can't do it," Rausch-Stewart said.

Rausch-Stewart said over the past two and a half years, MTD has extensively advertised its 15 existing accessible buses, but has provided only 1,007 rides for handicapped people.

Easy-Lift, a bus service which is partly subsidized by MTD, has provided 600,000 rides over the same period using only four vans.

"MTD has been very supportive in funding," Rausch-Stewart said. In the past, MTD has subsidized Easy-Lift with \$114,000 a year. This year, however, the amount has been cut to \$50,000, Rausch-Stewart said.

"Our funding situation is a patchwork," Rausch-Stewart said. In addition to the subsidy from MTD, Easy-Lift gets funding from city and county revenues, the United Way, the New Vista Foundation, and other sources, she said.

Hoping to divert more funds to alternative transportation for handicapped people, Rausch-Stewart said she has contacted both state Senator Gary Hart (D-Santa Barbara) and Assemblymember Jack O'Connell (D-Santa Barbara). "They're interested in getting something changed," she said.

Fisher said the per-person cost for an MTD ride is about \$1. According to Rausch-Stewart, the cost for door-to-door service is about \$9 a person, but the fare for Easy-Lift is only \$1.50.

Fisher said Easy-Lift could continue its service with the \$50,000 subsidy it is receiving.

MTD receives 80 percent of its funding from the federal government. The remaining 20 percent comes from local fares, Fisher said.

## Lebanon In Transition

Political, social and religious currents have collided in Lebanon, radically altering the balance of power in the Middle East. The Lebanon of old, Christian-dominated and western-oriented, is gone. If a new, united Lebanon emerges, it will reflect this shifting of power.

The Muslim majority in Lebanon has the military and political momentum now. Their long-standing demands for greater political representation and reform of the inequitable social and economic structure of the country must be met if Lebanon is to be united again.

Assertions by U.S. policymakers that Lebanon may be "lost" simply reflect an inability to understand the forces at work in the country; to many Lebanese, Lebanon is on the verge of being "won". By placing the civil war solely in an East-West context, American officials indicate their insensitivity to Muslim concerns.

However, the architects of U.S. Mideast policy seem determined to completely alienate Lebanon's Muslim population by bombing Syrian-held territory outside Beirut. This attempt to preserve America's image of strength cannot salvage a policy which was misguided from the start. It can only damage larger U.S. interests in the region.

Moderate Arab states such as Saudi Arabia and Egypt may be uncomfortable with Syria's bid for dominance, but they cannot countenance intensive U.S. and Israeli attacks on Muslim positions. Each shell which falls on Lebanese soil delays peace, and reduces the likelihood of any pro-American sentiment in a new coalition government.

It is possible for the U.S. to emerge from the crisis in Lebanon with increased standing in the Middle East, and perhaps some true friends in the moderate Arab world. This would require a more comprehensive negotiating perspective, placing the Lebanese conflict in the larger context of the region as a whole.

I hope that you will continue your news coverage and contribute to an informed public decision with an open and fair mind.

The issues of funding for I.V. parks affects every resident. Currently, from the property tax rolls each resident (low incomes as we are) pays into the park's district treasury almost \$15. About \$7 goes into the fund for operations, maintenance and recreation. The remainder goes into the fund for paying the mortgages of about 25 acres. The district's current annual budget is about \$120,000. Much of this money comes from one time grants. Next year's fund will be \$40,000 to \$60,000 less. We have examined alternative funding from government and private sources. They have advised us to secure our own funding.

You opposed the county being our tax collector. I agree. By law the county must be our treasury. This does not allow the county to control the funds, but, only to act as our private banker. The district sets its own budget. If the district were the tax collector we could have direct communications with each resident during the tax collection season rather than sending bills to the property owners. Direct collection of the tax by the district would permit the

residents an opportunity to directly protest, praise, or otherwise express themselves. This direct method costs much more than using the county property tax rolls, but, it sure would increase taxpayers participation! When the residents see their park's bill rather than having the costs hidden in the property tax bills there will be more public attention to the park's. I submitted such a proposal three years ago (yep, it is an old issue that was covered little). The district has considered using the county as the tax collector because they only charge 25-50 cents and the district wants to be cost effective.

During the 1970's over two-thirds of the I.V. voters approved the district's tax authority and the \$1.1 million open-space acquisition program. Since then we experienced "Prop. 13" and lost over half of our revenues. We have operated on bail-out funds from county and state sources while cutting recreation and other programs. These alternative sources say there is no more bail-out. So, it is up to the voters to decide if I.V. is to bail-out it's own district.

### Zionism

In her February 8 response to a *Nexus* editorial about Israel, Regina Newman raised some issues which I feel compelled to address.

The first is the issue of Zionism. Zionism is the desire of Jews to self-determination in our historic homeland, Israel. It stands to reason, then, that Jews living in Israel are by

definition Zionists.

Since the state of Israel is a flourishing democracy, Israeli citizens do not have to agree with all of the policies of their government. That disagreement, such as expressed for instance by Peace Now, does not mean that they are not Zionists. It is not a matter, as Newman suggests, of calling the government Zionists because she disagrees with them, and Peace Now non-Zionist because she agrees with them.

Newman also implies that Judaism and Zionism are not at all interconnected. It is true, of course, that not all Jews are Zionists, nor are all Zionists Jews. But Zionism is strongly rooted in Judaism. Ever since the Temple in Jerusalem was destroyed in 586 BCE (BC) and again in 70 CE (AD) and the Jews were exiled from their homeland, we have longed to return home to Zion, or Israel. That longing is seen throughout Jewish literature, including the Bible and the Passover Haggadah.

I am sorry that Regina Newman is so afraid of being labeled a Zionist. I am, however, glad that she is concerned with what she perceives as anti-Semitism in *Nexus* editorials. I think she is right in pointing out the two are very often confused and confusing. I hope she is also aware that anti-Zionist remarks are often merely more politically acceptable forms of anti-Semitism. In her desire to distinguish Zionism and Judaism she makes it easier for anti-Semites to hide their anti-Semitic remarks in the guise of political dialogue.

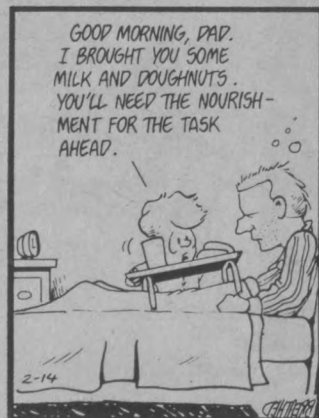
This letter is directed to Tom Truong, La Cumbre editor.

## A Small Price To Pay

In 1972, despite enormous opposition by property owners and absentee landlords, the people of Isla Vista were able to form their own local government: the Isla Vista Recreation and Park District. Living in the most densely populated community on the west coast, and having only one small park (maintained by the County of Santa Barbara), people felt that open space and parklands were critical.

In 1977, the community again demonstrated its commitment to parklands and open space by approving (by a 67 percent margin) a 1.15 million dollar bond issue, to purchase and provide parklands and open space within the community. Basically, voters recognized

if they wanted parks in Isla Vista, they were going to have to pay for them. Today, the public owns over 26 acres of parklands in Isla Vista through the land trust that is the Park District.

Since 1977, however, two significant developments have put severe constraints on the ability of the District to maintain these parklands. First, the state-wide passage of Proposition 13 (which was soundly defeated in Isla Vista) reduced the secured property tax revenues available to the Park District by almost 50 percent. Secondly, the dismantling of the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) by the Reagan administration reduced the staff of the Park District by more than 75 percent!

At present, the Park District employs a full-time general manager, a part-time bookkeeper, a part-time secretary, a part-time grounds manager, a full-time grounds worker, and a part-time grounds worker. This tiny staff is responsible for administering our local government and maintaining over 26 acres of parkland! All things considered, they do an outstanding job.

But the Park District is faced with yet another fiscal crisis: the loss of its "safety net" — the Special District Augmentation Fund. This fund, created by the State after the passage of Proposition 13 to cushion its severe impact on local governments (and in particular, Special Districts like the Park District), accounted for one-third of

the Park District's budget in 1983-84. In other years, our share of these funds has ranged from zero to \$20,000. Obviously, this is an insecure source of funding at best. There is a great deal of competition for these funds, decisions about who gets them are entirely out of our hands, and the amount of available funds continues to shrink.

For these reasons, the Board of Directors of the Isla Vista Recreation and Park District is proposing a Special Tax in Isla Vista, between \$10 and \$15 per household per year, to replace the Special Districts Augmentation funding and assure financial stability for the District.

We are not trying to increase services, we are only trying to maintain our current level of operations. We are not a fat cat Park District. The vast majority of our parklands are held as

undeveloped open space, with only parks like Anisq Oyo, Children's Park, Window-to-the-Sea, and Little Acorn receiving regular attention. (As a matter of fact, much of our staff time is spent coping with a daily barrage of beer bottles and other debris).

Generally speaking, people do not like to pay things, but generally speaking, nothing is free. Government officials who propose more taxes are aware that this is generally unpopular, and they usually do it only when they believe it to be necessary.

Some of the alternatives to the proposed Special Tax which have been proposed — selling our parks, or leasing our parks for parking lots — seem to deny the very legitimate needs which created the Park District in the first place. As it is, our ratio of parklands to people is the

lowest in the country. Isla Vista needs every single park it has.

There will be a public hearing on the subject of a Special Tax in Isla Vista this Thursday, Feb. 16, at 8:30 p.m. at the Park District offices, 889 Camino del Sur in Isla Vista. Please attend and voice your opinions. If you cannot attend the hearing, please forward your written comments to the District.

The average Isla Vista household has somewhere in the neighborhood of four tenants, which means the proposed Special Tax would cost each person between \$2.50 and \$3.75 per year. Isn't this a small price to pay for some parks and open space in the most densely populated community in the western United States?

### Valentine's Day 1984: The State Of Romance

Is romance healthy in America? You can bet it is, judging from the lucrative week the confectionary, flower and greeting card industries are now having. On Valentine's Day 1984, consumers will buy about \$102 million worth of flowers (three percent of annual floral sales), \$385 million worth of candy (it's the industry's largest sales day of the year) and 300 million greeting cards.

Yet behind the commercial aspects of affection is a more intricate story of on-going changes in love and relationships. While marriages are increasing and divorces are decreasing for the first time in years, romance itself may not have recovered from the tumbles it's taken in the past decade. Romance may seem alive and well on Valentine's Day 1984, but some of its more studious observers voice caution about its prognosis.

In the interest of the season, and since our expertise on the subject is lacking, we asked some authorities on romance — sorry, but they're not names from the pages of *People* magazine — to present their opinions on the state of courtship 1984. Herewith their mixture of offerings:

Lorna Sarrel, director of the human sexuality program at Yale University: "My sense is that, in comparing the 1950s to the 1980s, coeducation has been helpful in breaking down the misunderstanding and mystique that existed before. So today there's the potential for more intelligent, real kinds of relationships between men and women.

"Yet because of earlier sexual involvement in general, more young people have been scared by the pain of relationships ending abruptly. We tend to underestimate that, not realizing that it's almost as traumatic as divorce. So many young people I see are weary of trusting. I hope they will develop a cautious sense of realism."

Edward Brecher, author of several books on sexuality: "I'm very optimistic about love and romance. The iron-bound corset of Victorian nonsense no longer inhibits couples from finding a kind of relationship that is appropriate to themselves. When I was young, courtship and marriage and affairs and all relations between men and women were like a military drill in which you did what the sergeant — often the priest, rabbi and minister — told you to do. Today it's like a free-flow dance, as it should be."

Dr. Shirley Zussman, sex therapist and past president of the American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors and Therapists: "The sexual freedom that was so hailed by a generation ago is now being re-evaluated. Now many of that generation's members are questioning the value and meaning of the sexual freedom that permitted them to go to bed with a casual partner. I think such people are seeking more commitment and more of a relationship that has some degree of caring. It's a period of introspection for them.

"These people are working harder, and having more doubts and uncertainties about the future. They want someone to care about. And many of them are thinking that they are not going to find it, so they are more anxious about

what kind of future they're going to have. They are no longer 20 and they are wondering if they are going to be alone for the rest of their lives."

George Leonard, author of *The End of Sex*: "The whole idea of recreational sex is not so celebrated as it was two years ago. There is more celebration of romantic love. AIDS and herpes have made us all take a second look at the joys of unbridled, joyous sex. People are interested in intimacy, romance and commitment."

Dr. Leah Schaefer, author and therapist: "I think there's been a kind of leveling of sexual behavior and people are becoming much more concerned with love and romance than they ever were. As the world becomes more mechanical with computers and more frightening because of the arms race, it causes people to feel the need for personal and intimate relationships to a much greater degree. The horror that we face in the world forces us to find warmth and intimacy in our relationships."

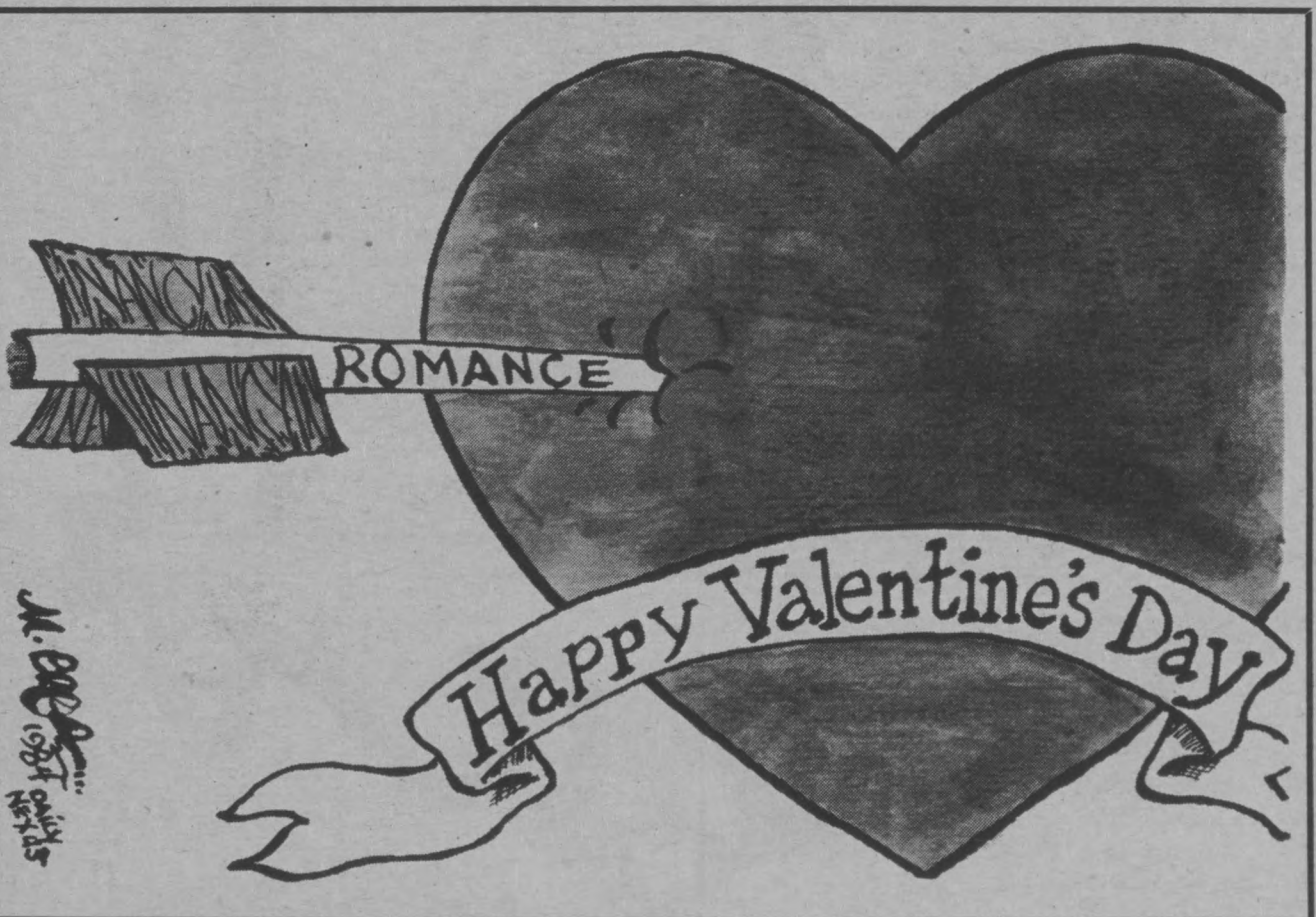
Professor John Gagnon, author and sociologist: "I think it would be more reasonable if people were slightly less

interested in love and romance in general. My sense is that a fairly large number of long-term intimate relationships are developed based on people not thinking enough of what their individual needs are."

Dr. Michael Quadland, sex therapist, Greenwich Village, N.Y.: "The gay community is in mourning this Valentine's Day, having lost 1,300 members to AIDS. People are depressed. People are not only mourning the loss of lives, but a sexual lifestyle that they enjoyed for a long time. They are also mourning the loss of good will of the heterosexual community which once again sees them as a threat because of the AIDS epidemic. Yet, there is a silver lining in all of this. Gay men have become much more careful about their sexual behavior. They are engaging in courtship again."

Some people might find the preceding bits of wisdom fairly instructive. Others will obviously find them wholly irrelevant. To both groups, one can only wish a happy holiday.

**Speakers Discuss Management Of Ecosystems At Global Conference**

Local and global perspectives on the changing ecosystem were offered by Paul Relis, co-founder and director of the Community Environment Council in Santa Barbara and Willis Harmon, director of the Center for the Study of Social Policy at Stanford, at the third annual World Community Conference.

Gary Bremerman, a UCSB student, moderated the discussion. "We are in direct confrontation with our environment and because people tend to overlook smaller things, subtle changes are taking place in the ecosystem that will be of greater magnitude in the coming years," he

said.

Relis emphasized local activities concerned citizens can take part in to make a difference in the environment.

The Community Environmental Council has conceived a "2000 Plan" for the Santa Barbara area which is "to have a significant effect on the use of resources in our area," Relis said. Students are presently involved in the council's efforts through work at the Gildea Resource Center.

Relis promotes mapping of ecosystems. Studying and mapping the impact of development on the environment can allow development to proceed with minimal damage, a process he calls "conceptualizing how our environment interacts with us."

Harmon discussed the roots of the words ecosystem and economy. "Economy wins out over ecology ... (There are) powerful economic incentives to (damage) the environment and deplete our resources."

Harmon noted current problems industry has brought upon the ecosystem, including over-grazing, rapid deforestations, soil erosion, and surface water pollution, which appear to be local but are actually global. "Acid rain originated in one country and ends up in another," he said.

Another problem disturbing the balance of the ecosystem is the burning of fossil fuels which is increasing the concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Scientists have two different theories about the long-range effects of this greater concentration, Harmon said. The "greenhouse

effect" poses the possibility that increased air pollution will trap solar rays and cause surface temperatures to progressively warm up.

The second theory, which has fewer followers but is well supported scientifically, predicts another ice age within the next few centuries, based on the fact that before the last ice age the concentration of carbon dioxide rose steadily.

Harmon presents our environmental choices in simple terms. Man can either continue to burn fossil fuels and cut down the trees that take carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere or he can reduce consumption and head off the possible ice age.

Harmon criticized those who accuse over populated third world nations of increasing the severity of these problems. Although the United States has only six percent of the world population, it consumes 40 percent of the (world's) resources, he said.

The "non-peace" which characterizes the world today is another detriment to the environment, Harmon said. Human beings are part of the ecosystem and war harms humans, he said.

"We live in crazy times ... limited nuclear war sounds realistic ... If anybody should venture to talk about peace on earth, they're flaky," he said. For those who wish to make a change there are "ways of quietly saying no ... (which cause) a consciousness chain reaction," Harmon said.

Since most of what is going on in people's minds takes place out of conscious awareness the beliefs people hold unconsciously need to be understood so that changes to save the ecosystem can occur, Harmon said.

Both speakers emphasized the need for citizens to involve themselves at the local level. "Leadership in environmental problems must start locally as citizens initiating local programs," Relis said.

# Professor Discusses World Religion At Global Community Conference

*He who loves himself lives in hell  
He who loves another lives on earth  
He who loves others lives in heaven  
But he who silently adores the self of all creatures lives in that self, and it is eternal.*

Nandini Iyer, lecturer in the UCSB Religious Studies Department, speaking in the "Non-violent Tradition in World Religions" segment of the third annual World Community in the 21st Century Conference, summarized the attitudes that have been held towards love by all the major religions of the world with this passage from an ancient Hindu scripture.

"Every religion must teach non-violence of some sort. This is clear from the fact that every religion, to be a religion, must teach the love of one's fellow human beings," Iyer said. "Since few would deny this, we might ask ourselves the question of how does violence come up at all in the context of religion. How is it that the history of most religions seems to be filled with accounts of horrendous massacres, unspeakable cruelties."

Iyer thinks this violence arises from one of two possible sources. One possibility is that the ideal of love, which is basic to religion, has been construed by followers of religions in a peculiar and almost self-contradictory way, resulting in the claim of "violence towards others for their own good."

Iyer added this attitude is one that does not find much acceptance in our own time, and yet historically has had

many practitioners. She cited the Spanish Inquisition and the Salem, Massachusetts witch hunts as examples. Although practice of these attitudes may be repudiated publically, Iyer said there are repeated examples of individuals who are "told by god to kill others," and those who starve, torture or kill their children because "they are possessed by the devil."

"We must face the fact that the germs of such perverse fanaticism still then seem to infect the religious psyche," Iyer said. "They erupt into publicized violence in only a limited number of cases. But a Christ, a Buddha or a Gandhi would, I am sure, ask us to examine our own consciences, each one of us, to see whether we do not unwittingly harbor such seeds of spiritual corruption in ourselves."

A second possible source of violence, according to Iyer, is that the universal love enjoined by the great religious teachers is interpreted as applying to only a select portion of humanity. It is consequently regarded as permissible to be violent toward some groups of people when

# Panelists Stress Need for Action in Movement Toward World Peace

"If we can send men to the moon and rockets to the stars why are we still so far apart?" poet and recording artist Stephen Longfellow Fiske sang, introducing the final meeting of the third annual World Community Conference on the role of individual action in the furtherance of world community.

Peter Lumsdaine, a former research consultant for the California Energy Extension Service and an

Enrichment. "I'm going door to door in Goleta asking for support of arms control," Lumsdaine said. "This gives me a chance to see how people feel about arms control and world peace."

Most people believe that nuclear war is fairly likely, Lumsdaine said. "Eighty percent want a freeze on the level of nuclear weapons."

He emphasized social change as the path to world peace, and questioned heavy reliance on education

life style." Society is searching for answers that will secure peace without causing revolutionary changes in our ways of living, he added.

"I think after one has seen the years of wars and torture one begins to see that this will not be changed through petitions, it will only be changed through drastic life (style) changes. We must risk our lives," Lumsdaine said. "We cannot continue to talk about peace while people are forking over thousands of dollars every year to build MX, Pershing 2 and Cruise missiles."

Leenda Gonzales, a former college student, and the second panelist introduced, made a major life change by volunteering to work in a soup kitchen line on L.A.'s skid row. Gonzales found her task of keeping the peace in the food line to be demanding. "As a woman and being small I found it difficult," and such desperate people

are hard to manage rationally, she said.

Through her work experience Gonzales has been able to test her beliefs about non-violence. "I have a strong commitment that non-violence is what is needed to change the world. It wasn't until I was put into a position where I had to test my beliefs that I

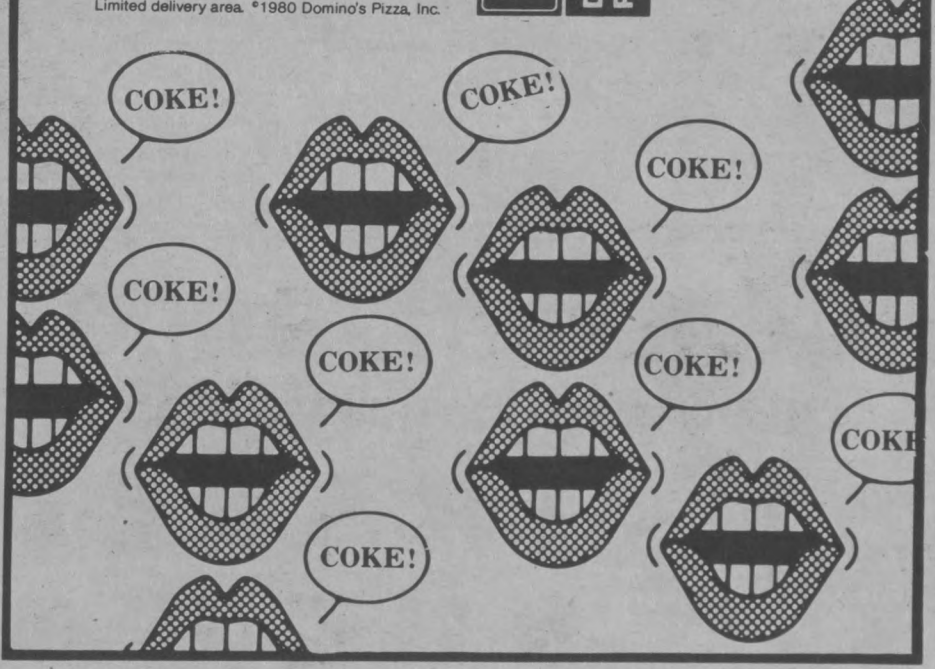

## Women in the 80's Rally Publicizes Women's Goals

In order to better acquaint women with the services available to them in the community and on the UCSB campus, the University of California Action Network sponsored a Women's Forum Rally Monday at noon in Storke Plaza.

The purpose of the rally was to bring women's groups together so women could find out what services and organizations exist to help them meet their goals, UCAN Director Holly Gold said. She stressed unity among the different groups will help improve the position of women in society. "All of the organizations have the same goal — to help women. If women can come to see the connections between the organizations, they may start working with various ones for their common goals and thus strengthen the women's movement," Julie Beck, UCAN member, said.

Beck spoke on the importance of continuing the struggle to improve the position of women in society. "We shouldn't feel as if everything's okay. The women's movement in the '60s made women stronger, but we still have a long way to go."

There are several reasons why it is difficult to be a woman in the '80s, Beck said. Economically, women still are not equal to men because they earn much less than men do, she said, adding socially, women are still the victims of violence, pornography and rape.

"There is still a general lack of respect for women. We're still considered second and it's hard to be a woman, especially a woman of color. You've got a lot against you," Beck said.

One reason for holding the rally is so all women realize they must work together, she said. "It is important that minorities be able to work with other women so feminism doesn't remain a movement for middle-class white women."

association on campus, also spoke on the importance of women's organizations, including the Associated Students Commission on the Status of Women and the American Indian Women's Support Group.

Other groups represented at the rally included the Gay and Lesbian Student Union and the Santa Barbara Commission on the Status of Women. "Even in a beautiful place like Santa Barbara women are suffering (from the restrictions society is placing on them)," Joan Woguis, representing the Santa Barbara Commission on the Status of Women, said.

Information tables were set up by the organizations represented at the rally and by others such as the Society of Women Engineers, the American Association of University Women, Shelter Services for Women, the National Organization of Women and the Rape Crisis Center.

Bev Strong from the Women's Community Building Project discussed the need for men and women who care about equality to get involved and take more active roles in the community.

"We are represented by less than 12 percent of those in political office who decide our future," Strong said. Representing UCAN, the

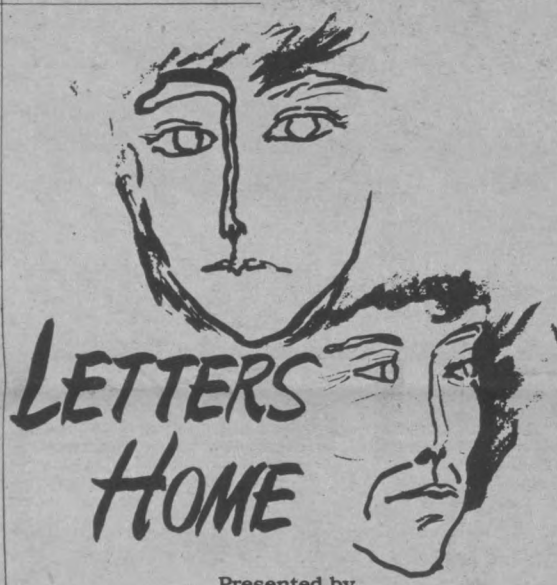

# County May Build A New Sewer To Improve Mission County Water

Construction of a new residential sewer project in Mission Canyon may soon be underway, according to Santa Barbara County officials.

"Mission Canyon has been a special problem area for many years. Sewage disposal needs immediate attention," Bob Flowers, chief engineer of the project, said. Currently, there are no sewer lines in the area.

"There is no question the Mission Canyon sewer project would greatly inconvenience the Mission Canyon residents," Flowers said, but added the project "offers the most areawide benefits at the least cost for the present time."

The sewer project will involve 906 home and land parcels. "Seventy percent of all the parcels have been declared eligible for grant funding. The installation of the systems will effect property value and subsequent use of property by homeowners." County Supervisor David Yager said. "The overall cost will be approximately \$3,200 per parcel."

The Mission Canyon

sewer project involves the building of underground sewage lines, sewage pumps and cleaning systems.

"The county will build the system, the city will maintain it with an increase in property taxes," Yager said. Construction of the system will take approximately one year.

This project is generally approved by the property owners involved, Flower said. Most of the

homeowners in the area realize even if they could get along without sewers for a while, the cost later would be greater, he added.

"Those who feel they do not need new sewers are unquestionably contributing to ground and surface water pollution in Mission Canyon," Flower said.

The project may be funded by the State Water Quality Board and the Federal Environmental Protection Agency. If not,

other funds must be determined because the State Water Control Board requires residents discontinue use of private disposal systems by 1986, according to a letter from Flower and associates to Mission Canyon residents.

"If the project's (funding) is abandoned, those residing in the areas which must be serviced will forfeit the county funding and will have to pay the cost themselves," Yager said.

(Continued from front page) sfferring our responsibility to the private sector," he said.

Miyoshi argued that the property owners do not lose anything by building the affordable units. He said low-income housing is "a human need" the county must meet.

The supervisors compromised with an amendment requiring only 25 percent of the units be affordable when the zoning designation is changed from non-residential to residential.

Since the required affordable housing might not be compatible with all developments, the supervisors approved the transfer of "affordable unit credits." The report explained the developer can use these credits to help fulfill the requirement for affordable units on his more expensive property. Thus the developer will be able to build an affordable project on another site, but in the same geographic area, for these credits.

The new amendment will also delete the "middle-income category" from the Housing Element. This results from recent increases in the median income level and the relative stability of the housing market, according to the county report. Originally, the middle-income category was created to fill a gap between the moderate income level and the cost of purchasing and renting housing.

**Staff Compiles Resource Handbook**

The UCSB Staff Assembly is compiling information for a comprehensive resource booklet which will provide vital knowledge about every department on campus, both academic and administrative.

The booklet, scheduled to be completed by spring 1984, will provide data on the personnel in each department and special services offered to students, faculty, staff, businesses, and the community.

The booklet will list any special programs, lectures or seminars a department might be holding. It will also include an explanation of how a department is set up. Any improvements currently planned or under way will be included in the booklet.

Besides departmental information, there will be a directory listing all local merchants, doctors and other service-oriented businesses. The booklet will also include maps of UCSB and Santa Barbara, coupons from various businesses, and employment opportunities for the staff.

A Staff Assembly subcommittee is responsible for compiling and arranging all the information for the booklet.

"The booklet will be a good source of information for the UCSB staff. The intentions are to give the staff a better idea of who is on campus, what the different department functions are, who is in each department, and to inform the staff of any special programs offered to them such as lectures or seminars," subcommittee

member Dete Jackson said.

"UCSB staff needs to be better informed on campus, to be more aware of what is available to them so they can take advantage of all that is offered," she added.

"It is going to be a booklet that will represent the staff as well as inform the staff," subcommittee member Martha Garrett said.

The booklet will be free to all staff members. Students and others who wish to purchase a booklet may do so at the UCSB bookstore next quarter.

"All the other Universities of California have a staff booklet except UCSB. The only reason we don't have one is because no one has taken the initiative to put a booklet together," subcommittee member Viviane Barton said, adding the aim of the booklet project is to help demystify the complicated university structure.

The booklet will be in paperback with advertisements on the inside covers. Merchants, businesses, and private individuals will purchase space. The price for the space varies depending on an advertisement's size and number of colors.

Ads and donations will provide the money for publishing the handbook. Remaining money will go into a scholarship fund. The scholarships will be used for "career enrichment" for staff members, enabling them to take a class which they might not be able to afford otherwise, Barton said.

"The size of the booklet will depend on what input we get from the departments and the community," Garrett said.

Barton urges any staff member who is interested in helping to call Garrett at 961-3800. Volunteers are needed for graphic layout, public relations, editing and compiling information.

Coalition, Billings does not support the demise of the public school system in the United States. "We need to amend the system and correct where it is needed, but there are a great number of very fine school districts and school teachers in the public system," he said.

Billings served as the religious liaison to Reagan during the 1980 campaign. He is currently the White House liaison from the Department of Education, supervisor of the 10 regional offices of the department, and supervisor of federal surplus properties. But, "my goal in life is not to be a bureaucrat," he said, adding he might consider returning soon to the private sector.

Jesse Jackson's campaign for the presidency will help the Republican party because, Billings feels, it is a divisive force in the Democratic Party. He also spoke highly of Jackson: "I think Jesse is a very charismatic person; I love to hear him speak. I think he has added pizzazz to what was an otherwise dull campaign."

There are areas in which Billings foresees rightist groups such as the Moral Majority can work with Jackson. Billings and Jackson share the same theology, both being Baptists. "We have the same interest in people, equal rights, justice for all." It is the politics which are used to achieve these ends which present any barriers, Billings said.

Women's issues, Billings said, are often blown out of proportion. "I don't think our society is going to rise and fall on them. I like women, don't get me wrong," he said. The breakdown of the family in society relates to women because it stems from the necessity for both parents to work, he said.

"I think the role (of women) is just as vital as that of the male species," he said. "I think they should be just as involved, work for the same goals, run for the same office and we ought to vote for them. Not because they are male or female, but because they present our position and because they are the best person we can get there."

**Nuclear Proliferation**

**Survey Seeks Arms Race Solution**

In an attempt to bring together citizens' views on nuclear weapons proliferation, the Santa Barbara chapter of the United Nations Association is compiling a summary of recommended solutions to be sent to high-ranking government officials and United Nations leaders.

The UNA is concerned with receiving input from the community on ways to resolve nuclear proliferation, Director of Program Development and Global Education Adele Somers said.

The UNA's Santa Barbara chapter conducted an open-ended survey which states the problem of nuclear proliferation and asks for proposed solutions.

The UNA-USA Project on Nuclear Proliferation hopes to create an increase in public awareness and utilize public opinion in policy-making in this field, Somers said. "We want to make a change in the attitude of the direction (of decision) of the world leaders of all

countries."

Acting as coordinator of the project and responsible for drawing up the recommendations, Somers explained the recommendations have come from different organizations in the community.

According to Somers, the UNA has received about 30 responses to the survey, and will continue to take suggestions until Feb. 15.

The final suggestions will be summarized in a report to be submitted to high-ranking governmental officials, including the president and members of Congress, as well as different United Nations members' leaders. By coordinating recommendations from other communities and sharing them with the national advisory council, "the UNA will act as a forum for people to communicate through," Somers said.

"The UNA is set up in order to help the U.N. meet with the media to clear up misunderstandings and keep its views visible to the public," Genevieve Nowlin,

board member of the Santa Barbara UNA chapter, said. "The local UNA is an organization to counter all the negative information our country gets."

At a UNA convention in New York last May, many resolutions came from our "grass roots (efforts)," Nowlin said. The national leadership has a wide-ranging panel of experts, but most of the ideas were from organizations in the community. From that meeting, she said, a multi-lateral issue program was proposed. The program is a network allowing anyone to make concerned and involved decisions.

"The local UNA is involved in developing programs on global education and wants the organization to be used as a contact for using the U.N. as an instrument for world peace," Somers said.

The recommendations from the area will be analyzed by the Santa Barbara chapter at a meeting on March 5 of the representatives of organizations and interested

individuals, Nowlin said.

"We will try to arrive at a consensus, and that will be presented to the National UNA-USA for their benefit," she added.

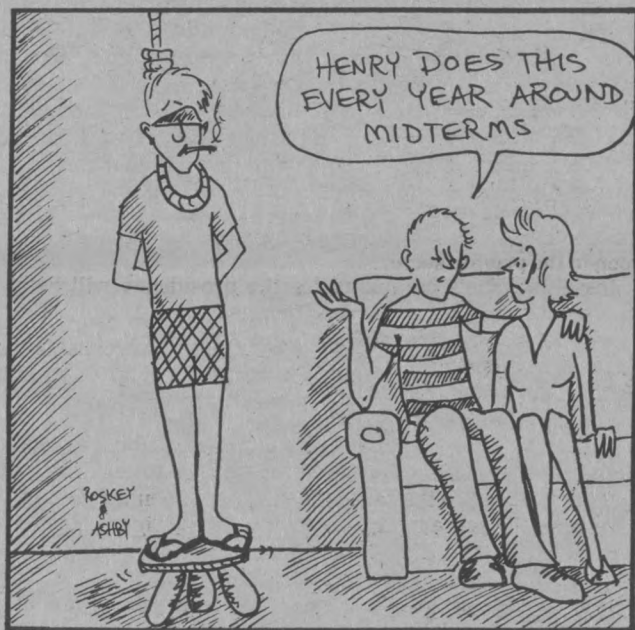

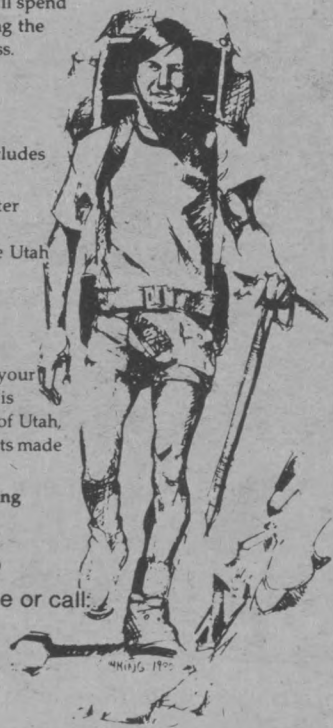

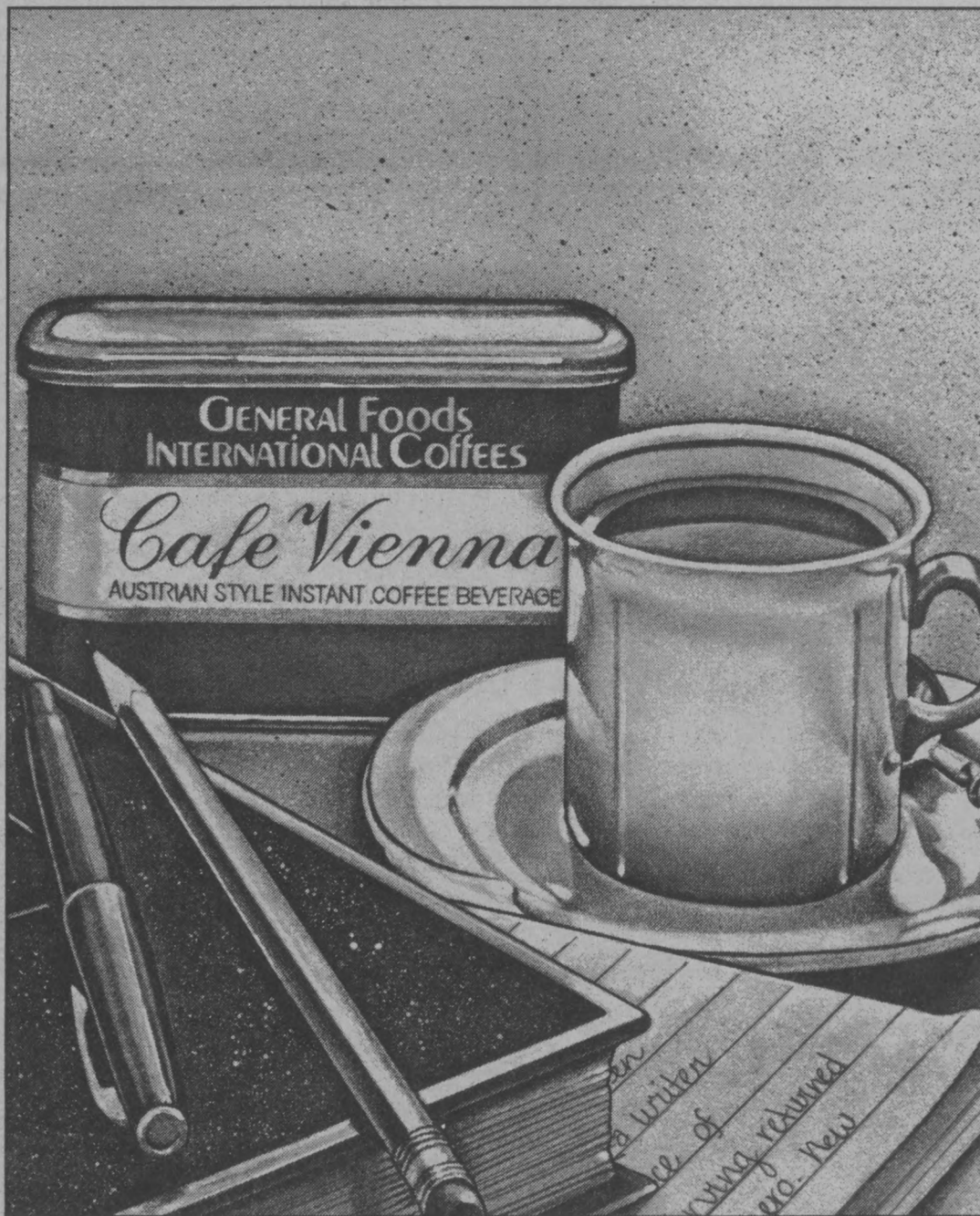

## Separation of Church and State...

(Continued from front page) Jerry Falwell, who thought on a grander scale. With Falwell donating \$1.4 million for the first year, the two founded what Falwell called the Moral Majority.

Billings spelled out the original purposes of the organization. First, he said, they wanted to establish a network of mainly Christian (but not all) people who felt the same on certain issues like abortion and the importance of the family. "We felt the way we could reach people who had not been involved before was through churches." Between July of 1979 and July of 1980, the Moral Majority had established chapters in all 50 states.

The organization's second purpose, Billings continued, was "to disseminate information through this

network. From our vantage point we tried to identify the good guys and the bad guys (in Congress)... and how they stood on the issues."

The third purpose "was to register voters through a concentrated voter registration drive.... They (Moral Majority) found out the voting requirements of states and gave them to the preachers." He added, "We conservatively registered four million new voters."

Finally, the Moral Majority sought to encourage the people to "come out and vote and become politically active."

As an example of the movement's success, Billings cited the case of Alaska, where evangelical preachers have given their support to the Republican party. As a result the Moral Majority literally took over

the state's Republican party. Billings said, however, it was not the organization's intention to be a part of the Republican party, nor is it now.

Billings said the direction of the Moral Majority has changed in some aspects since its inception in 1979. "We started out as a grass roots organization to involve people...but gradually since the 1980 election it has swung over to the position of being a lobbying group."

The Moral Majority will play a less significant role in 1984, Billings said, unless it's an "extremely close race" and it becomes necessary to "mobilize the troops". He added, however, that since 1977 there has been a proliferation of religious right groups, so the Moral Majority would only make up a segment of the

movement, though a large one.

Billings was asked by the audience his stand on various issues. Although the Moral Majority supports prayer in the public schools, Billings said though he agrees in principle with it, he does not promote the idea. "If we're going to do this and subject the children in the school to prayer, who's prayer is it going to be?...I don't think it's fair to say we're going to emphasize this prayer over another prayer."

While his son William, who spoke at UCSB three weeks ago, advocates the abolition of the public school system, Billings said, "I think education begins in the home...but there's a place for public schools like there's a place for private schools.

(Continued from front page) findings. The proposal then returns to the state for further review, he explained.

Among the wildlife inhabiting the slough, the EIR cites seven species of amphibians, 14 species of reptiles, and 32 species of land mammals. Two hundred seventy-nine species of birds habitate the slough at least seasonally.

Three species of animals inhabiting the slough — the red-legged frog, the coast horned lizard, and the badger — are

uncommon on the coastal plain. Seven species of the birds are considered rare, threatened, or endangered by federal or state governments. Several species of fish and invertebrates also exist in the area.

The EIR also acknowledges effects on archeological sites, areas once used by Indians for religious and ceremonial purposes, due to relocation of Los Carneros Creek.

When the final decision concerning airport expansion is reached by the state, the proposal could be approved even if there is an environmental impact, Cummings said.

## Posting Commission Cleans Up...

(Continued from front page) the kiosks clean," Lopilato said. "We have to work around the mentality of posting anywhere people will look; it just turns into lots of trash on the walls."

Once this goal is attained, the commission hopes to regulate all advertising on campus.

In the past, the kiosks

generally were popular forms of advertising, Lopilato said. However, when the kiosks were full, no one cleaned them, so people started to post illegally so their advertisements could be seen, he explained.

"Most people posted illegally because that was the only way they could post," Lees said.

"No one bothered to keep up the kiosks," Lopilato said. "We'd like to keep the kiosks up to date so that people aren't mesmerized by a bunch of posters."

Advertising on kiosks has become an inadequate

means of getting attention, Lopilato said. The overcrowded kiosks no longer provide the same spotlight for groups' advertising as they did in the past.

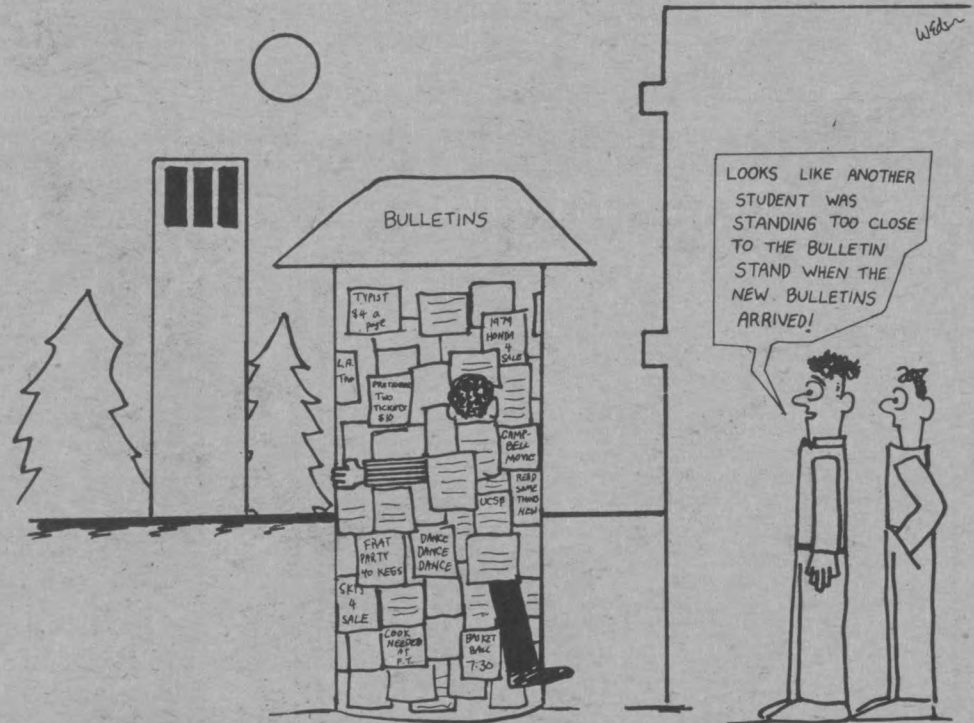
"We knew what the situation was like and thought advertising wasn't that effective on campus," Lees said. "Then we thought we could do something about it."

The commission is stopping all unlawful posting and regulating future advertising. "We're slowly cleaning up and still getting the word out to people," Lees said.

Rules and regulations concerning posting are available to groups, though they have been disregarded in the past, Lopilato said. "Rules have existed, but no one has enforced them."

The commission plans to make the rules more available to advertisers in the future by putting copies in groups' mailboxes. "We want to make sure that before any advertising is done (people) talk to us and everything is clear on the rules," Lopilato said.

If these rules are broken, offenders will be fined, (Please turn to pg.24, col.1)

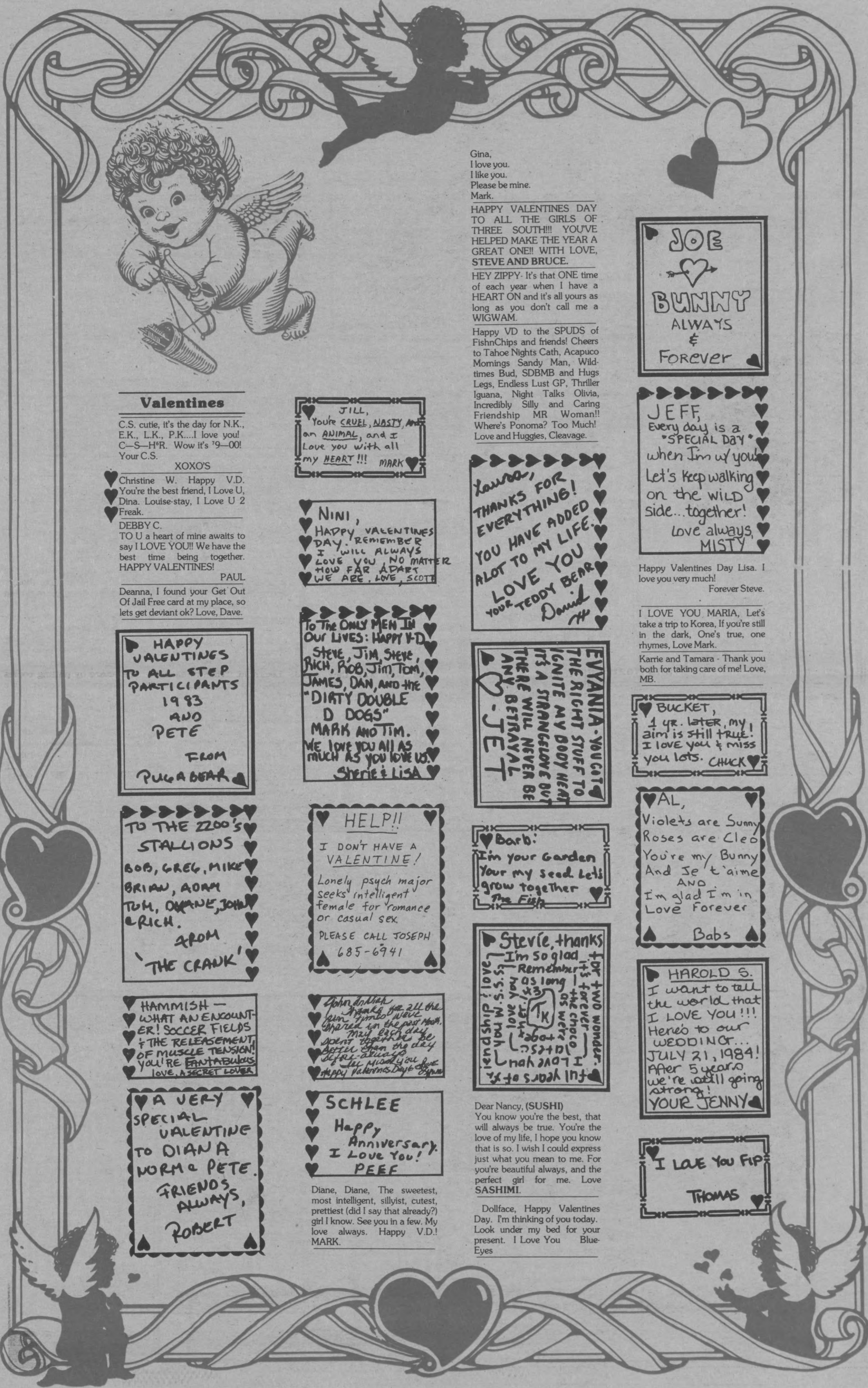

**Baseball Team Still Rolling Along**

Bring on the National Championship!

What's all the excitement about, you ask? It's the UCSB men's baseball team, riding a nine game winning streak and looking unbeatable to everyone so far. The Gauchos swept three games this past weekend from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, including a doubleheader on Saturday. They began the weekend sweep dramatically on Friday with a four-run ninth inning rally to beat the Mustangs 4-3.

The winning run came on a bases loaded double by rightfielder Jim Friedl with one out and the Gauchos down 3-2. "He (SLO pitcher, Larry McEvoy) was throwing fastballs to get out of the inning, so I was looking fastball," Friedl said after the game. "I thought it was caught," Friedl added, "but then I saw that the rightfielder had lost the ball in the sun."

As the two teams went into the bottom of the ninth, the Mustangs had a 3-0 lead, and the way the Gauchos had hit all day, it looked like the first loss of the year. However, the Mustang pitchers had other plans. Pitcher Jeff Deal walked Derek Vanacore and Dave Stewart to start the inning. After a flyout, pinch-hitter Kent McBride singled in Vanacore. Bill Geivett worked a walk off of Deal, and that brought in McEvoy from the bullpen. Eric Johnson, not looking like a freshman with the game on the line, battled the count to 3-2 before being walked.

Friedl stepped up to the plate, and with the count at 1-1, he lofted a flyball that at first appeared to be a sacrifice fly to tie the game. However, Mustang rightfielder Monty Waltz lost the ball in the sun, which allowed Paul Morehouse (pinch-running for McBride) and Geivett to score.

"We didn't play very well, but we'll take it," commented Coach Ferrar after the game. Ferrar thought the game was a typical early season game, since the two teams made moves that would not have occurred had the game been for the national championship. "We again played excellent defense," Ferrar added. "Sal (Gaucho catcher Sal Nicolosi) threw very well, and the bench really came together near the end of the game."

The bench had lots to cheer about on Saturday. The Gauchos apparently did not want to wait for any ninth inning heroics, drubbing the Mustangs 14-4 and 13-0.

In the first game, the Gauchos' bats erupted for nineteen hits, including three each by Bill Geivett, Kent McBride and Joe Kmak. Pitcher Steve French had little trouble picking up his second victory of the year, with relief help from Mike Fay and Frank Spear. The turning point of the day for the Gauchos happened in the fourth inning. Jim Friedl was at bat, and he was thrown at by the Mustang pitcher, possibly in retaliation for Friedl's game winning hit on Friday. Dave Stewart stepped up and hit a home run, a 410-foot shot over the centerfield fence.

"I didn't expect us to be so dominating," Ferrar said, "but they fired us up by throwing at Friedl's head. It was called from the dugout. You don't do that intentionally." As Ferrar saw it, there were two ways that the Gauchos could retaliate: "Do the same thing, or run and run and run and just humiliate them." The Gauchos obviously took the

second option, proceeding to steal six bases, being caught only once.

The second game was not much different. Pitcher Brad Kinney went five innings, striking out seven and giving up only two hits in increasing his record to two wins and no defeats. "He threw some gas," remarked catcher Rick Irwin. "He was hitting spots well. We stayed

inside with the fastball and jammed them all game. Brad's composure was very good."

The Gauchos' offensive attack was led by Irwin, Friedl and Erik Johnson. The rookie shortstop had three hits, including two runs batted in. "I didn't think I would be playing so much and so well," Johnson said. "I feel really confident

now. The more time I get to play, the better. I feel at home with a good team. All the guys have a good attitude. Everybody picks each other up."

The Gauchos seem to have it all together right now. The

defense has been excellent, and the pitching has been doing a commendable job. They put their winning streak on the line today against Cal Poly Pomona, 2:30 at the Campus Diamond.

# Losses To UCLA and Pepperdine Tough Weekend For Swim Team

The Pepperdine Waves left the Gaucho swimmers in their wake last Sunday on their way to posting a 70-43 upset.

The lopsided score poorly represents how tight this meet actually was, the outcome of many races came down to the finishing touch.

The first event of the meet gave a good indication of the things to come as Pepperdine's Chris Monohan defeated Gaucho Bob Lang in the one meter diving by a score of 246.4 to 245.9.

The total amount of time separating first and second place for the entire meet was a mere 12 seconds, and that includes such distance races as the 1000-yard free, 500-yard free, and both 400-yard relays.

"It was a tough one to lose," Gaucho Head Coach Bernie Stenson said. "I've got to hand it to Pepperdine though, they swam very, very quickly today. We were fired up for this meet, but they were hungry."

Coming into the meet Pepperdine was ranked second behind UCSB in the PCAA, and despite the 27 point victory will probably continue to rank second.

In swimming, the dual meets are usually little more than tune-ups for the championship meet, a meet where tapers and team depth far outweigh dual meet records. From the beginning, however, it was clear that this meet was especially important to Pepperdine.

In practically every event the Waves had someone swim a season best time to nudge UCSB at the finish. Peter Rohde's 1:54.12 in the 200 individual medley, Scott Grasmoen's 1:42.51 200 free, Darren Phelan's 4:35.86 500 free, and Duane Fiene's 1:58.13 200 back were just a few examples of Pepperdine's surprisingly fast times.

UCSB had some very good performances turned in by Tore Blichfeldt, Mike Carpenter, Ken Tittle, and Jon Otsuki.

Blichfeldt showed his versatility by winning both the 100 and 1,000-yard freestyles, he was the only double winner for UCSB.

His time of 9:30.16 in the 1,000 was his best of the season despite holding back his last 100, and the 46.27 100 time took over a second off his previous best.

Carpenter's 1:54.61 improved an already fast 200 IM time by a full second and a half, a second better than last year's shaved PCAA time.

Tittle held off a fierce comeback by Paul Marble and Daniel Su to take the 200 fly with a 1:52.29. The time moves him up to the top spot in the PCAA rankings.

Otsuki dropped his 100 free time into the 46's and took part in a surprising Gaucho sweep of the event.

"It was a good meet for us," said Stenson, "but it was a better one for Pepperdine. You know it's easy to put too much emphasis on dual meets and lose sight of the larger

goals such as winning PCAA's and doing well at NCAA's."

The Gauchos have a history of keeping things in perspective just ask the Long Beach 49'rs who have on occasion beaten UCSB in the dual meet only to be blown away at PCAA's.

But last Sunday was Pepperdine's day of victory as they dunked one of their coaches (a tradition saved for big meets), and Sunday night was party time. And for the Gauchos — 16 days until "pee-cee-two-eh's."

On Saturday UCLA came to town and easily swam away with the win while allowing the Gauchos to score 49 points.

For many UCSB spectators the highlight of the meet was the opening cheer because from that point on there was little to cheer about.

The Gauchos swam some extremely good times but for UCLA, one of the top teams in the nation, it was show time.

Tittle, for example, swam a very good 51.32 100 fly only to finish third behind Tim Jager (49.45) and Bruce Dorman (50.05). Blichfeldt swam a blazing 1:41.08 200 free yet finished behind Bruce Hayes' 1:39.27.

UCSB shouldn't have to deal with those types of problems when they face Cal State Northridge next Saturday.

knew that non-violence would work."

Gonzales realizes it is possible to change the violent world around us by learning to understand and control fear. "As I overcome my fear I allow others to overcome theirs and we can relate to each other in a more positive way," she said.

Gonzales has found stepping into uncomfortable situations produces change. "We are all in a culture of fear and this locks us. Running away from this or stepping away from it isn't going to change things."

She also believes individuals must shoulder more of the burden for change. "Personal responsibility is believing that government isn't going to change things but that people and individuals change things," she said.

Gene Sharp, director of the Program on Non-violent Sanctions in the Center for International Affairs at Harvard University, proposed a shift from

violent sanctions to non-violent means. "One of the crucial problems is that our society relies on violent sanctions; predominantly military," he said. "Witnessing that does not get rid of it."

Society's conviction that violence is real power must be changed, Sharp said. "There are non-violent ways of wielding power. This must be worked out specifically. A non-violent society can be achieved."

Sharp sees non-violence as one key to understanding one's personal life. "Our lack of understanding of this method of action is what has left us in either a position of passivity or in reliance on military action."

Sharp emphasized that all individuals can contribute to the peace movement. "Don't evaluate what you can do on the basis of what you have done in the past. You can learn how to be a good writer or speaker." Within one's own talent one can build on the ideas of non-violence, he said.

Fiske sees improved relations between people as one springboard to peace. "The challenge is to find this common ground," Fiske said. He is motivated by his music and poetry to reach out to others. "There's something in us that wants to realize our connectedness," he said.

George McRobie, co-founder of Intermediate Technological Development Group in London, discussed the need to take power away from big government and industry and return it to the community. "Let's take back from a very oppressive economic system some of the power," he said.

McRobie used the struggle against nuclear power as an example of how people can fight big institutions. "The best (non-violent) attack on nuclear power is to cut down on electricity consumption."

Grant ended the conference by underscoring the principle of solidarity as the word of the age. The question of how we can

make it all work on a daily basis is continually asked and discovering the way to universality seems to answer this question, he said.

probably \$25 — the amount of the bond each group is required to post before advertising on campus. "We also keep files on groups that have violated in the past," Lopilato said.

The commission hopes the kiosks will then be used to their full capacity and effectiveness. Off-campus groups are forbidden to use the kiosks and the commission plans to send letters to these organizations in-

forming them of this rule. "We want to let people know what we're doing before we take any serious action," Lopilato explained.

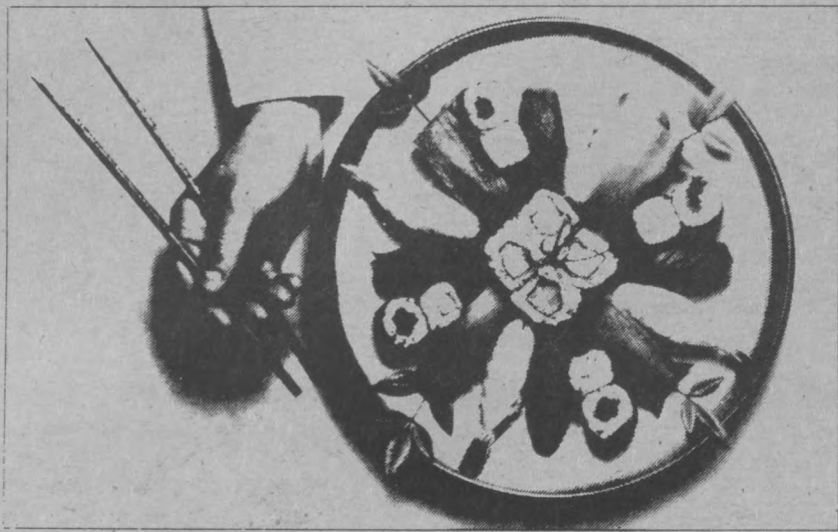
In addition to the clean-up of kiosks, the commission is looking for new methods of advertising. They traveled to UCLA, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, and Cal State Northridge in order to see other forms of advertising. An alternative method found at Cal Poly is a computerized "scoreboard" that

lists all upcoming group activities. A funding source for a similar sign at UCSB has not yet been determined, however, the committee is looking for private donors.
