Council Approves Vote of Publications, Plans Dinner

New student body officers and newly-elected class representatives to the legislature for 1937-38 held sway in Pine hall last night, as they met, under the chairmanship of Danny D'Alfonso, president, with this year's governing body.

Appointments to standing committee heads include Bill McKenzie, social committee chairman; Dorothy Hornor, welfare chairman; Petie McKinney, rally chairman; and finance chairman, Ed Cole.

The editorship of La Cumbre for next year was thrown open to the student body at large. Written applications by anyone interested must be presented to Danny D'Alfonso as soon as possible.

The recommendation of the publications board for the editorship of El Gaucho and the student handbook were approved and will be announced at the official El Gaucho dinner Saturday night. Old and new councils will meet next Wednesday night at the Barbara hotel for dinner.

Mass Action

We are not operating, at Santa Barbara State college a penal institution. We wish not to mask the weakness of our student body as a whole, or its members individually, in repeated instances of petty thievery and flagrant disregard of all that is worthy and traditional in the institution.

Innumerable cases of theft, occurring during the past few months at the college, have been quickly shelved by the "hush-hush" attitude so characteristic of those wishing to avoid collective condemnation for a personal crime.

A childish prank or a practical joke is no excuse for the continuance of such outrageous conditions at this school. The majority of students appreciate to full extent a sense of humor, but a humorous idea, carried to an extreme, becomes a loathsome, warped, something-to-be-shunned action.

A perfect example of the lowest type activity which has been the misfortune of State to witness during the past years is the deliberate defacing of the recently-presented Senior Bench. Following the dedication of such a gift by the most active senior class in many a day, such a deplorable act is discouraging, to say the least, and damnable, to put it mildly.

The well-defined purpose of the Gavel and Key organization and the Welfare committee in calling for a mass protest of the student body, is not primarily set forth to recover the stolen article, but to punish the culprit, should he be discovered, "to the full extent of the law," and ostracize him by expulsion and the censure of public opinion.

There is no need for a few persons to point out the possibility that the crime was done by a high school or junior high school student, as there have been, in the past, all too many instances of this kind traceable only to our own population.

Today, third hour, it is the duty of every student body and faculty member, with any respect for his college and hope for its future, to be present at the special assembly. When such a spontaneous movement is advanced by the students themselves, it may be easily recognized that the college is advancing toward an ultimate perfection, with regard to high and worthwhile ideals in all activities.

The special incident, regarding the defacing of the Senior Bench, is an insult to the student body, a definite slap in the face to the senior class, and a slur upon the past, present and future of the college. No criticism is too harsh, nor public opinion too strong, directed toward the existence of such a situation.

The keynote of the proceeding is protest. Surely, it needs no solicitation or compulsion. This aforementioned disregard of all our standards, must be yanked, not coaxed, from our institution.—THE EDITOR.

With Bill Hoyt, Senior president, Thomas Keating of the Santa Barbara Police department; President C. L. Phelps, and Dr. Charles Jacobs, dean of the upper division, as speakers, the only student protest gathering of the year will be under the direction of Denny McArthur, student body president.

Gaucha Staff Has Dinner Tomorrow

McKinney, Hoyt, Follett, in Charge; Fraternity Gives Silver Cup

The traditional dinner given by members of El Gaucho staff, Alpha Phi Gamma, the print shop and the feature writing class will be held tomorrow night, May 29, at El Cortijo. Bill Hoyt, president of Alpha Phi Gamma, Petie McKinney, editor of El Gaucho, and Don Follett, organizer and president of the Gavel and Key, will take charge of the meeting.

Guests and sponsors include Mr. and Mrs. John Porter, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Bennett, and Dean and Mrs. William Ashworth. Invitations have also been issued to prominent down town newspaper men.

At this time the person who has been selected by the publications board and council to succeed Petie McKinney as editor of El Gaucho for 1937-38 will be named. Bill Hoyt will present a silver cup honoring the all-star reporter and five other certificates for excellent work done on the paper this year.

A special new award to be given by El Gaucho, Alpha Phi Gamma and the instructor of the printing class, will be awarded to the outstanding member of the print shop for work done on the paper.

Coming out of a long series of occurrences throughout the year and climaxing in the stealing of the copper plaque from the Senior class bench within five days after the gift was presented, requests for a student meeting were given official backing and sanction by administration leaders. The disappearance of the metal plaque, cemented into the stone bench, occurred sometime over the last weekend. Indications were that the plaque had been chipped out with a sharp instrument, with the probability that it was bent in the removal. First notice of the missing article came Monday morning.

Other offenses which have come with constant regularity include the disappearance of a valuable oil painting of a State co-ed from the Art department, the prying open of display cases in the quad with baseball pictures enclosed being taken, the losing of money and clothes in the physical education dressing rooms, the placing of bottles behind the tires of a professor's car, the loss of candidates, pictures in the student body and A.W.S. elections, football pictures from the controller's office, and many books, pens, and personal articles.

Under the direction of Fred Lambourne, president of the Gavel and Key, and Bill Murphy, chairman of the welfare committee, members of the former organization will make announcements to all classes in session during second hour urging attendance of all students.

Pollock Directs New Bureau

From Capt. Paul Jones, assistant dean, official announcement of the opening of the college employment bureau, under the sponsorship of the Gavel and Key, with Dave Pollock as director, was made this week.

The new bureau will hold office hours from nine until ten thirty o'clock each morning in the outer dean's office. Activity of the new group will continue throughout the summer session, with all local merchants being contacted. Cooperation of the Boosters club has been assured in backing the move. Application blanks for all men wishing jobs are now ready for use at the office headquarters.

In commenting on the plan, Capt. Jones stated, "The purpose of the new bureau is two-fold; to aid students who prove their needs and ability to hold the position offered, and secondly, to provide local merchants and townspeople with a college bureau through which dependable young people may be hired."

The silence was shattered by the steady rat-a-tat-tat of a machine gun, bombs were bursting in the cool, crisp air, and the steady monotone of blood curdling cries from injured warriors gave stark evidence of a terrifying encounter.

But, all of this will seem quite mild when Coach "Spud" Harder lets his 1937 edition of Gaucho gridders loose this afternoon in the Annual Spring preview at four bells on the turf of Laguna Field. Members of the squad will be divided into two well-oiled speed sections, representing the Valley and the Coast.

Veterans Sparkle

Last year's veterans will sparkle on both teams and the Valley will offer the ultimate in linemen, while the efforts of the coasters will rely on speed merchants of the backfield.

The Coast outfit received an unwelcome blow when it was learned late yesterday afternoon that their star, Howard Yeager, all-conference half-back, would be on the sidelines with an injured ankle.

The Valley pigskinners will be headed by dynamic Doug Oldershaw, who will lead them from his guard position. Ends will be silent Dan Mulock, stellar defensive man and Frosh graduate, Bill Jessup.

All-Conference tackle "Buzz" Busby and Fred Valenzuela will endeavor to stop the coast onslaught from their respective tackle spots.

Donald Hart, Oldershaw and Dewitt Trehwitt will form the center of the (Lillies of the) Valley team.

Thompson Wins Gym Meet

Winning recognition as an all-round gymnast, Norman Thompson took first place with a total of 120 points out of a possible 160 in the first competitive meet of the Gym team. Second place winner was Howard McQuigg, with a total of 65 points, and Bob Williams third place with a total of 62½ points. Judges were Dr. Elmer Noble and Mr. Hal Davis.

Norman Thompson, the winner, besides receiving a medal in recognition of his feat, will also have his name placed upon the perpetual trophy, a gold cup donated to the club by Dr. Noble.

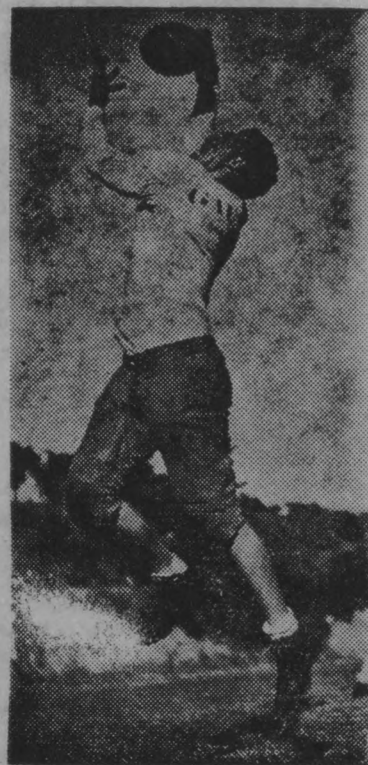
Many Controversies
