GREEN GROW THE LILACS' LAST REPEATS PLAY TONIGHT

The student production of *Green Grow the Lilacs*, which opened at the Riviera Auditorium last night will be repeated again tonight Saturday night at 8:30 p. m.

The play, which is under the direction of Theodore Hatlen, was written by Lynn Riggs. Its first production established a new vogue for Americana in dramatic production. More recently it has caused

another theatrical revolution when it was made the basis of the all-time musical success, Rogers and Hammerstein's *Oklahoma!*

The local production includes its cast such famous names in campus dramatic activities as Wal-Beaver, who appears as Curly, male romantic lead, Gill Johnston, as Jeeter, the jealous villain, Marie Willett, Beverly Benedict, Frank Borgotta and Ted Shank, as Laurie, who plays the part of Laurie, is new on this campus and she has made numerous appearances in plays prior to her entrance at UCSB. Many other familiar names are to be found in all parts in the cast, which is one of the largest ever to appear at the college stage.

The play is an exciting one, featuring folk songs, tense drama, and romance. It has many tense moments, including the scene between Laurie and Jeeter and the packed shiveree.

Mr. Robert L. Clark and his stage crew are to be commended for their excellent sets, especially considering the lack of space on the stage of the Riviera Auditorium.

Although the publication deadline of *El Gaucho* prohibits an actual review, it can recommend this production on the basis of the very promising rehearsals of the play.

Red Cross Course Opens Next Week

Students anticipating summer jobs or regular employment as physical education teachers, camp counselors, recreation leaders, swimming instructors, etc., are eligible, with certain prerequisites, to enroll in the Instructor's courses in first aid and in life saving and water safety, which open next week at Santa Barbara.

Students who hold current senior lifesaving certificates and are at least twenty years of age may enroll in the Water Safety Instructor's course, which will meet from 3:30 to 5:30 on weekday afternoons, May 17-25 inclusive, at the Municipal Pool.

Candidates for the First Aid Instructor's certificate must be at least twenty years of age, hold a current standard or advanced first aid certificate, and expectation of teaching first aid. The class will meet on weekday evenings, May 17-25, 7:30 to 9:30 p. m., at the chapter house, 1408 Chapala St. Complete details regarding these courses of training may be obtained from Terry H. Dearborn, director of Red Cross Water Safety in the Santa Barbara area. His office is in room MG 202.

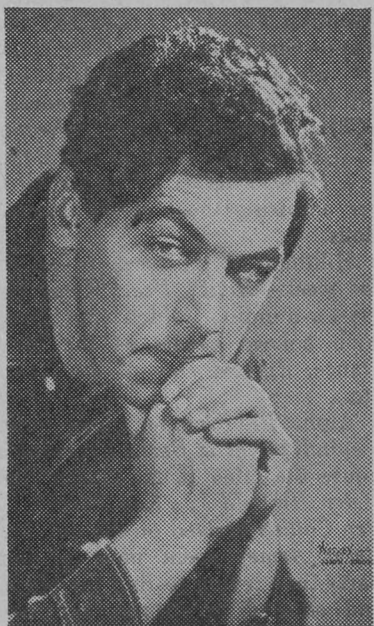
"Let's be Bear-like" Movement Hits SBC

ELECTION RULED INVALID

Thursday the Associated Students Election Committee, composed of June Marie Davidson, Chairman, Al Hardy, George Crilley and Larry Wathey, declared the election of Wednesday, May 12th, void. They took this action as a result of protests citing five violations of election regulations. The five citations are:

1. Misunderstanding as to Senior voting restrictions;
2. Electioneering at polls;
3. Ballot shortage and resulting confusion;
4. Illegal publicity;
5. Mesa campus polls open only two hours.

These violations were cited and accepted in the form of a motion.

Action on the protests must wait on the formal meeting of the Board of Election. Any action taken at that time will be subject to the Board of Appeals. The primary concern of the formal meeting will be discussion of the publicity violations. All candidates were familiar with these regulations and some action will be taken.

All publicity in violation of the regulations has been removed or will be immediately removed.

A record turnout of twelve hundred votes were cast last Wednesday. This indicates a student interest in the outcome of an election without precedent in recent history. It is hoped that in the postponed election the balloting is as large.

Voting will take place at one poll on the Riviera campus. The poll will be equipped with five booths. Students on the Mesa will have one poll. The election will be held on Tuesday, May 17th, and Wednesday, May 18th. Run-offs will be held Friday, May 20th.

Faculty members will be expected to defend themselves against the students in softball as one of the features of the day. Schedule of events:

Physics Club Prepares Art Festival Exhibit

"Fifty Years of Nuclear Physics" is the theme of an exhibit prepared by the Physics Club of Santa Barbara College for the Festival of Arts, which opened yesterday and continues through Sunday.

Located in the main corridor of the County Courthouse, the exhibit includes charts and equipment. Members of the Physics Club and the Physics staff are on hand to demonstrate the equipment and to discuss its operation and use.

The students received advisory aid from faculty members of the Department of Physical Sciences in preparing the exhibit.

One of the instruments on display is a Geiger counter which not only gives a visible indication of radioactivity on a meter, but also makes the ionization effect audible through a lounspeaker.

An electroscope is also on view, and the "tracks" made by ionizing particles photographed in a Wilson cloud chamber are projected onto a screen through a microscope.

The exhibit also includes a number of charts. One illustrates the "particles" of nuclear physics—proton, electron, positron, neutron, alpha particle, deuteron, meson, and gamma rays discovered in the last 50 years.

Other charts in the exhibit depict nuclear reactions, uses of atomic energy, progress of nuclear physics and similar developments.

A full day is planned by the committee including:

10:00-12:00 beach time, swimming.

12:00-2:00 sports (volleyball, touch football, folk dancing).

12:00-3:00 social dancing.

2:00-3:00 lunch.

3:00-3:10 rally.

3:45-5:00 faculty-student baseball game.

Play time: Social dancing by the sea is being arranged by Shirley Hillis Perkins of the Social Committee. A dance floor will be put on the sand and amplified popular records will furnish the music.

Swimming will be watched over by specially provided life guards, according to Dorothy Runde and the College Recreation Association who are planning and organizing all sports for the event. Water ball and other water sports are to be organized.

Touch football is being reserved for the men. Folk dancing and mixed volleyball will be open to participation by all. Stunt races should provide for contestants as well as onlookers, according to Miss Runde.

Food: Lunch menu will include spaghetti, mixed green salad, french bread, milk, and ice cream. Twenty-five cent tickets for this complete lunch are on sale in the Quad or may be obtained from any member of Phrateres. Tickets will also be available at the beach tomorrow. These tickets are only for the lunch and are not required for participation in any of the other events, all of which are free of charge.

Orgs cooperating: Campus service organizations are participating to make this picnic a really big day, say Henry and Stewart. College Recreation Association and President Dorothy Runde are in charge of sports. Dorothy Adameck and Phrateres are selling tickets. Invitations to the faculty have been sent out by Spurs. Squires and George Crilley are managing the lunch. Dancing is being provided for by Shirley Perkins and the Social Committee. Alpha Phi Gamma and Key and Scroll have been working as a joint publicity committee for the event.

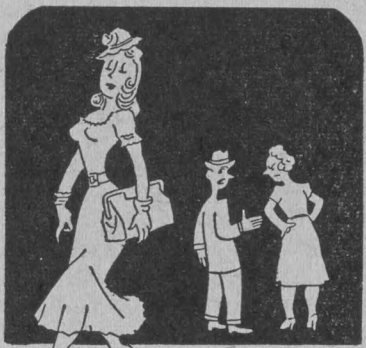

Miss Jean Bellinger and Miss Jean Hodgkins, both assistant professors of physical education (women), attended the Southwest District convention of the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation held in Phoenix, Arizona, on Friday and Saturday.

Miss Bellinger was particularly interested in a dance symposium held in connection with the convention.

Miss Gladys R. Van Fossen, associate professor of physical education (women), recently returned from the University of Wisconsin, where she attended the biennial convention of the Athletic Federation of College Women as faculty adviser to the Women's Athletic Association on this campus.

She was accompanied by four student members of the local association, Elizabeth James, Mary Mott, Clara Allison, and Barbara Rutherford.

The opening address was made by Miss Betty Hicks, former national women's amateur golf champion, who stressed the need for non-discrimination and opportunity for all to participate in recreational activities.

More than 400 delegates representing 144 colleges and universities from 39 states attended the convention. Sixty-four faculty advisors met concurrently.

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IRVINE'S LINKSMEN IN STOCKTON FOR CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS TODAY

Coach Bill Irvine sent a four-man golf squad to Stockton Wednesday to participate in the 2C2A tourney this week-end, and from all indications, the Gaucho linksmen expect to finish in second or third spot behind San Jose State.

Ernie Reid, Sam Randolph, Don Nergord, and Pete Reid were the four highest qualifying men chosen to make the trip for Santa Barbara. Each man is capable of shooting very good golf and all four of them have done as well as 70. Ernie Reid and Nergord are both three-year lettermen.

Eli Bariteau Jr. of San Jose is favored to grasp the lowest score as he can shoot between 68 and 70. The Spartans will back him with a team that was NCAA champion last year and that has won the conference title five years in a row. This is the reason for Irvine's pessimism and his statement that his lads should finish no higher than second.

COP is host college this year. San Diego, Fresno, and Cal Poly round out the six schools entered in the event.

Santa Barbara's men have won four and lost one match so far this year, beating Cal Poly twice, Cal Tech and UCLA once and losing only to Loyola on the Lions' course. After this week-end, a return match against Loyola is slated for the local links.

The championships will be played on Friday and Saturday, 18 holes on each day, and the lowest total medal score of the respective teams will win the title.

ANNUAL FRESNO RELAYS LURE CARTER'S ACE CINDERMEN FOR MEET TOMORROW

Tomorrow afternoon at Ratcliffe Stadium in Fresno the 23rd annual Fresno Relays get under way with some of the top talent from the west coast participating. Santa Barbara entries are Mel Patton in the discus, Otey Scruggs in the 440, a mile relay quintet, and Del Pickarts in the javelin. Last week in the CCAA meet, Otey ran a 49.2 quarter although he finished up in the fifth spot.

Pickarts has been getting consistently better with each week of competition. It was only last week that he tossed the javelin 220 feet, his best effort of the year. Tomorrow he will be up against his toughest competition to date as he faces such men as Bud Held of Stanford with a best mark of 231 feet, Martin Biles of the San Francisco Olympic Club with a mark of 224, George Roseme of Cal with an effort of 214 feet, and Dr. Steve Seymour of the Los Angeles Athletic Club with a throw of 214 feet.

Del's mark of 220 feet is second only to Held's 231 feet in national competition this year. The record in this event for the Relays is 234 feet 3 1/2 inches, held by Bob Peoples of USC and set in 1941.
