Lions' Prexy Speaks to I. E. Men at Dinner

Jack Pilley, president of the Santa Barbara Lion's club, gave an address to the men of the industrial education department at their semi-annual banquet held in the college dining hall last night, entitled "A Wanderer in Africa." His talk was illustrated with pictures and various displays from that country.

Although there is a hard and fast law that no native may have a weapon of warfare in this section of British East Africa, Mr. Pilley was able to bring some of these "non-existent" weapons back with him, some of which he displayed to those present.

The natives always called upon the white men to kill any of the larger wild game, as their only way of bringing down the animals is by the use of their native spears, which are wholly inadequate for bagging the larger animals. Mr. Pilley told of an encounter with a leopard, and although he can now claim the claws and several of the animal's teeth, the trade almost went the other way. Even today Mr. Pilley has a strong desire "to relieve the situation" when he thinks of the encounter.

Tom Orr and Dick Lund, officers of the department, arranged for the evening's entertainment, composed of a tap dance by Miss Mildred Barker, the State college quartet, and two vocal numbers by Mr. and Mrs. Pilley.

E. E. Ericson, head of the industrial education department, introduced members of the faculty who gave a brief resume of their life history. It was learned that some of the faculty have held "underworld" positions, among them was Mr. Ericson himself who worked as a coal miner in Sweden for his start.

F. E. R. A. Workers Not Allowed to Join Campus Fraternities; Announce Rush Rules

"Since FERA work is given on the basis of financial difficulties, the committee in charge of sorority and fraternity rushing does not feel justified in giving membership bids to FERA workers," stated Dean Lois M. Bennink.

Sorority rush week will begin next Wednesday and will be extended until February 23.

Rushing rules for sororities are given below for the benefit of new students and prospective rushees.

Eligibility:

1. No student shall be rushed by a sorority until she shall have satisfactorily completed one full semester of work, and at least fourteen units, in the Santa Barbara State college.
2. No student is eligible who has a scholarship in the previous semester of less honor points than registered units, or who has not been carrying at least twelve units.
3. If the scholarship of any member falls below the average, that

member shall be suspended and shall lose her privileges of voting and holding office. The suspension does not relieve the student from paying dues and assessments. If at the end of the semester she has brought her average up to the required standards she is automatically reinstated.

4. To be an active member a student must carry at least 12 units during the semester.

Rushing:

1. Rushing shall take place the last part of the second and all of the third week of the spring semester.

2. Notices will be placed in the mail box of each woman bid by 8 o'clock on Monday morning, February 25, with instructions from the lawyer.

3. If the rushee does not report to the lawyer (either in person or by proxy) by 2 p.m., the invitation will be withdrawn. If the woman is unable to report because of illness or for any other legitimate reason and

if she has no one to represent her, she should get in touch with Miss Bennink before 2 p.m. Monday, February 25.

3. Any information desired by rushees regarding sororities must be obtained only from the Dean of Women.

Definition of rushing:

A. Rushing is an effort on the part of a person to increase a rushee's standing in a particular sorority. By the word "rushee" is meant any girls who may become eligible at any time.

B. More than two members of the same sorority with a rushee without the presence of at least one member of another sorority at any event during the week or any member of a sorority paying the expenses of a rushee at any time is considered rushing.

C. Personal rushing is illegal: By personal rushing is meant talking with a rushee off campus or accompanying a rushee to other than rush parties.

Department Arranges for Adult Classes

Adult classes in jewelry, weaving, bookbinding, leather tooling, decorative needlework and life drawing are being offered by the art department this semester.

On Saturday mornings a class in landscape is being held and on Thursday nights from 7 to 10 o'clock a life drawing class.
