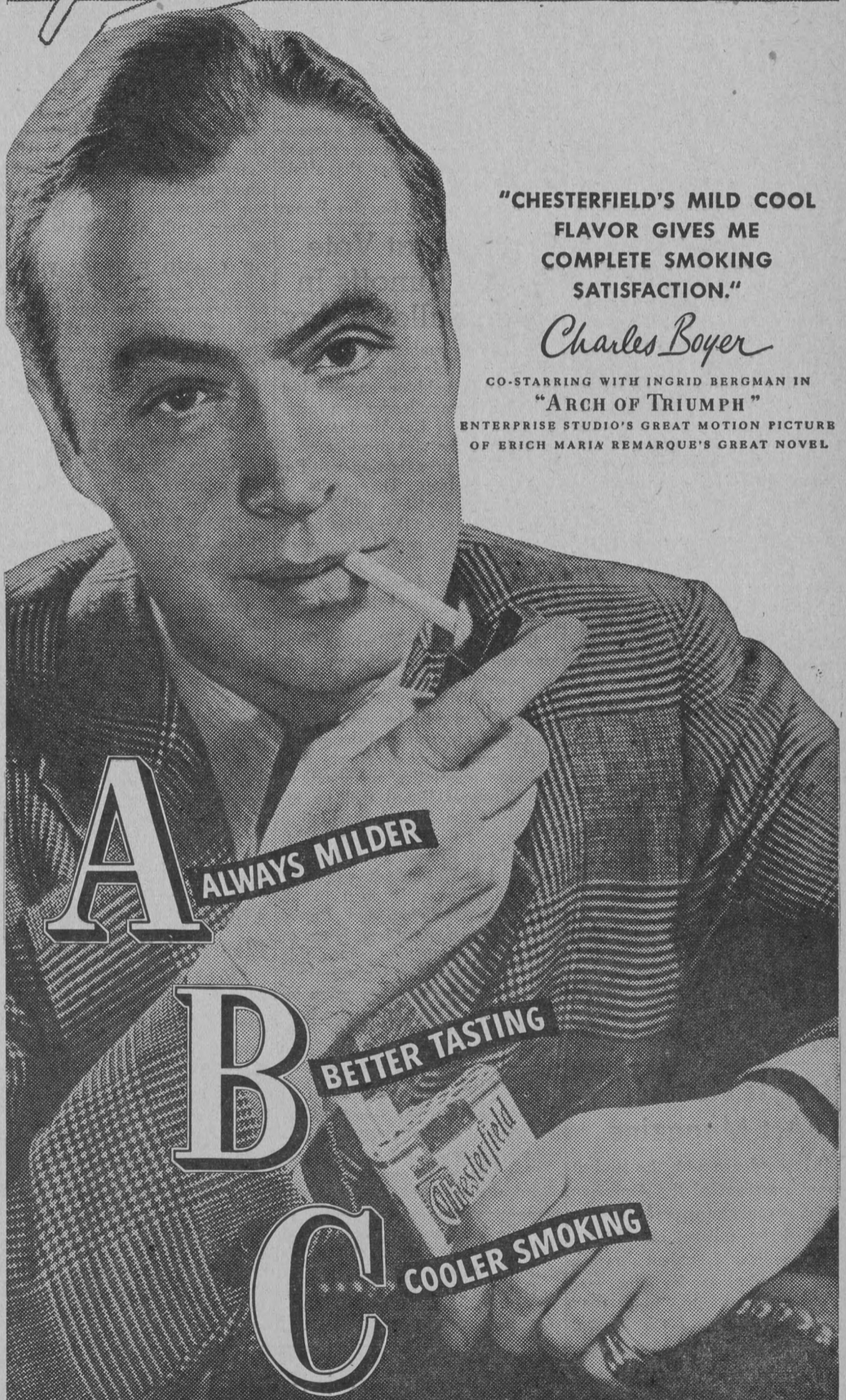

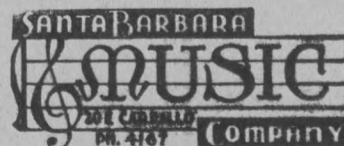

Split Loss-Win Record Places Gauchos Third

Coach Spud Harder's diamond-weary horsehiders, alternately hot and cold in all their 31 games, dropped the curtain on a better-than-average season by living up to their nickname, splitting an uneventful and loosely played twin bill one weekend and then coming back two days later to battle nip and tuck with California's CIBA-leading Golden Bears in one of their most faultless exhibitions of the year.

The Gauchos' policy of "you take one, we'll take one" gave them an even break and a third spot in the 2C2A conference standings with a record of ten wins and ten losses. San Diego's very classy Aztecs copped the mythical pennant with San Jose grabbing the place spot.

Harder had only good words for the performance of his charges, but he bemoaned the fact that he had to lose three pitchers to the professionals at the onset of the season. This, along with the loss of leading flinger Bill French and heavy hitting Hal Chauncey midway in the flag chase, probably cost Santa Barbara the league title. But Coach Spud expects all his congregation to return to the fold next year, and with a few more hurlers to bolster the staff and a permanent practice field on which to work out—this latter being one of the question marks to future success—the Hilltoppers should really come romping home way ahead of the pack.

While many of the squad have professional aspirations, none seem willing to leave school before graduation and all plan on reattending the "campus with a view" next fall. Nearly everyone had his own little sideline and here's a few of them. Billy Alhouse has the distinction of playing the most innings, scoring the most runs, and drawing the most free passes. In conference play Vern Wrightson probably will be the team's leader in runs-batted-in; he also has strode to the plate the most times, and shares the two-base-hit honors with Hal Abbott at six. Buck Billinger topped the team in home runs with three, and Mark Steinberg banged out the most triples, four.

In the chucking department Dale

Scott and Bob Elliott came out of the season deadlocked for the strikeout crown with 32 apiece. Elliott proved himself the most versatile man on the squad by also wrapping up the batting championship with a ten point spurt in the past few weeks that carried him past Williams and Steinberg.

The latest scoop from the feed-box concerning next year says that the Gauchos have had offers to join the California Intercollegiate Baseball Association (CIBA). This would step them up in class, but they have proven that they can hold their own with the best. The league would include USC, UCLA, California, Stanford, St. Marys, and Santa Clara. The Gauchos wound up the year with a total of 18 wins and 15 losses, which included two forfeit triumphs over San Jose State.

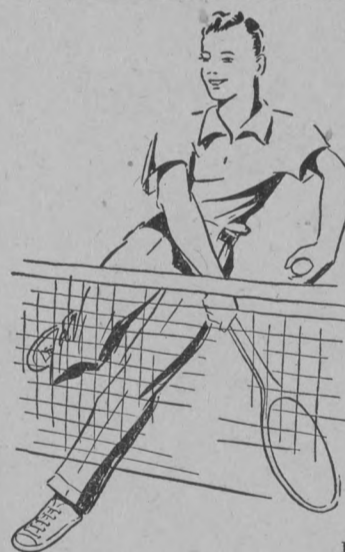

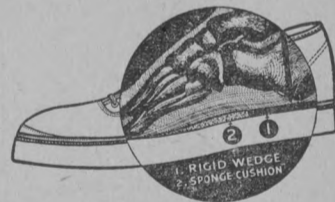

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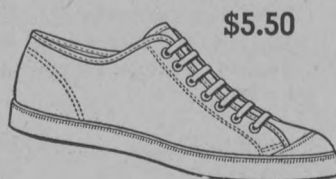


1. This rigid wedge keeps bones of the foot in their natural, normal position.
