

# 'Antigone' on Riviera Stage Tonight

## Modern Version of 'Antigone' To Feature Willett, Goerner

A modern version of Sophocles' classic tragedy, "Antigone," will be presented tonight on the Riviera stage at 8:30, as the first offering from the Speech Department for the fall semester. Other performances are set for tomorrow night and Friday, November 24.

Directed by Dr. Ted Hatlen, "Antigone" stars Marie Willett and Fred Goerner in the roles of Antigone and Creon. The play has always been known as an "actor's play" since it affords difficult but rewarding roles to experienced actors.

Marie is a veteran of many campus plays, including "Green Grow the Lilacs," and "Circle of Chalk," while Fred played in "Beyond the Horizon" and many campus reviews.

### Sans Scenery

"Without the support of formal scenery and special costuming, the play is a challenge to the modern day actor," stated Dr. Hatlen. "Antigone" was modernized by Jean Anouilh in France during World War II when it served as a bitter commentary on life under the German occupation.

In further commenting on the difficulty of the play, Dr. Hatlen stated, "Two of the chief characters hold the stage for 35 minutes without a break."

### Lighting Changes

All transitions and scene shifts are accomplished by lighting changes under the direction of Cecil Forbes and the curtain will not be drawn until the end of the performance.

Wally Jonason of the Art Department designed the simple setting and the furniture. Platforms have been built into the orchestra pit to give greater depth to the stage and a simple cyclorama will serve as a backdrop.

Costumes were designed by Roger de Cloutier and the dance choreography has been under the direction of Nancy Chmowski.

## Local Win Streak Threatened By Strong Whittier Tomorrow

Riding the crest of a five-game win streak and an All-U triumph over Davis, Santa Barbara's gridmen invade the L. A. area tomorrow for an inter-league fray with Whittier. The Poets, by virtue of a decisive 15-0 win over Occidental, rate the distinction of being toughest competition faced by the Gauchos to date.

Past performances shape the contest up as even Stephen. Whittier has bounced Pacific Fleet Air Force, Cal Tech, S. F. State, Davis, Oxy and Flagstaff while being upset by a fired up Pomona gang 13-10.

### Rough Evening

Santa Barbara with a 7-1 record, the best in many a season, promises to give the Poets a rough evening.

Chief headaches for the locals will be Whittier halves Tony Siciliano and Jim Stecklein. The Poet pair have accounted for almost two thirds of the rushing yardage marked up by their teammates.

The only outstanding injury sustained by the Gauchos against Davis was Les Harris, with a pulled knee. The outstanding defensive back will definitely miss the Whittier go.

### Weight Bulge

Charts on the probable starting teams give the Gauchos a fat weight bulge, fourteen pounds, and slight experience advantage. Starting ends will again feature Adran Adams and John Juday, Grant Gauce and Corky Johnson at tackles, Gene Bynum and Ray Stark at guards and Mike Moropoulos at center.

Offensive backfield will feature sophomore fullback Dave Gorrie. The youngest of the brothers is rocking and socking opponents with a 5.3 yard rushing average. Elder brother Dick Gorrie will call signals while starting halves will be Russ Bertell and Bill Davis.

### Defense Unit

The defensive unit is out to maintain their outstanding average of only 6.1 points being scored on them in eight games.

However Whittier holds the top offensive and scoring mark of the local schedule with a season total of 171 points scored against seven opposing teams.

An interesting sidelight is the fact that both teams will determine their respective conference championships on Thanksgiving day. Whittier plays Redlands, present SCIC leader, while the Gauchos will attempt to keep on top of the CCAA ladder against San Diego.

## Foreign Students Will Make Tour of State

Foreign students now on California campuses will have a chance for a close-up of all the major communities throughout the state with the Foreign Student Tour of California.

The tour, which will be held this year between January 26 and February 4, is sponsored by the National Students Association in co-operation with the Universities and Junior colleges in California.

Cost for the tour will not exceed \$30 for each student for the entire ten-day period. This amount will cover insurance for the tour and bus expense for the 1500 miles traveled. The low charge is made possible by the donations of both food and lodging by host communities on the tour itinerary.

The tour, which will start and end in Los Angeles, will stress a close view of metropolitan areas, the Citrus Belt, the Central Valley, the Bay Area, the state capital at Sacramento, and scenic and historic landmarks.

All foreign students in California who plan to return to their native lands are eligible to join the tour. Deadline for applications is December 10. 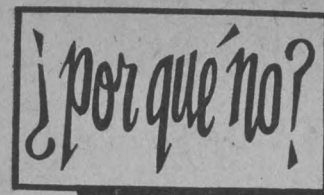

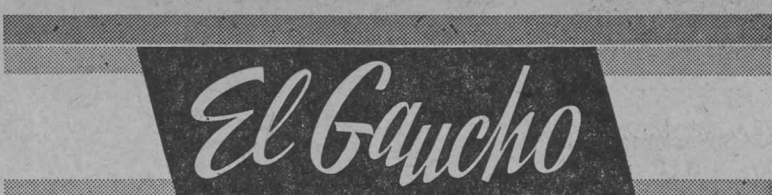
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### Editorial

It behooves the Legislative Council and everyone interested in the strengthening and perpetuation of the Associated Students and Santa Barbara College to carefully consider the problem and to determine what can be done to interest promising high school students in entering college here.

One answer to the question, "What can be done?" is scholarships. In the next issue of *El Gaucho*, we will present some ideas about freshman scholarships to Santa Barbara College and how they can be obtained.

## GAUCHOS OVERWHELM HAPLESS AGGIES IN UNEVEN ALL-U FOOTBALL BATTLE

Scoring their third All-Cal victory and their seventh win of the season, the 2C2A conference leading Gauchos downed an out-classed Cal Aggie eleven 26-0 at Berkeley.

Throwing up a defense which held the Aggies to 10 yards on the ground, the Gauchos completely dominated the play and every player saw action.

### Fast Start

Coach Roy Engle's crew got off to a fast start when Halfback Les Harris snagged one of five Aggie pass bobbles and raced for 55 yards behind excellent downfield blocking for the score.

The second period saw the Gauchos score again on a pass play from Dick Gorrie to Adran Adams.

Another pass interception, this

time by Bob Laskin set up the third Gaucho tally and Russ Bertell boomed over for one yard and the TD.

### Unique Play

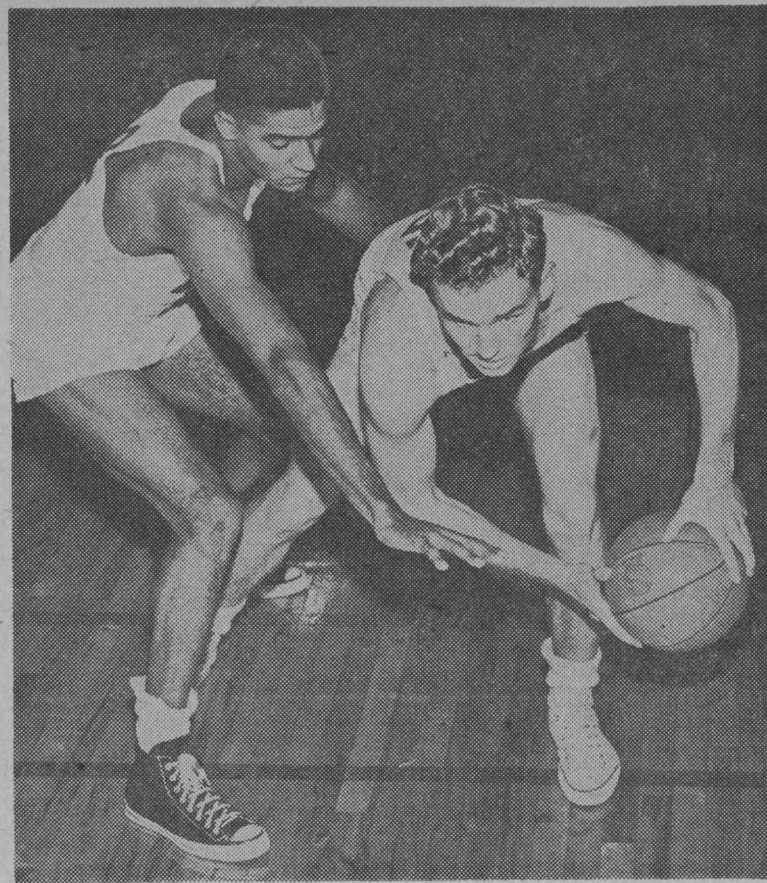
Shortly following Bertell's touchdown, a play occurred which is probably unique in college football, as all three Gorrie brothers got into the act. Dick Gorrie passed to Dave to the Aggie 10, Dave fumbled after hauling in the ball, but the play was saved by Doug who pounced on the ball for the gain.

The final Gaucho score came on a 11 yard pass from Dick Gorrie to Clyde Francisco. Gorrie had previously hit Francisco on two other plays to set up the score.

Outstanding for the Gaucho defense were Les Harris, who sustained a disabling knee injury which will sideline him this week, and LeRoy Criss at end. In general all of the Gaucho reserves put on a creditable performance and all gained some valuable experience for future games.

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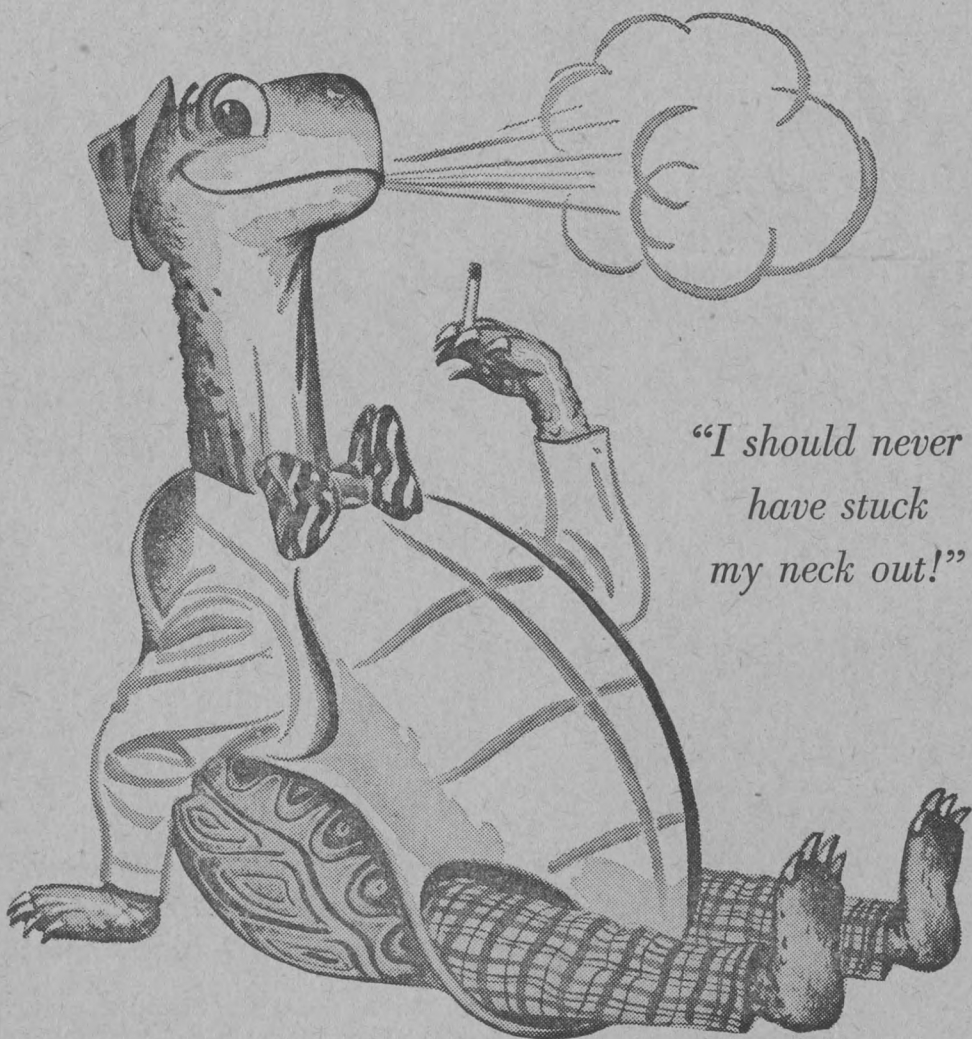
