

Seniors Don Lent, Phil Gallo Awarded Wilson Fellowships

Donald Lent and Phillip Gallo, UCSB seniors, have been named as the 1959 recipients of the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. The final selection was announced by Dr. Robert Kelley. The fellowship is designed to support students of high promise who plan to enter college teaching.

One thousand scholarships were awarded this year by the Wilson Foundation to outstanding students over the nation. Lent and Gallo won two of the 80 awards given in California. There were 13 applicants from

Intellectual Disciplines

The scholarship is given to seniors or to graduates not yet enrolled in a graduate program. It is primarily concerned with "what has been called the intellectual disciplines, such as the humanities, literature or science," according to Dr. Kelley.

The recipients are given \$1,500 for the first year of study, plus extra allowance for wife and children and full tuition and book expenses.

Study at Yale

Lent plans to do graduate work at Yale University in the field of fine arts. He is married and is currently a tutorial major with emphasis in art. One of the new murals in the Student Union was done by Lent.

Gallo, a psychology major, also is married. He plans to continue his education at UCSB. The Wilson scholarship is not usually granted to students who intend to continue working at the same school where they did their undergraduate work.

Exception Made

In Gallo's case the general rule was passed over because the Foundation felt the Psychology Department here was worthy of the exception, according to Dr.

Students receiving the Fellowship may reapply for it a second time if their achievement warrants the award. Nominations are made by faculty members in October of the year prior to the granting of the scholarships.

The three Allied movies attempted to instill the necessity of fighting the war through to a satisfactory conclusion.

The series of films exemplify the manner in which direct propaganda is used in wartime to effect the way people think. The films are open to the public free of charge.

ing held today from 3 to 5 p.m. at the pool for all solo, duet, trio and quartet numbers.



Thomas's award - winning effort is a piece of bronze sculp-ture, 24 inches high, named "Girl." The honorable mention was given by Dr. Louise Svend-sen of the Guggenheim Museum in New York.

Masters Programs in PE and **Mathematics Start Next Fall**

Two new master-of-arts programs, in mathematics and in physical education, will begin next fall at UCSB, announces the Chan-

With the addition of physical education and mathematics, 12 fields of study offer a graduate program at UCSB. MA programs already exist in the following fields: biology, botany, chemistry, economics, English, history, physics, political science, psychology

The master's degree in mathematics is intended to strengthen the existing master's programs in physics and chemistry. The graduate work in mathematics is planned to follow a standard pattern of courses in analysis, topology, differential geometry and modern algebra, together with seminars in special topics given according to the research interests and background of the departmental staff.

Individual Interests

The departments of men's and women's physical education at UCSB will grant a master's de-gree in the field of physical education. This program will be flexible enough to permit stu-dents to pursue individual interests in other disciplines.

The new physical education building, which will be completed this spring, contains facilities for

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Small Classes

Admission to the graduate program at UCSB is restricted to students selected on the basis of high scholastic attainments and promise. These academic qualifications are designed to ensure small classes, close student-faculty relations and optimum use of facilities for advanced study and research.

Official transcripts and applications for admission to the graduate program should be filed with the Registrar not later than July 15 for the fall semester and not later than Dec. 15 for the spring semester. Earlier filing is desir-

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
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
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

The University of California, Riverside's swim team proved too much for Coach Frank Rohter's Gauchos Saturday, as the invaders splashed to an easy 58-28 victory in the campus pool.

The Highlanders won every event with the exception of the 50-yard freestyle, which ended in a dead heat between the winners' Bob Wills and Gaucho Henry Hill. Hill and Wills jointly set a new pool record of 25.3, breaking Hill's old mark of

Santa Barbara freshman John Soth, swimming unattached in the 440-yard free, came in better than 12 seconds ahead of the field in the time of 5:38.2. Ned Preece of UCR won the event in 5:50.3.

The most exciting race of the afternoon was the four-man relay in which Frank Curl nosed out Hill of UCSB for top honors. Swimming the anchor lap, Curl had a 25-yard lead on Hill, which the big blond Gaucho disregarded to come within a fingertip's distance of winning.


