• Success of the Gauchos' initial extemporaneous speaking contest was assured as the deadline for entries yesterday when it was revealed that 30 students had signed up for the competition, the preliminaries of which are to be held December 7, with the finals scheduled for December 8.

Twenty-five male and five female speakers will vie for the valuable prizes posted by Ott's and Jack Rose's. A ten dollar merchandise order from the hardware company will be awarded the outstanding male speaker and a similar order from the ladies' smart shop will be presented the female winner.

Following the close of the entry list, it was announced that the preliminaries will be run off in afternoon and evening sessions. They will be staged in Room 80, Pine Hall, Tuesday, December 7, from 3 to 5 p.m. and from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

The finals, at which the eight best in the preliminaries will compete, are to be held in the auditorium, beginning at 8 p.m. and continuing until the judges have selected the two winners. Though prizes will be given both the outstanding male and female speaker, it does not follow that four boys and four girls will necessarily be selected for the finals. The judges will be instructed to pick the eight best, regardless of sex.

Ten Topics

Ten various topics will furnish the subjects for the speeches and contestants will draw for a topic. In the preliminaries a second topic may be drawn if the first does not prove satisfactory. In the finals, however, the first topic drawn must be presented unless it is a repetition of the contestant's topic in the preliminaries.

Speeches are required to be from five to ten minutes in length for the eliminations and from ten to fifteen minutes in length for the finals.

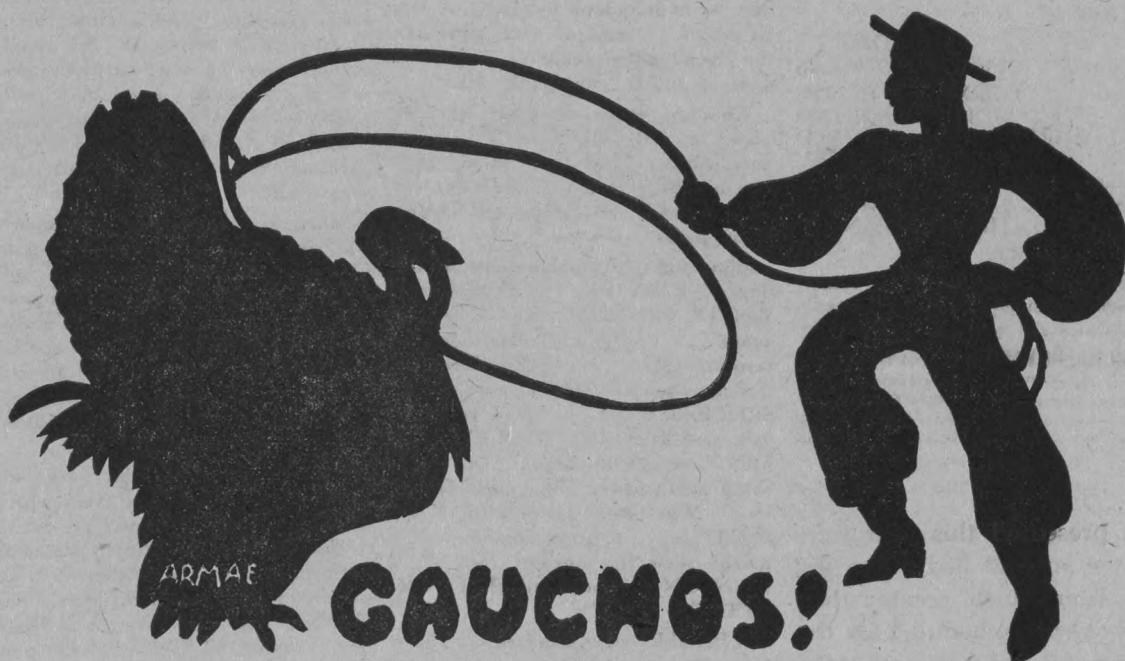
Basketball Obtains New Managerial Merit System

Cinches Warn Students

Mid-Term Warning Show Fewer Failings Than Previous Years

• The usual crowd of students flocked to the mailboxes in the main hall Monday morning to collect the sad news in the guise of mid-semester warnings, or to celebrate a semi-annual "Valentine's Day" set aside by Santa Barbara State.

Upon receiving the above mentioned flunks, the students are requested to see the faculty member who presented them with the little "gift." Faculty members wish the students to confer and cooperate with them in an effort to raise these grades.

The amount of knowledge of the students at State showed a decided increase over last year. The percentage of students receiving "valentines" this semester was several points under the figure registered last fall as only 44 percent of the student body were recipients and but 5.3 percent received 3 or more notices.

The dreaded event has passed without a riot and the Gaucho gridsters looked carefully to their laurels and came through with better than average grades. For the information of new students these notices are nothing more than warnings of unsatisfactory work. They do not mean an 'A' or 'B' grade is not impossible but that the required work to date has not been done satisfactorily.

Ineligibility for sports is not based upon these midsemester notices. However, athletes and student body officials are forced to declare non-participation or resign if they drop below a "C" average at the end of the fall term. NYA job holders are required to interview their respective deans to be sure that they have the required scholarship standing.

After this was foiled by a little water squirting on the part of the Aztec H2O boy both sides banded around to heckle the distracted "cops."

Sight-seeing trips to Carlsbad Cavern and through El Paso and Juarez have been opened for students and fans. The United States government is lifting the \$1.50 admission fee for the Carlsbad visit and the Mexican government will welcome visitors to Juarez. Three buses have already been filled for the Carlsbad trip. The Carlsbad trip costs \$4.60.

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Aztecs Capture Title Over Gauchos, 13-0

Strength of Southern Offense Beats Santa Barbara As Glass, Higashi Lead San Diego Attack

● San Diego State college Aztecs outpowered the fighting Gauchos of Santa Barbara State and rode to their second conference championship in two years with a brilliant 13-0 triumph before 10,000 fans in Peabody Stadium last Saturday afternoon. It was just a case of too much power with the huge Aztec forward wall opening up for hard running backs who poured through for sizable chunks of yardage.

The game started off with a determined drive by the Gauchos, and they received the opening kickoff to a first down on the Aztec 38 yard line on a series of five runs by Yeager and Monson. A pass interception by Glass of the Aztecs which was returned to midfield changed the complexion of things and the Gauchos were hard put to keep San Diego from scoring in the first quarter as Sefton and Glass led one drive on their own one yard line. Freddy Monson kicked out to midfield, only to have Glass return it to the Gauchos' 41 yard line and saw Higashi score from the 4 yard line. Danny Mulock rushed in fast to block the attempted conversion.

The rest of the first half was played in midfield with neither team able to dent the defense of the other. San Diego's pony backs were unable to pierce the defense set up for them by the Gaucho team. Injuries forced Dave Pollock and Al Young to leave the field during this quarter.

Fumble Ball

The second half found Yeager running the opening kickoff to the 40 yard line and a determined Santa Barbara drive got underway. However a fumble stopped things just as it appeared that the Gauchos were going places. In the fourth quarter the Aztecs drove 48 yards to a touchdown by Glass with Sefton converting to make the score 13-0.

The Aztecs clearly were the superior team on the field Saturday. Their line out-charged the State forwards and the failure of the Santa Barbara passing attack to function as it has in the past enabled the Aztecs to bunch their defense and stop the Gauchos running attack before it got underway.

Monson, Bailey Flash

Fullbacks Freddy Monson and "Buck" Bailey were the chief ground gainers for Santa Barbara. Don Hart played the entire game for the Gauchos as did Howard Yeager, Danny Mulock and Clair Busby were the outstanding linesmen for the locals, as two Aztecs were assigned to cover Doug Oldershaw on every play. Mulock, playing with a bad leg, turned the plays in to Busby, who made a lot of tackles during the afternoon.

The Aztec backfield of Glass, Zinser, Higashi, and Sefton worked smoothly behind the wonderful interference of the forward wall and showed plenty of fire and drive. Glass, especially, was very hard to bring down and he returned more than one punt for sizeable chunks of yardage. The San Diego team is now staying at Atascadero, where they are preparing for a Thanksgiving day game with San Jose State college. The Gauchos, after resting Monday,

Jimmy Phelan of Washington university produced a conference champion last year and when his huskies dropped a couple of games early this season Jimmy was almost thrown out by angry alumni. They couldn't seem to understand that perhaps the Huskies were meeting ball clubs superior to themselves.

It is to the credit of Santa Barbara sports fans who saw last Saturday's game that they realized what the Gauchos were up against. They saw a San Diego football team that even surprised its own followers with the brilliant exhibition of football. Aztec rooters were unanimous in declaring that their team played by far its best game of the year against Santa Barbara. At top strength and unhampered by injuries throughout the contest the Red and Black team did everything right. Their huge line gave the backs a chance to get going and once they were rolling it was very hard to bring them down.

Santa Barbara had no alibis to offer after the game. The defeat was decisive and clean cut. However, it would interest us to see how the outcome would be if Mulock were in top shape and if Young, Pollock, and Monson had not been forced to leave the playing field with injuries. Then, too, the Gauchos made one, possibly two, mistakes in the game. That first quarter pass interception stopped a Santa Barbara drive that had seen Monson and Yeager missing a lot of yardage. Of course, the Aztec defense was moving in closer and closer, but a first down pass was a questionable procedure and put the Gauchos in the hole for the entire first half, as did the fumble in the opening minutes of the third period.

Defeat or no defeat, Santa Barbara is still proud of its football team and is even more ready to agree with Coach "Spud" Harder's statement at last Friday's bonfire—he has got 33 of the fightingest football players ever to play on the football team.

"I will demand that every man observe such training rules necessary to put him in the best of condition," he concluded.

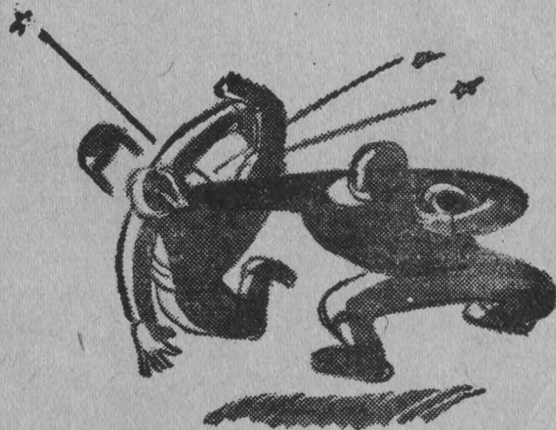
A number of lettermen from last year's team plus most of the men from the championship frosh of last year, will form a nucleus for the new squad.
