New Resolution Set By Academic Senate

"In order to avoid confusion and facilitate responsible coopereration between State officials, members of the State Legislature, and the administrative officers of the University in the formulation of all University policies in which State authorities are involved, the Committee on Privilege and Tenure of both sections of the Academic Senate adopted resolutions which were subsequently incorporated into University Regulation Number six," stated Dr. Elmer R. Noble.

"The most pertinent paragraph of this Regulation applies not only to the budget, but to all the areas of official relationship between the Regents of the University and the community including highway access to the campus, zoning, matters under study by the State Department of Finance and Education or Committees of

the Legislature, as follows: "Individual members or groups of members of the academic or non-academic staffs, or of the student body of the University, should not initiate or seek to promote, through members of the Legislature or Congress, or other State or Federal officers, any policies or legislation relating to the University, or to give the appearance of acting in the name of the University or any policies or legislation, without specific authorization.
