Special Session for Relief

A program of fourteen points. calling for immediate action was placed before the special session of the legislature at Sacramento by Governor Merrian. A minimum pay of \$35 a month was asked for to replace the present provision for persons receiving old age pensions. He also proposed the validation of irrigation district bonds and asked that changes be made in the social welfare act in order that the state could qualify for larger sums from the federal government to care for dependent children and the blind. These were among the major considerations of the special session.

Holy Land Is Scene of War

From Jeruslem reports come of the outbreak of guerrilla warfare, as the results of a coming to a head of the perpetual quarrel between the Jews and Arabs. Busses, government forces, telephone wires, and government forces have all been attacted in one way or another by well organized Arab marauders. It was hinted in the house of commons in London today, that it seems very suspiciously possible that some nation on unfriendly terms with England is inciting these natives to rebellion.

Bankruptcy Act Illegal
Justice McReynolds, leader of
the five justices of the supreme court, who held the 1934 municipal bankruptcy act unconstitutional today declared in the address putting forth the decision that "the challenge to the validity of the statute must be sustained." Justice Cardoza, Brandies, Stone, and Chief Justice Hughes are of the belief that the act is constitutional. Townsend of Undaunted

While in Washington, D.C., Speaker Byrans and Representative Bankhead, suggested that action must be taken soon against Dr. F. E. Townsend for his defiance of a house investigating committee and recommending that the case be turned over to the federal court, Dr. Townsend was in conference with Rev. Gerald K. Smith, leader of the Long "share the wealth movement" in Baltimore. As a result of their conference it was announced to the papers that backers of the old age pension and share the wealth movements will place presidential and vice presidential candidates in the field against President Roosevelt and Republican candidates.

Additional assistance is available to the winner of the scholarship to the sum of \$600. Applications will be considered by the scholarship committee of the club, headed by Charles B. White of the Security-First National Bank of Los Angeles. The scholarship has been established to encourage the interest of Southern California students in pursuing graduate studies in the field of private and public business administration at Harvard.

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

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

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
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
