## The Loyalty Oath

The Loyalty Oath is one of the most important problems by the University of California in recent years. Deemed ssary and hence compulsory by the Board of Regents, this has met with serious objections by the faculty on all cam s. They feel "any attempt to subject teachers to civic limi ns not imposed upon other citizens is a threat against the emic profession and against the society which the proserves.
At present we are one of the world's foremost universities result of the resignation or dismissal of professors who uld not sign the oath, the University would suffer a grea of prestige. Since the intellectual eminence of the Univer stems from the reputation of its faculty, reversal of such ep-seated moral conviction as some of its members hold on loyalty oath would harm the reputation of the University
While it is thus improbable, or even impossible, for the aculty to alter its stand, it is well within the power of the ents to restate their position on this issue
The newspaper publicity about the situation has been un ortunate. Misinformation and editorialization which aroused public opinion without stimulating public understanding of he situation have caused interference which has only made a situation worse. It has caused confusion and hence mad irtually impossible for faculty and Regents to come to factory solution
It is our duty as students and members of one of the orld's outstanding educational institutions to consider that nstitution as a whole. We should assume a calm attitude in face of general discussion of the situation and so contribute the Regents' solving it satisfactorily.-D.S.
