



## 'CALICO CAPERS' AT GOLETA AUD

### MARTHA GRAHAM DANCE AT LOBERO TOMORROW

A proud local audience in the Lobero Theatre Saturday afternoon and evening, March 11, will witness another of Martha Graham's popular performances in her home town under the sponsorship of the Associated Students of Santa Barbara College. "America's Great Dancer" gave her last performance here four years ago.

Four dances are on the program for the Lobero performance, and the choreography for all of them was created by Martha Graham herself. Through endless analysis of herself and her medium Martha Graham has become a singular figure in her art and a leader of modern dancing.

Advance notices report that Martha Graham continues to make dance history and theatre history. "Her works are not dramatic—but drama, not theatrical, but—humor are all there. Drama-in-essence, imagination, emotion so elemental, it needs no words. It is drama—danced!"

#### Local Girl

A popular local girl, Martha Graham attended Santa Barbara High School and was outstanding there as Editor-in-Chief of the school annual, the Olive and Gold; she also had a part in the Senior Play. The dancer's first recital was held here in 1921 when she was just out of high school, but even then her unusual talent was evident.

The dances on the program include "Diversion of Angels," with music by Norman Dello Joio; "Dark Beloved," a story of three sisters featuring Erick Hawkins as the male lead; "The Eye of Anguish," a purgatorial history of King Lear; and "Every Soul is a Circus," with Miss Graham as The Empress of the Arena and Hawkins as The Ring Master.

Martha Graham appears for the first time in the program as one of the three sisters in the second dance, which also features Eleanor Goff, Mary Louise Louchheim, and Erick Hawkins. She also appears in the concluding circus number as The Empress of the Arena reclining upon a couch and taking things at her ease. This is not the usual three-ring circus under the Big Top, but a circus of ridiculous situations and silly behavior.

Critic Wehlan Morgan has this comment to make upon Martha Graham's concept of modern dance: "While some critics speak of this phase of Miss Graham's work as symbolism, modern psychiatrists refer to it as superb psychological drama, the most penetrating of our day. What still others point out is that it is pure dance. Perhaps all are right. In pursuing the emotional stuff of which dance is made, Miss Graham has uncovered the elemental and archaic passions, which most civilized moderns have hidden in the subconscious."

### AS Council Proposes Students Be Seated On Academic Senate

At the Tuesday meeting of the Legislative Council, a resolution was unanimously passed to recommend to University President Robert Gordon Sproul that the matter of student representation on the Academic Senate be discussed at the meeting of the University Faculty at Davis in April.

Student representation on faculty committees which directly concern the students, except for the committee on scholarship and awards, will be asked.

#### Student Autonomy

This plan for the cementation of student autonomy on the campuses of the University of California is the product of joint agreement and co-operation of student body presidents Sherill Luke of UCLA, Dan Coehlo of Berkeley, Bob Hartzell of Santa Barbara and ex-president Horace Hampton of Davis.

The faculty attitude is expected to be one of welcome for the plan, since faculty members have been consulted in drawing it up.

#### Hartzell in Favor

Bob Hartzell stated that the success of the Library Committee on this campus is an example of the need for and feasibility of such a move. That committee has arranged meetings with the Faculty Library Committee in order to more easily discuss their joint problems.

He also said that he expected that it would add to the prestige and mature judgment of students in general and prevent a repetition of such issues as the anonymous complaint against the grade curve system which was presented to the campus last fall.

### "Circle of Chalk" Now in Rehearsal To Go On UC Tour

Production is proceeding rapidly on the Chinese comedy, "Circle of Chalk." The play is to travel to UCLA, Berkeley, and Davis later in the year. Work takes place every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoon.

The sets are being constructed under the direction of Wally Jonason, the designer. Roger Cloutier is designing the costumes, and Ann Jackson is in charge of sewing and fashioning. George Stewart will handle the head dress and make-up.

Evening work will start soon, for several hundred hours are necessary to bring the production up to staging. Many of the actors are doubling as stage crew in order to make a more compact group for traveling.

Casting for the second spring production, "Beyond the Horizon," will begin in about two weeks. This play will be presented to the student-body on May 19 and 20.

Under the student direction of Ted Shank, this second play will soon be rehearsal. Tryout readings will be from March 20 to 24 in Oak Hall at 4 p.m. Scripts may be obtained in the Reserve Library.

### The Loyalty Oath . . .

The Loyalty Oath is one of the most important problems faced by the University of California in recent years. Deemed necessary and hence compulsory by the Board of Regents, this oath has met with serious objections by the faculty on all campuses. They feel "any attempt to subject teachers to civic limitations not imposed upon other citizens is a threat against the academic profession and against the society which the profession serves."

At present we are one of the world's foremost universities. As a result of the resignation or dismissal of professors who would not sign the oath, the University would suffer a great loss of prestige. Since the intellectual eminence of the University stems from the reputation of its faculty, reversal of such a deep-seated moral conviction as some of its members hold on the loyalty oath would harm the reputation of the University system.

While it is thus improbable, or even impossible, for the faculty to alter its stand, it is well within the power of the Regents to restate their position on this issue.

The newspaper publicity about the situation has been unfortunate. Misinformation and editorialization which aroused public opinion without stimulating public understanding of the situation have caused interference which has only made a bad situation worse. It has caused confusion and hence made it virtually impossible for faculty and Regents to come to a satisfactory solution.

It is our duty as students and members of one of the world's outstanding educational institutions to consider that institution as a whole. We should assume a calm attitude in the face of general discussion of the situation and so contribute to the Regents' solving it satisfactorily.—D.S.

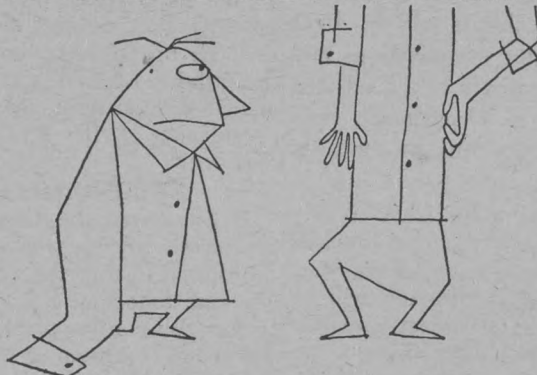

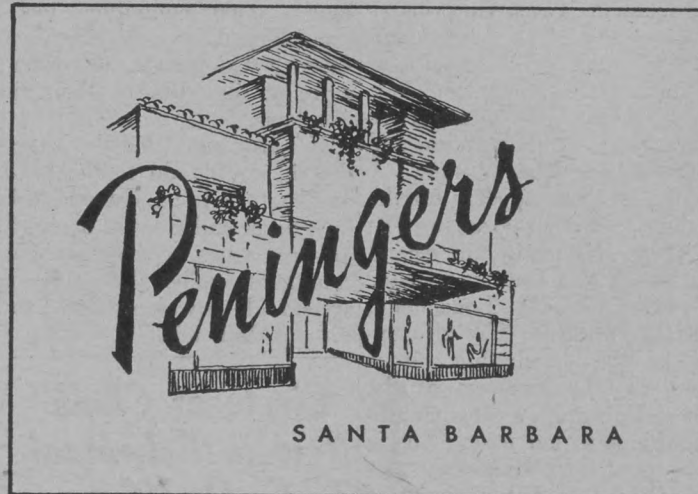

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# BOB McCUTCHEON HEADS BASKETBALL STATISTICS

BULLETIN!

The CCAA Conference statistician has announced that Stu Inman has been awarded the conference scoring title with 157 points. It was claimed that seven of Inman's points were erroneously credited to another Spartan player. Inman therefore displaces Bob McCutcheon as the leader. Gene Snyder of the Gauchos placed third with 128 points.

The final statistics of the Santa Barbara Basketball team were released today. Individual statistics were dominated by forward Bob McCutcheon, who paced the team in scoring with 407 points in 28 games for a 14.5 average. McCutcheon, also led the CCAA in 151 points in 10 games for a 15.1 average. He edged San Jose State's

Stu Inman by only one point. McCutcheon had the high score for a single game when he scored 27 points against San Diego State several weeks ago.

Following McCutcheon in scoring was Gene Synder with 297 counters in 27 games for a 10.1 average, and Jack Moore, who dropped in 112 points in 22 games to gain a 5.1 final mark.

The Gauchos as a team scored 1303 points, while their opponents were carding 1336. Therefore, Santa Barbara scored an average of 46.5 points per game, and the opposition dropped in 47.5 points per contest.

## CARTER TAKING 21 TRACKMEN TO NEXT LONG BEACH MEET

Track coach, Nick Carter will be taking twenty-one men south this weekend to compete in the 32nd annual Long Beach Relays to be held on Wilson High School's Stebbin's Field this Saturday.

Strong aggregations from UC LA and USC, along with such personalities as Panama's Lloyd La Beach, winner of the 1948 Olympic 100 meter dash, will be among the many fine athletes who will be striving for honors in the West Coast's first big track and field event of the 1950 season. High-jumper, Willie Dancer will be the Gauchos' best bet for a winner. Willie took last year's open high-jump event, and will be out to do a repeat performance tomorrow.

Another sure winner would have been Del Pickarts, but Del will not be able to compete due to an injury sustained in the recent inter-class track meet, when he sprained his ankle with his first javelin toss. Outside of Dancer, there will be little hope of any of the Gauchos placing in the open events, though Carter believes his boys will all make a good showing.

Other Gauchos chances for honors rest in two relay teams that will be competing in the college class. The 440 quartet of Kelly, Scruggs, Vick, and Johnson has a real chance of coming through with a victory, and the team of Houtz, Lahey, Crie, and Staffenson may place high in the two-mile relay event.

Also entered will be: Ted Vick, in the hundred; Bob Cook, and Dick Barr, in the 120 high-hurdles; Wayne Templeton, in the discus; Jack Cooper, in the pole vault; freshman, Dick Hentig, in the gruelling 5000 meter run. Others in the Jr. College Division who will be entered by Carter, include a two mile relay team composed of Bill Contes, Dick Cokley, Howard Gates, and Bill Rolph.

At the conclusion of the each basketball season, every sports-writer sits down at his typewriter and chooses some sort of All-America or All-Conference team, which ever the case may be. Usually these "All" teams are worth about as much as a Chinese dollar, because sportswriters do not get a chance to see a representative number of players in action. With but few exceptions, they see only those who play in the immediate vicinity.

Still, all in all, to be chosen on an All-America or All-Conference team is an honor, because it carries with it some degree of recognition. For this reason, the teams will continue to be picked, and as long as they are picked, outstanding players will be overlooked. There is no way of getting around it, and for the reason I named above.

All-Conference teams are a little more valid than an All-America, although certainly not infallible. Most conferences play a home-and-home season, and the writers get a look at all of the teams. The CCAA team is chosen by a ballot of the coaches in the conference. Each coach is asked to choose a first and second team, leaving off members of his own team. This system has its drawbacks also, but we won't go into them now.

Not being any different from other sportswriters, I am going to attempt to pick an All-Conference team. I was fortunate enough to see each conference team in action at least twice, with the exception of San Diego State, whose game against the Gauchos up here was the only opportunity that I had to glimpse the Aztecs. The conference this year was replete with both outstanding teams and players, and therefore doubt if any two All-Conference teams will look the same.

The center spot is not an easy one to pick this year. In the games that I witnessed there wasn't an outstanding man at the position. For this reason I have moved Stu Inman of San Jose State from forward, where he regularly plays, to center. Inman, also a repeater from last season's selections, played brilliantly all year, and placed second in conference scoring. He was the sparkplug of a Spartan team that lost only seven out of their twenty-eight games this season.

Rounding out the team at forwards are Jim Hamilton of Pepperdine, and Santa Barbara College's Bob McCutcheon. Hamilton was the player who made the Waves move this season. Bob led the CCAA in scoring with 151 points in 10 games for a 15.1 average. He nosed out Inman by one point. Mac is another repeater from last year's All-Conference team.

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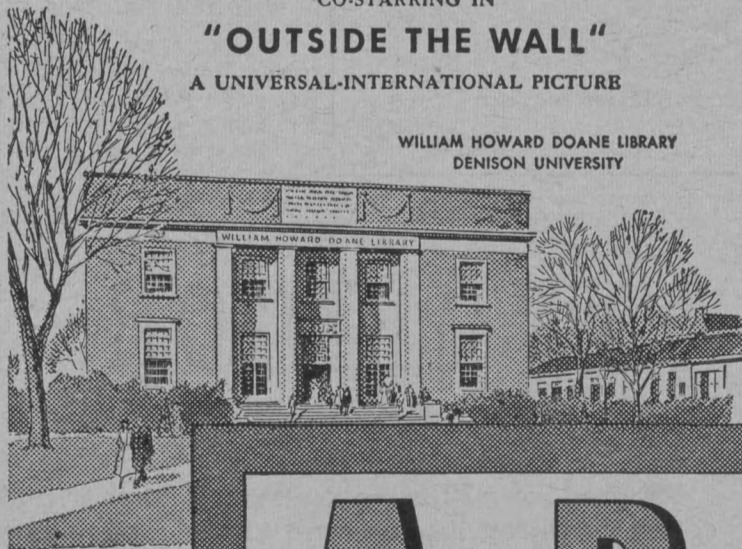
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
