# UCSB's Season Ends With Loss to Irish at NCAA Tourney

Notre Dame Doubles Teams Do the Damage in Victory

The Gauchos sent their best troops down south to Georgia, but history again repeated itself as the northern team

won the battle.
The UCSB women's tennis team lost to the #15-seeded Notre Dame Fighting Irish, 5-3, in their first ever NCAA appearance Friday at Athens. Santa Barbara was tied 3-3 with the Irish after the singles por-tion, but had no luck in doubles - losing two in a row to end the match.

Even though UCSB wasn't able to move on to the next round, the sentiment on the team wasn't of disappointment because this was the best Gaucho season in school

"It would have been nice to win, but I'm not disappointed," senior Laura Rutledge said.

"You can't be disappointed when you go to the NCAAs. We had a great season; just getting there was nice."

This turned out to be Rutledge's last match, as she has used up her four years of eligibility. She certainly did her best to help the team by winning a close #3 singles match, 7-6 (7-5), 7-6 (7-4), over Laura Schwab. She also teamed up with Lynn Coakley in doubles, and they were about to clinch the win, but the game was stopped once Notre Dame had won the other two doubles matches.

"It was really anticlimactic," Rutledge said. "I'm gonna miss it."

The #15-ranked Gauchos finished the season with a 19-4 record, having lost only to higher-ranked teams such as #9 UCLA, #4 Stanford and #7 Pepperdine, before the loss to the Irish squad that was right behind UCSB in the


national rankings at #20. Going in, UCSB Head Coach Chris Russell knew that they were in for a long day of tennis.

"We had a strong feeling going into this match that it was going to be a battle," he said. "We knew we matched up really well with Notre Dame. We fought hard, but they played very

Santa Barbara's #1 player Jean Okada, ranked #38 in the nation, was in a position for another upset as she took the first set, 6-0, from the Irish's Wendy Crabtree, who is ranked 16th. But Okada was slowed down by the 80 degree weather and the humidity, losing the next two sets, 4-6, 4-6.

"I was playing very well in the first set," Okada said. "But I think I just started to slow down a little bit, playing

# Track Concludes Year at League Meet

Women Finish 6th While Men Take 4th at Las Cruces

It was a sultry day in Las Cruces.

The UCSB men's and women's track teams participated in the annual Big West Championships at New Mexico State this weekend and returned with something less than

Although the women's teams one-upped their previous notch of seventh place, they did not even threaten a fourth-place finish as Head Coach Pete Dolan had hoped. The men dropped one spot from last year's #3 finish, well behind host team NMSU, a squad that clearly caught the competition off guard.

Perhaps the sole consolation for both teams was that they kept it close with their best-matched rivals, Long Beach State. UCSB's men edged LBSU by 4.5 points, while the women finished a mere 14 points down. As expected, Utah State won both sides of the meet, although UNLV's surprising female squad nearly stole a victory at the

championships.
Regrettably, no
Gauchos qualified for the NCAA championships. The favorites for this honor, freshman Adrian Garcia in the men's 800 and Jennifer Lagle in the women's triple jump, each finished a respectable third in their events, but were unable to match previous personal bests.

Garcia's final time of 1:54.61 was swift, but just off the pace set by Ne-

vada's Brandon Rock. UCSB's Brian Steip was a few strides back of Garcia and finished eighth

Andrew White, another NCAA possibility for the Gauchos, ran a fourth-place 54.79 in the 400 hurdles, closely followed by teammate Marc Musitano.

However, third place was the highest the Gauchos could manage at the tournament. In addition to Garcia and Lagle, UCSB's Frank Smith and Kalina Freeman got the third spot in their events, the triple jump and the

points of the competition occurred in the men's decathlon, when Gaucho Mark Cassayre outthrew his rivals to capture the #1 distance of 57.27 meters in the javelin throw.

More than a meter behind in second place was the eventual winner of the decathlon, Nevada's Enoch Borozinski, who won seven of the 10 events. Cassayre finished

## 'Pack Take Series, **Conference Title**; **Gauchos Finished**



Going from last to first place in one season, the Nevada Wolfpack (39-10 overall, 16-5 Big West) finished off their Cinderella season by clinching the 1994 Big West Championship with a weekend sweep of the

The Wolfpack entered the series with the fifth most potent offense in the nation, and proceeded to justify that, as they lit up Gaucho pitchers for 29 runs on 40 hits over the three-game set.

Although Nevada is known for its hitting, its pitching held the Gaucho batters in check, allowing UCSB hitters only 16 hits and five runs over the three games, while walking only one better

ing only one batter.

"The pitchers have been the heart of the team," Nevada Head Coach Gary Powers said. "These three starters [Post, Lake and Patton] have been like

nails for us all year."

Friday's game was the most exciting and competitive contest of the series, as both teams were held in check by excellent starting pitching. Gaucho Steve Lane (5-5) allowed three runs over 6½ innings, while Bobby Post (10-0) of the Wolfpack threw eight strong innings, permitting UCSB three runs on five

Santa Barbara drew first blood in the fourth, when a Wynter Phoenix single drove in Matt Bokemeier. After the Wolfpack scored one in the sixth, the Gauchos answered with two more on Phoenix's first home run of the year.

Nevada put across three runs in the seventh to take the lead 4-3, but in the bottom of the ninth, Gaucho pinch hitter John Minton singled in Matt Bazzani to tie the game and send it into extra innings. The Wolfpack won the game in the tenth inning off UCSB reliever Clint Pearson (1-1), as Mark Lewis drove in Andy Dominique for the winning run. Rico Lagatutta (3-3) earned the win for Nevada in relief.

The Gauchos stayed in Saturday's game on the strength of excellent starting pitching from Pat Treend (3-8). However, the flood gates opened in the ninth when Treend

came out as the Wolfpack scored nine runs off relievers Steve Cain and Pearson. Nevada scored a total of 11 runs in the inning, although four of the runs against Pearson were unearned.

Left-hander Kevin Lake (10-3) pitched a masterpiece against Santa Barbara, going the distance for his first shutout of the season, while striking out 11, walking none and al-

lowing only four hits.

Providing the bulk of the Nevada offense in the game and in the series was right fielder and ninth-place hitter Terrance Wilson. Coming into the weekend, Wilson was hitting only .216, but over the three games, Wilson went 6-for-10 with six runs, six runs batted in, two doubles, and a home run over the scoreboard in left field.

"I've been struggling all year, and it was good to come out here and break out of my struggles and clinch the championship," Wilson said. "We tried to come into this series really relaxed. We just came in and did what we've been doing all year."

Sunday's game was preceded by ceremonies honoring the four Gaucho seniors: shortstop Matt Bokemeier, reliever John Bretza, second baseman Peter Muro and catcher Mark Umemoto. All four played in the game, their last opportunity to don the UCSB uniform as active players.

"I'm gonna miss the guys and the team camaraderie," Muro said. "Its been a tough year, but we battled back, never quit and never gave up. This program is headed for better and better days."

"Once I got the gear on, I was OK, but thinking about things before and after the game was hard," an emotional Umemoto said. "I had my fun here. I got a chance to play, and I enjoyed my four years."

Once again, Sunday's game saw the Gauchos play competitively with the Wolfpack for the first part of the game, then falter in the late innings.

## Softball Team Wraps Up Year With Pair of Losses to Titan Squad

It was a rough way to end a season of ups and downs.

Saturday afternoon, the UCSB women's softball team attempted to end their season on a winning note, but it just didn't happen. The #22-ranked Cal State Fullerton Titans (32-27, 21-11 Big West) added two to the already eight-game Gaucho losing streak with a 6-1, 3-0 sweep of UCSB.

The pair of losses just added to the devastating all-around slump the young UCSB squad has been experiencing on the field and in the batter's box. But it was plain to see that the Gauchos (23-32, 10-22) fought much harder in these last two games then they had in recent weeks.

"The team really wanted to win for the seniors [Margo Melendrez and Krissy Kyriazis]," UCSB Head Coach Frann Wageneck explained. "And because of that, several of the team members fought hard all the way until the end of the second game. But against a team like Fullerton, it just

wasn't enough.' After allowing two runs

in the first inning of game one, the Gauchos showed a little bit of fire, as shortstop Kathy Shortall hit an RBI single, scoring second baseman AJ Vitulli. Unfortunately, that was the only scoring opportunity that Santa Barbara managed to capitalize on for the rest of the game.

The Titans came right back and scored three runs in the second with the help of a Gaucho error and added three more runs to their previous five with the help of an error in the seventh inning.

"We really let down defensively the first game, right at the beginning and at the very

the Gauchos, going 2-for-3, including a double. Melendrez and Shortall added the only other two hits for Santa Barbara.

"It was a really tough loss," Melendrez explained. "We fought so hard during that second game. Nobody really let up. I guess it just wasn't


UCSB's Stacy Atwood a pitch that got past led the Gauchos' hitting
