Dr. Robert Haag, instructor of music at El Camino College, will present a series of four piano concerts, performing Beethoven sonatas, beginning Thursday, June 25. The performances will be given in Room 1250 of the Music Building at 8 p.m. on Thursday. Admission is 50 cents, and tickets may be purchased at the door.

A highlight of the summer concert series will be the performance by the New York Chamber Soloists on Monday, June 29. Five members of the ensemble will perform works by Handel, Ravel, Mozart, Beethoven and Couperin at 8 p.m. in Campbell Hall.

Tickets may be purchased at the Arts and Lectures office in Campbell Hall for \$1 for students, faculty and staff.

Also on the agenda are a Lieder recital by Dr. Roger Nyquist, pianist, and Mrs. Marilyn Somville, soprano, in Room 1250 of the Music Building at 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 15.

Dr. Patricia Sparrow, director of the University Dance Group, will present a dance concert at 4 p.m. in the Little Theater on Wednesday and Thursday, July 22 and 23.

The final concert of the season will be a noon performance July 27 by the Paganini Quartet in Campbell Hall. Tickets may be purchased for \$1.25 at the Arts and Lectures Office. (continued on page 4)

# UNIVERSITY LECTURE SERIES BEGINS IN SOUTH HALL NEXT WEEK

A program of five public lectures is on the agenda for the summer months on campus, beginning with "How To Cause a Prison Riot," by <u>Dr. Donald R. Cressey</u>, professor of sociology and Dean of the College of Letters and Science, on Tuesday, June 30.

All lectures will be at 4 p.m. in South Hall Lecture Room.

The series will continue with a reading of his poetry by Gary Snyder, poet and author of two books, on Tuesday, July 7; "Cultural Conflicts in Japanese Education," by J. Franklin Hunt, professor of education at Hamilton College and a visiting professor of education at UCSB this summer; "A Reading From His Fiction," by Richard G. Stern, associate professor of English at the University of Chicago and also a visiting professor of English here during the summer, and "How Not To Murder Caesar," by Sigurd Burckhardt, chairman of the department of literature on the San Diego campus.

# SUNDAY MOTION PICTURES ENHANCE ARTS AND LECTURES PROGRAM HERE

A series of five foreign films, four of them being shown in Santa Barbara for the first time, will begin this Sunday with an Italian movie, "Bell Antonio," and an accompanying short subject, "The Hole."

The films will be shown each Sunday at 7:30 p.m. Admission to students, faculty and staff is 25 cents.

Other films and shorts in the series include "Road to Life," a Russian film, "The Case of the Mukkinese Battle Horn," an English film, with the short Men's Diving Sequence from "Olympia," June 28; "No Exit," a U.S.-Argentine production, and "Soap Bubbles," a featurette, July 5; "On Approval," a British classic, and "The House," from Holland, on July 12; and "A Girl in Black," made in Greece, and "A Short History," on July 19.

# TRYOUTS FOR PLAY PRODUCTION

Students and members of the faculty are invited to attend tryouts for parts in Shakespeare's "Two Gentlemen from Verona" which will be presented on campus July 23 through 25.

According to Director Stanley Glenn, associate professor of speech and drama, there are parts for 15 men and three women.

The tryouts will be held Monday and Tuesday from 3 to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 10 p.m. in the Little Theatre.

#### RECREATION PROGRAMS ARE OPEN TO FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS

POLICE REGULATIONS FOR CARS, BIKES ARE TOLD FOR SUMMER SESSION

All motor vehicles and bicycles on campus during the Summer Session must be registered with the police department, according to department Captain W. A. Lowe.

This includes those who belong to registrants who are not regular UCSB students. Fees are \$1 for vehicles and 50 cents for bicycles for the summer.

After paying the fee for vehicles, the owner is issued a parking decal which entitles him to use A (parking for faculty and staff), B (for residence hall students) or C (for students living off campus) facilities.

Racks are provided for bicycle parking, and areas where riding is prohibited are clearly marked. These include central academic areas where bikes are not permitted between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. on school days.

The campus police department will continue its 24-hour service during Summer Session. In addition to maintaining a lost and found service, rendering first aid and transporting persons sick or injured, the department will continue to patrol the campus around the clock.

The police offices are open in Building 427, Room 202, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The police emergency number is 2221.

## SUMMER WORKSHOPS AND SPECIAL COURSE ARE OFFERED BY UNIVERSITY EXTENSION

Summer workshops, institutes and special courses offered by University of California Extension, Santa Barbara, will attract teachers, scholars, professional people and adults interested in continuing education to the UCSB campus during the

Summer Session beginning next week.

During the first week of the session five workshops will meet here and in this area. They include a Foreign Language Workshop, a Nursery Education Workshop, a Child and Youth Study Workshop, a study of The Totalitarian Challenge: Communism, Capitalism and Fascism in the Contemporary World, and the Pacific High School Debate Institute.

Later summer programs include the Field Science and Conservation Workshop, the Ninth Annual Folk Dance Conference, a study of Teaching Culturally Disadvantaged Children and others.

A special lecture series, King Lear: From Script to State, will be conducted by Dr. Homer Swander, associate professor of English, in observance of the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth.

HIGH SCHOOL SUMMER SESSION ATTRACTS STUDENTS FROM ALL REGIONS

Some 290 high school juniors from schools throughout the United States have been admitted to the sixth annual summer program for high school students here.

These exceptional students will be afforded an academic preview of college life when they enroll in freshman and sophomore level university courses and earn up to six and one half units of credits. They may later submit the credits for evaluation when making formal application to the University.

Core courses are offered in anthropology, history, geology, music, political science, speech and psychology, and additional courses are offered in a variety of academic disciplines.

EXHIBIT OF FRENCH REVOLUTION MATERIALS IN LIBRARY DURING SUMMER SESSION

From its holdings, largely in Foot and Mayer uncataloged materials, the Library has assembled a summer exhibit of contemporary materials describing events of the crucial decade, 1780-1799, in French history. July 14th this year marks the 175th anniversary of the storming and fall of the Bastille, and early pamphlets on display give eyewitness accounts of the fall of the Bastille, of the trial and execution of Louis XVI, and of the Reign of

Terror that followed.

Leading figures of the revolutionary movement are represented by the publications of Mirabeau, Brissot, Louvet and Robespierre; accounts of victims (Malesherbes is notable) and refugees are also included. The daily progress of events can be followed in the Journal de Paris and L'Ancien Moniteur, two basic journals of the period displayed in volumes for 1789. Unfavorable journalistic reaction from the English at the same time is shown in the verse satire of the conservative Anti-Jacobin.
