MUSIC DEPARTMENT TO PRESENT FAURE, MENDELSSOHN SELECTIONS

The Music Department of Santa Barbara College will present two performances of Faure's "Requiem" and Mendelssohn's "Hymn of Praise" as its major undertaking for the school year.

The first performance will be given in the Presbyterian Church on Sunday, January 9, at 5 pm. The second will be given on Thursday, January 13, in the College Auditorium on the Riviera campus at 8:15 pm. Both concerts are presented to the public free of charge.

"According to our information, this is the first time that these two works have even been presented on the same program in Santa Barbara," Dr. Van A. Christy, Chairman of the Music Department, said. "It is the first time that the 'Hymn of Praise' has been heard here, and the first time in many years that Faure's 'Requiem' has been presented."

Two casts of soloists have been chosen and will alternate in singing the parts at the concerts. The combined choral groups, including the A Capella Choir, Male Glee Club, Women's Glee Club, and the Treble Ensemble, will join with the college orchestra in the presentation of the two works.

Soloists for the "Hymn of Praise" will be: Alfred Jensen, tenor; Ruth Bannerman and Else Jensen, soprano solo and duet, first team; June Lord and Jean Lewis, soprano solo and duet, second team; June Lord will also sing a soprano solo with the Treble Ensemble.

Soloists for the "Requiem" presentation will be Gloria Nygard and Terry Porier, sopranos; Marvin Johnson and Morris McNaughton, baritones.

Most of the work will be done in the Institute itself, although the trainees will get a chance to become acquainted with the work of other Good Housekeeping departments, such as fashions, beauty clinic, decorating studio, building forum, and the Good Housekeeping Bureau.

Pat, who attended Pasadena Junior College before transferring to Santa Barbara in 1946, will receive her B.A. in home economics this January.

Pat Sullivan, senior in home economics, is preparing to leave for New York to start a six-months training course at the Good Housekeeping Institute on Feb. 1.

She was one of a limited number of girls in the United States chosen for this special training, which is sponsored by Good Housekeeping magazine in collaboration with the American Home Economics Association. The selection was made by the Apprentice Training Committee of the latter organization.

Good Housekeeping pays travel expenses to and from New York and \$35 a week to the trainee.

A special training program is hand-tailored to the needs of each trainee. The major interests and specialized training of each girl are considered in this planning. The work of the trainees is supervised by the Institute's director,

Prominent state officials in the field of education spoke laudingly of the work of the association as indicative of the professional status desired of teachers in California.

In the hearings on committee and chapter reports, Prexy James Taylor forecasted the work of the Santa Barbara chapter in obtaining the aid and cooperation of the departmental educational clubs in developing a broad basis of teacher relations early in the preparation of prospective teachers. The increasing tendency of school officials in molding coordinated and integrated teaching staffs as best suited towards obtaining whole objectives of education was noted as expressing a need for such training experiences.

Campus Police Lamp Down on Parkers

New regulations affecting the parking of student and faculty cars on the Riviera Campus will go into effect on Monday, January 10, Police Captain Floyd Ward announced yesterday. He said the action is being taken on recommendation of the Safety Committee.

A campus police officer will be stationed at the main entrance to the Riviera Campus in front of the Home Management House. All city cars bearing a valid parking sticker on the windshield will be admitted. Student cars, however, and those of non-academic employees will not be allowed to enter. They will have access to student parking areas, as before, but may not reach the area driving through the faculty parking zone.

This last step was necessary, Captain Bernard explained, because of the practice of some students using the faculty parking space.

Other recommendations of the Safety Committee which are being put into effect are as follows:

1. Immediate citation, without warning, for students found parking in space reserved for faculty parking.

2. One warning prior to citation for students violating parking regulations within the student parking area.

3. One warning prior to citation for faculty members and non-academic personnel violating parking restrictions within their respective areas.

4. Citations in the above cases will require appearance in the Santa Barbara Justice Court at the County Courthouse.

5. Capt. Bernard urged faculty members, students, and non-academic personnel who have not registered their cars to do so without delay. His office is in the basement (Room 1) of the Quad Building, Riviera Campus.

The newest version of the on-again-off-again Gaucho humor magazine, the "Barb," hit the stands Wednesday with a collection of essays, plays, stories and cartoons which the editorial staff guarantees as non-bannable. However, the staff has recently been spotted sipping their cafeteria coffee with crossed fingers.

Highlights of the yellow-and-black jacketed "Barb" is a hilarious take-off on the movie "Rope," by Walter Beaver. The "scenario" portrays two college students who carry out the cannibalism theories of one Marcel Thurmond, an English professor, by serving up one

of his eminent colleagues as pate-de-foie-gras.

Jerry Larson contributes a commentary on the current trend of students toward quoting from books, actually; and Walt Arndt inconclusively surveys the advertising situation. GAUCHO MATMEN TO MEET LACC, SFS

The Santa Barbara College wrestling team has scheduled two home meets to take place before the end of the current semester. Los Angeles City College will bring a strong squad here this Friday, January 7th, while San Francisco State College will put in an appearance the following afternoon, Saturday, January 8th. Both meets will be held in the Mans' Gym, and will start at 3:00 pm. Admission is free to all.

Los Angeles City College is rat-

ed the strongest team in the metropolitan area, second only to UCLA, and has already shown its power by defeating the Gauchos grapplers earlier in the season in a practice meet, 5 matches to 2. However, Coach Dick Kaywood's team has been strengthened by the arrival of Bill "Skee" Brozowski and George "Hook" Harnden, both of whom have been busy until just before the holidays with football. Both are expected to win their share of matches this season.

San Francisco State boasts an experienced team, led by Joe Kimura in the 128 lb. class, who won the Far Western and Senior

AAU championships in 1946 and 1947, and went to the fourth round in the finals of the Olympic tryouts. Every other member of the team has placed third or better in Northern California Junior AAU championships.

These two meets close the first half of the wrestling season. Shortly after the start of the Spring semester, the varsity wrestling team will meet the El Toro Marines (twice), San Diego Junior College, Cal Poly (twice), and UCLA.

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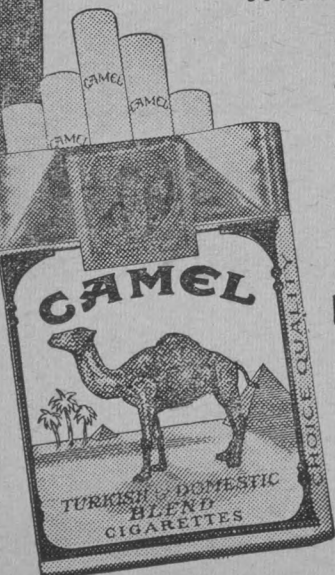

IMPORTANCE SAYS MATHER STUDENT TEACHERS GAIN NEW

A report on student teaching in California was submitted by Dr. Irving A. Mather to a 30-member statewide committee of the California Teachers Association in Los Angeles.

Dr. Mather, Chairman of the Education Department at Santa Barbara College, University of California, described practices in California colleges and universities and made suggestions for improvement. His report was entitled "Selection for and Admission to Student Teaching."

According to Dr. Mather, in-

creasing recognition is being given to the importance of the student teacher's personality and emotional stability. Santa Barbara College is among the institutions which have long laid stress on this phase of the student teacher's development, he said.

viewed from the standpoint of the limited size of the student-body budget as a whole. We therefore have in mind the plan of requesting the University to assume

some of the administrative functions now being performed by the Graduate Manager's office and Publicity Director's office at student expense. Assumption of some of those functions by the University would relieve the students of some of the expense involved.

Our first proposal of that nature referred to the function of providing publicity; it was accepted by the Student Council and was sent to the Provost for his consideration. An article on this

matter appeared in *El Gaucho*.
Thirty cents of the \$7 student-card fee is for Federal Tax on admissions to athletic and other events. It should be emphasized that every penny of the actual student-fee of \$7.50 is spent for service to students and for no other purpose. The student-body budget is compiled yearly by student officers and passed to the student council elected by the student-body itself.

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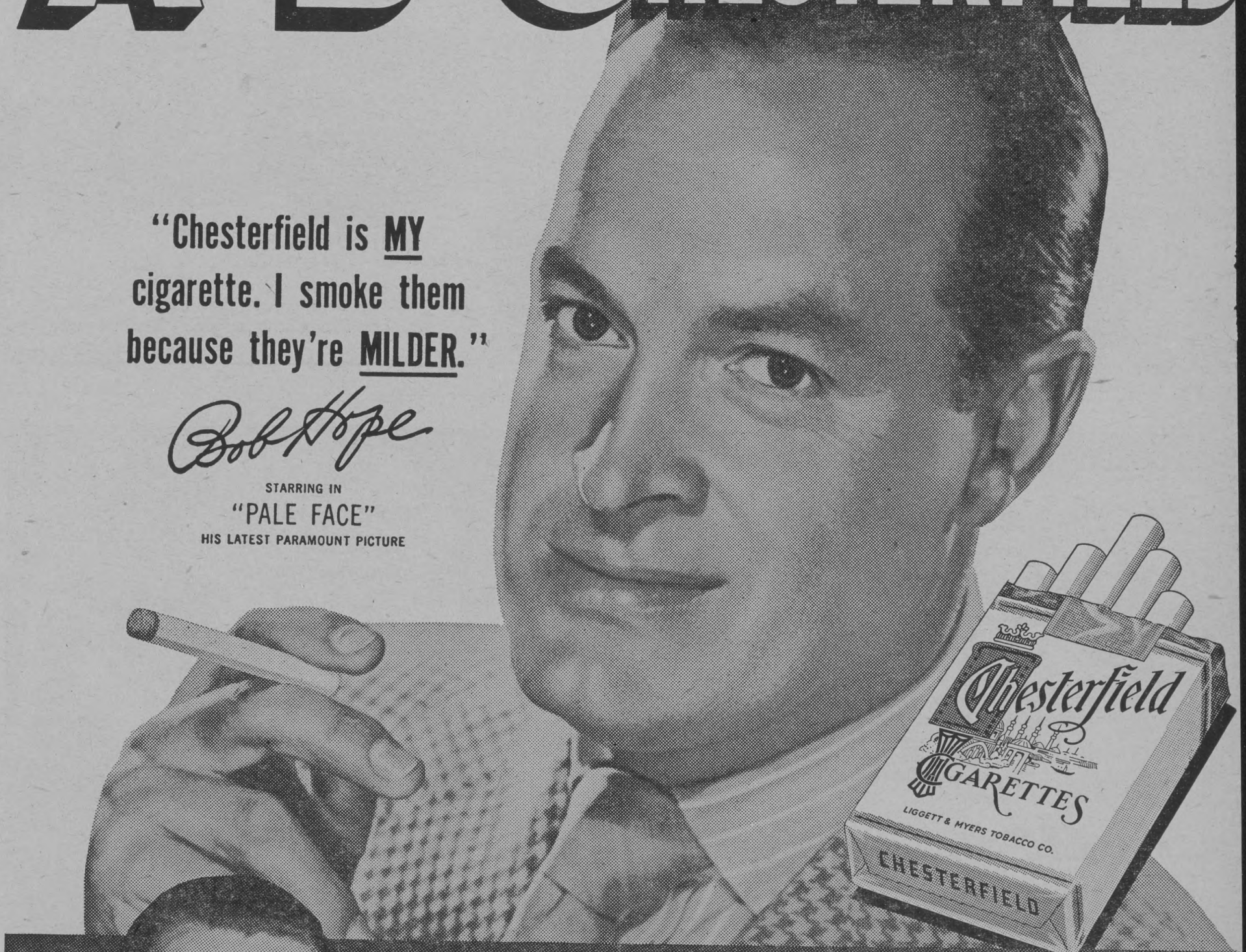
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
