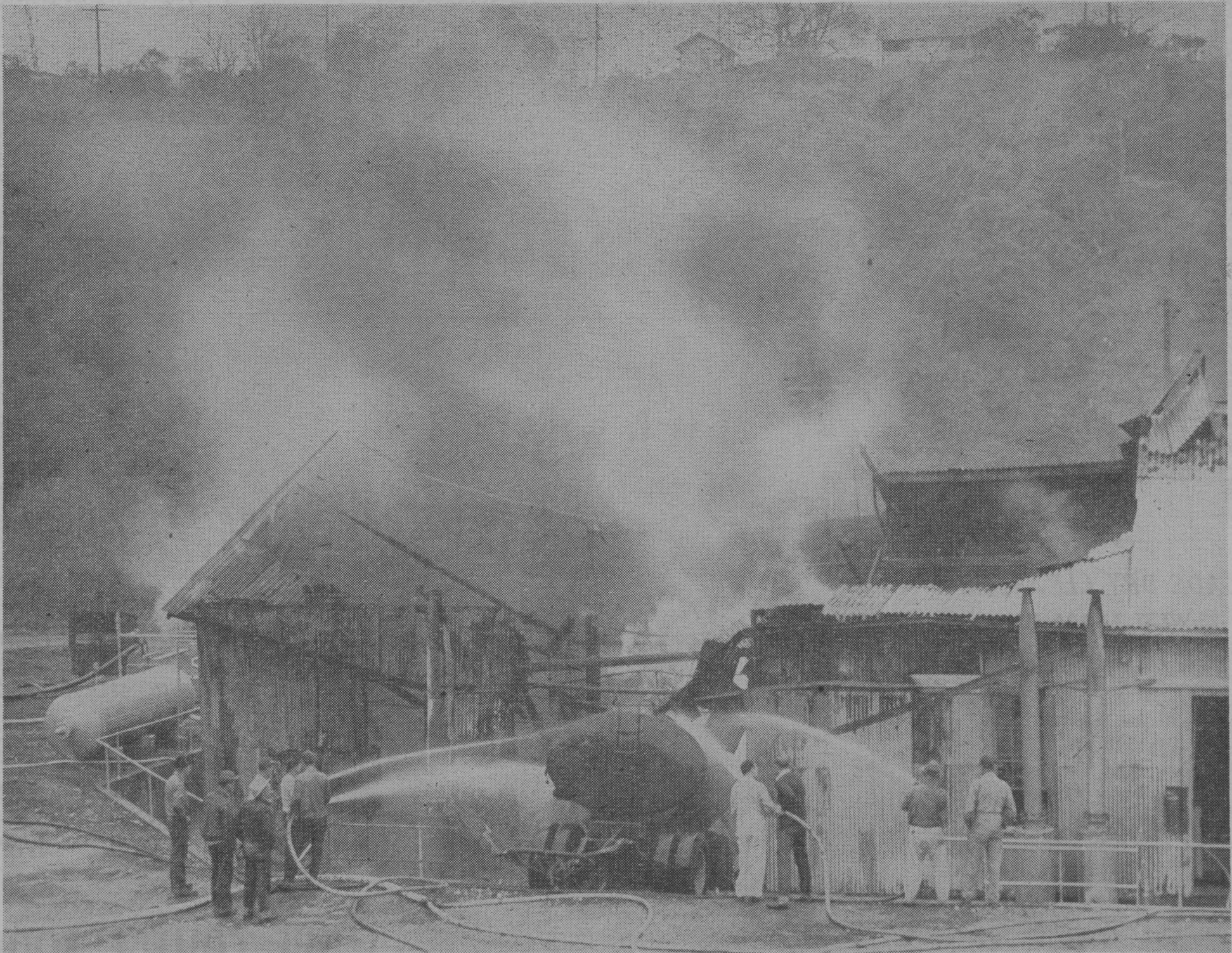

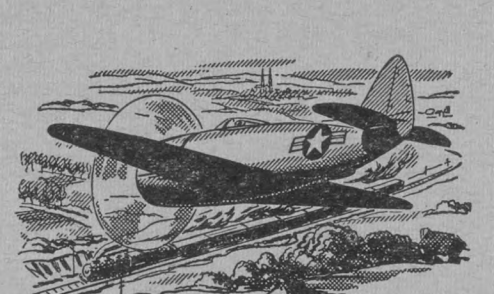
Major Roy Carlson, U. of Iowa, Training Executive, U.S. Air Force!

The Santa Barbara College baseball team made their 1950 Laguna Park debut a winning one as they defeated the Stanford Indians 4-0 on Tuesday night. Diminutive Bob Johnston spread out nine Stanford hits in gaining the shutout victory, and he was aided by brilliant support by his mates.

The Hilltoppers wasted no time in denting the scoring column as they scored their first run in the initial frame. Gil Rayburn singled and went to second base on a wild throw by the Indians' third baseman Cameron. Then after two were down, Shortstop Bill Davis sent a drive into left center field to score Rayburn.

Two More

The Gauchos picked up two more runs in the third on a double by Rayburn, a single by Danny Kutch, and another two bagger

by Davis. The final tally came in the fourth when Tom Dailey singled, and then was forced at second by Johnny Bassler. Johnston attempted to sacrifice, but Stanford's first baseman Clegg dropped the ball, and Bassler went on to third. Bassler scored when Claypool, the Indians' starting hourlier, was charged with a balk.

Johnston, who struck out five men while yielding five free passes, was untouchable in the clutches, and the Stanford nine left 18 men stranded on the basepaths.

The Gauchos hit the road today to play Camp Cooke, and then return for a game tomorrow afternoon against the El Toro Marines at the Mesa diamond. Next Tuesday night, the Gauchos will attempt to gain revenge for a 10-9 loss to UCLA as they play host to the Bruins at Laguna Park.

Cindermen Play Host To Bruins, Cal Poly; Javelin Dual on Tap

Two of the nation's top javelin tossers, Delfs Pickarts and Cy Young, are expected to be the feature attraction tomorrow when Santa Barbara, UCLA and Cal Poly spikesters meet in a triangular meet at La Playa Stadium.

The Bruins' Young, whose best mark for the Bruins this season was a 213 foot, 1 inch effort at the Long Beach Relays, did 224 feet last summer in Europe with an AAU cinder squad. Santa Barbara's Pickarts, who heaved the spear 228, 91/2 inches last summer while abroad, has only competed in one meet this year. That was in a dual meet against Occidental when he copped a first with a heave of 201 feet, 10 inches.

Both juniors, Pickarts and Young are old time rivals. This will be their first meeting of the year as Pickarts missed the Long Beach Relays due to a severe ankle sprain.

Another top event should be the high jump with Willie Dancer of Santa Barbara, John Kalen of UCLA and Doss Sims of Cal Poly shaping up as top contenders.

Dancer's best mark this year was at Occidental when he cleared 6 feet, 6 1/2 inches to break his school record. Kalen's top this spring is 6 feet, 1/2 inch, compared

to Sims' 6 feet. A possible dark-horse is Carl Kraushaar, UCLA's basketball center, who jumped 6 feet, 4 inches in an intramural meet last year. He has not competed in any meets this season.

In the sprints, the top men are Bob Watanabe of UCLA, Dick Johnson of Santa Barbara, and Charles (Dub) Carter of Cal Poly. Watanabe has a clear edge with a 9.8 best on his record.

Roy Engle Still Head Coach: Stan Williamson to Assist As Scout, Line Mentor

Roy Engle will remain Head Football Coach at Santa Barbara College for the 1950 season, it was announced yesterday by Acting Provost J. Harold Williams.

Former Gauche Mentor Stan Williamson has now completed work for his MS degree at USC and will return from a year's sabbatical leave in September to take up duties at Assistant Coach in charge of the line under Engle. He will also take over some of the football scouting assignments.

This joint recommendation by Theodore (Spud) Harder, Director of Athletics, and Terry Dearborn, Chairman of the Men's Physical and Health Education Department, was approved and gives Engle complete charge of the Gauche gridders for the coming Spring practice and for next season.

The decision involves a balancing of instructional and coaching duties and as such affects the Physical Education Department as well as the Athletic Director, who handles the coaching assignments. Because Williamson will not be head coach next year, he will handle an additional academic load in the department, Dearborn said.

It is no way affects the assignments of M. S. (Doc) Kelliber as Assistant Coach in charge of the backfield, a job he has held for the past three football seasons. Engle came to Santa Barbara College last year after three seasons as backfield coach with Jeff Cravath at USC.

Williamson campaigned four seasons with the Gauchos, taking over from Harder in 1941.

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RELEASE SCHEDULE FOR 1950 FOOTBALL NINE GAME SEASON
