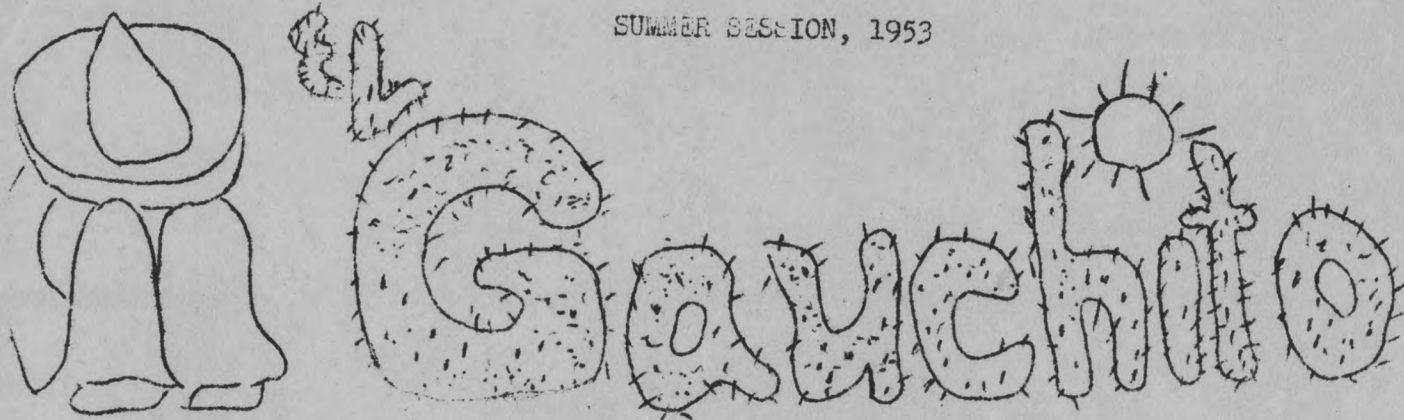

REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

The registration lines will form at 9 a.m. today with non-veteran students to report to the Men's Gymnasium and veteran students reporting to the auditorium in the administration building.

Subject A Examinations will be given this afternoon from 2-5 p.m. in Oak Hall 105.

Those who have not yet obtained a copy of the Summer Session Bulletin which includes all classes scheduled, may secure a copy at the Registrar's office in the Administration Building.

Dr. Paul W. Wright, Registrar announced the addition of two classes in addition to those already listed:

Industrial Arts 11. Woodworking fundamentals, 3 units, daily 8-12 a.m., rm. 116 Mesa campus. Instructor--Holtrop.

Music 30EF. Piano, 1-1 unit, by arrangement with the instructor--Gillespie.

A change of time has been announced for Education 111, Child Growth and Development by Van Deman. It will be given at 9 a.m. in Ridge Hall 104.

For the 1953 summer session there is no minimum load, however 6½ units constitute the maximum load without petition. Excess loads may be granted in exceptional cases by petition when Aug., 1953, or Jan., 1954, graduation would otherwise be hindered. Need for excess programs is to be established by the student and his adviser with approval by the appropriate academic dean.

Classes will begin Monday and July 3, at 3 p.m. will be the deadline for filing registration books with the Registrar's office. July 6 will be the last day to change study program without petition.

The registrar reminds new students planning to attend Santa Barbara College at the regular session next fall that they must file an application in the regular manner. Applications and credentials must be filed in the Registrar's office by Aug. 15. Applications and information are available at the Registrar's office.

ALL REGULAR COLLEGE SERVICES AVAILABLE TO SUMMER SESSION STUDENTS

Santa Barbara College will maintain its regular services for summer session students, including cafeteria service, library service, bookstore, student health center, teacher placement, graduate manager's office, and housing office.

STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE

During the entire summer session, the Student Health Service will provide medical service to students on a 24-hour a day basis. No physical examinations will be required for those attending the summer session.

BOOKSTORE

Beginning today, the College Bookstore will be open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during the registration period. After registration, the hours will be 7:45 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The store will be closed July 1, through the 3rd. for inventory.

An attractive range of articles are on sale at the store, including jewelry and novelties, in addition to classroom supplies and textbooks. Make a call on the bookstore and see what they have available for you.

SNACK BAR

In the California tradition, all food will be served outdoors this summer at the Lone Pine Snack Shack, near Ebbets Hall. Today the Shack will be open from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Beginning Monday for the duration of the summer session, the Shack will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

WANT TO STAY IN SANTA BARBARA AN EXTRA TWO WEEKS?

Students with a bachelors degree or a teaching credential are eligible to attend the annual Institute of Nature Study and Conservation to be given by University of California Extension. All the museums in Santa Barbara and the outdoor laboratories abounding in Santa Barbara will be used for this event. This post-summer session even is scheduled for Aug. 10-22. It will, by the way, provide an opportunity to enjoy Santa Barbara's famous Fiesta.

Field classes in seashore life, native birds, insects, native plants, western trees, rocks and minerals and elementary science methods will be included in the offerings this year. Santa Barbara College faculty members and other local scientists will participate in the Institute.

Undergraduates will be admitted with permission of department chairman and divisional dean.

DEMONSTRATION SCHOOL

Children can attend their own "summer session" this summer at the Santa Barbara College Demonstration School. Registration is being conducted this morning (June 27) from 9 a.m. to noon at Peabody School, in the San Roque district.

This school, designed to demonstrate modern and proven teacher methods for prospective teachers, will be in session from 9 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday during the College summer session. Teachers are all from Santa Barbara city and county schools.

Dr. Lester B. Sands, chairman of the Education Department, is arranging the details of school. He said that youngsters are needed particularly for the kindergarten-junior primary and fifth and sixth grade levels.
