MICHAEL TO SPEAK ON "USE OF PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTS IN COLLEGE SELECTION" TUESDAY

Dr. William B. Michael, until recently director of the Educational Testing Bureau at the University of Southern California and now professor of education and psychology at UCSB, will deliver the Tuesday University Lecture on the "Use of Psychological Tests in College Selection." This talk is scheduled for 3 p.m. in the lecture room of South Hall.

Professor Michael is a nationally known educational consultant and author of three books and literally hundreds of articles and critical reviews on topics in his field. He has been associated with the Educational Testing Service at Princeton and since 1957 has been consultant to InCas (Integrating Child and Society), a non-profit-making foundation involved in interdisciplinary research concerning medical, psychological, educational, and sociological factors in problem and delinquent children and adults. Since last year, Dr. Michael has been research director of this Southern California organization.

"Fifty Books of the Year", ranging from textbooks to cookbooks and including volumes on history, poetry, fiction, and art, will be on display in the library on campus from July 1-15.

The 40th annual exhibition is sponsored by the American Institute of Graphic Arts. The books were selected by a jury of national experts in printing and typographic design from over 800 titles. The "50" were chosen for "consistent and/or inventive topography, and appropriateness of the overall treatment and subject."

Mrs. Edwin Corle of Santa Barbara, who is a member of the library affiliates of the university, is responsible for the two-week exhibition.

In the exhibition there are 15 books from university presses; 16 by museum and private presses; and 19 by trade book publishers. A wide range of Americana, including President Kennedy's Inaugural Address, the Diary and Autobiography of John Adams, and the Life of Abraham Lincoln make up a large segment of the collection.

Of particular local interest is a book of Rico Lebrum drawings designed by Ward Ritchie for the University of California Press. Lebrum, noted California artist, served earlier this year as a Regents Lecturer at UCSB.
