Those for class prexy are the following: Senior class, Janet Leash, Bud Hammerstrom, and Lyle Purdum; Junior class, Richard Bowdy, Marc Haines, and Jack Jardine; Sophomore class, Richard Barr, Bob Christofferson, John McPike, Jim Mulick, and Sally Shepard. One candidate has been placed

on the list for yell leader. He is Vic McCarty. Nine students make up the choices for Representatives at Large. Three positions are open. The aspirants are Robert Anderson, Frank Goodall, Pat Henon, Don Mills, Beverly Purdum, Elaine Strobel, Wayne Templeton, Ken Trevey, and Henry Use.

All those who enjoy the rich blend of men's voices will want to attend the Lobero Theatre this Sunday, May 8, at 3 p. m. for the annual concert given by the Men's Glee Club under the direction of Dr. Walter Buchanan.

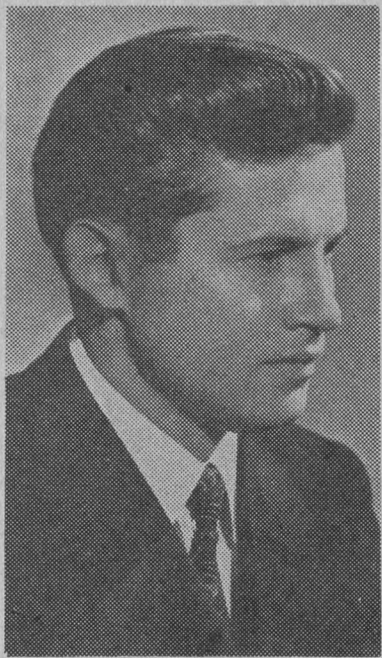
The program is one of great variety. Many types of choral music will be presented. Selections of Bach and Palestrina will represent the greatest in music while sea chanteys and quartet numbers will play rhythm and lightness. There will be an art song, a grand opera selection, and a take-off on grand opera.

The Barber Shoppe numbers will be presented by the Clef Dwellers, a quartet well known on campus for its quality and originality. The Clef Dwellers will use some of their own arrangements.

Setting the stage for the take-off on grand opera, Sam Simons will give a legitimate operatic selection. Half of the glee club will take to the orchestra pit and the other half to the stage to present a fifteen-minute one-act production of grand opera given in a modern fashion. The story will be an apartment house fire. The Clef Dwellers will, in true grand opera style, sing about their plight rather than do anything very practical about it. The music they will sing will bear a striking resemblance to Gounod's Faust and other fair-weather operas.

The Glee Club boasts of a brass band and a string quartet, both of which will be incorporated into the program.

File Scholarship Applications Now

Several scholarships with specialized requirements which are not met by applications now on file have been reopened to new applicants, Dr. E. Allan Williams, chairman of the Honors and Scholarships Committee at Santa Barbara College, University of California, announced today. He urged all students who are interested and believe that they are eligible to file applications immediately.

Applications received have reflected good scholastic standing, Dr. Williams explained, but because of specialized requirements it has been impossible to award some of the scholarships. He has pointed out that only 20 per cent of the applications on file for scholarships can be filled by scholarships now available. Yet less than one-third of the scholarships have been awarded.

One scholarship of \$150 is available to a student from Placer County, California.

Senior Women
Two scholarship of \$100 each are waiting to be awarded to senior women.

Several scholarships of \$70 each carry the following requirements: The recipient must be a citizen of the United States; a descendant by blood from anyone who served in the army or navy in World War I, before July 1, 1918 (i. e. whose father or grandfather, etc., but not uncle, cousin or the like,

Delta Zeta Delta and Pi Beta Phi.

Gamma Delta Chi and Alpha Delta Pi.

Pi Kappa Gamma and Chi Omega.

Sigma Delta Phi and Sigma Kappa.

Tau Gamma Sigma and Alpha Phi.

An eighth local sorority, Delta Sigma Epsilon, already is an affiliate of National Panhellenic Conference and was formerly a member of the Association of Education Sororities.

Colonization

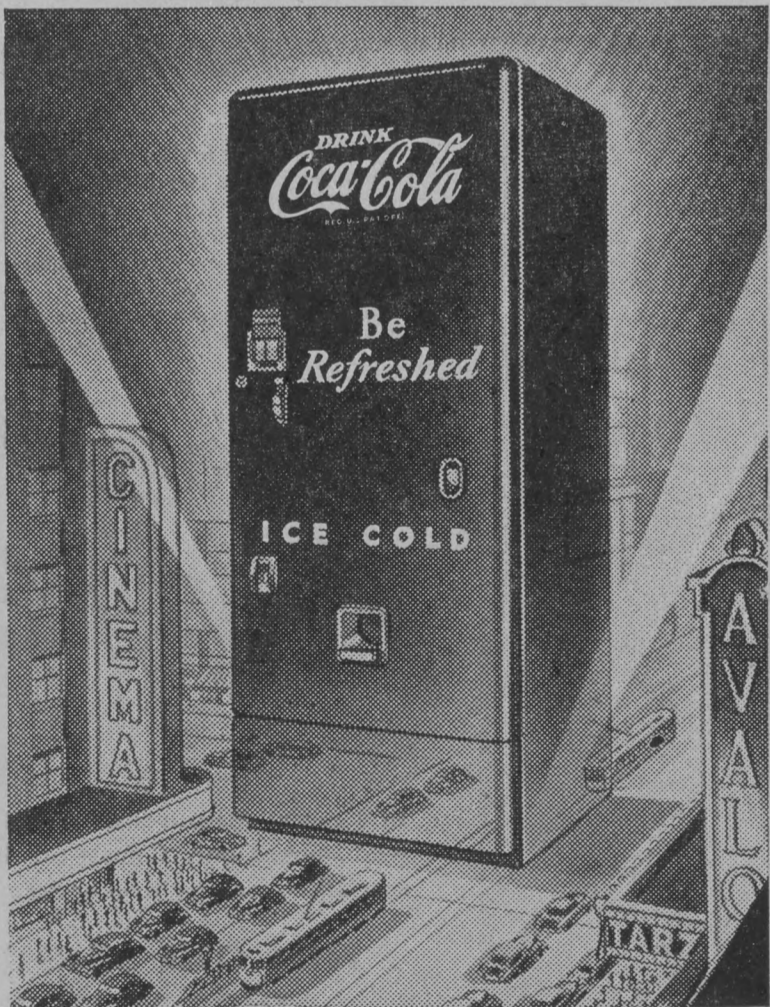

PICKARTS WINS FIRST IN DRAKE RELAYS

Lantagnemen Lick Wounds After Disastrous Vacation Losses, Seek Revenge Against San Diego Tonite

Santa Barbara's luckless baseballers, stung by five losses in their last eight games and fighting to stay out of the conference cellar, meet the San Diego Aztecs in a three-game series here this week-end. The opener is slated for Laguna Park at 8 tonight, and a double header at Cabrillo tomorrow afternoon will wind things up.

The Lantagnemen dropped two out of three to both COP and San Jose during vacation and as a result find themselves in fourth spot in the CCAA with a record of three wins and six losses. During the northern jaunt the Gauchos also lost to Stanford, 8-4, but climaxed their none-too-happy trip by edging California, 7-6, the last day.

Abbott Sparkles

Versatile Hal Abbott won both CCAA games for the Gauchos, besting COP, 7-6, in a thriller and spinning a nifty three hitter against San Jose last Saturday, 3-1. The ace right-hander has won all three league games and at the same time is sporting a .377 batting average for the 17 games to date. Abbott has won three and lost three and leads in strikeouts with 31 to Goedhard's 28.

Neil Goedhard southpawed his way through ten tortuous innings at Berkeley before finally getting the nod over the Bears, 7-6, on the strength of Harold Swift's home run into deep left center with none on in extra innings. Although his mates blasted five Cal hurlers for 13 hits, six Gaucho errors kept the tricky left-hander in all sorts of trouble. He had a 6-3 win all but sewed up when the Bears suddenly exploded for three unearned runs in the last of the 9th to tie up the game. Swift's homer in the 10th gave him a one-run lead but the contest wasn't over until Jackie Jensen took after an outside pitch and popped up to shortstop with the tying run on second base. Goedhard bore down in the pinch and left 16 Bears stranded on the sacks in chalking up his third season triumph against one loss.

Spartans Hot

San Jose pitching was apparently just too much for the Gauchos as they could muster up but six runs in three games. The visitors massacred the locals 21-2 and 5-1 before Abbott stopped them with his 3-hitter in the finale. The only Spartan run off Hal was unearned. Oren Skeith drove in all three Gaucho markers with a homer and a long fly.

Santa Barbara's horsehidiers watched their early lead disintegrate into an 11-9 UCLA victory Tuesday night at Laguna Park as the Bruins combined three walks with three hits and an error to push across six runs in the last of the 8th inning.

Gaucha Willie Dancer added more digits for the locals as he took a third in the high jump with 6 feet 4 7/8 inches. Dwight Eddleman won theevent with a leap of 6 feet 6 7/8 inches.

Bruins Capture Relays

UCLA's power-laden scantyclads captured the number one team spot in the Santa Barbara relays on Saturday, April 23, at the La Playa oval by scoring 65 1/2 points. Santa Barbara's Gauchos finished up in second place with 34 markers.

The Trobables from Southern California annexed the junior college division with 47 1/2 points followed by Los Angeles City College and Pasadena City College with 31 1/10 and 17 points, respectively. In the high school division L. A. Jordan walked away with the title with 120 1/5 points, set-

ting six new records in the victory.

Athletic Club also lifted the spear for 201 feet but the great performer did not officially enter the meet.

Mel Patton threw the discus 150 feet 2 7/8 inches for a new school record although he finished up in second place behind Taylor Lewis of UCLA, who sent the weight 170 feet 5 7/8 inches. John Cooper grabbed high honors in the pole vault, clearing the bamboo at 12 feet 6 inches to finish ahead of John Vujovich of UCLA and Bill Johnson of USC.

Craig Dixon of the Bruins tied his own meet record in the high barriers, winning the event in 14.3 with the wind against him. Dixon also anchored the record breaking UCLA relay team with the winning time of 41.9 seconds, to finish ahead of Patton.

Wilbur Thompson, holder of many records in the shot, added another prize to his long list of victories by sending the bulb 55 feet 1 1/2 inches. In the century the Bruins again came through with their well-balanced power by finishing one-two. Tom Work and Ernie Lightner were the Uclans, followed closely by Dave Gammie
