## Associated Men Hunt Zoot Female

### AMS CITES RULINGS IN QUEEN NOMINATIONS

As nominations for the Gaucho Homecoming Queen hit full stride this week, officials of Associated Men Students, sponsors of the election, laid down rules on who may or may not enter candidates.

All women's or mixed clubs on campus, as well as any individual, may sponsor a Homecoming Queen nominee. The freshman and sophomore classes may also

enter candidates. Only all-male organizations such as fraternities are ineligible to put up the name of their favorite co-ed.

Names and pictures, not larger than 8x10, of candidates should be turned in to the office of Dean Jones before the deadline on Tuesday, October 21. The nominees will be presented to the voters at the AMS smoker at the Naval Reserve Armory Tuesday night, and are urged to attend.

#### "Review" Site

The Queen will be crowned at the Galloping Gaucho Review, and will ride in the honor spot in the Homecoming Parade. Afterwards she and her ladies-in-waiting (runners-up in the contest), together with her escort and AMS president Dale Scott and Mrs. Scott, will be guests of AMS at a reception and dinner at the Native Sons beach club, opposite Marmonte Hotel. The Queen will preside at the dance, sponsored by the Social Committee, which will wind up Homecoming Day at the Armory.

### Campus, City To Be Decorated For Homecoming

Flags, bunting, crepe paper, perhaps even strings of alternating pretzels and beer bottles will festoon the Gaucho campus, the fraternity houses and the city of Santa Barbara when SBC alumni return for the annual Homecoming on November 1.

In preparation for this colorful welcome, campus organizations should begin dreaming up decorative ideas, according to Ed Morris, chairman of the Rally Committee. The frat house with the best-looking and most novel decorations will be awarded a cup donated by the Freshman class, who will be the judges, Morris said.

#### All Represented

Every Gaucho organization will be represented in the Homecoming Parade by a large emblematic poster, and Morris urged that all campus groups begin planning their posters immediately.

He also stated that the Galloping Gaucho Review has an opening for one more act, and anyone interested should contact George Stone, director of the show. Two cups will be awarded for the outstanding performances in the Review.

### Community Chest Opens

"Who me? Yes you!" With that as their slogan, the Santa Barbara Community Chest has begun a drive for funds for this year. The Community Chest benefits many of our needy charities in one fell swoop, eliminating many individual requests for contributions.

The Chest works on the theory that "Everybody Benefits When Everybody Gives," for contributions aid directly 40 per cent of the donors, and the others indirectly. By helping youth organizations it decreases juvenile delinquency, and aids the poor and needy of our own town.

This money does not go pouring off into the distance, but mostly remains here to help our own people. Remember, YOU benefit from your contribution, so give as much as you can. That 65 per cent is a short amount, but you can stretch it a little, can't you?

Movies of the Gaucho-Oxy football game, and possibly of tonight's match at San Jose will be featured on the program of the men's "smoker" sponsored by Associated Men Students at the Naval Armory next Tuesday night, October 21. The time will be 7:30 and not 8:00 as previously announced.

Also scheduled for the stag events are three boxing bouts, one starring Bob Garcia vs. Bill Cormier, a contest for the degree of B.U.—bachelor of ugliness; and several student acts, including Ed Beamer at the piano. The candidates in the Homecoming Queen election will be presented to the male population of SBC, and are urged to attend the smoker.

Among the guests will be a faculty representative from each department.

Two door prizes will be awarded, and AMS officials promise plenty of free cigars and cigarettes.

Every man on campus automatically becomes a member of AMS upon registration, and his AMS card, which cost \$1.00, entitles him to admission to the smoker and all other AMS functions. Cards may be purchased at the Naval Armory door.

#### Dean For Each

Under the new action, authorized by revisions in faculty by-laws, each division will be headed by a dean and a faculty advisory committee.

The two-divisional plan will emphasize a broader and better intergraded curriculum for each student than under the present departmentalized set-up. Strict departmental lines will tend to disappear as specializing students find pertinent courses outside the field of their particular major. Faculty members believe the revised curriculum will develop a new kind of specialist—the student interested in wide yet intelligently related study in all fields.

"Our problem now," stated one faculty member, "is to decide what courses constitute the best possible liberal education. Stress will be placed, not on the department offering a course, but on the course itself—its scope and its aims."

#### Which Courses?

It is not yet known specifically what courses will be added to or withdrawn from the present catalog. The faculty will devote the next several months to working out this problem in the light of the new liberalized ideal, and changes will be made gradually. The 1948 catalog will show the two-divisional set-up, but is not expected to reflect the great change in the content of the courses now offered.

#### Requires OK

The plan still requires approval of the coordinating academic council, certain University of California administrative officers and the Board of Regents.

The faculty agreement on administrative details implements a resolution taken last spring approving the establishment of a two-division curriculum. It was a first step in the growth of the college to a distinctive institution.

# THE BLACK HOLE

Do you realize that YOU—individually—may be the partial cause of a crisis in the usual serene life of Santa Barbara College? Lets measure up and see how you stand.

The bodies of over 2600 Gaucho students cover the campus lawn like locusts, hang out windows and classrooms, and make the cafeteria resemble the "Black Hole." Circumstances don't permit immediate building expansion to accommodate this greatly increased enrollment, so cooperation is the only answer.

Specifically, the aforementioned crisis lies in the cafeteria.

At almost every hour of the regular school day a person interested in taking on provisions must scan the horizon well to find a clear table and chair to comfort him with his food. During the noon rush hour—heaven forbid! Vishinsky HIMSELF would find it difficult to talk someone out of a chair.

It doesn't have to be as bad as all this. A small but potent lobby is holding out for higher wages—namely, the bridge fiends.

### ATTENTION, CAR OWNERS

1. Cars are not permitted to park in any zone extending from the Practice Cottage to Ridge Hall, excepting those cars belonging to the faculty, entitled by permit.
2. Faculty cars are not permitted to park in any manner contrary to posted signs or in any way to obstruct traffic or fire laws or fire escapes.
3. Speed limit: 15 miles per hour is the speed limit on campus and then only if pedestrian traffic is clear.
4. No car shall drive in a direction contrary to the posted signs, unless directed to do so by an officer of the Santa Barbara College Police.
5. No cars shall be permitted in the area blocked off by posts put there for that purpose unless directed to do so by a police officer of the University.
6. No cars of the faculty or students shall park in any of the marked Special or Provost, unless directed to do so by a police officer of the University.
7. No cars of either faculty or students shall be permitted to park all night.
8. No cars shall be permitted to park within 15 feet of any fire plug or hydrant.
9. No cars are to be parked in the parking lot in any manner which would obstruct traffic coming in or going out.
10. No private cars shall be permitted to park in the area adjacent to the store room except for the purpose of loading or unloading instructional equipment.
11. No cars are permitted to park within 15 feet of any building, nor shall they be permitted to park between any building on University property.
12. All persons shall conform to and abide by all orders and directions issued by a police officer of the Santa Barbara College Police.
13. All violations of the above shall be classed as to the seriousness of the offense and shall be dealt with accordingly.

Notices of float entries in the Gaucho Alumni Homecoming Parade on November 1, are pouring in to Virgil Bryan, parade marshal, and organizations which have not filed entries have until next Friday to do so.

No more than \$30.00 may be spent on any float. Prizes will be awarded to the three entries most effectively and originally complying with the Homecoming theme, "Rolling Home."

The parade will form at 1:30 p.m. on Chapala street north of Haley, and will move at 2:30. Parade units will be assigned specific numbers.

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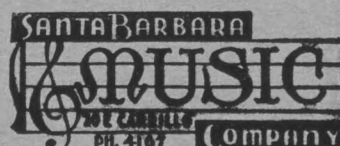
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# THE CAMPUS CORNER

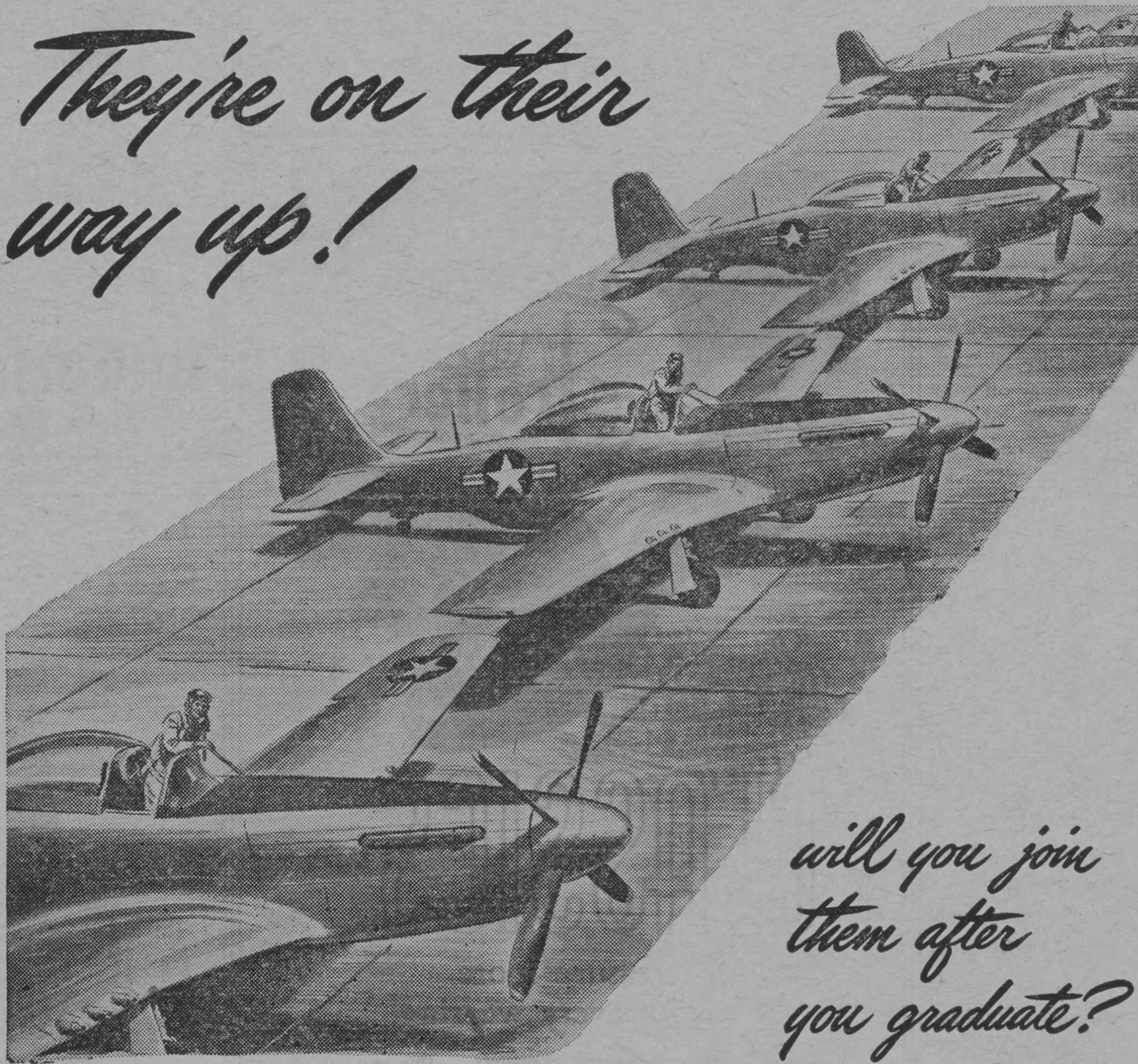
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
