- 1. Cars are not permitted to park in any zone extending from the Practice Cottage to Ridge Hall, excepting those cars belonging to the faculty, entitled by permit.
- Faculty cars are not permitted to park in any manner contrary to posted signs or in any way to obstruct traffic or Dear Editor: fire laws or fire escapes.
- Speed limit: 15 miles per hour is the speed limit on campus and then only if pedestrian traffic is clear.
- No car shall drive in a direction contrary to the posted signs, unless directed to do so by an officer of the Santa Barbara College Police.

- No cars shall be permitted to park within 15 feet of any fire plug or hydrant.
- No cars are to be parked in the parking lot in any manner which would obstruct traffic coming in or going out.
- No private cars shall be permitted to park in the area adjacent to the store room except for the purpose of loading or unloading instructional equipment.






