Owen Directs Seminary Choristers in A.W.S. Men's Club Meet

State college students were entertained in a combined A.W.S.-Men's club meeting Tuesday morning second hour with a concert by Father Owens and his St. Anthony's Seminary choir.

Following an introduction by Alfredo Chavez, program chairman of the Men's club, Father Owen gave a brief summary of the origin of the spiritual songs, telling of their introduction to this country by the padres, and having been sung by the Indians in the same manner as was preserved by the boys in their presentation.

The first half of the program consisted of Acapella interpretations of Easter anthems and negro spirituals, opening with the entire group in their full length robes of their order, singing "Dios Te Salve Maria," an old mission hymn, and Guender's "Sandtus."

These were followed by Easter songs: "O Filii ea Filii," Leo Wersharr and Perome Ahles as soloists, "Jesus Christ Is Written Today" and "Terra Teremuit," by Nekes. Original versions of negro spirituals with Lea Wershaar, Philip Corner, Jerome Ahles and Father Owen as soloists. Louis Barela, in the typical sombrero and colored serape of Mexico, began the latter half of the program, which included a humorous Mexican mask dance, a Santa Barbara folk song and a rain song.

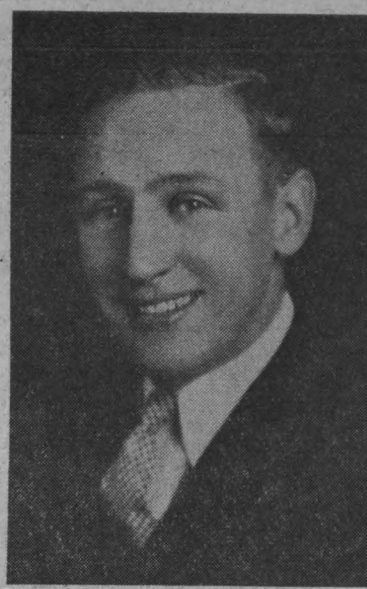
