## Dr. Goodspeed to Speak on Foreign Policy Tomorrow

The highly-controversial issue of where American foreign policy is heading will be discussed by Dr. Stephen S. Goodspeed, assistant professor of political science at Santa Barbara College, in an address at 4 pm Wednesday, February 21.

His talk on "The Foundations of American Foreign Policy" will open the All-College Lecture Series for the Spring Semester, in Room 100 of Pine Hall on the Riviera Campus of Santa Barbara College. The series is sponsored by University of California Extension in cooperation with the Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music.

Open to all students, the Wednesday series will present a number of leading college speakers on literary, art, military science, history, economics and nutrition subjects.

Among the noted lecturers from out of town will be Dr. Edgar Johnson Goodspeed, uncle of the local faculty member, widely-known publisher whose latest work, "A Life of Jesus" recently received acclaim in *The Saturday Review of Literature*. Dr. Edgar Goodspeed, who will speak April 4, will also exhibit a rare collection of Bibles.

The appearances of Dr. Edgar Goodspeed and that of Curt Stern, professor of Zoology at UC, Berkeley, on May 2, have been designated as Provost's lectures.

## UCSBC Women Attend Dances in Capacity Of Junior Hostesses

Groups of Santa Barbara College women have been serving as parties in well-chaperoned trips junior hostesses at Army and Navy under the supervision of the Dean of Women in a program which has been in effect since December 19.

Since its December inaugural when the first group went to Camp Cooke, the program has steadily increased and has been well-received by both the service men and the college women.

### Sign-Up

According to Miss Ellen Bowers, acting Dean of Women at the College, the women students were given an opportunity to sign up for the junior hostess program at the time of spring semester registration. Three hundred and twelve women signed up for the program.

At several of the parties that the hostesses attended, special decorations were put up in their honor, sometimes in the Gaucho colors of blue and gold. Although nothing definite has been announced, several proposals have been made to occasionally hold formal military balls with the girls wearing formals.

### Camp Cooke Parties

As many as 60 girls at one time have attended parties at Camp Cooke, groups of eight have gone to the Red Shield Service Salvation Army Club on Saturday nights, and groups of around 40 have gone to parties at Port Huene. They have also attended parties at the Recreation Center and the Carrillo Auditorium.

The Associated Women Students of which Jean Tahajian is president, has charge of coordinating the groups making the trips.

**Applying the 'Cosmopolitan' Ideal . . .**

One of the aims of this newspaper during the past year has been to be as "cosmopolitan" as possible in its coverage of social events and in the mention of names in its columns. By "cosmopolitan" we mean the inclusion of names and personalities from a variety of groups on campus, independent as well as Greek.

For example, in the gossip column and other columns, where it would be much easier to write only about the people we personally know, we attempt to ferret out the names of Greeks and independents alike and to divide the space up as much as possible. When this is not done, it is probably because one group is more active than the others, or because one group gives us more information than the others.

We wish we could say that other student committees and organizations on this campus are as "cosmopolitan" as we try to be, but that is not the case. Often when a committee or staff is appointed for some important honor or task the appointees are taken from the same group, with no attempt being made to spread the responsibilities and/or honors around. Everyone knows that this is not fair, and many complaints are made, but little is done about the matter. If everyone who reads this editorial would keep the ideal of being "cosmopolitan" in mind and apply it when the time comes, a much friendlier and happier spirit would pervade this campus.

**Veterans Reminded of Withdrawal Regulations**

All veterans under Public Law 346 are requested to carefully follow the university procedures established for withdrawal in order that the university may cooperate fully with the Veterans Administration in its attempt to prevent subsistence overpayments.

There are three reasons for overpayment of subsistence in colleges and universities:

1. Registered veteran students leave school without following the regular withdrawal procedure.
2. Registered veteran students drop courses or fail to attend them without following the regular "petition to change study list" procedure.
3. Registered veteran students in fall semesters, who graduate or fail to return for any reason in spring semesters, fail to notify the Office of Veterans Affairs on their campuses prior to the opening of the spring semester.

A squad of 28 varsity baseball aspirants reported to Santa Barbara Head Baseball Coach Spud Harder officially opening workouts in preparation for the defense of their CCAA southern division championship.

### Racketeers Swing Into Early Play

Turning out in force to open the 1951 Gaucho tennis season, 24 candidates met Tennis Coach Lyle Reynolds to begin competition for places upon the playing ladder and to start conditioning.

A round-robin tourney is being played to determine actual standings upon the eight man playing ladder with an over-all squad total of fifteen members, including player-manager Glen Vaughn.

However, for the meet over the weekend which was played against Cal Tech at Pasadena, Reynolds released the names of returning lettermen Hilbert Lee, Cal Cory, Bob Chapman and Arnold Funai, who participated along with Joe Zoller, a transfer from El Camino; John C. Chatfield of Glendale; Wendall Niles and Santa Barbarans Milan Thompson and Jim Westwick.

Raynolds says the squad was considerably weakened by the ineligibility of Don Tully, No. 2 man of last year's third place Gaucho team. However, top man Hilbert Lee and No. 3 boy Cal Cory will be around along with transfer Joe Zoller to round out the top trio, exact ranking being still in doubt.

Last year's runner-up, Pepperdine, is admittedly the power of the CCAA, while Reynolds figures to improve the Gauchos' standing this year also.

A sixteen game schedule has been released which includes a double meeting with each of the conference foes and a CCAA tournament to determine league standings.

This Friday, the first home game will take place at the Montecito Country Club against the local Koury All-Stars. Spectators are encouraged to attend.

Harder sounds an optimistic note by saying that the brightest spot in the Gaucho horsehide picture is the addition of two pitching aces — Wynn Smallwood of Glendale and Ray Rubenstein, a transfer from Pasadena CC. Right hander Smallwood, and southpaw Rubenstein will join portside Bob Johnston, the top Conference pitcher in 1950, to round out the pitching staff to date. Johnston won 11 and lost six last year.

On the receiving end of the offerings of the aforementioned mounds-men, is a group of catching candidates from which Harder is expecting much. Ray Knerr, from Pasadena, and Roger Wilson from Santa Rosa have looked especially good in preliminary workouts.

The Gaucho outfield looks pretty well despite the loss of lettermen Gil Rayburn and Harold Swift. In right field, Harder has Dave Gorrie, a footballer who made All-CCAA last season, but still calls baseball his best sport. Eddie Miller, a Compton transfer, will probably patrol left of centerfield Alan Cox. Cox is a veteran Gaucho lead-off man and leading base thief. He hit .253 while stealing 15 bases in 27 starts. All three outfielders are left-hand hitters.

Harder is unsure of his infield with the absence of third baseman Tom Dailey, shortstop Bill Davis and utility man Jack Huntsinger, all good hitters and fine infielders. To plug the hole at third, Dick Gorrie, Gaucho quarterback, has first call to perform with Knerr, Wilson, or Chuck Terry, all catchers but available for duty in the hot spot.

Danny Kutch has moved to shortstop with his old spot at second to be handled by football end George Mattias. The first sacker isn't picked yet but Harder indicated he may move Corkey Johnson, a pitcher last season, into the position. Johnson batted .263 last year playing irregularly. Another candidate for the job is Bob Talley, a left-hander from last year's squad.

Competition will open against the Alum squad in their annual meet on the Mesa field February 24.

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## Board Will Screen Students Interested In Diplomatic Careers

Miss Bowers, Dr. Jones and Mr. Reynolds have been appointed by Dr. J. Harold Williams, Provost, as a nominating board to act in a clearing and recommending capacity for any students interested in careers in the U. S. Department of State.

Interested women students should see Dean Bowers and men students should see Dean Reynolds on or before February 20, 1951.

### Program Provided

Outstanding students who are recommended to the Department and who show promise of being able to qualify for key career jobs in the future will be provided with a program of work experience and training.

The training will include approximately nine months of (1) specialized instruction at the Foreign Service Institute, (2) rotational and observational assignments, (3) special work assignments in one or more areas of the Department, (4) preparation of special reports, and (5) periodic seminars and conferences.

### Permanent Assignments

At the successful completion of the training program, permanent assignments will be made, when appropriate vacancies exist, to the areas for which Interns prove best qualified.

In addition to the assignments made in the Intern Program, a number of appointments will be made to the Department's Offices and divisions to fill existing vacancies.

### Salary

Salary runs from \$3,000 to \$3,450 per annum.

To be eligible candidates must have: (1) taken the Junior Management Assistant and Social Science Assistant Examination, (2) have outstanding character and leadership ability, (3) have ability to express himself effectively, both in speech and in writing, (4) have bearing and manner which would enable him to make favorable representations on behalf of the United States Government, (5) have received an undergraduate degree before July, 1951, with major study or demonstrated interest in such fields as History, Economics, Political Science, Geography, International Relations, Law, Public Administration, Public Relations, Social Psychology, Anthropology, Foreign Languages, and International Law, (6) must be an American citizen, and (7) must be in good health.

### Home Service

Positions are in the home service with temporary overseas assignments at the discretion of the Department.
