Dances of the Nations Featured in PE Show

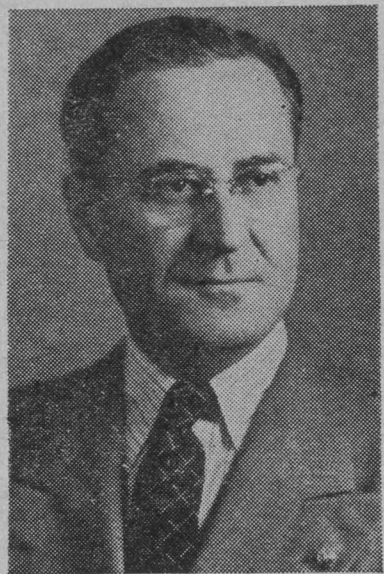
Final rehearsals are scheduled this next week for "Dance We Must," the ninth annual dance concert to be presented by the women's physical education department, Friday and Saturday evenings, March 21 and 22. This title, "Dance We Must," taken from a book by Ted Shawn, was chosen because the program of dances attempts to show that all through the ages, since primitive times, man has danced.

The first group, Dance as Ritual, opens with a very striking ancient temple dance. June Hellweg planned this number, and she is assisted by Mary Lou Lewis, Marion Nelson, and Connie Peugh. The accompaniment will be with a gong and drum and other percussion instruments. The Greek and Medieval periods are also included in this group of ritualistic dances.

In the next part of the program, dance is treated as spectacular and elegant. This is the age of the court dances and the ballet. The Pavane, a stately, dignified dance followed by the livelier Gaillard, make up the Pre-Classical Suite. A court scene, complete with a king, jester, ballerina, trumpeters, and court ladies is the setting for the typical flourishes and maneuvers of a large group Ballet.

The Romantic period opens the last part of the program. This, a solo danced by Virginia Coble, represents the emotional dance, a result of the freeing of dance from its traditional techniques. A jazz number and a modern dance of the Contemporary period conclude the program.

Gauchos Play Host; Six-Score Musicians Gather for Symphony

Outstanding young talent of some two-score or more high schools from all parts of Southern California will gather again in the city this month to demonstrate the wealth of ability and enthusiasm in the field of orchestra music when the All-Southern California High School Symphony Orchestra concert, a Santa Barbara tradition of seven years' standing, will be presented on Monday, March 24.

Sponsored by the Associated Students and the music department of Santa Barbara College, University of California, the event is again being directed by Maurice Faulkner of the music faculty who has handled the details of the project since its inception in 1941, except for the war years when he was in the service and the event was handled by Edwin F. Jones, also of the music department.

LERT TO CONDUCT
Dr. Richard Lert, conductor of the Pasadena Civic Orchestra and musical director of the Pasadena Music Association, with an international reputation of music director, will weld the young musicians into a symphonic ensemble and conduct their concert in the Lobero Theater, March 24.

150 APPLICANTS
Some 150 young students have applied for places in the orchestra and from these about 125 players will be selected. These young musicians will be housed during their brief stay in the city in private homes under the auspices of the college faculty.

Gauche Ballteam Takes Twin Win

The 1947 Gauche baseball season got off to a flying start last week-end when the Pamorus rider nine downed two formidable foes. Friday afternoon, Spud's boys downed a sailor squad from Port Hueneme 4 to 3; then they came back to following day to outslug a flashy Redlands college team 18 to 13.

Coach Harder was well-pleased with the showing of his squad and is hopeful for another pair of victories this week. The S.B.C. nine will travel to Whittier to tangle with the Poets, Friday, then scoot back up to resortville for a battle with Cal Poly Saturday. The main weakness that showed up in last week's tilts was weak pitching and over-anxiousness in the outfield. Coach Spud is hopeful for a remedy in the chugging staff; by the time this goes to press, the staff may be bolstered by Cecil Neal and Greg Smith, both of whom are good moundsmen and will strengthen the squad a good deal. The other evil will only be cured by action under fire. This week the outperch boys hurried their tosses and therefore missed some good assists.

At this time the coach is only contemplating one change; he may shift Al Katich from the initial sack to the outfield in order to get another portside hitter in the line-up.

The Cal Poly tussle will be the first 2C2A battle for the Gauchos, and a win will start them off on their 1947 championship march.

Pomona's Track Power Subdues Gauche Squad

Chuck Skidmore, a man who had a hard time making points last season was virtually hero-for-a-day for the Gauche track squad in their 78½ to 582/3 loss to Pomona last Friday, in obtaining 10 of the Gauchos' total points. Chuck registered wins in the one and two mile runs.

No doubt Santa Barbara's chances for a win would have been much greater with the services of Sammy Cathcart in the hurdles, Mel Patton in the dashes, and Earl Engman in the high jump. Sammy because of the boxing team was unable to participate and the other two men were kept out of the mentioned events because of injuries. However, Patton scored a second place in the discus.

High point man for the day was Pomona's Jack Riddle, gaining 11¼ points for wins in the 440, 220, and with the relay team.

Other first place winners for Santa Barbara were Nelson in the 120-yard high hurdles, Cole in the 880, Cooper in the polevault and Grabast in the shot put.

Musical Given In Auditorium Makes Big Hit

Ranging in scope from undulating hula girls to maudlin hill-billy soup, a musical production, "The Maestro's Nightmare," was presented last night to a packed house in the Riviera campus auditorium. The show was apparently greeted with unanimous approval.

Placed in the capable hands of Professor Maurice Faulkner, the music direction was rendered in magnificent style, which definitely set the mood for the entire production.

Among the surfeit of outstanding entertainers were the following: Pat Sparrow, in an original interpretation of dances set to colored folk-songs; Martin G. Brown, as the bandmaster whose dream is the theme for the multiplicity of musical scenes which follow; Nicki Uyebara, who takes us back to the average individual's conception of Hawaii as a glamorous bit of Paradise.

Gauchos Race Second In 2C2A Hoop Standing

Santa Barbara shared a second place standing in the 2C2A basketball league, dividing the honors in a three-way tie with San Jose and San Diego State. Each of the teams won five games and lost five. In offense the Gauchos scored 502 points, ranking second only to College of Pacific who scored 579. In defense, however, the Gauchos slipped to fourth.

HUBLER MAY BE TOP MAN

Officially, Harvey Hubler, Santa Barbara center, earned second place laurels in the California Athletic Association basketball scoring race with a total of 141 points scored in ten conference games averaging him 14.1 digits per contest. But according to information received at the Graduate Manager's office, Hubler actually totaled 159 points rather than the previously accredited 141. This office has taken steps to contact the 2C2A secretary in Fresno to correct the discrepancy. If Hubler is awarded the 159 points it will place him 2 points above C.O.P.'s now all-conference center, John Toomay, who has a total of 157.

GAUCHOS ON ALL-STAR TEAM

In two all-star basketball teams selected by a committee of basketball coaches Santa Barbara placed three men along with the three players chosen from C.O.P.'s championship quintet. Harvey Hubler again represented the Gauchos as forward on the first team while Quentin Sims and Bob Sherman were elected forwards on the second team.

The team which will accompany him is expected to include Bobby Wright in the number one singles spot. Constitutional Revisions Which Will Be Voted Upon at

Election on these proposed revisions to the Constitution of the Associated Students, University of California, Santa Barbara College. Polls for general election on these changes will be open on Wednesday, March 19 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Three polling places will be available, two on the Riviera and one on the Mesa campus. Riviera polls will be located outside the office of the graduate manager and by the student mail boxes. On the Mesa campus the poll will be located in the Industrial Education office.

In order to vote it will be necessary to present student body cards. Three-fourths of the student body must vote in order to make the election valid.

The following changes were requested by the departments concerned and were compiled by the constitution revision committee, headed by student body vice-president Del Beissel:

Proposed revisions to the Constitution of the Associated Students, University of California, Santa Barbara College:

REVISIONS

- Article III, delete the word "extension" to read as follows:
Limited students may purchase an Associated Students card if they desire and may receive the benefits of active membership subject to the provisions of this constitution and by-laws.
- Article II, add c to read as follows:
Associate membership may be granted under conditions prescribed by the Legislative Council and approved by the Administration.
- Article III, Section 1a, No. 4, delete the word Yell leader to read as follows:
4. Head Cheer leader.
- Article III, Section 1b, rewrite to read as follows:
b. Non-voting members of the Legislative Council shall be the following:
1. Graduate Manager of the Associated Students.
2. Director of Publicity.
3. One faculty member appointed by the Provost of the College.
4. Dean of Men.
5. Dean of Women.
6. Member of the Santa Barbara College Alumni Association.
- Article III, Section 2a, add No. 5 to read as follows:
a. Membership:
1. President of the Associated Students.
2. Vice-president of the Associated Students.
3. Secretary of the Associated Students.
4. Chairman of the Finance Committee.
5. Advisor, elected by cabinet.
- Article IV, Section 1a, delete word Yell leader, and substitute word Head Cheer leader to read as follows:
a. In a regular election the President, Vice-president, Secretary, and Head Cheer leader of the Associated Students shall be chosen to hold office for one year.
- Article IV, Section 1b, delete the word choose and substitute the word elect to read as follows:
b. Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes each elect two representatives to the Legislative Council, one man and one woman, to hold office for one year.
- Article IV, Section 1b, add numbers 1 and 2 to read as follows:
1. Representatives will be elected at the Regular Associated Students elections held in the Spring semester

- Article IV, Section 1e, rewrite No. 2 to read as follows:
2. They shall be regularly enrolled students, each semester during the term of their office.
- Article IV, Section 1e, add numbers 5, 6, 7, 8, to read as follows:
5. Candidates must be approved by an Election Committee appointed by the Vice-president.
6. They must file their name in the Graduate Manager's office twelve (12) school days previous to the election.
7. Between the time his eligibility is established and a petition is issued, each candidate will have successfully passed an examination on this constitution and by-laws of the Associated Students. Failure to pass said examination will result in the disqualification of the nominee.
8. Each eligible candidate or his campaign manager will obtain from the Graduate Manager a petition upon which will be secured the signatures of at least ten (10) percent of the regular members of the Associated Students. The petition will be returned to the Graduate Manager's office one day previous to the Campaign Assembly. Any Associated Student member may sign one or more petitions for the same office.
- Article IV, Section 1f, rewrite to read as follows:
f. The Head Cheer leader shall have maintained a "C" average or above in work at this and/or other collegiate institutions, and shall have been in regular attendance not including extension work at the University of California, Santa Barbara College, at least one semester prior to nomination. Candidate must also comply with Sections 1e, 2, 5, 6, 7, and 8.
- Article IV, Section 1g, rewrite to read as follows:
g. The Chairman of the Election Committee must file with the Faculty Eligibility Committee the names of nominees eleven (11) days before election.
- Article IV, Section 1j, rewrite to read as follows:
j. Any person who shall receive a majority of all votes cast for the office for which he is a candidate shall be declared elected to that office, providing the candidate has complied with the requirements set forth in Article IV, Section 1e, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. In the event no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast for that office, a second election shall be held within five (5) days at which time the office in question shall be filled from the candidate receiving the highest number of votes in the first election and the candidate or candidates receiving the second highest number of votes. Additional elections shall be held until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast for that office.
- Article IV, Section 4b, delete word September, substitute the word October to read as follows:
b. Freshman class officers and council representatives shall be elected in the month of October and shall not be chosen from those taking extension classes. They shall carry at least ten (10) units of college work each semester during the term of their office.
- Article IV, Section 4d, delete the

- Article V, Section 5, rewrite to read as follows:
5. During the school year, he shall render a complete quarterly financial report to the Pre-audit Committee, Finance Committee and Legislative Council.
- Article V, Section 13, rewrite to read as follows:
13. The Graduate Manager shall appoint and terminate the duties of the Director of Publicity with the approval of the Legislative Council. The Director of Publicity's budget shall be under the supervision and responsible to the Graduate Manager.
- Article X, Section 2e, rewrite to read as follows:
e. Be a member of the Assembly Committee, Activities Control Board, Music Control Board, and Speech Control Board.
- Article X, Section 4, rewrite to read as follows:
The Head Cheer leader shall:
20. Article XI, Section 1, add g to read as follows:
a. Assembly Committee.
b. Awards Committee.
c. Finance Committee.
d. Pre-audit Committee.
e. Rally Committee.
f. Social Committee.
g. Publicity Committee.
- Article XI, Section 4, add d to read as follows:
d. The decisions of the committees are not final, but must be approved by the Legislative Council.
- Article XI, Section 7b, number 3, rewrite to read as follows:
3. This committee shall study all requests for allotments from Associated Students funds, and make recommendations to the Legislative Council. Any requests over and above the original budget shall be recommended to the Pre-audit committee, and then to the Legislative Council.
- Article XI, Section 8, rewrite to read as follows:
The Pre-audit Committee acts in behalf of the Provost to insure that Student Body expenditures are properly made and that they conform to the policy of the University.
a. Membership:
1. Three faculty members appointed by the Provost.
2. President of the Associated Students.
b. Duties and Powers:
1. This committee must approve the proposed Associated Students Budget for the succeeding year before it is presented to the Associated Student Body members for their vote, so that it may conform to the policy of the University of California.
2. All expenditures over and above the original budget must have the approval of this committee.
3. If any unauthorized obligations should be incurred, it will be charged to the person or organization responsible for it. In any such case a settlement satisfactory to the Pre-audit Committee will have to be made.
4. The Graduate Manager shall make a quarterly financial report to this committee.
- Article XI, Section 9a, number 2, delete the word Head Yell Leader,

6. Chairman of Rally Committee.
7. Director of Publicity.
b. Duties and powers:
1. To plan and carry out a school news broadcast three days of the school week, i.e., Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.
2. To administrate and supervise posters, and all other forms of publicity used on the campus with the exception of the approved publications, such as El Gaucho.
3. To assist the Vice-president of the A.S.B. in the administration of an adequate and supervised program of election publicity.
4. To secure adequate handling of campus publicity for all Student Body sponsored events.
- Article XI, Section 13, add to read as follows:
Section 13. All members of committees shall have a vote on their re-

4. Recognition of established organizations may be withdrawn for just cause by vote to that effect of any five members of this board and with approval of the Legislative Council. Organizations shall be given a hearing before this board prior to disqualification. Cause for disqualification are: anti-social, non-cooperative or unorganized.

Section 4. All requests for purchases by the manager or chairman of any activity shall be made on the standard requisition form, provided by the Graduate Manager, signed by the manager or chairman and co-signed by the faculty representative or coach of the activity. This form shall then be presented to the Graduate Manager whose duty it shall be to see that it is a proper order, and is covered by the budget for that activity before issuing the purchase order.

AWARDS

I. PREAMBLE

All awards shall be subject to the approval of the Legislative Council and shall be made at the final awards assembly of the school year.

Awards for those activities completed during the fall semester are given at an awards assembly in January.

Recipients of these awards must maintain a total scholarship average of "C" or higher.

Section 1. All awards are to be given on the basis of the standards approved by the Legislative Council in the following sections.

Section 2. The Legislative Council may authorize the giving of special awards or other awards for exceptional meritorious service to the Associated

Students. The character of the award shall be designated by the Legislative Council.

Section 3. The Legislative Council shall pass upon the character and specifications of all awards. The approved specifications shall be kept on file in the Associated Students Graduate Manager's office and shall be the guide for ordering all awards.

Section 4. Council Awards.

a. All Legislative Council Awards shall be recommended by an awards committee, composed of the Associated Students' President, one Council member, chosen by the President with the consent of the Council, and the faculty representative appointed by the Provost of the college. This committee will also award the Legislative Council certificate.

b. The Legislative Council Key shall be awarded to all voting members of the Council, and shall be awarded on the basis of one year's service to the Associated Students and regular attendance to all Council meetings. Regular attendance shall be recognized as no more than five unexcused absences, the validity of the excused absences being determined by the president of the Associated Students and recorded by the Council Secretary. The Council Key shall be presented at the final awards assembly of the school year. For two years' service as upperclass voting members on the Legislative Council the members shall receive the white gold Council Key with a small sapphire set in the Key.

c. The President of the Associated Student Body shall receive a regulation size gavel and block with a silver plaque on the block, bearing his name and the year in which the award is made. He shall also be awarded a life pass to all college events. These awards to be in addition to the Council awards.

d. All Council members shall be eligible to receive a Council membership certificate.

Section 5. Athletic Awards.

1. Men's Athletic Awards.

a. There shall be a uniform style for all block "C" awards. The block "C" award shall be a gold chenille block "C" on gold felt base, with a small blue "S. B." on the base. The base shall extend past the chenille as a piping of 1/8 of an inch. Its size shall be 5 3/4 inches long and 4 inches wide and the width of the letter shall be 1 1/2 inches throughout all its parts. The above size is to be used to be placed on regulation sweater coats only. For the blanket award, the letter shall be of plain gold felt 12 x 10 1/2 x 2 1/4.

b. Awards for major sports shall be granted as follows:

1. First Varsity Award: Light weight blue coat sweater with gold block letter.

2. Second Varsity Award, in the same sport: Block "C" blanket. The

blanket is to be blue with gold trim. A large block "C" is to be placed in the center of the blanket and the name of the blanket winner stitched in on the lower right corner.

3. Third Carsity Award, in the same sport: Choice of a white sweater with the block "C" and three stars or the block "C" blanket with three stars.

4. The Freshman Award for major sports shall be a light weight pull-over sweater (crew neck) with the class numerals on the front of the sweater. The sweater shall be blue and the numerals gold.

5. No more than one award may be given to a man in any one college year.

c. Additional Awards: Any man who has won a varsity letter in any major sport for three seasons of that sport shall be awarded upon graduation a life pass which will be honored for all athletic contests held under the auspices of the Associated Students of the University of California, Santa Barbara College, on its home grounds. This award is to be issued by the Legislative Council on recommendation of the board of Athletic Control.

d. Awards for Managers: Upon the recommendation of the Student Athletic Manager, Coach of the particular sport, Board of Athletic Control, and with the approval of the Legislative Council, a manager shall receive the award of the particular sport, i.e., Freshman sweater, Varsity sweater, Blanket, and White sweater. The letter "M" shall be placed on the numerals or letters of all awards. A life pass shall be granted to all managers who win their freshman and three varsity manager awards.

e. Football: The athletic award will be awarded to any man who has played the following number of minutes in one season and played in at least half the games in one season.

10 game season 100 minutes
9 game season 90 minutes
8 game season 80 minutes
7 game season 70 minutes
6 game season 60 minutes

f. Baseball: The athletic award will be awarded to any man, excepting pitchers, who has played in 50% of the total innings of all intercollegiate baseball games; to pitchers who have pitched 1/4 the total innings of all inter-collegiate baseball games.

g. Basketball: The athletic award will be awarded to any man who has played a total playing time to average 12 minutes per intercollegiate basketball game for any one season, and who has competed in at least half the total number of intercollegiate games played.

h. Track: The athletic award will be awarded to any man who has earned an average of 3 points in all intercollegiate track meets scheduled and has participated in one half the total intercollegiate meets, or has won or tied for points in the California Collegiate Athletic Association Meet or an official meet of the A. A. U.

i. Awards for the Minor Sports will be a gold circle "C" on a blue background. The awards for Minor Sports will be made upon the recommendation of the coach of the sport and the Board of Athletic Control.

j. All athletic awards require the recommendation of the coach of the sport, and the Board of Athletic Control.

II. WOMEN'S ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION AWARDS.

a. There shall be three types of certificates awarded to members of the Women's Athletic Association according to the sports credit which they have earned. With a third certificate award the girl is eligible to wear, and may purchase, a Women's Athletic Association sweatshirt; with the second certificate award she is eligible, and may purchase the class numerals; and with a third certificate award she may purchase a letter.

b. Basis for making awards:

2. For 11 seasons of participation with one first team or three seconds; or

3. For 10 seasons of participation with two first teams or one first team and three seconds or six second teams; or

4. For 9 seasons of participation with three first teams or two first teams and three seconds or one first team and six second teams.

c. Basis for making Second Awards:
1. The second award may be granted to any woman who has participated in sports for 9 seasons; or

2. For 8 seasons of participation with one second team; or

3. For 7 seasons of participation with one first team or three seconds; or

4. For 6 seasons of participation with two first teams or one first team and three second teams.

d. Basis for making the First Award:

1. The First Award may be granted to any woman who has participated in sports for six seasons; or

2. For 5 seasons of participation with one second team; or

3. For 4 seasons of participation with one first team.

IV. RECALL OF AWARDS

a. At any time the Legislative Council may recall an award because of condition of sweater, such as filth, shabbiness, or any other rules set up by the Council. No person but a letter man shall wear an award, or athletic insignia at any time. The Legislative Council may recall an award because of infringement of this rule on the recommendation of a coach and/or the Board of Athletic Control.

Section 6. Music Awards

a. Any member of the Associated Students who has given three years of meritorious service in the following musical organizations shall receive the music key.

1. Orchestra.
2. Band.
3. Brass Choir.
4. String Ensemble.
5. Glee Club.
6. Treble Ensemble.
7. Acappella Choir.

b. The standard U.C.S.B.C. gold key with the word music raised diagonally across the crest shall be the music award.

c. Recommendations for the award shall be made by the director of the activity and approved by the Music Control Board.

Section 7. Speech Awards

1. For Excellence. (This award may not be given unless excellence is achieved.)

a. Any member of the Associated Students who has been in residence at this college for at least two years and who has achieved excellence in one of the following fields shall receive the Speech Key. A student eligible for this award must exhibit a spirit of co-operation, responsibility, and leadership. Only one of each of these awards is given each year.

1. Acting (for Actor).
2. Acting (for Actress).
3. All Aspects of Theater.
4. Theater Technician.
5. Debate.
6. Oratory.
7. All Around Forensics.

b. The standard U. C. S. B. gold key with the word speech raised diagonally across the crest shall be the Speech Award.

c. Recommendations for these awards may be made by members of the speech faculty and members of the Speech Control Board. Approvals for the awards are then made by the Speech Control Board.

II. HONORS IN ACTING AWARD:

a. Any student who has given the best acting performance of the year is qualified for this award. The award may be given even though the student may not have achieved excellence in acting.

b. The award is a trophy cup, which is the property of the Associated Student Body, which has the recipient's name and the year date engraved upon it.

c. Recommendations for the award

are made by members of the speech faculty and members of the Speech Control Board. Approvals for the award are made by the Speech Control Board.

III. ANNUAL SPEECH CONTEST AWARDS:

a. Participants of the Annual Speech Contest given in the spring semester are eligible for awards in the following divisions:

1. After Dinner Speaking.
2. Oratory.
3. Extemporeous Speaking.

b. Winners shall have their names and year date inscribed on the Associated Student Body trophy cups for each division.

c. Winners are selected by the Speech Contest judges who are appointed by the Speech Control Board. The judges' recommendations are then approved by the Speech Control Board.

IV. INTRAMURAL DEBATE AWARDS

a. The two students composing the winning team in the intramural debate receive this award.

b. The year date and the names of the two students on the winning team are inscribed on the silver Associated Student Body Debate trophy cup.

c. Debate Contest judges appointed by the Speech Control Board select the winners. Their recommendations are then approved by the Speech Control Board.

Section 8. Yell Leaders' Award:

a. The head Yell Leader shall receive a light weight white coat sweater with a gold block "C" and megaphone. His assistants shall receive the insignia only which shall be white. The head Song Leader shall be given a light weight white coat sweater with a gold block "C" and megaphone. Her assistants shall receive the white insignia only, as shall the pianist.

Section 9. Honor Awards:

I. HONOR COPY OF LA CUMBRE

a. The highest honor to be bestowed by the Associated Student Body is given to a senior for outstanding service for character, for leadership, and for scholarship over a four year period.

b. This award shall be the Honor Copy of La Cumbre. The recipient's name shall be inscribed on the Honor Copy Plaque.

c. Selections for recipients of the award shall be made by secret committees.

II. ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS' AND ASSOCIATED MEN STUDENTS' AWARDS:

a. The highest honor to be attained by any students for leadership, for character, for scholarship, and for service in any one year are the Associated Men Students' and Associated Women Students' awards.

b. The two recipients of these awards shall have their names inscribed on Associated Men Students' and Associated Women Students' plaques and shall receive miniature plaques.

c. Selections for recipients of these Honor Awards shall be made by secret committees.

Section 10: Scholarship Awards:

a. There shall be each year a trophy cup awarded to a student in each class with the highest scholastic average. In addition the student with the highest scholastic average shall have his name inscribed on a permanent Associated Student Body cup.

b. These awards will be based on a full year's work of not less than 30 units regardless of period of entrance into the college, fall or spring semester. The awards will be made after the close of the spring semester and awarded in a general assembly at the beginning of the fall semester.
