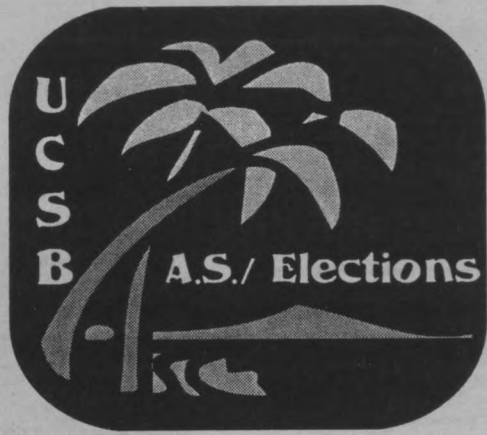

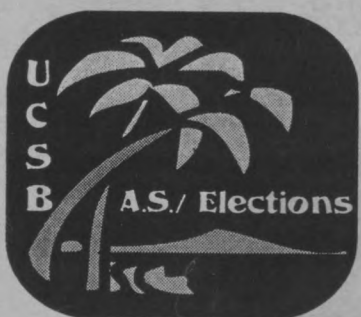

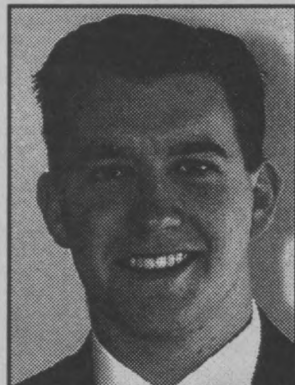

In my experience here as a student, I have witnessed little annoyances that bother us all in our daily student routines. Are you tired of waiting in line for 20 minutes to use a netstation to check your e-mail for a class? Have you ever needed an administrative office but it was closed in the middle of the day for lunch? Have you gotten a busy signal or been disconnected when trying to dial in and check your e-mail? It is issues such as these that affect and waste the time of the student population that I will be addressing as AS President. It is time for the students to come first.

The first of the two goals I intend to accomplish as AS President will be to extend the hours of three administrative offices. The three most important offices to students at UCSB are the Office of Registrar, Office of Financial Aid, and Billing Office. These offices are open from 9am-12pm and 1pm-4pm. The fact they are open for only six hours and close during the busiest part of a school day is completely unacceptable. My objective is to work with the administration to extend hours of these three most important administrative offices for students.

The second goal I project to achieve will be to expand the computing and Internet access for the student population. Two ways for computer access expansion is to establish open-access computer labs dedicated to UCSB students only and to increase and upgrade the current modem pool. This entails upgrading current netstations and finding avenues to make more stations available throughout the campus for the purposes of e-mail, GOLD, and the WWW. Along with little or no computing access, the current state of remote access (i.e. the modem pool) is horribly insufficient. For a population of nearly 20,000 students, there are only a total of 76 modems available. This results in frustration and inconvenience for those trying to check e-mail or use GOLD. My plan is to upgrade and enlarge the modem pool for better student access.

Along with the major goals stated above, I aim to work on issues brought up by students throughout the year. I will then work fervently to bring them to some resolve as quickly and equitably as possible. As well, I refuse to waste my time or the students of UCSB while in office. I promise to submit bi-weekly reports on the WWW, to the press, and to AS Legislative Council. This will ensure students will remain informed.

With all of this in mind, I ask you, the students of UCSB, to allow me to enact the goals I have presented. Vote Joshua Darrieualt for AS President. It is time for the students to come first. (Qualifications and experience info. can be found at <http://www.ivlive.com>)



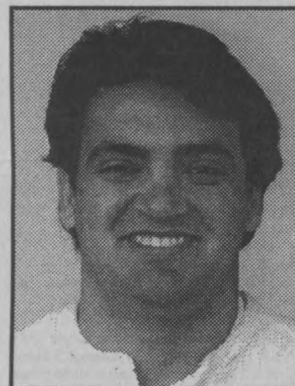

As the EVPLA, I will also work to increase the number of local band and cultural performances, like Dia De Los Muertos, in the park, and hope to empower other student groups to move their cultural celebrations into Isla Vista so that others can experience them.

If you want someone who is community-oriented, be sure to write-in JESSICA GREEN.

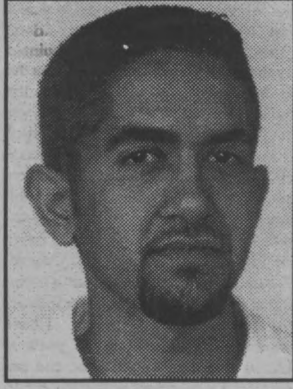
If you want someone who will work on fixing the bike paths, write-in JESSICA GREEN.

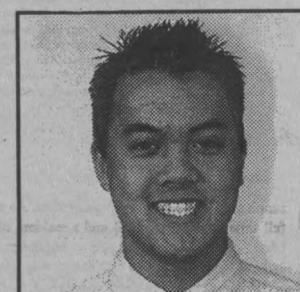

Mariah Hoskins

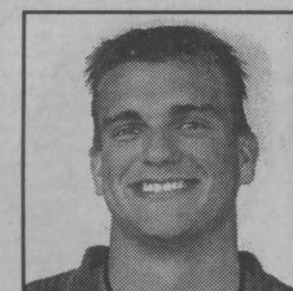

Pro-Statement for the AS Program Board Lock-In Fee Increase

The Program Board is a student run organization that consistently provides quality concerts, lectures and films at a very low cost for Students. Look at the concerts we've done this year: Adam Sandler (\$14), Charlie Hunter Quartet (\$9), The Itals (\$9), Reverend Horton Heat (\$11), Henry Rollins (\$10), Save Ferris (\$10), Everclear (\$13), and Mack 10 (\$12). We've also put on some great films, like Face Off, Contact and Amistad for only \$3 each. Not to mention all the free concerts we do around campus like our weekly acoustic series, storke shows and Extravaganza. This year's Extravaganza will feature Social Distortion and The Roots.

But here's the problem, our costs are constantly rising. We have increased advertising costs, higher minimum wages for our student employees, and simply put, bands that demand more money. It all adds up, and has been adding up for the last 15 years. That's how long it has been since we received a Lock-In Fee increase. This means that the Program Board is functioning on the same budget as it did in the early 1980's, before all the inflation. So the quality and quantity of shows we can provide now, is less than what was intended 15 years ago. If the fee is increased, Program Board will be operating off a budget sufficient to compete in today's modern music industry.

So how much will it take to alleviate the problem? We have decided that if all the students chip in an extra 70 cents every quarter, we will be able to continue our current level of programming, despite recent and upcoming operating cost increases, like minimum wage. With this amount increase, you will see about the same amount of bigger concerts but a few more smaller free events. So what would it take to make programming even better? With a \$1.20 from every student, we

are confident that we could provide more large concerts as well as more free events. What do I mean by large concerts? Hub shows with well known national acts and Event Center shows with Top of the Chart Acts.

So please remember when you go to vote on April 21st or 22nd:

- AS Program Board is a STUDENT run organization
- We are operating off a budget from the early 1980's
- \$0.70 is not too much to continue the quality programming we provide, and \$1.20 is an even better deal, making your college experience that much more fun

The A.S. Program Board (ASPB) is committed to providing excellent and diverse programming for the UCSB community. In addition, we have successfully attempted to accommodate all student groups that have come to us for financial support and guidance. The lock-in fee increase will allow ASPB to maintain events on a weekly basis by keeping up with increasing talent, labor and venue costs.

The last time the ASPB saw a lock-in fee increase was 15 years ago. Since then we have done our best to provide the UCSB students with entertaining events around campus with concerts like Everclear and Save Ferris, films like Contact and Face Off and performers such as Adam Sandler and Henry Rollins. All of these events come with very low ticket prices compared to any professional or off-campus venue or promoter. Remember that we also provide the annual Extravaganza concert festival, the biggest concert event on the Central Coast, for free.

We want the students to decide how much of an increase we should receive. By choosing a 70 cent increase ASPB will be able to continue programming weekly movie nights and free acoustic concerts in the HUB. We will also continue the tradition of showing "up-and-coming" bands in Storke Plaza and showcasing national talent at our HUB concerts. With an increase of \$1.20 ASPB will be able to plan more free movies and lecture events around campus, bigger names for HUB concerts, and possibly make bigger concerts in the Events Center a reality.

It's our university and our Associated Students. Make our vote count. Help us provide quality campus programming for UCSB. Vote YES for the A.S. Program Board lock-in fee increase on April 21st and 22nd.

Bicycle Initiative

PRO Statement

This fee creates a permanent funding source for new and improved bicycle paths, additional bicycle parking, and safer pedestrian crossings at UCSB. A new student committee will govern the student funds, which must be matched every year by the university for the lock-in to continue. Up to \$80,000 a year will be generated and spent on the bicycle path system through this lock-in (while costing students only the price of a soda per quarter).

Improved bicycle paths, bicycle parking, and pedestrian crossing will encourage the use of alternative transportation, reduce the number of cars on campus, and improve the campus environment. The improvements will also increase bicyclist and pedestrian safety and reduce the number of near-misses and serious accidents that occur every year.

Several universities, including UC Berkeley and Irvine, have chosen to deal with the problem of bicycle path funding by simply banning cyclists from the interior of their cam-

pus. A similar fate could befall the UCSB bicycle paths if students, staff, and faculty do not come together and find a cooperative solution. UCSB's bicycle system is a unique and important part of this campus - let's work together to fix it.

CON Statement

Many students want a campus without bicycles and do not wish to contribute to this system in any way. Bicyclists should be forced to dismount at outside the campus and then walk to all their classes and other events. In addition, if the university really wants to improve bikepaths (which are not in that bad a shape) it should take money away from research laboratories and other programs to pay for it.

Pro Statement for A.S. SCORE:

Student Commission On Racial Equality

UCSB established A.S. SCORE to educate the student body on the sensitive issues regarding ethnicity, race or gender that arise from time to time. One such time was during the Los Angeles "uprisings" in 1992 following the Rodney King verdict as it eased campus tensions through forums and discussion sessions. SCORE also assists campus organizations such as the Irish Club, El Congreso, Persian Club, and the Vietnamese Student Association with production of events that celebrate their respective heritages. These cultural experiences also act as an educational experience for those outside of a particular culture.

SCORE supports all socially underrepresented groups in its mission of creating understanding. Disabled Students, Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender Students and the Women's Center all look to SCORE for support. However, at the current lock-in fee of 26 cents, SCORE cannot hope to include these three groups fairly without shortchanging everyone. A.S. SCORE has the lowest lock-in fee amount among the Associated Students Boards and Commissions, and will still have the lowest fee if our initiative passes and the lock-in increases to 51 cents per student.

The Commission hopes that SCORE will achieve the following three goals by the end of this year:

1. A rise in qualified applicants to the board (i.e. previous leadership experience, excellent administrative and managerial skills) so that it can become even more active and involved as an A.S. body,

2. An increased lock-in fee to reflect the enlarging scope of SCORE's activism and to bring the commission's revenue up to par with other A.S. entities.

3. A more involved role in student life.

This year, SCORE cosponsored Raza College Day, History of Rap, M.S. Rocks, Geronimo Pratt, Filipino Culture Night, Vietnamese Culture Night and the Rape Prevention & Education Program national conference, to name just a few. SCORE has been working actively on the EEOI (Equal Educational Opportunity Initiative) that seeks to promote diversity in education while at the same time combating discrimination. Also, SCORE is a major contributor to the Cultural Graduation Celebrations, a vital, annual tradition. It is regrettable that SCORE could not be there during the Nexus/Dogs in I.V. fiasco, or the Woojoe Lee/Keenan Lamkin battles, but with a higher lock-in fee, SCORE can worry less about penny pinching and more about doing our job as the equalizer and promoter of tolerance and diversity at our beautiful UCSB.

Housing, parking, recycling, community services, and concerts in the park. These are all issues that many students care for, and/or complain about. 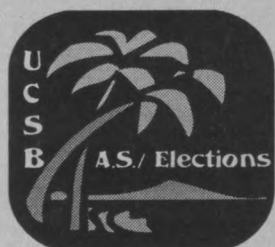

In actuality there are a number of services such as: The Community Counseling Center, The University Children's Center, The IV Medical Clinic, The Isla Vista Youth Projects, The Isla Vista Mediation Program and the Adopt a Block Program, but they are constantly in need of more support and more funding so that they can provide the needed services for all of the people who request their services. In the past there have been other organizations that were very beneficial to the community, but they had to disband because of lack of funding. The AS Community Improvement Lock-in for 75 cents was drafted to make sure that there will always be money available for services and improvements in Isla Vista. Although the County, the University and Associated Students

Luckily, there are various entities that work on these type of issues to make the community of Isla Vista (particularly), a better place to live in. The Associated Students Environmental Affairs Board, for example works on recycling issues in Isla Vista and helps to organize the annual Earth Day Festival. The A.S. Isla Vista Community Relations Committee created a video about the Seawall to inform the community and they also worked on creating the Gaucho Housing Guide, which will come out next year. In addition to AS groups, there's community groups that work on community issues, such as the Isla Vista Youth Task Force which is a collaborative that is working to bring a Teen Center to Isla Vista. The Isla Vista Parks District is another great community organization that maintains over 20 parks for our enjoyment. The County also helps the community in many ways, such as improving the lighting, sidewalks and housing (through the Housing Inspection Program). Then there's the University which provides funds for services such as the IV Foot Patrol and the IV Community Services Center.

We, the student majority UCen Governance Board, are appealing to all students to help us retain the UCen as you know it and to improve it even more for future students. We know you value the UCen as an important part of campus life, but the reality is that the UCen will have to change drastically if it doesn't get some additional fee support. We wouldn't ask for your help if we didn't believe it was absolutely necessary.

The Facts:

- 1) The UCen is not eligible for any state financial support. It is a self-supporting auxiliary unit of the campus.
- 2) Sufficient funds were not provided for the UCen expansion and remodel to cover all the costs of keeping the new public space areas open (custodial, maintenance, utilities, plumbing, air conditioning, heating, etc.).
- 3) None of this new fee will go to support the Bookstore or Dining Services.
- 4) The proposed fee will only pay for operating costs in

public areas: (Lounges, Hallways, Decks, Patios, Restrooms, Hub Seating Area, 3rd Floor Student Offices, Associated Students Offices, Graduate Student Association Office, MultiCultural Center, Meeting Rooms).

5) This fee will allow us to continue being one of the largest employers of students on campus. We're proud of that fact and do not want to cut hours and services which will likely result in the loss of student (and career) jobs.

6) Even with this fee, the UCen will continue to have the lowest student union fee of any comparable building in the UC system.

7) With the proposed fee, we can not only avoid drastic reductions in services, but we can even add a few things which students have requested in our surveys like a Late Night Study Lounge with Nicoletti's kept open and the lounge area wired with free computer use for students.

Please help us. We realize no fee increase is going to be viewed as a positive move. But it is a necessary move to keep the UCen open and to improve it. The Associated Students has formally endorsed our Initiative and is leading the way for many other student groups who are lining up to show their support. Enforcement of Isla Vista Noise Ordinance

If you agree with the following declaration, mark Yes on this ballot. The results will be forwarded to the Isla Vista Foot Patrol, the County and all applicable parties.

"We understand that the Isla Vista Foot Patrol regularly enforces a noise ordinance policy in the Isla Vista area of Goleta that restricts amplified music after 10:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and after 12:00 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights (Saturday and Sunday morning). We are also aware that the Foot Patrol actively issues \$108.00 citations, either with or without having received complaints from other residents, to households that are believed to be violating the ordinance. We are also aware that the police officers may issue these citations without providing the residents with a warning and an opportunity to lower noise to an acceptable level. We do not believe that amplified music that can be heard beyond 100 feet of the property (thereby violating the noise ordinance) during those hours is inherently wrong or disturbing at all times. We believe that the goal of the noise ordinance is to eliminate noise that disturbs the residents of the Isla Vista area of Goleta. We recognize that our right to inform law enforcement officials of any disturbances is not limited to the hours listed in the ordinance and that we can and will do so at any time that we are being disturbed. We support a policy that would enable law enforcement officials to enforce the noise ordinance only after having received a complaint from a resident or after having issued a warning to the household believed to be in violation of the current ordinance."
