Gaucho Participation Sought in Forums **On Atomic Energy**

Four public forums on the "Social and Political Implications of Atomic Energy" will be co-sponsored by the Adult Evening School and the City Recreation Commission, starting Thursday evening, April 8, at 8 pm at Recreation Center, 100 E. Carrillo Street. A special invitation has been extended to Gauchos to participate.

"The challenge of the new age is man's conquest of the political and social problems of atomic energy," according to Edward L. Blincoe, executive director of the Research Forum of Redlands, California, who will lead the discus-

Blincoe added that, "At our first meeting there will be a strictly non-technical presentation of bomb." Graphic displays, motion pictures and miniature experiments will be presented to illustrate the nature of atomic energy, but the course will not be given from a specialist point of view.

The opening topic for the group will be, "The Meaning and Nature of Atomic Energy." On the following three successive Thursday evenings, discussion will center on The Role of the Atom in International Security Problems," 'Your Health and Work in an Atomic Civilization," and "Atomic Control and Its Consequences,' according to Mr. Selmer O. Wake, principal, who is in charge of arrangements for the program.

The forums are open to the public for a one dollar registration fee which admits to all forums and all other adult education activities.
